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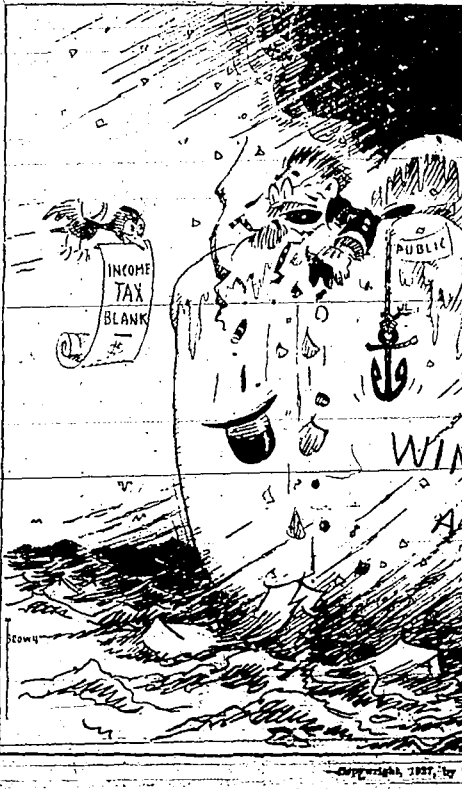
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# THREE POWERS MAY CONFER ON NAVAL PROBLEM

Washington Government Confidently Expects Convening of Conference in Geneva During Early-Summer Months.

(By The Associated Press) GENEVA, March 8 (AP)—The convening in Geneva in June or July of a British-American-Japanese naval limitation conference to discuss maximum tonnage ratios in capital ships, cruisers and submarines is confidently expected by the Washington government.

Definite proposals for a three power attempt to find a suitable formula have been made by the United States to London and Tokyo. While they are informal and possibly no more than verbal in character as yet, replies from awaiting will result in a formal invitation if the plan is accepted as is clearly foreshadowed in preliminary diplomatic conversations.

It is noted that the British-American-Japanese naval limitation project, not a proposal for reduction of tonnage, is under consideration in London and Tokyo, and in the informal exchanges here and in London and Tokyo which followed reports by France and Italy of the original American plan for a five power conference at Geneva.

France and Italy probably will be invited to participate in the three power conference.

**Foreign Participation**  
Some officials believe it possible that ultimately the Paris and Rome governments will find it expedient to participate despite their previous refusal to do so. It is noted in part on the official interpretation of the original American proposal introduced in the French refusal and also upon the basis of the French refusal that the powers fully understand what President Coolidge has in mind, they cannot be taken advantage of by the opportunity to escape competitive naval building. At any rate, it is made clear that the Washington government expects to leave the door open for their participation.

**Meeting to Solve Problem**  
The Washington government probably will not attempt to present any limitation formula in the invitation to Great Britain and Japan. The whole question of what steps will be taken to solve the three major naval problems in each other's own building programs is being handled in the most delicate manner.

Officials here believe that proposed three power conference would evolve a plan to meet tonnage limitations for capital ships, cruisers and submarines at a maximum figure but with a specific requirement for re-examination of these figures at a future date with a view to revision upward of naval building—outlines the tentative group of powers makes that expedient.

**PRELUDE ACCEPTANCE**  
LONDON, March 8 (AP)—The American invitation to Great Britain and Japan announced in Washington today, to hold a three-power naval limitation conference at Geneva, was met with surprise and interest in London.

Great Britain and Japan had already accepted President Coolidge's recent proposal of this nature, which Italy and France failed to do.

It is expected the British government will accept the latest American proposal immediately, although the usual invitation had not reached Downing street late tonight.

**Opinion Favors Plan**  
Public opinion throughout Great Britain, as interpreted by the officials of the government, demands that Great Britain fall into line with the American scheme for disarmament. Despite the headlines under which the American, British and Japanese delegates terminated their talks, it is hoped the work accomplished there may serve to convince France and Italy that it is to their interest to cooperate with the other great naval powers in world disarmament.

The likelihood of other naval powers instituting programs in competition with the greater spirit of the agreements which may be reached at the Geneva is not considered likely here. The British delegates would do in the proposed disarmament conference the important task of emphasizing their country's special requirements in providing sufficient tonnage for the empire's long trade routes.

## POSTPONE GRAIN RATES REVISION

Members of Interstate Commerce Commission to Wait Until Investigation Ends.

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—A revision of rates on grain and grain products from North and South Dakota to principal marketing terminals was postponed today by the Interstate Commerce Commission after its general investigation into western grain rate levels is completed.

A minority of the commission disagreed vigorously with the majority ruling and advocated immediate action on the rate revision.

**Changes in the transportation rates** were proposed to the commission from two different standpoints, railroads serving the territory having filed a bill of rates based on a mileage scale which would have increased the charges of grain moving to markets from North Dakota and western Minnesota, though they incidentally would have placed the two territories on an equal basis in the matter of transportation charges. In South Dakota farm organizations, shippers and representatives of the state government sought a reduction and approved the railroad proposal.

The commission set aside the views of all the contending parties, and the filing of it had already undertaken a general investigation into western grain rates. At the conclusion of that preliminary investigation a basis for all of the rates just mentioned will be handled.

Similar proposals made in the form of rate schedules, were suspended when introduced in 1925 and have never gone into effect. The decision today ordered them cancelled.

**RELIGION MUST SHAPE NEW IDEA OF DIETY**

CHICAGO, March 8 (AP)—Religion must shape a new idea of God as a deity aligned with scientific advancement in science and democracy, Dean Shaler Matthews of the University of Chicago theological school said in an address to Methodist ministers meeting a host for the day.

"We can not sweep back the ocean of science," Dean Matthews said, "and we must not try to align God with science as they now exist. Our old idea of the deity as a postulated monarch no longer endures."

"We must not try to analyze men's souls through gibberish," he said, "but we must try to align psychology to the old religion by interpreting them in our deities, not our origins."

## SEVEN ENACTMENTS OF IDAHO LEGISLATURE GET SIGNATURE OF GOVERNOR

Two Education Measures Are Among Others Signed During Day by State's Executive.

BOISE, March 8 (AP)—Governor H. C. Halliday today approved seven legislative enactments, all of which originated in the senate. They include two education measures, one of which permits independent classes and joint independent school districts to issue bonds, if authorized by election, in an amount equaling 10 per cent of the district's assessed valuation, while rural independent school districts may issue bonds up to 4 per cent of their valuations. The other provides that common school districts may vote to furnish transportation for high school students.

Approval was also given a measure which increases the time for filing machine licenses from 60 to 90 days. Other measures approved permit the highway department to do maintenance work under \$2000 without letting contracts, permit the public utilities commission to suspend the certificate of a school district upon written consent of applicants, fix fees to be charged for copies of records of industrial accident board hearings and require registration of collection agencies with the commissioner of finance.

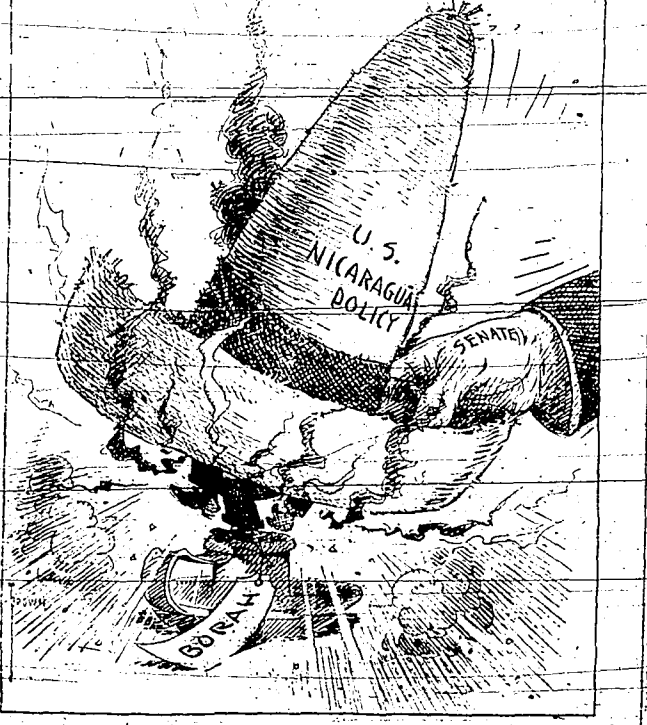

Before an interested audience of 350 people the Twin Falls affirmative team won its initial debate from the Gooding negative team in Twin Falls high school auditorium Tuesday evening. The question was: "Resolved, That the United States should cancel the French debt."

The argument was opened by James Bothwell of the affirmative team. He asserted that the debt should be cancelled because it was the result of the first place, and that it was our moral obligation to pay. Miss Helen Percy for the negative proved by a study of French history that it was unnecessary for the United States to make the cancellation.

The second affirmative speaker, Kenneth King, stressed necessity of debt cancellation for economic and political reasons, declaring that it was worth economically to have France prosperous than to have the debt paid. Royal Hubbard for the negative advanced the argument that it would be impractical to cancel the debt, while Byron Reinhardt argued for cancellation by comparing the natural resources and national wealth of the two countries.

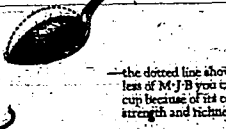

**INCREASED SEED  
ACREAGE DOOMS**

**Farmers of Idaho Enthusiastic  
Over Clover Outlook, Survey  
of Situation Indicates.**

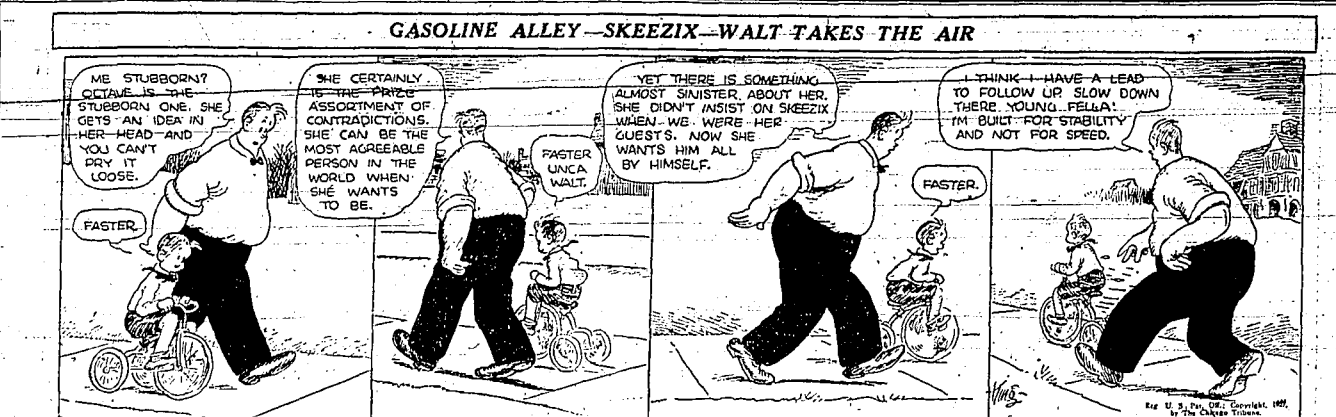
BOISE, March 8.—Farmers throughout the state are extremely enthusiastic about red clover seed production, says C. B. Abson, field agronomist and state seed commissioner. The survey of the clover seed situation indicates that Idaho farmers can profitably continue to keep red clover in the rotations. The good prices of recent years, and especially this year, will have a tendency to increase the acreage. It is the history of the clover seed industry here and other industries, that high prices stimulate acreage. Many farmers will look late to purchase seed and other things toward the planting of clover seed, which invariably is not profitable for a seed crop. The resultant crop is very likely to be smaller and will not command the price available for the present price of seed of another year grade seed. The planting of inferior seed will mean better profits for the farmer and the grower will condemn the red clover seed industry when he is at fault.

**Recommendations Afford Seed**  
If the grower cannot afford to plant the recommended amount of 8 to 10 pounds of high quality seed per acre, it would be better to plant 4 to 5 pounds of good quality than a surplus amount of inferior seed, to control weeds, the good, clean, well prepared seed. Ordinarily in the spring a nurse crop is planted with red clover. The best nurse crop is a mixture of rye and timothy, because these varieties produce less foliage and can stand up to a generally high degree of winter injury. It is suggested that the grower plant a nurse stand to insure about 80 pounds of grain instead of 100. Perhaps farmers in Twin Falls are not getting the best part of Lincoln county should adhere to the Dicklow wheat as a nurse crop. Quality seed is the most important factor. Get a good grade. A two ounce sample should be sent to the state seed laboratory, Noble building, Boise, or branch laboratory, Moscow, for analysis. The report on the lot will indicate whether or not the seed is desirable to put into the soil.

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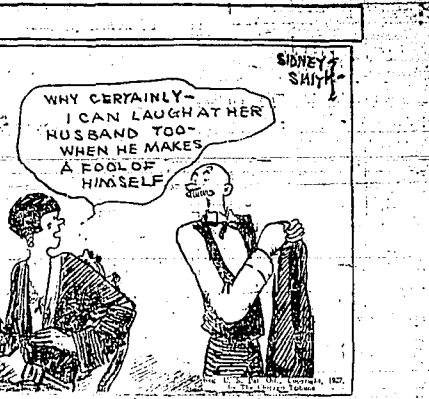
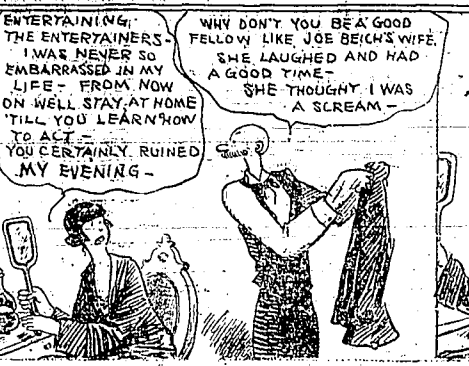

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# SCHOOL BOARD AUTHORIZED TO LEVY EXTRA TAX

### Twin Falls District Electors for Fourth Consecutive Year Approve Seven Mills Levy for Maintaining Schools.

Twin Falls independent school district electors voted, 107 to 21, at an election Tuesday, to authorize the board of education to levy a tax of seven mills in addition to eight mills levy made without such authorization for maintenance of Twin Falls public schools next year.

The total vote, 128, was higher than that cast at any of the three preceding annual elections at which the district voters have authorized the extra-tax levy.

### Board's Estimates

It is estimated that the seven-mills levy for which authorization was voted Tuesday will yield approximately \$56,600.74. The eight-mills levy for which authorization was voted Tuesday is expected to yield \$67,725.00, bringing the total district tax revenue for this purpose up to \$124,325.74.

Under the existing tax procedure for expenditure of \$100,000 for maintenance of Twin Falls public schools, the board will be unable to provide for this purpose of appointments of state and county school funds.

# TRIO'S EXPLOIT ENDS MISERABLY

### Vern Taylor of Buhl in Hospital With Broken Leg and Two Companions in Jail.

Vern Taylor, 30, of Buhl, lies in the Twin Falls county general hospital, with a broken leg, and two companions, Herb Peters, 20, of Ellettsville, and Thomas, 40, of Marshfield, Oregon, are incarcerated in the county jail at Twin Falls as a result of exploits which culminated in an automobile wreck one mile west of Curry on the state highway shortly before 10 o'clock Tuesday morning.

Members of the sheriff's force who happened along shortly after the accident, disarmed the rascals, removed Taylor to the county hospital and escorted other members of the trio who were reported to have been in an intoxicated condition to Twin Falls. Up on sight of the jail and probable recognition of an officer of the law Thomas is alleged to have come to a realization of his destiny and shortly before the car stopped at the entrance to the court house jumped from the moving machine on the first move in an effort to escape his captors. His flight was impeded, however, when he reached the sidewalk and tumbled and injured his knee to the extent that the county physician was called to take four stitches to close the wound. Officers apprehended Thomas in the rear of the Baptist church on Second avenue. During the entire proceeding Taylor remained in the sheriff's car pending developments.

The Ford car in which the men were coming to Twin Falls was totally wrecked when it encountered a telephone pole several yards from the highway at a point one mile west of Curry.

Charges of driving while intoxicated will probably be preferred against Taylor and Thomas and Tate will probably face charges of drunkenness, it was indicated.
