

RENEWS DEMAND FOR RELEASE OF FOUR RUSSIANS

Soviet Government Sends Second Note Asking Immediate Freedom for Couriers; Chinese Authorities Act.

(By The Associated Press.)
MOSCOW, March 9 (AP)—The Soviet government today renewed its demand on Peking for the release of four Russian couriers held in China. The note, signed by Michael Borodin, advisor to the Chinese government, and the three Soviet couriers, Vladimir Kuznetsov, Vladimir Kuznetsov and Vladimir Kuznetsov, were received in Peking today.

The demand was sent to the Chinese minister in Moscow and was a reiteration of a previous note on the matter sent to the Peking authorities.

Government officials said they recognized that Chang Tso Lin, Manchurian warlord, who was reported to have ordered the release of the couriers, had been ordered to do so. They said, however, they were not sure whether the couriers would be released. They stated that no answer would be expected to the demand until the Chinese government officials said that they could not believe that Chang Tso Lin would go so far as to order the execution of the couriers and admit that they were contrary without confirmation of such a report.

CHANG HOLDS WOMAN

SHANGHAI, March 9 (AP)—The drive of the Chinese for the city of Moscow and the attendant threat on Shanghai today were overshadowed momentarily by the possibility of strained relations between the Chinese government and Moscow growing out of the arrest of Mme. Borodin, wife of the advisor to the Chinese government, and three Soviet couriers.

While Mme. Borodin is in the hands of General Chang Tsung Chang, who is in a delicate position, there are contradictory reports as to the fate of the three other Russian emissaries. Details from Chinese sources indicate that the three had been released and are generally believed here that they have not been held.

Chinese authorities declare there have been increasing indications that large numbers of Cantonese emissaries have been arrested in an effort to stop their activities. Every precaution already has been taken to prevent an influx of these emissaries into Shanghai. The Chinese government and other northern industrial centers.

It is charged here that the Soviet steamer Panlai Lenin, on which Mme. Borodin and the couriers were seized, is a Soviet ship. It is reported that the vessel was carrying a large quantity of munitions and only a few pounds of gold.

JUROR HITS TO

COURT DECIDES DRAINAGE CASE

Idaho Tribunal Holds Law Requiring Payment of Certain Funds Unconstitutional.

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Psychiatrist Admits Croak

The admission by Dr. William J. Hickson, director of the municipal psychiatric laboratory, that Croarkin was insane, was the first step in a legal battle for his release, as he was when he shot the little boy.

Concurs in Opinion

"My opinion, based upon my examination of the defendant, is that he is insane," Dr. Hickson said today. "He is insane, his absolute indifference to the enormity of the act he committed, his complete lack of remorse or regret, that Harold Croarkin was insane at the time he committed the murder and is now insane."

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BATTLE AGAINST DIFFICULT ODDS IN QUAKE AREA

Thousands of Refugees, in Sore Need of Relief, Struggle Valiantly to Bring Order Out of Chaos in Japan.

(By The Associated Press.)

TOKYO, March 9.—Thousands of refugees in central Japan, shivering, hungry and in sore need of medical aid, tonight were struggling to bring order out of the chaos created Monday night by the earthquake, which already is known to have taken a toll of more than 200,000 lives.

The home office this afternoon stated that its latest estimates showed that 2275 persons were killed and 3441 injured. Information received by Tokyo news papers, however, indicated that the dead in the entire earthquake region would number more than 300,000 while one everywhere stating that the toll would amount to 500,000 from 50,000 to 75,000 homeless.

Heart-Bending Scenes

The correspondent for the Tokyo Asahi Shimbun, who traveled through the stricken area in Miyazaki, said that the scenes in Miyazaki, where more than 1000 people were killed, were heart-bending.

He was expected to show that only a small amount of relief.

Many relatives of victims of the quake spent the day digging in the ruins of devastated villages seeking the bodies of fathers, mothers, sons and daughters. Funeral pyres were built and bodies cremated.

Shading areas were dug in the snow covered ground, even small children assisting in the burial rites. Bits of half-burned sticks, raked from the debris, were used as incense sticks for the offering of prayers before burial. Japanese and Christian preachers and priests were everywhere aiding and comforting widows and orphans.

DEBATE ADVISABILITY OF ENACTING CENSORSHIP LAW

ALBANY, N. Y., March 9 (AP)—Actors, authors and managers at the annual and representative of religious and reform organizations on the other, debated the advisability of enacting a state censorship law at a hearing today before the state assembly committee on education. While interest in the hearing was great, fireworks were lacking and there was no exchange of personal attacks that frequently have marked hearings of this nature in the past.

He said he had transmitted to Tokyo the note received from the state department during the day.

RESUME INQUEST INTO DEATHS OF 8 INFANTS

CHICAGO, March 9 (AP)—Resumption today of the coroner's inquest into the deaths of six infants given their acid instead of water at Columbia Memorial hospital developed into an object-lesson for the nation but produced few new facts looking toward the fixing of official responsibility.

There still was ascribed official blame for the deaths in testimony by Dr. W. D. McNally, coroner's chemist, who analyzed the babies' vital organs.

McNally previously testified that many as a beneficial hot bath-wash, was said by Dr. McNally to have been fatal in many instances, even in very small doses, although the reactions to it varied widely.

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PATRIOTIC DESIRE OF GIRL SCOUT COSTS LIFE

LEXINGTON, Neb., March 9 (AP)—The patriotic desire of Mildred E. Fugate, 17, of Lexington, to save the American flag from desecration cost her life.

The flag had been mired in a 100-foot landing tower alongside the high school on an addition to the school could be erected. Contrary to the regulations, it had been allowed to remain on the hoist for several nights much to the displeasure of war veterans and the girl herself.

UTAH AUTHORITIES JOIN IN SEARCH FOR THIEVES

SALT LAKE CITY, March 9 (AP)—City and county authorities joined tonight in an intensive hunt for a gang of expert diamond thieves responsible for a boldly executed holdup and robbery this morning in Salt Lake City.

The robbery, coming almost on the heels of the daring holdup of Mrs. D. B. Brown, jewelry merchant, two weeks ago at a local hotel, has convinced a "Bureau of Detectives" that a gang of robbers syndicate has selected Salt Lake City as the scene of its operations.

Authorities believe the same gang to have been responsible for a recent jewelry store robbery in Denver and it is thought its scope of criminal activities extends to other cities.

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WOMAN HELD TO ANSWER CHARGE

Mrs. Margaret Rowan, Cult Leader, Accused of Conspiracy to Commit Murder.

LOS ANGELES, March 9 (AP)—Mrs. Margaret Rowan, religion leader, who at one time called upon members of her following to prepare for the end of the world, today was held in jail on a charge of conspiracy to commit murder.

In arraignment proceedings she was accused of having plotted to slay Dr. Bert E. Palmer, leader of an opposing cult. Palmer charged that he was threatened by Rowan near her home and dragged and given a beating. He said the attack followed his threats to expose the activities of Mrs. Rowan and her followers.

Followers Admit Attack

Dr. J. W. "Pat" Baker, 51, 3155 May A. St., leader of a cult, Mrs. Rowan's cult, have been named with her in the conspiracy charges after being arrested at the scene of the assault in their cult in Los Angeles.

Mrs. Rowan disappeared for more than a week following the attack on Palmer. She was later located in the mountains, near Mead, where she had been "killed." They admitted the attack, implicating the leader of their cult as the instigator.

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Publicity Stunt Of Theatre Man Gets Big Action

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 9 (AP)—When Tom Arthur, Mason City, Iowa, theater manager, decided to obtain some publicity last January by announcing the hypothetical receipt through the mails of \$40,000 in currency, he started something which "learned" that the money came in a little brass bound cigar chest, was intended for them.

Kansas City's candidate, probably the most persistent, sent the Mason City postmaster 10 cents in stamps with instructions to forward the package to him and when the money was not forthcoming retained a lawyer.

Clairmont Holdup

Mr. Arthur of Kansas City explained that he had been held up here by a friend of his who later repented and called him on the telephone, saying that the money had been mailed to him in Mason City.

No such holdup had been reported to the police.

Efforts by the attorney to obtain the money for his client resulted in the clearing up of the mystery today. The Mason City postmaster was advised that the theater manager perpetrated the hoax for publicity purposes and that Mr. Arthur of Mason City knew who mailed the package and that it contained \$40,000 in currency, which costed up a lot less than \$40,000.

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1484 CARS IDAHO PRODUCE INSPECTED DURING MONTH

BOISE, March 9 (AP)—Federal agricultural inspectors in Idaho inspected 1484 cars of farm produce during February. L. C. Schulz, federal inspector for Idaho, announced today that the number of cars inspected during January while the crop movement in Idaho is expected to increase. Since July 1, 1926, the federal force has inspected 12,123 cars of Idaho produce.

February inspections were made on 1443 cars of potatoes, two cars of onions and 20 of apples.

GOVERNOR BALDRIDGE SIGNS THREE MEASURES

BOISE, March 9 (AP)—Three legislative enactments were approved today by Governor H. C. Baldrige. These increase the salaries of the commissioners of agriculture, public welfare, public investments and law enforcement from \$3000 to \$3500 annually, provide \$1200 for the salary increase to \$3500 authorized the mining inspector, and provide one common fund for law libraries at Lewiston, Pocatello and Boise.

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JURY RECOMMENDS DEATH FOR TWO COLORADO BOYS

HOT SULPHUR SPRINGS, Colo., March 9 (AP)—A jury here today found Raymond Nokes and Arthur Osborne, each 17, guilty of first degree murder of Fred K. Betck, aged hermit and money lender of Grand Lake, Colorado. The jury recommended the death penalty.

Nokes was hanged to a tree in the mountains, July 21, 1926, and his cabin looted by the youth who were in search of money. Betck's body was not found until about a month after the crime. The youth pleaded insanity at their trial.

The new athletic constitution adopted by the high schools is being so rigidly followed here causing considerable comment among the school officials and coaches. Among other things it stipulates that an athlete can participate in only three events, including the relay, in any meet.

Bound in Theory

In theory the ruling is sound as it is by the high schools of the state in general, but in practice such as Timm and Meyer would have been participating in four events in the half the events in which they were points in the state meet. The constitution also provides that any athlete who enters three events in the 200 yards can enter only one event. This eliminates the possibility of a distance man participating in the field events. The 50 yard dash has been eliminated from the state championship in the state and the mile relay has been added. With these rulings in force it will be necessary for each team to have at least five quarter-milers, four for the relay and another to participate in the 100 yard dash.

A letter has been addressed to J. J. Rice, secretary of the Idaho High School Athletic Association, asking for a clarification of the rulings laid down as confusing will result from individual interpretations.

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ATTACKS MOVES IN HINTON CASE

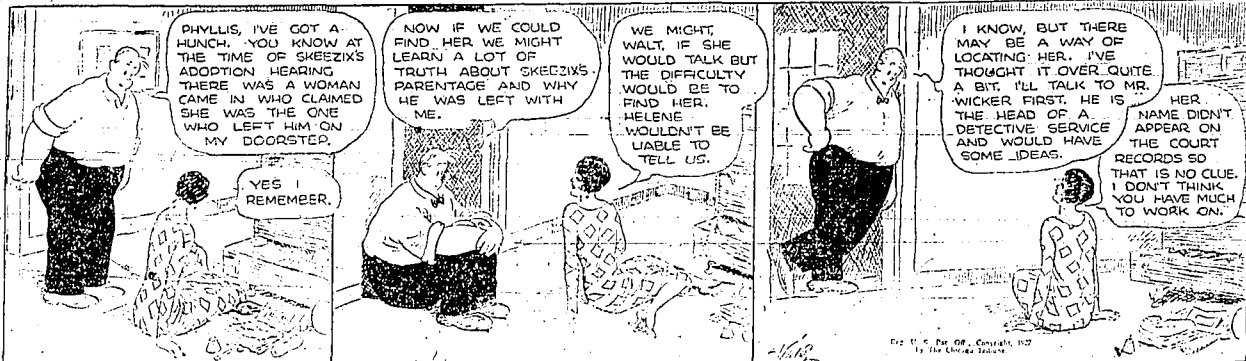
Defense Attorney Urges Motion to Quash Information Because of Alleged Flaw.

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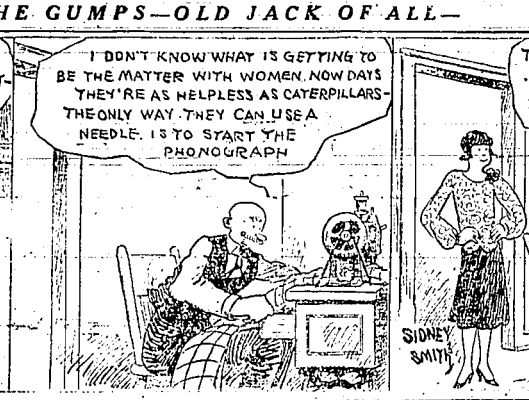
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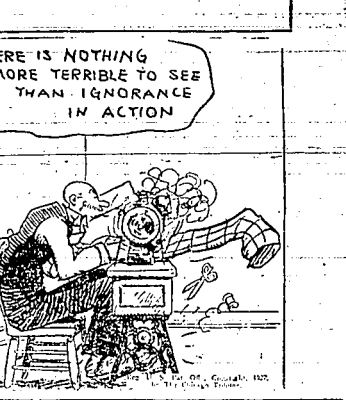

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ORDERS MAN REPORTED DEAD TO SERVE TERM

County Attorney Takes Steps to Require Bondsmen for K. S. Peters to Furnish Court With Proof of Death.

An order calling for imprisonment of a man who is reported to have been dead since last summer was drafted Wednesday by Judge W. A. Hahnel in district court here.

The order was drafted by O. W. Witham, prosecuting attorney, in conformity with an order of Idaho's supreme court which requires K. S. Peters and Frank H. Leeboldt to give bonds of from 1 to 10 years over the state prison for each member of the bond in the amount of \$10,000 and \$15,000 from the Mutual Building and Loan association.

Peters is alleged to have been found dead last summer in this automobile on the edge of Death Valley in California.

Leeboldt is said to be living now in Los Angeles and will return to pay the penalty of the offense of which he was convicted.

Peters and Leeboldt furnished bonds in the sum of \$100,000 for their conviction in district court here in May, 1924, pending the outcome of their appeal to the supreme court.

Under the order, Wednesday in the district judge, will call upon the sheriff in producing the convicted men in court here. Bondsmen will be held responsible in event of failure of either of the convicted men to respond to this summons.

Bondsmen for Peters, who are Frank Kruger and Robert Schuster, will be represented, it was learned Wednesday, by a quartet composed of F. J. Wood, Mrs. S. H. Postler, Mrs. H. J. Postler and Miss Anna Robert with accompaniment at the place provided by Mrs. Joe Laughlin. Members of the quartet and the accompanist are residents of Kimberly.

Pullman's chosen from among citizens of Kimberly who were intimate friends of the deceased were H. H. Burton, Fred Cook, William Conkey, Mervin Gill, Roland Harbin and O. P. Bellowood.

Not all of the insurance companies which had insured Peters' life had paid claims presented on evidence of his death, Mr. Witham said he had been advised.

IDAHO POWER GETS NO FREE WATER AT FALLS

Engineer Expects Big Reservoir to Fill With Big Waste First Season, but Will Not Make Definite Prediction.

The Idaho Power company will obtain no free water from the American Falls reservoir with the consent of the water conservators of the county. Members of the board went on record in this effect at a meeting at American Falls Tuesday at which representatives of the power company stated that the company's water rights in the reservoir for operation of the plant are exhausted within a few days. Normal flow waters would not be taken into the stream below the reservoir for some months.

Conditions on the Snake river water shed this season and records of runoff in past seasons indicate that the big reservoir will fill this season, and that some 600,000 acre feet of water may be wasted over the top of the dam. F. A. Bailey, reclamation services engineer in charge of the American Falls project, told members of the advisory board. He would not make a definite prediction, however, that the reservoir would fill this season, but pointed out that the big dam has not yet been put to test.

The board recommended that the Idaho Power, reclamation watermaster for district No. 26, be authorized to distribute the American Falls reservoir waters this season in that he allowed a minimal salary for this work.

American Falls reservoir district directors met in the millinery board meeting and also held a meeting of their own at which authorization was given for making contracts with several local companies involved in the project for handling of American Falls water bought by them through the district.

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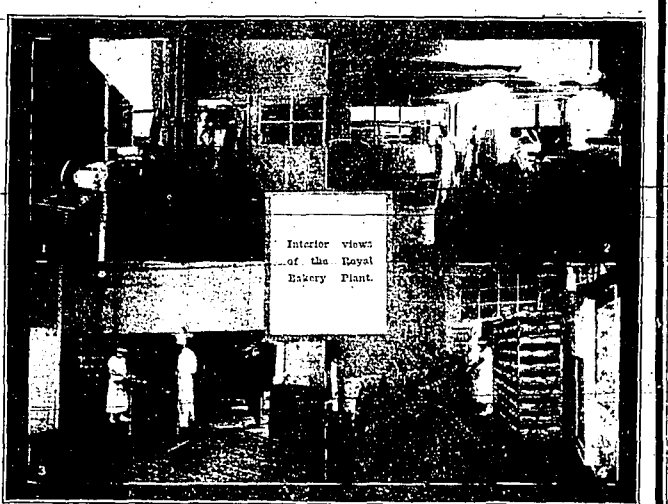
