NEW DIRECTORS FOR BRUIN CLUB NAMED AT MEET

Five Twin Falls and Two Buhl Men Selected to Direct Destinies of Local Baseball Team During 1927 Season.

Harry Bonit, Al Kiefer, George Sandholz, Joe Kuehler and Dr. Alexander of Twin Falls and L. F. Meredith and J. H. Adams of Buhl were elected or the board of directors of the Twin Falls baseball club at the club meeting in the J. K. Hall last evening. A new president and secretary-treasurer will be chosen by the board from among its membership to serve for one year.

Cowley Reports
President Cowley opened the meeting by reading a partial report of the past season. He indicated that many of the expenditures made last year were of a permanent nature and would not have to be duplicated again this season. Among them was an expenditure of about \$750 for equipment, the greater part of which is on hand and in good condition for use this season. There was also an expense of \$125 for permanent improvements on the ball park. The grounds this year are in the shape of a new field. It will be necessary to pay them in playing order.

An expensive item last year was the training season, extensive all of which were borne by the Twin Falls club. By virtue of the contract entered into with the Sacramento club this year a large portion of this expense will be eliminated as the east club will train a good many of the players for Twin Falls.

Terms of Contract
The contract in question gives the Sacramento club the privilege of furnishing the Twins with promising players, and a satisfactory manager, their salaries to be paid by the local club. The Sacramento club also agrees to absorb any deficit incurred during the season up to \$2000, and retains the privilege of an option on any player furnished by paying the local club \$750.

Stockholders were enthusiastic over the prospects for the season and with a schedule arranged by coach Eugene Estess, season expenses show prospects of being materially reduced. The schedule calls for six game series instead of three, as was the case last year.

League of Nations Would Prevent War
GENEVA, March 15 (AP)—The league of nations is interested in preventing outbreaks of any war, regardless of whether the nations concerned are members of the league. This was made clear today in a report adopted by the league council committee engaged in interpreting the league covenant as an instrument for preventing war.

No nations are named in the report, but it indicates that any dispute—even though it involves the United States, Mexico, Turkey or any other non-member, becomes a matter of concern to the council. That body should study the advisability of bringing into play all preventive measures.

The report concludes that if specific measures, it war occurs, it is probable that events will have made it possible to say which state is the aggressor.

NEW RADIO COMMISSION COMPLETES ORGANIZATION

WASHINGTON, March 15 (AP)—The new federal radio commission completed its organization today and took several steps toward establishing its authority over communication by air.

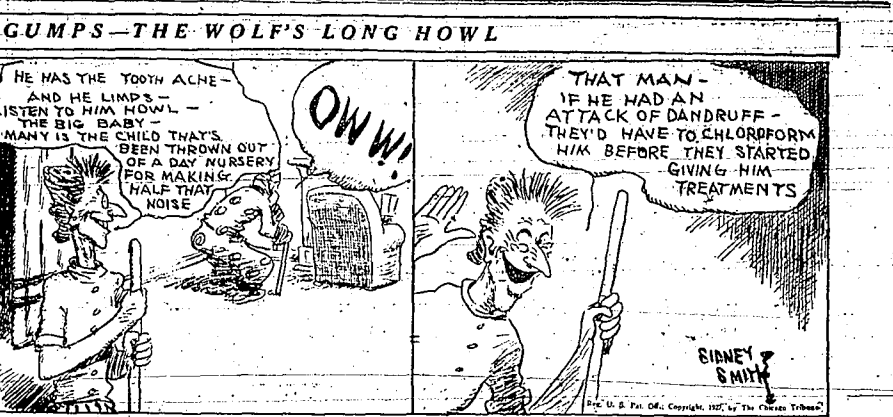
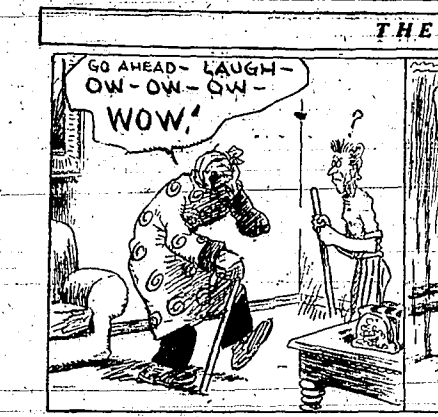

RETAIN SMITH AS MANAGER OF CANAL COMPANY

Directors Re-elect Administrative Head of Irrigation System Operation With One Dissenting Vote.

Barton Smith, chief general manager for the Twin Falls Canal company, was Tuesday elected by the canal company directors to serve the company in that capacity for a fourth year. Directors divided four to one on the vote for general manager. Carl J. Miller of Butte voted in the negative and expressed his vote on the ground that canal company administration during the past two years had been extravagant. Expenditures for operation of the system two years ago, he asserted, exceeded the budget appropriation by \$25,000 and excess on that account last year amounted to \$10,000.

In reply, Mr. Smith discussed canal company operations that had involved unseasonable expenditures during those seasons, and referred to the policy recently adopted by the directors whereby the directors assume responsibility for expenditures.

Other Officials Named

Justice James R. Balfanz was re-elected as legal advisor for the company, and contract for medical and surgical treatment and hospital care for canal employees was awarded to Dr. R. Morgan of Twin Falls and Dr. J. H. Murphy of Butte.

The directors made no changes in the salaries of the officials who were re-elected.

Schedule of wages for the coming season was adopted, only one material change being made as compared with last season's schedule. Salary of J. H. Perrine as engineer was increased \$10 a month.
