Coroner's Jury Falls to Fix Responsibility. Holds Nurses Negligent and Medical Staff "Lax and Inefficient."

CHICAGO, March 18 (AP) - The negligence of two nurses and the "great laxity and inefficiency" of the medical staff of the Columbus Memorial hospital were held responsible for the deaths of six babies February 29, who were fed a horrid acid solution instead of sterile water, a coroner's jury decided today.

The two nurses, Miriam Alleca Callahan and Margaret Cuff, who prepared and fed the solution, were held "negligent" while the jury said it was also their belief that there is a greater need for closer cooperation between the medical staff and the nursing staff.

Commission Disapproves Plan for Consolidation

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP)—Henry Ford's proposals to consolidate his railroad properties into a single corporation eliminating minority stockholders, are being disapproved by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The Detroit & Frontier company, a new corporation of which the Ford interests are the sole stockholders, was refused permission to take over the Detroit, Toledo & Frontier railroad, in which Mr. Ford owns nearly 99 per cent of the stock.

Permission was likewise refused the Detroit, Toledo & Frontier company to issue stocks and bonds contemplated in the transaction, and it was denied the power to take over the Toledo-Detroit railroad, a short line operating in the Detroit territory.

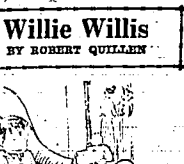

BROTHER'S NEED MOTIVE FOR ACT OF ACCUSED MAN

Frank Hinton of Hansen, on Trial on Felony Charge of Receiving Stolen Property, Testifies in Own Defense.

When he learned that his younger brother was in trouble and in jail and wanted him to remove certain property, William Frank Hinton of Hansen, university graduate civil engineer and farmer, testifying in his own defense in district court here Friday, said that he acted in compliance with his brother's request.

His younger brother, Clyde Hinton, serving a term in the state prison for burglary, testified Friday as a witness summoned by the prosecution in the effort that he had stolen the property which, after being arrested here last January, had asked Frank Hinton to take away from the residence of Mrs. Stella Stevens on Third avenue east where Clyde had been a roomer. The property, which has been identified by the owners, included a rifle, revolvers and pistols, field glasses and four hunting knives. It was a part of the loot that Clyde had confessed to have taken from the Stevens home in nearly a score of burglaries committed in this region during a period of about two years.

He was followed by C. E. Munson of Twin Falls, who testified as a good reputation borne by the defendant.

Officers testify in rounding out his case in court which was opened Thursday, C. W. Wilham, county attorney, called to the witness stand Friday, besides Clyde Hinton, R. E. Leighton, chief of police; M. E. Simpson, police officer; W. S. Watson, deputy sheriff. The officers told of the discovery of the stolen property on the Hinton ranch, and of Frank Hinton's statements to them at that time. Some emphasis was placed on the discovery of a rifle in a straw shed after Frank Hinton's alleged statement to the officers that he had lost the rifle.

Bridge Men Here To View Big Span

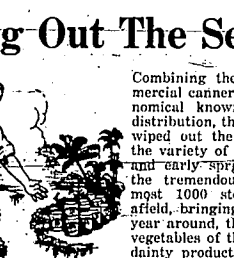
