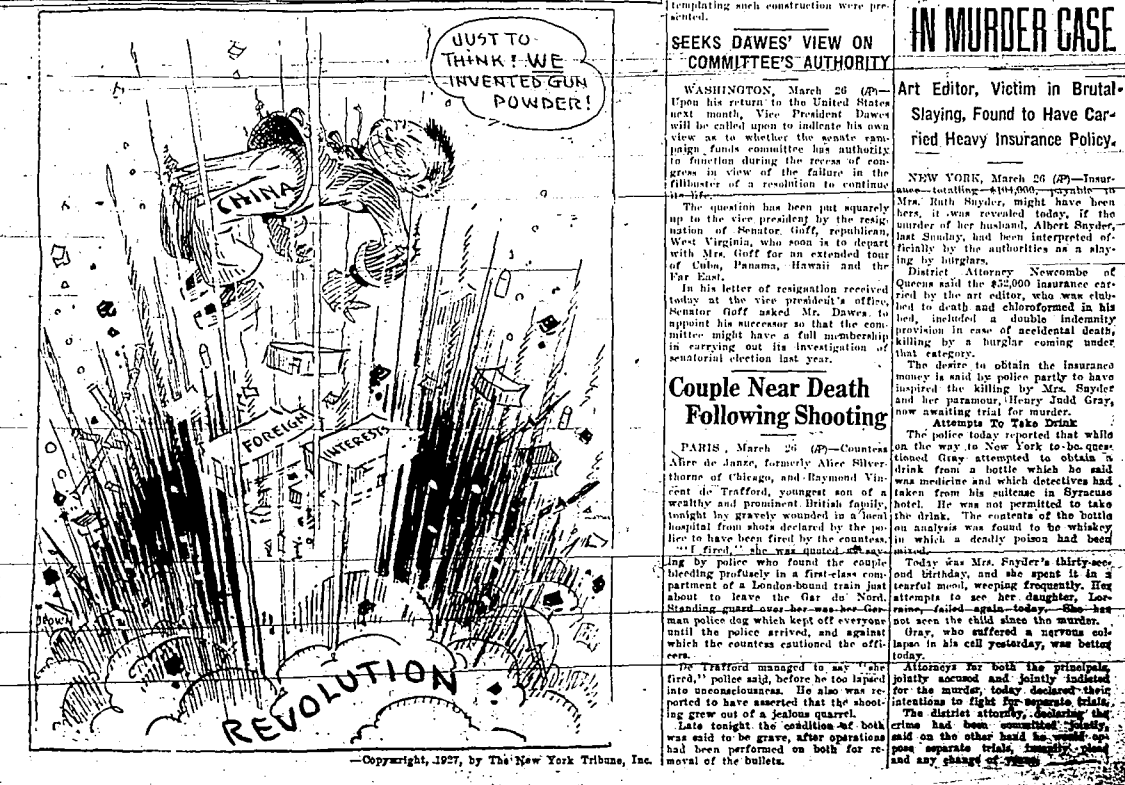

HAIR BETRAYS RACE AND SEX

University of Chicago—Student Cites Experiments Before Anthropological Sessions.

CHICAGO, March 26 (AP)—Human hair betrays race, nationality, sex and probably age, the American Anthropological Association of Central, Eastern and Southern States was informed at its annual meeting here today by a student at the University of Chicago, who has conducted detailed experiments with hair of all colors and textures.

An Irishman's hair, for instance, has different weight than a Russian's, and an old Irishman's hair, Mr. H. J. Hooton said he believed, would show a definite difference from a young Irishman's.

Important Discovery
This discovery has considerable importance in the realm of physical anthropology, Hooton said, inasmuch as researchers may now have had to work upon as well as shape or make any anthropological determinations.

"Differences in hair weight was due to three causes," he said, "first, difference in quantity of pigment present; second, presence or absence of an bulb; and third, differences in area of cross section, that is, coarseness of hair. Second differences seem to be due to the difference in the amount of pigment."

On the other hand, Chinese women and children were captured and sent to a detention camp. The American consuls who had been sent ashore to guard the consulates assembled themselves, splendidly and completely, the Nanking fall refugees early in the morning.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, March 26 (AP)—Idaho's 1927 football prospects aren't what they had been cracked up to be. This warning sentiment is freely declared now, as all those in touch with the football situation here.

It isn't so much the reason for all this ballyhooing, up and down the coast and in Idaho about what a wonderful ball season is going to have next year, Coach Charles Erb complained recently. "We ought to have a pretty good team but it certainly won't be a wonder event by any means."

It is pointed out that much of the material upon which Idaho backers are basing their hopes is inexperienced and green, and that to expect consistent high grade performance next fall is expecting a little too much.

Varsity prospects have also offered a number of rather heavy blows during the winter. 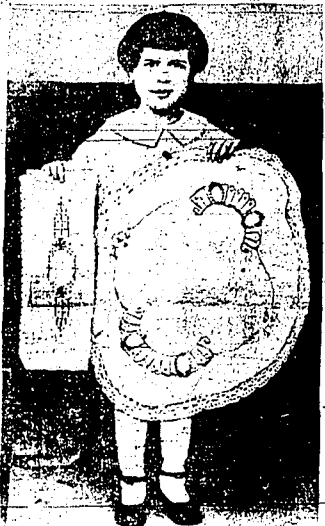

Marian's epithets mean against heartless combinations of colors. "I hope to see the day," he says, "when men will have the same disgust for an unworthy style as for a vice."

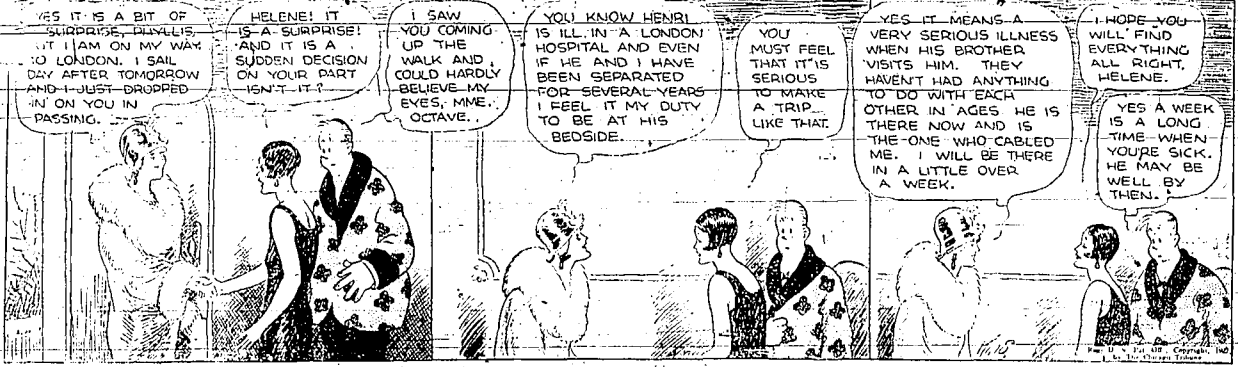

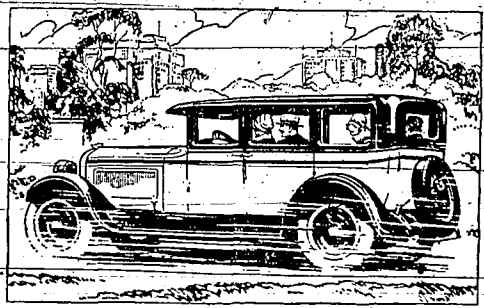
