LEADERS ISSUE PLEA FOR UNITY WITHIN RANKS

Manifesto Signed by Cantonese Authorities Appeals for Solidarity; Victory for Radical Wing Indicated.

(By The Associated Press) SHANGHAI, April 5.—An anti-American strike and a boycott of American goods are being called for Monday in Shanghai, Hunan province, says a wireless dispatch received from that place.

SHANGHAI, April 5.—An appeal for unity within the Cantonese ranks at this critical moment was made today in a manifesto signed by Cantonese leaders and signed by Wang Ching-tung, former chairman of the executive committee of the nationalist revolutionary organization, and Chen Tui-shih, local communist leader.

The manifesto in veiled terms denounces the efforts of the Kuomintang, or republican revolutionary party, which is the political organization of the Chinese revolutionaries. It asserts that the committee within the party adheres to the main Kuomintang principles set forth by the late Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the manifesto asserts that reports of internal friction are due to the activities of counter-revolutionaries who are attempting to wreck the nationalist movement.

Impelles Chiang Humbled One paragraph of the manifesto implies that General Chiang Kai Shek, the Cantonese generalissimo, has been humbled at a critical moment by the radical wing of the party, has accepted the will of Hankow, capital of the Cantonese government.

The manifesto is generally interpreted as an effort by Wang Ching-tung to prevent a rift in the ranks of the party, which is now willing to obey the instructions of the Kuomintang and it is now probable that the differences and misunderstandings, if any, between them will eventually be adjusted to the satisfaction of all.

Foreigners Gather at Tientsin Foreigners are continuing to concentrate on Tientsin from various sections of north China, while the American and British evacuation of Szechuan province in the upper Yangtze valley was virtually completed.

The American gunboat Monoway, which is conveying the steamer Chinan, was on its way to Ichang, leaving the United States coast and Tientsin from Chungking.

TO SUBMIT DEMANDS WASHINGTON, April 5.—With submission of Nanking reparations to the Chinese Ministry of Finance at Peking in concert with the British and Japanese believed to be imminent, the Washington administration has determined its attention to the possibility that it may become necessary to remove Americans in north China.

An investigation was launched as soon as the excitement subsided. Officials were working on the theory that some enemy of former Chief of Police was responsible for the explosion.

THOMPSON NEW CHICAGO MAYOR

War-Time Executive of Windy City Defeats Two Others in Race Marked by Bitterness.

(CHICAGO, April 5.—(AP)—William Hale "Big Bill" Thompson, republican mayor of Chicago from 1915 to 1923, today was elected to that office for the third time.

Thompson, who conducted his campaign with a slogan of "America first," was over Mayor William E. Weaver, democratic incumbent, in one of the bitterest and most closely contested elections in Chicago history.

Big Pinally On the basis of returns from 2600 of the city's 10,000 precincts, Thompson was returned a winner by upward of 70,000 votes, with 384 precincts missing.

Plans for the conference, to be held after June 1, will go forward, it was said today at the White House and elsewhere. The president is hopeful that Italy, who refused to join France, to be an active participant, may decide to sit at the table as an observer.

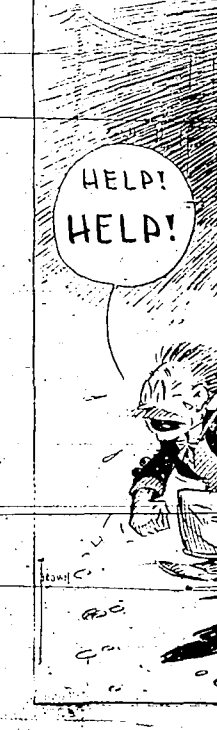

Yankees and Cardinals, 1926 Contenders for Premier Honors, Expected to Set Pace.

NEW YORK, April 5 (AP)—Batting punch, the chief factor in the recent triumphs of the Yankees and Cardinals last year will keep the two championship clubs in the thick of the 1927 major league season.

The two batting heroes of the 1926 baseball classic, Babe Ruth and Tony Thayer, both have been finding the range, setting the pace for their teammates in slugging hits. Babe has made the last few games of the spring exhibition series.

Thayer Hit: Good Club

Thayer, a supposedly weak strike-out pitcher, surprised the batting line by hitting over .400, although he hit in eight places this spring in the batting order. The young third baseman has been slugging at a pace.

Thayer's stickwork augments the heavy St. Louis artillery which already includes Frisch, Hatfield, Lester, Brant, Slaughter and O'Rourke.

BOISE, April 5 (AP)—Robert Lemp was elected mayor of Boise today, receiving 5,768 votes, a record for a city election here.

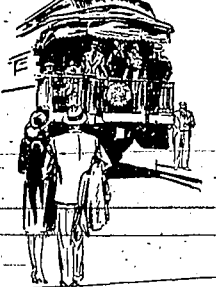

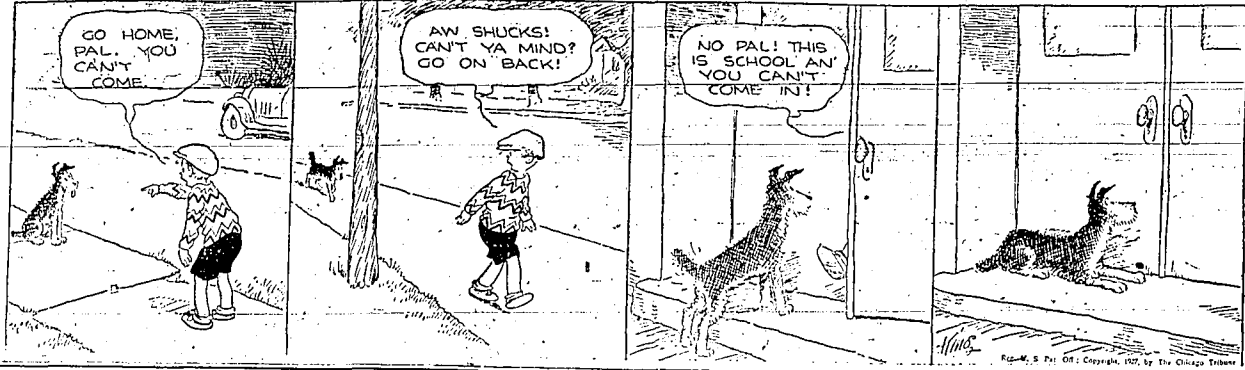

WHEAT VALUES TREND UPWARD

Less Favorable Crop News Gives Slight Impetus to Grain Prices; Corn Little Higher.

CHICAGO, April 5 (AP)—Somewhat less favorable crop news today and a tendency to tilt wheat upward. Closing quotations on wheat were mixed, 5c to 5c 1/2 higher, corn 5c to 5c 1/2 to 5c 3/4, oats unchanged to 1c advance and provisions unchanged to a rise of 1c.

Notwithstanding that all through the day many traders showed a disposition to combat the advances in wheat, buying orders persistently revealed that the market had been overvalued. Many of the buying came from houses with southwest connections and gave backing to some crop complaints from that section, especially advisers indicating probable loss of acreage in western Kansas.

Decrease in World Supply Some complaint is to wheat falling in the Texas panhandle, eastern New Mexico and central Colorado was also given credence. On the other hand, extremely favorable reports were made in the great bulk of domestic wheat territory, production being current that yields in Texas as a whole and in Oklahoma will exceed all records.

Mostly, many parts of central and eastern Kansas were reported having sufficient moisture to carry the crop to harvest. A decrease of 4,070,000 bushels in the world's available supply was announced. Live-stock quotations were relatively firm and export business continued in United States markets, including 50,000 bushels to France.

Corn and oats were responsive to the upward trend of wheat. Receipts of corn here today totaled 2,997,000 bushels. Vessel tonnage was chartered for 65,000 bushels of corn, to go to Argentina.

Provisions developed firmness owing to an uptick in hog values.
