350 Athletes to Represent U. S. At 1928 Games

NEW YORK, April 7 (AP)—With an ocean liner as their home while the international competition is on, a team of 200 to 350 athletes will represent the United States in the 1928 Olympic games at Amsterdam, Holland, at a cost of about \$100 per athlete.

Charting of a boat to take charge of housing, as well as transportation problems was decided on today by the executive committee of the American Olympic committee, which met here to launch formally the program of preparation for the nation's next big athletic campaign abroad.

It will cost between \$300,000 and \$500,000 to defray the expenses of the team, officials estimate. As the first step in perfecting the financial organization necessary to launch a nationwide campaign for funds, the Olympic committee unanimously elected Dr. Frank John D. Haskell, treasurer of the General Motors corporation, and also identified with the largest interest at Wilmington, Delaware, Mr. Haskell, who has done much to foster industrial athletics in the organization with which he is connected, succeeded Julius H. Harrison of New York and Minneapolis, who resigned after serving six years with the Olympic committee.

MAY REMOVE EMBASSY

SHANGHAI, April 7 (AP)—The possibility of the removal of the soviet embassy at Peking to Hankow, the seat of the Cantonese, or nationalist government, was suggested today by William P. Lindo, soviet consul here, as a result of yesterday's raid by northern soldiers on buildings attached to the Russian embassy.

Mr. Lindo said that such removal was not impossible in discussing the incident with government men after he had called on the Norwegian consul general, dean of the diplomatic corps in Shanghai, to announce he would hold the consular body responsible if the soviet consulate here were raided again.

Dangerous Precedent

The soviet consul general declared that if the Peking raid was carried out with the approval of the diplomatic corps, it would set a precedent that would endanger the foundations of diplomatic prerogatives. In this connection he said that he understood that permission for the entry of the Chinese troops and police into the legation grounds at Peking had been granted solely by the dean of the diplomatic corps and not from all the members.

While interest continued to center here on the international possibilities of the Peking raid in so far as it may cause serious repercussions in Moscow, foreigners in various sections of China are steadily evacuating the areas where anti-foreign agitation has been spreading.

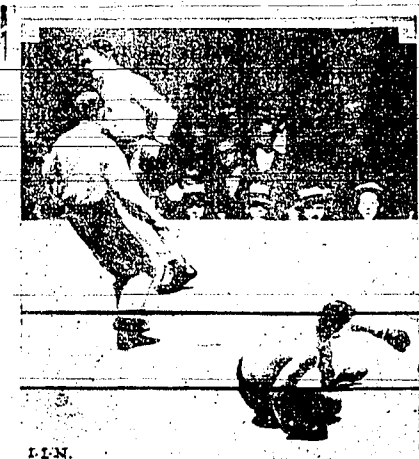

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PRINCESS SEEKS WHITE HUSBAND

South Sea Island Native Chief-tain—Would Import Fair Spouse for Daughter.

SYDNEY, Australia, April 7 (AP)—Nararak, chief of a tribe of North Oceanic savages who live in the mountains believed himself the only monarch in the world, has taken to modern ideas and wishes to see his daughter marry the other half of the world. The chief wants a white husband for his 16-year-old daughter.

Mr. McLeod, a British explorer, to find a suitable man, blonde or brunette, who is a good fellow and whom the chief would be willing to take into his family fold as a son-in-law.

First White Man
Mr. McLeod says the first white man Nararak had ever seen and it was the explorer who disabused the chief's false notion of the "white group of islands" in the South Pacific. That there were other big chiefs here and there. He also learned that he had better be a decent fellow or he would lose his family. The chief thereupon granted Mr. McLeod permission to visit the island which he was commissioned to do, as well as the appeal for a husband for his daughter.
"The women of the South Sea islands, living near the equator, are famous for their beauty, their lengthy luscious hair, and their clear, brown complexion." "Princess" is 16 years old, the chief's daughter, is considered the most beautiful by the missionaries.
The chief's formal appeal to Mr. McLeod, before he was shown to the island, translated, was like this:
"Since learning there are other rulers on this earth I am eager to know the names of a more powerful chief of this league of nations. My daughter, too, has the greatest admiration for the white man."
Not Widower
"I am not a widower, by any means, and if it were possible to get rid of all my wives, or even a few of them, there are some living on several other islands—some I have not even seen in years—I would not mind myself having a white woman or two in my household. But my daughter has no matrimonial bonds and has her heart set on a white man husband."
"Of course, you will want to see the great unknown and if you should meet a young man whom you think would suit the girl, please tell him, as coming from me, that she is beautiful, and is the best of the islanders and has a second plantation, and a hut.
But say to him too that there must be no children of this match for it is not our custom to have half-brothers with the blood of rulers in their veins."
Mr. McLeod says he will go to his heart.

SWEDEN HAS EMPTY JAIL

VIMBY, Sweden, April 7 (AP)—An empty jail and idle keepers now comprise the main activities of the police in the Baltic island of Gotland, which was once a member of the Hanseatic league. At the beginning of February there were three prisoners, but now there are none.
Throughout Sweden there has been in recent years a steady increase in prisoners detained for serious offences. Capital punishment has been abolished for several years and an one has actually been executed in the last few days of the war. Yet the number of life-time prisoners is only 27 in the entire country, and of these none is a woman.

\$200-A-DAY BET WITH DOCTORS

Sir Basil Zarahoff Gambles Against Chances of Medics to Repair Digestive Organs.

MONTI CARLO, Monaco, April 7 (AP)—Sir Basil Zarahoff, once part owner of the Monte Carlo casino, has the biggest gamble of his career on his health.
He is betting \$200 a day with medical specialists that they cannot fix his digestive organs back to normal so he may eat caviare again.
Sir Basil, whom Mr. Chamberlain described as the "sixth great European power," is living here on dry toast, milk and fruit juices. It is another strange chapter in the interesting life of the money king who played a powerful role in the war.
Born in 1852 in the slums of Southampton, his rise to fame and fortune has been one of the outstanding successes of the post-war Europe. It was because of his investment in stocks of arms and munitions, that Sir Basil is one of the few men on whose head, head or alloy, Germany set a price during the war.

Advises Lloyd George
In 1914 Sir Basil was the leading arms manufacturer in Europe, and during the war played an important role in an adviser to Lloyd George, the prime minister of Great Britain, on many political questions.
It was Sir Basil who was credited with bringing peace into the conflict against Germany.
Then, in 1919, the British government conferred knighthood upon him. Sir Basil now is cited as Prince Michael of Mont Carlo. Some time ago he sold his casino to Prince Michael of Baden. Sir Basil is under the constant care of surgeons. The specialists have hopes they will fix him, but by a stringent diet he may get back a suggestion of his old-time vigor and digestion. But the dieting must be of the most careful order.
The story is told here that recently Sir Basil, his appetite sharpened by a "bite" along the way offered to send an aeroplane to Russia for a fresh supply of caviare, with a \$100 bonus for every pound produced. The specialists informed their patient, bluntly, that a meal of rich food would be his last.

Police Chief Tells Work of Two Years

Twin Falls police, during the 23 months period of Ralph G. Leighton's administration as chief beginning May 3, 1925, have made 1218 arrests, and fines assessed in police court totaled \$1023.92, according to report compiled Thursday at police headquarters.
Violations of traffic regulations caused 595 arrests; violation of various other ordinances, 114; drunkenness, 107; misdemeanors and felonies under state laws, 100.
Police issued warnings in 274 cases involving minor violations of various ordinances, 1682 minor violations of traffic ordinances and 21 minor violations of sanitation ordinances.
Complaints investigated totaled 1895. One hundred and sixteen search warrants were executed. Seven hundred and thirty-five men were served as prisoners in the city jail, and leads in the city jail were furnished to 200 persons other than prisoners.
Police were on the scene when fires occurred on 43 occasions during the period.
One hundred and fifteen automobiles were reported stolen and 110 were recovered.
One hundred and twenty bicyclist motor-vehicles stolen and 93 were recovered.
The officers were called upon to do duty 295 days during the period.

COUNCIL MAKES OFFICIAL COUNT OF CITY'S VOTE

Canvass—Shows—No—Variation
From—Results—Announced on Basis of Unofficial Returns;
Discuss Building Operations.

Official canvass made Thursday evening by Twin Falls city council showed results of the municipal election of last Tuesday coinciding with the results previously made public on the basis of unofficial counts.
Resolution of Richard E. Bobler with a majority of 25 votes over W. W. Chapman for mayor.
Resolution of J. E. White and L. A. Chapin over Paul Fox, Jr., and Ott Nelson to be commissioner.
Endorsement of an ordinance to permit opening and operation of theaters and picture shows on Sunday afternoons and evenings.
Endorsement of a tax levy of one-fourth mill for support of Twin Falls municipal fund.
Newly elected mayor and councilmen will take office at a regular meeting of the council on Monday evening next and will succeed E. L. Ashton, mayor, and James N. Keel and W. T. Laskie, councilmen, retiring.

Mayor Joins Out Tack
During informal general discussion the retiring mayor stated that there are two matters to which he hopes the council will give serious consideration. First, he said, is the matter of city planning and zoning, with which the present council has made a beginning under terms of state law as amended by the last legislative session. Second, he said, the question of drainage and starting sewer is one of the most important.
During a business session that preceded canvass of the election returns last evening, the council approved issuance of permits for construction of buildings of an estimated aggregate cost of \$270,000, authorized to grant permits to the Continental Oil company for construction of a \$1000 service station at the north end of Shoshone street, across the street from the Washington hotel.

Reorganize Department
The council adopted two resolutions, one providing for employment of the Edwin A. Wilson company to make the annual city audit at a cost of \$500, and the other providing for reorganization of the waterworks department in accordance with the policies outlined some time ago by J. S. Keel, retiring commissioner of finance. Under this reorganizing program the office of city treasurer and waterworks clerk are combined with a salary of \$120 a month, and an assistant waterworks clerk is provided for, to receive a salary of \$100 a month.

S. H. Graves for construction of a two-story residence, 20x10 feet, on Lincoln avenue in Blue Lakes addition, estimated cost \$500.

W. C. Wiley, 527 Fourth avenue east, remodeling of residence, \$100 construction of garage, \$150.
Chas. Walker, 401 Seventh avenue north, garage, \$150.

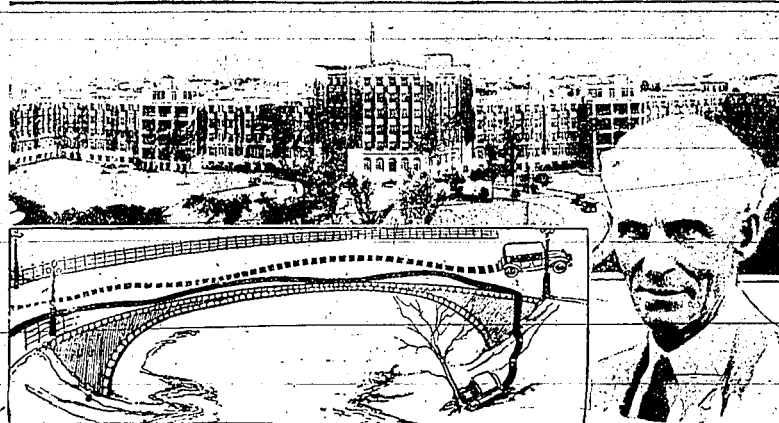

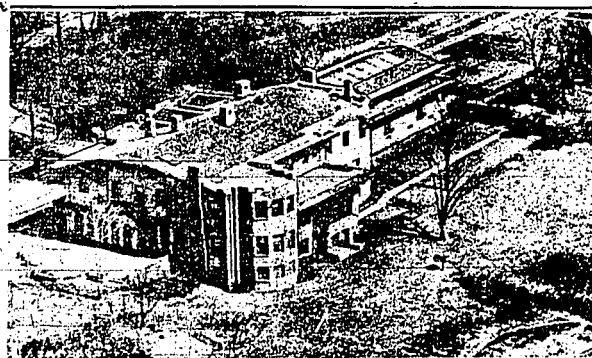

WOULD CONNECT FOUR BODIES OF WATER BY CANAL

Proposed Volga-Don Channel Through Narrow Isthmus Would Give Southern Russia Outlet to Sea; Huge Project.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7.—The Volga-Don canal which is planned through the narrow isthmus between the Volga and Don rivers, near the Caspian Sea, would connect the Caspian, Black, Baltic and White seas by water routes," says a bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic society.

At the proposed location of the canal the two rivers are but 60 miles apart, then they veer off in opposite directions, the Don plowing the fertile Cossack country to the east, and the Volga extending northward through the Russian grain belt.

The Volga, Europe's longest river, will play an important part in the success of the program, continues the bulletin. A narrow isthmus of land, linking the upper stretches of the river with the Neva river that flows into the Gulf of Finland at Leningrad.

The more than 2000 miles of navigable water of the "Little Mother Volga," as the people affectionately call the stream, are busy with shipping. Huge rafts, some of them longer than a city block, are towed up and down the river by big "saw-tooth" and "side-wheelers." They are laden with grain, hides, wool, fruit, vegetables and other products from the Volga regions. Other "side-wheelers" tow cotton bales from Persia, and all tanks from the neighborhood of Baku in the Caspian sea.

Systems of the cargoes are consigned to Russian centers and some to Leningrad for shipment to foreign ports. Sometimes the trip to the subject means thousands of miles of slow travel that takes days and weeks, so the government tries to have all the comforts of home. When they build new cabins, about the raft and surround them with small truck gardens which they tend as if they were their own.

At night the boatmen gather around a large fire which from the shore presents a picture of campers afloat.

Volga Boatman Has Disappeared.
For years, making the "diamond" route of the Caspian, the Russian river was the scene of the Volga boatman's toil. Singing in minor strains, the boatmen tracked the mountainous shores of the river, tugging at crude tow-ropes, that cut into their bulky shoulders, while their feet sank deep into the soft towpath clay.

But the thousands of partiers, as the Volga boatmen were known in Russia, that played the role of towpath mules, have been displaced by oil burning passenger boats and commercial craft.

TOMBS REVEAL SAVAGE TRAIT

Mound Builders' Mysteries Are Bared in Ohio Excavations; Aborigine Lover of Beauty.

COVINGTON, Ohio, April 7.—The mound building aborigine of America, stripped of the fantastic myths which have hovered above him, is revealed as a savage who loved fine ornament and ornamentation, paid great attention to economics, trafficked with distant tribes and could fight when he had to.

This appraisal has been reached by the Ohio State Archaeological and Historical society after more than two decades of exploration in the great mounds of earth and stone built in prehistoric times, and found in their greatest completeness in Ohio. A patient striving for beauty is depicted in the remains of mound building civilization uncovered in recent months in the 8th mound, scene of "The Great Pearl Digger" of Ohio.

In this primitive but regal tomb the red man were unearthed five kinds of cloth, leather finely tanned and dressed, and ornaments upon thousands of pearls.

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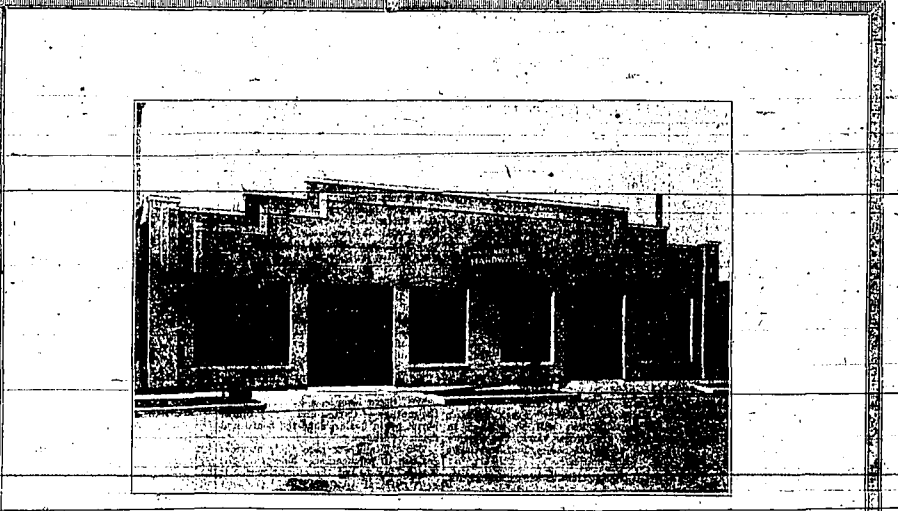

SECOND A. E. F. GAINS MEMBERS FOR PILGRIMAGE

National Commander, American Legion, Advises Idaho Department Officer of Rapidly Filling Ranks for Journey.

BOISE, April 7.—The ranks of the second A. E. F. of the American Legion are rapidly filling, it was announced today by Lester P. Albert of Boise, department France convalescent officer for this state, upon information received from Richard P. Savage, national commander. The journey over this September for the ninth annual Legion convention will afford many opportunities to meet to address who make the trip in 300 days.

Announce Complete Plans After two years of intensive preparation for the great trans-Atlantic movement, the Legion is able to announce complete plans for the convention. It will be held in Paris, France, beginning Monday, September 12, and ending on September 27, 1927. The business sessions of the convention will be held in the famous Palace Tardieu, government buildings located in the headquarters of 4-10 and 8-10, making and-dinner service of the Legion will be in the Hotel d'Orsay. The Legion members will have transportation to the Continental hotel. On the first day of the convention, the great Legion parade will pass in line before Marshal Ferdinand Foch, supreme allied commander. General John J. Pershing, war-time commander of the A. E. F. and prominent officials of several nations, will be present. The Legion has scheduled one day for a round trip from the veterans' home to the ports of embarkation on this side. A five-day cruise on the ocean liners, of which the great Leviathan is flagship, will carry the Legionnaires to France. Round trip steamship fares on official Legion ships range from \$145.00 to \$250 on most of the ships, while on the Leviathan, the rates are from \$151.50 up. Legionaires will be able to run on of the ships and a program of entertainment will make the overseas journey enjoyable. The landing party aboard will include Dr. Huggins, Havre, Cherbourg and Antwerp, Belgium.

Special Trains to Paris Fifty special trains will carry the Legionnaires from the ports to Paris. Thirty thousand rooms of all classes have been placed under contract in the French capital for the exclusive use of the Legionnaires. Battlefield and spy story tours to all sectors of France and Belgium, where American troops were engaged, have been worked out and will run daily throughout convention week. Eleven great tourist companies are contesting in arranging tours for the Legionnaires to all corners of Europe. Railroad fares have been substantially reduced, not only in France, but in practically all European countries. Landing charges have been removed at the ports and all of the European countries excepting Spain, will accept official Legion identification certificates in lieu of passport and visa.

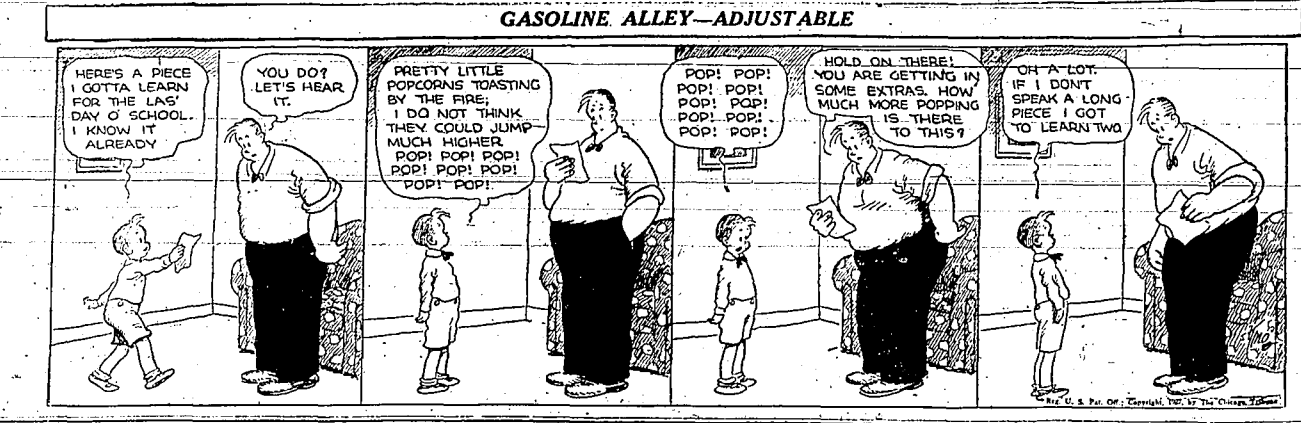
Epworth League at Buhl Stages Play

CHURCH COUNCIL REPORTS 30 LYNCHINGS DURING LAST YEAR

WASHINGTON, April 6 (AP)—Thirty lynchings in the United States during the year 1926 shocked the churches in their co-sponsorship for lynches last, the Federal Council of Churches said in making public its annual honor roll of states free from lynchings during the 12 months.

The figures for the year showed a sharp increase over 1925 when only 17 lynchings were reported, and five states formerly on the honor roll were removed because of mob violence within their borders.

One of these states, New Mexico, had a record of no lynchings for a period of 10 years preceding, said the Rev. Peter A. Ballew, of Baltimore, chairman of the executive committee of the council's race relations section.

The four other states which were free of the evil in 1926, but which lost their place on the honor roll because of lynchings during 1926 were Kentucky, South Carolina, Tennessee and Texas.

States Classified The list, showing the states free from lynchings in 1926, is classified

groups over periods of years, follows: States that have never had a record of lynchings: Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont.

Additional states that have no record of a lynching since 1926: Connecticut, Maine and New Jersey.

Additional states that have no record of a lynching during the past 20 years: Delaware, Michigan, Wisconsin and Nevada.

Additional states which have no record of a lynching during the past five years: Arizona, California, Colorado, Kansas, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Carolina, Washington, West Virginia and Wyoming.
