FEDERAL TREASURY TO MAKE UP COLLECTIONS

MAJOR LEAGUE CLUBS DISPLAY WARES AT HOME

Fans Get Chance to Pass Judgment on Record-Breaking Player Shakeups; Five-Team Battle Seen in Each Circuit.

(By The Associated Press)
NEW YORK, April 9.—Most of the major league clubs came home today to let the fans judge for themselves the result of the game's record breaking player shakeups and decide whether the experts are correct in predicting a five club battle in each pennant race with the Pirates and Athletics as favorites. The conclusion of the exhibition campaign over the weekend will have the way for an colorful end, as the boys say intriguing a season as either big league has ever faced. The opening salvo will be fired next Monday. The somewhat widespread agitation isn't all due to the promise of an exciting tussle for position or the novelty of the situation that finds neither of the present champions, the Cardinals and Yankees regarded as favorites in the pre-season "dope."

Keen Interest in Prospects

Most of the nation's fans is snapping it up as seldom before because it is keenly interested in what they call, aided by Edillo Collins and Zach Wheat, will ignite the Athletics pennant fire again; whether Tris Speaker, starting with Cuba Jimmie for a "campaign of redemption" will make a contender out of the Senators; whether Bill Carrigan can revive Red Sox status after a long layoff; what the Giants will accomplish with Rogers Hornsby as captain and Eddie Roush ahead of the outfield; how eight new managers will fare, especially Donie Bush with the Pirates and Bob O'Farrell with the world's champion Cardinals; and whether the South will prove it is worth the \$70,000 that the Yankees have agreed to pay him for the next three years.

Stiff Opposition Looms

So far as the pennant races go, they will develop contests in which the two pennant entries, the Athletics and Pirates will meet their stiffest opposition from the two metropolitan contenders, Yankees and Giants, in the opinion of more than ten score baseball writers who outlined their views for the first time to a consensus compiled by the Associated Press. Most of the views of these experts, probably the best qualified of all league relative values, show that the Athletics is in the lead in the American as against one favoring the Yankees, three Pirates and one each the Senators and Cleveland. In the National league, 19 select the Pirates and 15 the Giants, while four favor the Reds and only three the Cardinals. The Chicago Cubs are rated as the "outstanding" of the National league's five principal contenders.

It will be a miracle comparable to the 1911 triumph of the Boston Braves,

the writers agree, if any one of the three other clubs in either league come through. They consist the Braves, Boston and Phillies in the first three places, in that order, in the National league, and the White Sox, Browns and Red Sox, to the three last runs on the American league ladder.

Abolishment of Spring Football Urged by Coach

EUGENE, Ore., April 9 (AP)—Captain John J. McEwan, head football coach with the University of Oregon and for three seasons head coach at West Point and member of the football rules committee before coming west a year ago, has made the revolutionary proposal that spring football practice in the colleges be abolished.

Lists Alleged Evils

Among those evils Captain McEwan lists the following:

Spring practice over-emphasizes football in the colleges by extending practice through what amounts to two seasons. It thus comes near making football an all-year activity for hundreds of thousands of young men.

This virtually doubles danger of injury to players by adding two to eight weeks of active practice to a sport strenuous enough in one season.

It interferes also with participation in other sports better suited to the spring season, such as track, baseball and lacrosse.

NEBRASKA BOWS TO CALIFORNIA

Western Athletes Romp Home With Smashing 85-45 Victory Over Cornhusker Invaders.

BERKELEY, Cal., April 9 (AP)—While rain and hail alternately beat a suit late on the field, California's track team romped home with a smashing 85-45 victory over the University of Nebraska here today.

The battle between graduate students of the two institutions also went to California when Phil Barber, former head captain, needed to knock out winner Roland Locke, world's record holder of the 220 yard dash, in two special events. Despite the soggy track Barber took the work of Glenn Johnson at the finish of the 100 and repeated his performance in the 220, with Locke trailing by a yard and a half. Barber's times were 19 seconds flat and 21.8 seconds respectively.

Johnson Stellar Performer

The mid-westerner found their solace in the work of Glenn Johnson, who caused the biggest upset of the day by defeating two California favorites, Les Schwoboda in the mile and Elmer Boyles in the 880.

With his victories Johnson tied for individual high scoring. Both Captains Elmer Boyles and Alex Higgins finished in totals of 20, the former winning the shot put and discs, and the latter the hurds events.

GERMAN POSTOFFICE IS BILL COLLECTOR

BERLIN, April 9 (AP)—The German post office department is a bill collector, banker, subscription agent for newspapers, magazines and books, and operator even of rubberneck sight-seeing buses as well as carrier of mail.

As bill collector the department will for a small fee deliver a notice to pay doctor, collect the money, and forward it to the creditor.

The department also has a checking account system of nearly 1,000,000 subscribers. A debtor can fill out a blank pay amount due at any post office and the department will credit the sum to the creditor's account.

The regular mail carriers also take subscriptions to any publication in the country. The sight-seeing and regular passenger line buses are operated in connection with the rural delivery service in regions where other forms of transportation are infrequent. More than 50,000,000 passengers were carried last year.

CRIME WAVE, MYTH, SAYS SOCIAL WORKER

DES MOINES, Iowa, April 9 (AP)—Crime waves? There isn't any, declares John A. Japp of Chicago.

It is his business to know, for as president of the national conference on social work he has at his fingertips extensive data on crime and its treatment.

The fact is, he says, that fewer people die in auto, fire, and other accidents in proportion to the nation's population than there were ten years ago.

When the social workers meet in Des Moines May 11 to 14 they will discuss the very certain progress in handling criminals and will plan new methods of holding their back on reform.

"A popular hysteria about crime gives rise to the idea that there is a crime wave which must be checked by drastic methods," says Japp. "But crime in its totality has decreased in ratio to population."

"It is like the creation of a 'suicide wave.' One or two spectacular student suicides are played up to give an outward evidence of an epidemic which is false."

RADIATOR CAP LIGHT DEVISED FOR AUTOS

BERLIN, April 9 (AP)—A radiator cap light to warn pedestrians when an automobile is speeding has been patented by Samuel Shorowitz, noted German engineer.

Shorowitz declares it is folly to have a red light on the rear of an automobile without a similar contrivance on the radiator cap.

His device for meeting the situation consists of a dozen standard varicolored electric lights arranged as a radiator ornament, a different light flashing for each increase of 10 miles in the speed of the car from 15 to 60 miles when a red light glows as a warning signal. Some have suggested that the red light ought to register the legal speed limit. So far the justice have not taken action to make installation of the device obligatory on automobiles.

ANDREWS ASKS REPORT ON ROW

Prohibition Administrator for Arizona and Southern California to Prepare Document.

LOS ANGELES, April 9 (AP)—Major Frank H. McReynolds, prohibition administrator for southern California and Arizona today began preparation of a report to Assistant Secretary Andrews of the treasury department of charges that customs officers have interfered with prohibition enforcement work. McReynolds, who returned to his office today after a day's absence, made the charges in a report addressed to Glendon A. California. He found a telegraphic request from Andrews for the report awaiting him when he returned.

Withholds Details
McReynolds, who charged customs officials at San Pedro harbor and on the Mexican border with interference, declined to reveal details of the request. Collector of Customs Lewis Schwab-

be, who has vigorously denied McReynolds' charges, today said, "I think the best thing to do is to forget it." He added that he received no request from Washington for any report on the inter-departmental controversy.

To Probe Death of Man
The United States district attorney's office received instructions from Attorney General Harney in Washington today to conduct an independent investigation of the death of E. P. Ingenta of San Pedro. Frank P. Farley and George Hudson, prohibition agents here, were indicted for murder as the result of the death, caused by an official car, operated by Hudson, colliding with Ingenta's. The attorney general's instructions said that it appears that the prohibition agents were acting lawfully and within the scope of their authority, and that the accident may reasonably be attributed to performance of their duty as agents, and not caused by misconduct while they were on private business. Then the United States district attorney is authorized to have the murder trial transferred to the federal court.

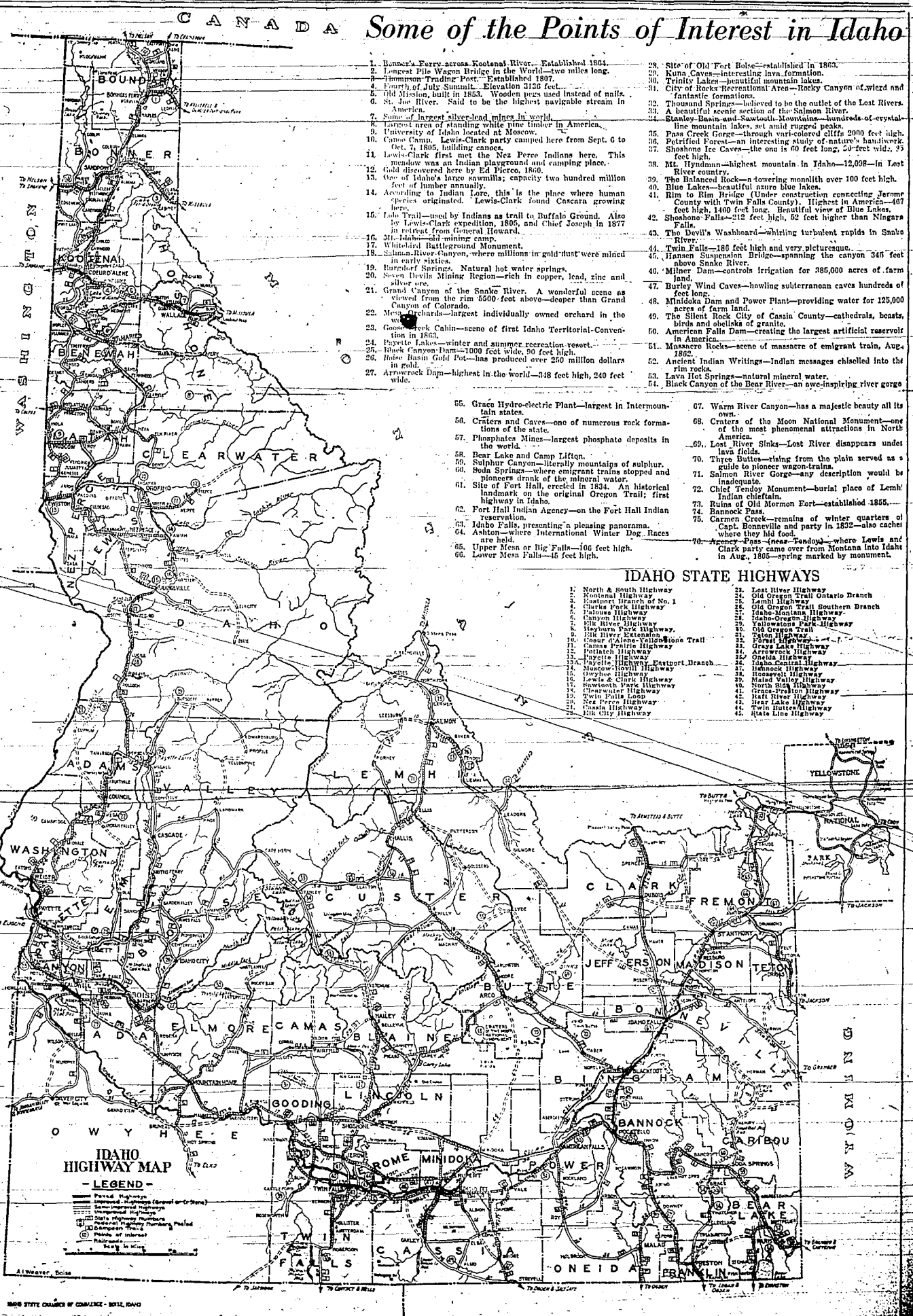

THIAUCOURT CEMETERY

Soldier Dead of St. Mihiel Rest On War-Won Site

American Military Cemetery at Thiaucourt Located on Territory Recovered by Yankee Doughboys From Germans.

(Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of five articles by Richard Sockley Jones dealing with the American cemetery located where not 20,000 American soldiers who died on the field of honor.)

The northeast corner of France, as France was before Alsace and Lorraine were restored to her possession, was the area assigned to the American troops when the United States joined the world war. This area, bordering on Lorraine, had once been part of Burgundy. Its principal city was Nancy, while across the enemy lines was the city of Metz. Each side would have liked to capture the city opposite. Other cities on the French side were Toul, and Neufchateau, and Chaumont, and Epinal and Langres and Commercy.

This corner of France was assigned to the Americans because when they began to reach France the battle lines there were fairly quiet and it seemed a logical place to set up a training area. The lines of supply from the coast could be routed over railroad tracks, not so thoughtfully needed for the British and French in Flanders and Champagne. Also because in the long run, when a real American army was assembled and ready to assume the offensive, there would be plenty of hard fighting to do in this, the northeast corner of France.

Whenever you mention the name of St. Mihiel, you think of the first American army to enter France on the 12th of September, 1918, the day that the American Expeditionary Force crossed the Meuse river and entered the St. Mihiel salient. This salient existed because the German line, instead of running straight across the map from Verdun to Metz, swung south on the western edge of the Verdun area and holding to the Meuse river as far as St. Mihiel, where the enemy held a bulge over the Meuse. Only then did the line swing east again to Pont-a-Mousson, a city of the Moselle south of Metz. The German line gained that bulge in the very early days of the war, and until September 12, 1918, they kept it and used it in attacking Verdun and later in attacking the Americans.

American Attack
On September 12 the First American army trained and operating as a unit, attacked the salient both from west and south, drove in its sides and collapsed it on the Germans, taking nearly 16,000 prisoners in the operation. After that the St. Mihiel salient never bothered anyone. In taking it the Yankees took the town of Thiaucourt, and at the edge of that town there later was located the permanent American cemetery where they buried the dead from the St. Mihiel drive, and also the many others who died in training or in battle in that corner of northeastern France which was the training ground of the A. E. F. Now this cemetery will soon part of the 20,000 American Legionnaires who come to France this fall on a special pilgrimage.

Thus the cemetery site is on reconquered ground, ground actually fought over that September afternoon by the

troops of the 2nd division, and yet some of the boys there today never saw Thiaucourt, nor lived to know that it was taken and the whole St. Mihiel bulge knocked flat in one of the smoothest, fastest, finest pieces of offensive military operation which the great war witnessed. Some of those who rest at Thiaucourt gave their lives in the early day of the arrival and training period. Some of them fell in the skirmishing raids which accompanied the early occupation of the line by the quiet sectors. And some fell in the big drive on the St. Mihiel salient, which captured Thiaucourt and 150 square miles of additional ground of strategic importance to the war side of the lines.

Thiaucourt is not much of a town. It stands on the banks of the Rupt et Mad, which is a small river that runs northward and eastward to the Moselle. Much of it is a creek, or a run, or whatever you please to call a stream that was of great consequence to the battle of the salient and the machine guns in the valley, and recalled a counter attack there. So the most important thing about Thiaucourt is that the 2nd division crossed the Meuse—Mad there, entered it at the River Mad, and that afterwards a permanent American cemetery was established there, where some 20,000 boys are resting under the 11 white flags from which the red, white and blue banner flies every day.

Close in on Boches

The 1st and 2nd and 3rd divisions saw something of the Rupt et Mad that day also, as they had the long pull around Montsec and into the very heart of the salient, to the left of the 2nd. To the right, pivoting on Pont-a-Mousson as it were, the 4th and 82nd and 90th were swinging and smashing

the Boches back toward his homeland, being pulled near Verdun, the 10th and 20th came smashing eastward, aided by some French troops, and before long they were in the hands of the 1st division, and closed the line around the Germans, who had been slow about their retreat.

The Germans made every effort to hold the bulge of the St. Mihiel salient, but they were everywhere being outflanked. This story might have been all right had it not been for the fact that the Germans were not equipped with the same kind of munitions, railroad supplies, artillery, etc. In more recent years the allies were equipped with everything the First army did on those days in September, 1918, but at the time all France rejoiced because the salient, swung thrust against the river side by law Verdun, was wiped out at last.

The battle, because it was such an almost perfect victory, was regarded by some as an easy achievement. The more than 100,000 dead give no such evidence, for while not that many St. Mihiel men remain at Thiaucourt, a great many have been brought back to the states these six or seven years ago. It was a perfect victory in that every objective was taken on schedule time, or sooner. In the perfect victory, it was secured only by the perfect courage of a half million American fighting men, and by the heroic sacrifice of many who were left on the field as the world thus monuments of the drive succeed on to their chosen objective.

Daily Accessible

The cemetery at Thiaucourt is one of the most easily visited spots in France, because of its location about equidistant from Verdun, Toul, Metz and Nancy, and not far from Chaumont and other former American centers. Special arrangements have been made to take members of "The Second A. E. F." there. It is also in a route of miles from St. Mihiel, and a Lafayette has his station and a very little farther from Verdun, the village where John D. Haney lives. All of these places attract visitors, and Thiaucourt may easily be reached from any of the nearby cities, the roads being excellent in all directions.

Because the divisions which took part in the St. Mihiel offensive, the causes of Thiaucourt had the names of many others which trained or had defensive sectors in this area. The names of the 7th, 20th, 28th, 37th, 78th and 80th appear quite frequently, and they are names of many arms and units of the service which were not with the combat divisions.

Here and there one finds the grave of a number of the air service, for there were many aviation cadets in this area, and for months the American fliers did most of the allied work over the Rupt here. The air service, in fact, which had their base at Pont-a-Mousson, and other points in the northeast of France, have left some part of their dead here. The motor transport, the hospital corps, the adjutant generals and judge advocates and provost marshals, the cooks and corporals

The whole country of the St. Mihiel salient is now a beautiful park. The American Legionnaires are participating in the dedication of the ground this September when they come to France.

This St. Mihiel cemetery, as it is officially called, is perhaps the most visited by the people of France of any American cemetery. Like all of our battle-field burial grounds it lies on land reclaimed from the enemy by our arms. In this instance it happens that the area set free by the American forces was a populous region, and surrounded by a populous region. Also it is a region where Americans lived and trained and fought for many months, and the people of those cities and towns still "feel" villages, really "know" the Americans, and really liked them. The homes of this countryside were American billets, and when the "Second A. E. F." comes back this year to the borderland of Lorraine there will be thousands of happy reunions as veterans meet the townsfolk, they know in

the war days. These people make many a visit to Thiaucourt, to rest on the graves of the graves of those American boys who did not get home after the war.

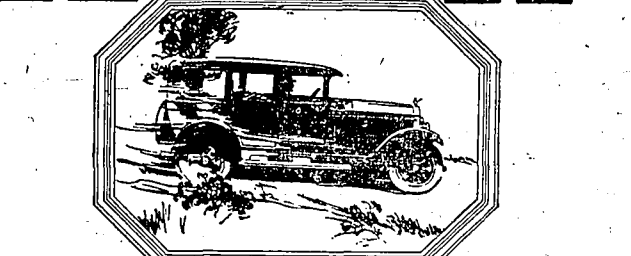

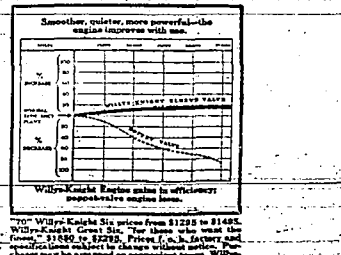
