LEEVE GUARDS KEEP FIDELITY WATCH ON RIVER

Men Patrol Great Dykes in Various Sections as Crest of Flood Moves Toward Sea; People Move to Safety.

(By The Associated Press) MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 15.—Through driving rain tonight, levee guards along the 10 miles between Miles Eight and Eighteen, Columbia, Kentucky, and Memphis, districts of the Mississippi river patrolled the great dykes or fought the surging waves in the greatest flood in history moved down the drainage arteries.

Five hundred women and children, including their stock, pushing and driving livestock ahead of them, moved out of a new danger zone south of Hickman. Two hundred men were working in the levee between Miles Eight and Eighteen, Columbia, Kentucky, was inundated 10 to 15 feet as the water sought its level behind a broken levee, and all machinery available to guard levees could not hold all the water in sight.

Thousands of acres of low lands in the basins of the Arkansas, White and St. Francis rivers were under water in Arkansas. From Cottonwood Point, 100 miles north of Memphis, to the mouth of the White, 600 miles south of Helena, the government levees of the Mississippi were reported in prime condition. But their keepers cautioned that every man and all machinery available to guard them against the ever increasing weight of water that has been leaning heavily upon them for four weeks.

Arkansas river reached 26.1 feet at Fort Smith, the highest stage in 94 years. Motor traffic through the river valley where rain has been falling for days is almost at a standstill and train service has been interrupted at many points.

POLICE PREVENT DEMONSTRATION

Plan of Boston Attorney to Re-enact Crime Strikes Snag When Officers Intervene.

AIR MAIL PILOT KILLED IN FALL NEAR KING HILL

Bailey last Saturday, it was indicated by questions put to Bailey on cross-examination during preliminary hearing in the case of the Van Eatons to prohibit entry into Idaho.

Judge C. A. Bailey, presiding at the preliminary hearing and a hearing argued by E. V. Larson, attorney for the Van Eatons for dismissal of the complaint, and after the Van Eatons held night bonds, in the amount of \$1000 each to answer in district court to felony charges of assault with deadly weapons. The preliminary hearing in the Van Eatons was adjourned.

Tells Story of Attack

He testified that the Van Eatons were in an attempt to find a home for his residence early last Saturday morning and called to him to come out. When he went out to the car, he said, the older Van Eaton, who had a rifle with him and threatened to kill him. Bailey said that he grabbed the rifle and struggled with the older Van Eaton. The younger man, during the struggle with the older Van Eaton, shot at him and struck him on the head with another gun.

During cross-examination, Mr. Larson asked Bailey if he had not gone to the Van Eaton residence on the preceding evening to start a quarrel, and if, when he went out the next morning to the Van Eaton in their car, he had not carried a gun. Bailey replied in the negative to both questions.

Washington Lawyer Sues to Recover Dog Held by Filer Man

A legal contest for possession of a Lowellian setter dog was launched in district court here Friday when Frank W. Sharpstein, Walla Walla, Washington, attorney, instituted suit against E. H. Billa of Filer to recover the animal. Under terms of a court order the sheriff Friday took possession of the animal and delivered it into the custody of E. H. Billa. The chief of police, to be held by him pending final determination of the lawsuit. Counsel here for the Walla Walla attorney stated that he was seized Friday by the sheriff and the sheriff's deputy. Sharpstein says Billa, who was found last January by the police, had communicated with Sharpstein. The animal at that time it is asserted, was a collar bearing Sharpstein's name and a Walla Walla license tag. The elder man's claim to the animal, it is understood, is based on evidence that it was sent as a gift to his wife by her father in Washington, who had purchased it.

Way Is Opened for More Navy Recruits

Authorization for more intensive recruiting for the United States navy has been received by James J. Travis, gunners mate in charge of the navy recruiting station here. Under these instructions the Twin Falls station is given a weekly quota of six recruits, and this district for which the Salt Lake station is the center, is expected to furnish 51 men for the navy each week. Minimum age of applicants is reduced from 18 to 17 years; minimum height is reduced from 62 inches to 52 inches, and waivers will be accepted under the new orders.

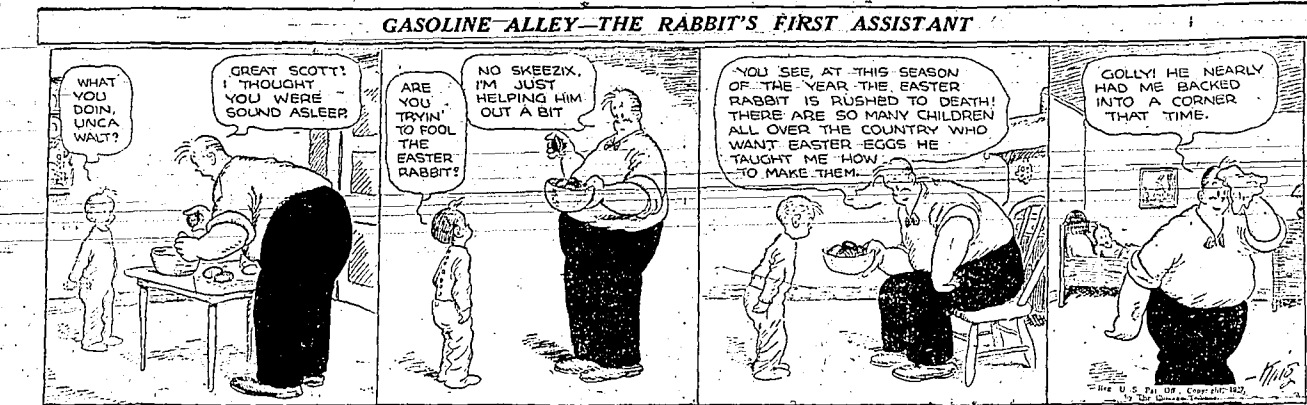

COURT'S ORDER HALTS WORK ON FILLING STATION

School District Obtains Temporary Injunction Against Continental Oil Company to Protect Children.

Under terms of a temporary restraining order issued by Judge William H. Beck in district court here Friday, construction of a Continental Oil company filling station across the street from the Washington school at the north end of Shoshone street has been suspended, pending hearing fixed for next Friday.

Application for the restraining order was made to the court by James E. Rothwell and W. O. Chapman, as attorneys for the Washington school district, which seeks to have the Continental company permanently enjoined from construction of the filling station on the grounds:

1. That it violates terms of an ordinance adopted by Twin Falls city council in November, 1926, providing construction of filling stations within 500 feet of a public school.
2. That it constitutes a menace to the safety of school children who must use sidewalks that will be crossed by driveways leading to the filling station.

Ordered to Show Cause
Agents of the company are required under the court's order to show cause appearing in the district court next Friday at 2 p. m. why the company should not be permanently enjoined from construction of the filling station.

The school district's complaint in this action recites that the Continental company began work on the station after its application for permit had been turned down by the city council last week.

Property on which the Continental company proposes to construct the filling station is a triangular lot that is bounded by Shoshone street, Blue Lake boulevard and Eleventh avenue east. It has been owned for some time by the Continental company. It is proposed to construct driveways across sidewalks on Blue Lake boulevard and Eleventh avenue. Estimated cost of the proposed filling station is \$1000.

Showers Continue To Drench Region

OPEN FIGHT ON PAVILION PLAN

Protest Circulated at Tabernacle—Objects to Proposed Construction at Bridgehead.

Signs of a protest that was circulated last evening in the tabernacle in which a union revival campaign is being carried on here, launched an attack on the project of J. W. Rose of Twin Falls to construct a substantial pavilion involving expenditure of some \$2000 in stone in connection with a recreation park and tourist camp grounds which he expects to establish on his property at the south end of the Twin Falls Jerome county bridge now under construction to span Snake river, south at Blue Lake.

Signers of the petition protested against granting of a license for the proposed pavilion for which Mr. Rose recently made application to the county commissioners. The protest is based on the grounds that "the granting of such license will not be conducive to the best interests of the community in which said dance hall is proposed to be established" and on the expressed assumption that "said dance hall is likely not to be conducted in a quiet, peaceable and orderly manner."

The county commissioners will reconvene here in adjourned session next Monday, and it is understood that action on Mr. Rose's application for license will be taken at that time.

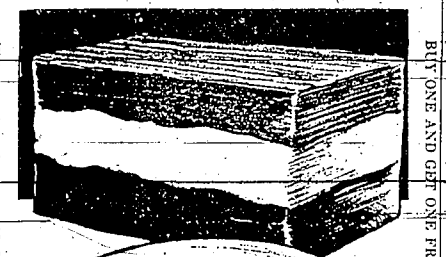
