

CHIANG SETS UP GOVERNMENT AT CHUNGKING

Generalissimo of Cantonese Army Takes First Determined Step Toward Driving Radicals Out of Party.

(By The Associated Press)
SHEWAN, April 18.—Chiang Kai-Shek, generalissimo of the Cantonese (nationalist) army, who has declared his intention of driving out the radicals from the Kuomintang (Cantonese political organization) as reported to have taken the first determined step toward setting up a new government at Chungking, in opposition to that at Hankow, which he charges is controlled by the communists, element. Through details of the revolution of the Chiang government are lacking, the report is generally credited and it is understood that prominent leaders representing Canton, Nanking, and Shanghai will have a place in the ministry.

Little Hope of Unity

Thus the original Kuomintang government would appear to be split in twain and the hope of unity among the southern opponents of the Peking government to have been dissipated, temporarily at least.

Both Factions of the Nationalists

Both factions of the nationalists have been hoping every effort to get the support of the various provinces north and south of the Yangtze river and the adherence of the various military units, but for the moment the southern forces, which not long ago were in swift retreat, have had a chance to reform in some measure.

Warlike Concentration

The revolution power has made certain that they will be prepared for any developments at Hankow, where events of serious import are expected, or more warlike of Great Britain, United States, Japan, France and Italy are stationed at this port, or inland cities, for whatever emergency may arise.

MARSHALL AND SMITH PUBLISH VIEWS ON ISSUE

Exchange of Letters on Alleged Clash of Principles of Catholic Church With U. S. Constitution Raises Interest

(By The Associated Press)
NEW YORK, April 18 (AP)—The exchange of public letters by Governor Marshall and Governor Smith, chairman of the Board of Catholic Affairs, has raised interest in the alleged clash of principles of the Roman Catholic church with the American constitution. The letters were published when Marshall replied to the governor and the latter's secretary announced that the governor would have nothing further to say.

The governor's reply, in which he said he knew of nothing in his field that would interfere with the duties of the state, raised interest in religious, civil and political circles throughout the country. Among a number of prominent men who commented favorably on Governor Smith's reply were James C. Cox and John W. Davis, former presidential candidates.

Hope for Change
Marshall, a lawyer and Episcopalian, favored his reply to Governor Smith, a Catholic, considered a likely presidential candidate, on two chief points. One of these points was the hope that Governor Smith's "declaration" of an adherence to church dogma stronger than at present would state principles which the majority of Americans would be glad to bring to the policy of the Catholic church into accord with the modern world.

The other was a remark, used in a parenthetical sense, in his manual, that "Catholicism is a religion which is not a religion." He was considered a repudiation of Governor Smith's contention that the church did not teach doctrines opposed to the dissolution of church and state.

Challenges Statement
Marshall emphasized that he accepted the governor's "declaration" of religious principles that would interfere with the administration of office, but challenged the governor's statement that such principles were not taught in the United States. He pointed out that such principles were taught in parochial schools, Marshall pointed out from the textbook "The Manual of Christian Doctrine," published in 1926 under the imprimatur of Cardinal Dougherty of Philadelphia.

Commenting on a quotation from this manual, in which the author, John Joseph McVey, stated that the church has the right to prescribe religion and morals, Marshall said:

"If you will insist that this teaching applies only to the ideal Roman Catholic state, may I ask why it is taught in the United States, which are not an ideal Roman Catholic state? If you say that it has only an ideal application, I ask then why it is not given in parochial schools? Is it and really instructions given in order to make the United States an ideal Roman Catholic state?"

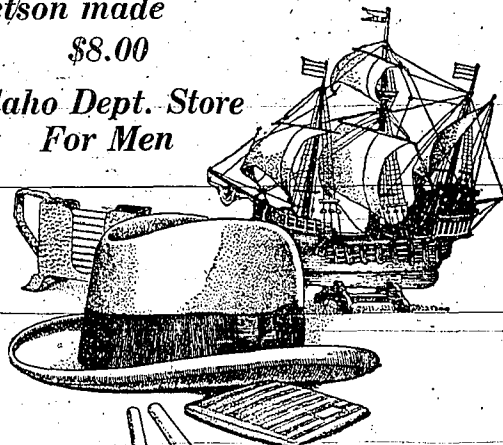

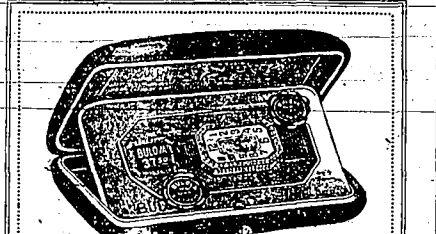

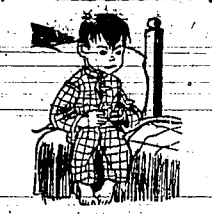

RAILWAY TO PUT IDAHO IN MOVIES

Union Pacific Contracts for 100,000 Feet of Film Showing Scenery in Technicolor.

Union Pacific railway officials have entered into contract with the National Pictures corporation, of which J. B. Perrine of Twin Falls, is vice president, for the delivery of 100,000 feet of film showing 18 natural color scenic views along its route including many of the scenes in this district. It was announced here Monday. The National Pictures corporation which has its headquarters in Los Angeles recently perfected a motion picture camera which records scenes in their natural colors.

Twin Falls has been designated as the first branch office and will handle the business of the corporation for the intermountain. The local office will be in the Idaho City building at 253 Second avenue north.

C. B. Hart, of Los Angeles, president of the corporation and Mr. Perrine have been associated in the undertaking for a number of years.

The Union Pacific railway is the first system of its kind in negotiating for the filming of its scenic attractions along its lines and camera men will start on the first 100,000 feet of colored film for the railway company about June 1, it was announced.

Mr. Hart and Mr. Perrine in company with P. S. McFarland of Los Angeles, general manager of the corporation are in Chicago now arranging contracts with the factory district in manufacturing the new camera and machines are expected to be delivered shortly before May 1.

OUTLINES PLANS FOR BOYS' WEEK

Twin Falls Scout Council Arranges for Observance of Annual Event.

Activities of boy scout citizenship week in Twin Falls, May 17, in which 200 members of Twin Falls scout troops will take part, were outlined by members of the Twin Falls scout council at a regular meeting in the probate court rooms last evening.

Administration for one day of school districts and county offices by boy scouts, and a boy scout parade and field day are to be outstanding events of the week.

Sunday, May 1, according to the plans outlined, is to be "church" day, for the schools and county offices will attend churches in accordance with selection to be made by the members of each troop.

Monday will be registration day and voters in the election of scouts to administer school district, city and county offices, will take place that day under supervision of Mrs. E. M. Wolfe.

Tuesday will be "school" day, and scouts will be expected to invite their parents to visit schools on that day.

Wednesday will be election day, voting on the junior officials in school district, city and county offices being conducted on that day under supervision of Mayor W. Gardner, former chairman of the scout council.

Thursday will be election day.

Friday is the day designated for the parade and field day events to be supervised by J. H. Jamme, district scout executive, and held at the Twin Falls high school athletic coach.

Events of the week will culminate on Saturday when the junior officials in school district, city and county offices, E. V. Berg, scout commissioner, in general chairman, in charge of arrangements for citizenship week.

The scout council last evening elected to its membership, August Welcher, father of one of Twin Falls' eagle scouts.

School Board Talks Gymnasium Plans

Twin Falls school board will meet next Monday evening to receive recommendations of Felix Plonitz, Twin Falls high school athletic director, relative to the gymnasium into which an annex to the senior and junior high school buildings will be converted if a \$20,000 bond issue for this purpose is approved by vote of the district's electors at an election on May 10.

Members of the board met last evening to consider plans for the proposed gymnasium, which were drafted some months ago by Burton E. Moran, architect. Advice of the athletic director was requested in determination of numerous details in the arrangements.

Sees No Basis for Contest on Shows

On the broad grounds that the issue of the people has been expressed in the recent election on the issue, authorization for Sunday shows in Twin Falls probably will stand against any legal attacks that opponents may bring against it, E. M. Sweeley, city attorney, stated last evening.

Mr. Sweeley stated that he had not been advised of any contemplated attack on the ordinance permitting Sunday shows in all cases where elections are held in a fairly, without fraud and substantially in conformity with requirements of the statute.

The ordinance permitting Sunday shows that was approved by a majority of the voters at the election became effective when the results of the election were certified by the council at its meeting two days after the election, the city attorney has advised.

Protest Delivered To County Board

Protests signed by 470 persons against issuance of a license to James W. Reese for operation of a pavilion that he expects to construct at a cost of \$100,000 to \$200,000 in connection with a recreation park and tourists' campground on his property near the south end of the Twin Falls reservoir inter-county bridge across Snake river canyon at Blue Lake, were received Monday by board of county commissioners. Members of the board said the protest was delivered to them by Rev. C. C. Curtis of the Christian church.

The protest, which was circulated in the tabernacle in which a union revival campaign is being conducted here, is based on the grounds that granting of the license "will not be conducive to the best interests of the community in which it is proposed to be established" and on the assertion that the "said dance hall is not likely to be conducted in a quiet, peaceable and orderly manner."

Commissioners' action, under terms of state law governing issuance of licenses, is to be deferred for 20 days.

CHICAGO DETECTIVES PLACED ON PROBATION

CHICAGO, April 18 (AP)—Detectives of the Chicago city police force were placed on probation today for a three-month period.

The probation is the result of an announcement by "the Hot Mike" Hughes, newly appointed chief of police, that Chicago is to be rid of its criminals 30 days hence.

William O'Connor, chief of detectives, following a conference with his superior today, called in his workers and curtly told them:

Miss Rugg is a junior in the school of business administration at the University of Idaho at Moscow and has taken an active part in athletics for the past two years. Last year she was treasurer of the Women's Athletic Association at Moscow.

Volume of Air Mail Calls for Changes

Increased volume of air mail on the Salt Lake-Twin Falls route due to the new low rate of 10 cents per half ounce which became effective February 1, has necessitated inauguration of daily flights between the Utah capital and the Washington terminus, instead of six trips each week both ways, it was announced Monday by Walter T. Varney, contractor for the Pacific northwest division of the United States transcontinental air mail serving the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

The new service will offer to the people of the northwest the same daily service now enjoyed by residents of San Francisco and Los Angeles, Mr. Varney stated.

According to Frank P. Bell, traffic manager for the line, the air mail service will now reach the northwest on regular air mail schedule, instead of being trained out of Salt Lake, as heretofore has been the custom. This will speed up the seasonal mail by two days, and eliminates the training of the mail from the northwest to Salt Lake on Mondays.

Prior to yesterday no flights were made on the Salt Lake-Pasco route which includes Idaho on its schedule on Mondays.

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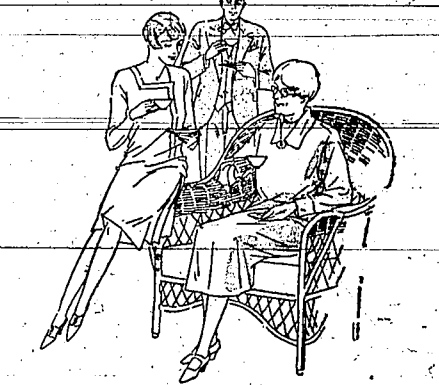
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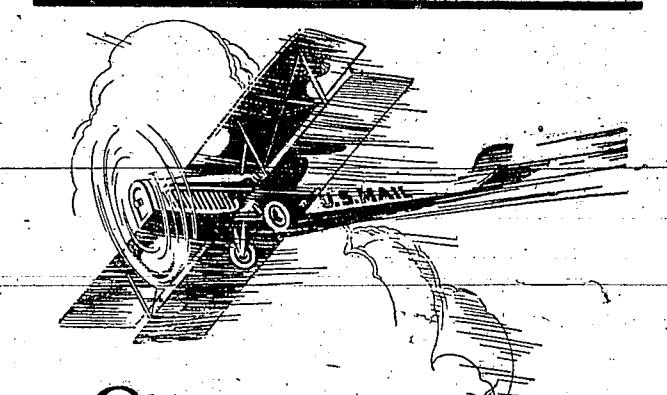

PROMISES CUT IN CITY'S TAX LEVY FOR YEAR

Reduction to .28 or .30 Mills
From 36 Mills Last Year is
Possible, Clerk Tells Council-
men in Weekly Session.

Twin Falls municipal tax levy, that was 36 mills last year, probably will not be more than 28 or 30 mills this year, J. L. Morgan, city clerk, told members of the city council when they met last evening in regular session to consider, among other things, a tentative estimate of municipal expenditures for the coming year.

Levy last year, Mr. Morgan explained, included eight mills for a fund for payment of street and waterworks purchase bonds. A portion of this fund income probably will be refunded next January so that this year's refundment will not need to be made this year, it was explained.

Councilmen were prompted to a study of estimates for the coming year's expenditures in view of necessity for adoption of a budget prior to the opening of the new fiscal year on May 7. Preliminary estimates of the budget is scheduled for consideration at the council's next regular session.

Money for Band

The budget for the coming year will include an appropriation for support of Twin Falls municipal band in anticipation of the special tax levy of a quarter-mill which was authorized by the voters at the city election on April 5. Fred W. Ingraham, representative of the band, was advised by E. M. Sweeney, city attorney. The band, Mr. Ingraham told the council, will be prepared to furnish music for 10 or 14 open air concerts during the season as well as for Fourth of July celebration and other occasions.

The council placed itself in position to make a clean cut defense of its regulations with respect to establishment of filling stations, the city attorney advised, when it adopted last evening an ordinance that prohibits establishment of such stations within 250 feet of Shoshone street between Fourth avenue and Blue Lakes boulevard.

The council subsequently adopted a resolution in which reference was made to this ordinance, degrading the application of E. E. Ostrander, manager for the Texaco company, to establish a filling station on Shoshone street opposite the Reed apartment.

Protest on Filing Stations
A protest against establishment of filling stations in the area covered by the new ordinance, that had been signed by some 200 residents and presented to the council some months ago, was again laid before the council at this meeting and was ordered filed.

The council authorized issuance of a permit to J. M. Cavouder to operate a second hand store, and approved applications for building permits made by the Reed Investment company through Walters and Parry, attorneys, for alterations on the front of the Big White store building at the corner of Main avenue and Second street south, and by J. P. Arrington for construction of a store building on Main avenue south involving an expenditure of \$12,000.

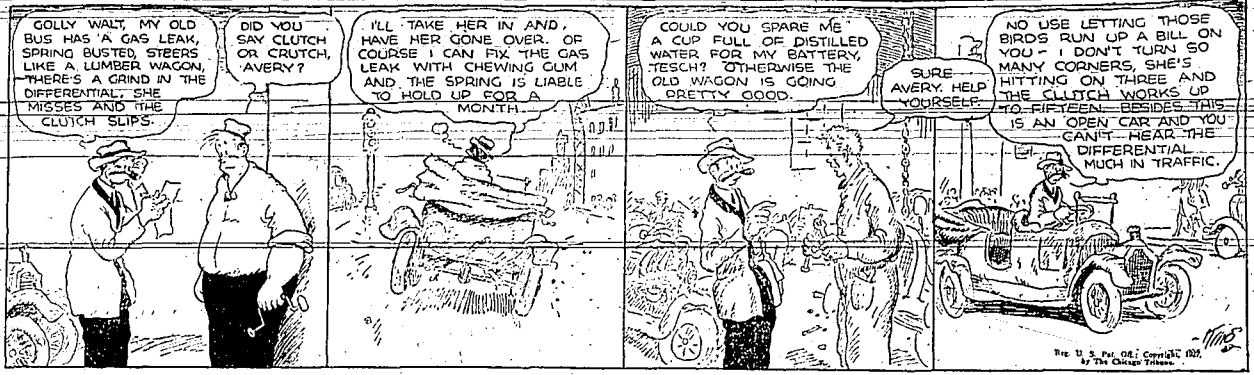

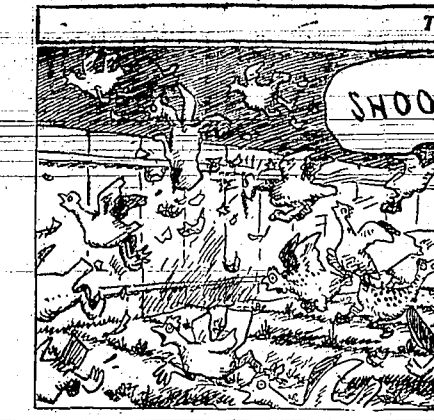
