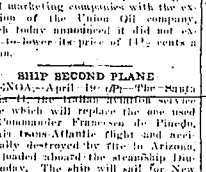

Buhl Pioneer Is Called to Rest

Buhl, April 19 (Special to The News)—Funeral services will be conducted in the First Baptist church of Buhl Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock for Jacob Henry Zimmerman, 87, pioneer resident of Buhl, who died at his home here Monday evening at 10:30 after a long illness.

Mr. Zimmerman is the father of George L. Zimmerman, Mrs. George Mylo and Fred Zimmerman of Buhl, Mrs. William M. Shortwell of Twin Falls, and Mrs. Georgia Etta Boice of Denver. Mrs. Louise Zimmerman, to whom the deceased was united in marriage 52 years ago last December, also survives.

Mr. Zimmerman was born May 9, 1839, in Titusville, Pennsylvania, where he was married in 1861 to Miss Rachel Troper. To this union a daughter, Mrs. Georgia Etta Boice, whose home is now in Denver, was born. After the death of Mrs. Zimmerman in 1901, Mr. Zimmerman and his little daughter went to Chicago, where they lived at the time of the great Chicago fire. From Chicago, the deceased moved to Balmora, Nebraska, in 1904, on December 22, he was married to Miss Louise Willis at DeWitt, Iowa, and to this union six children were born. A daughter, Ethel Zimmerman, and a son, Roy Zimmerman, died in early infancy. In 1900 Mr. Zimmerman moved from Balmora with his family to Boise, where he engaged in farming and stock raising for seven years prior to locating in Buhl, which was his home continuously for 15 years.

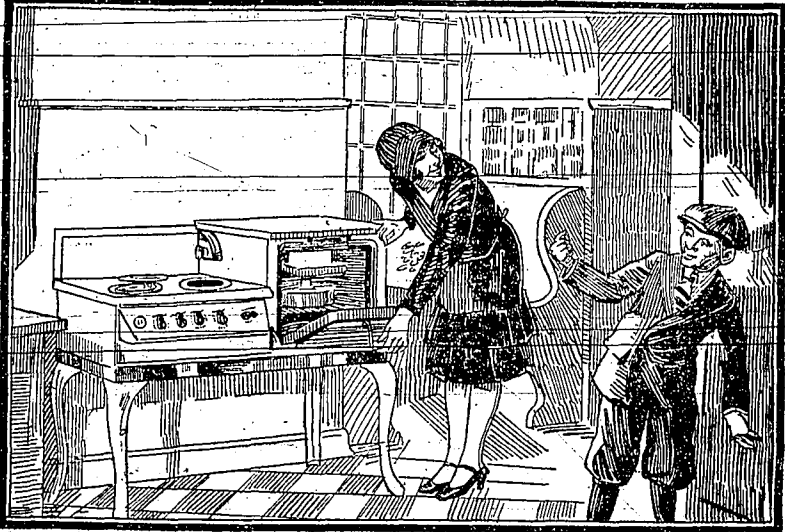

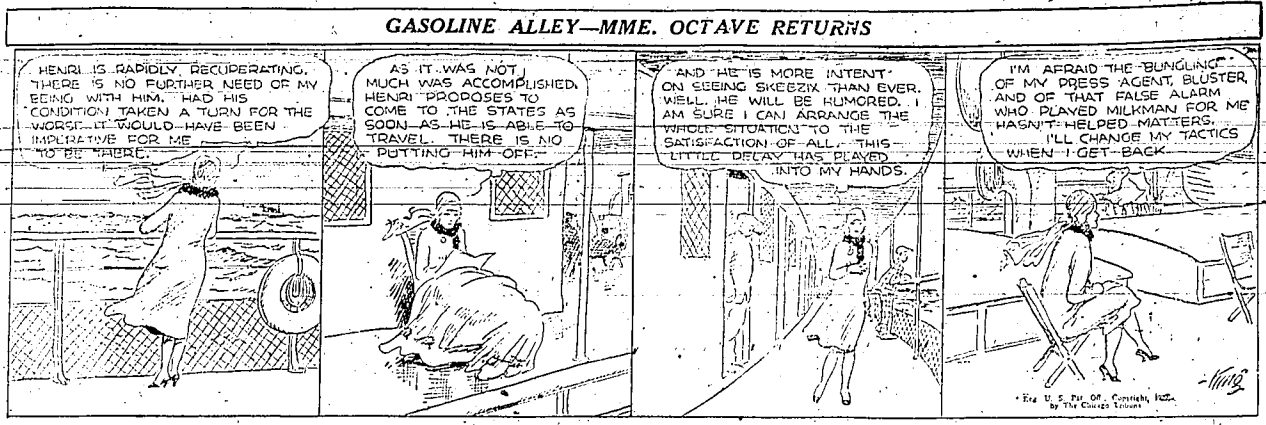

ANSWER COURT IN WATER SUIT

Commissioner of Reclamation and Watermaster Tell Position in Dry Creek Dispute.

George N. Carter, Idaho commissioner of reclamation, and F. J. May, local watermaster, cannot finally obey the court's commands relative to distribution of waters of Dry Creek in Boise and Twin Falls counties, pending their return from an alternative writ of mandamus filed for them by Frank L. Stephens, Idaho attorney general, and Walter and Percy, attorneys, in district court here Saturday.

The writ of mandamus in question was granted by Judge W. A. Babcock in district court here on March 8, last, in an action instituted by J. H. Stone, Julia Stone and the Dry Creek Water company against the reclamation commissioner and watermaster.

In their answer, the commissioner and watermaster assert that the plaintiffs are improperly seeking to litigate in this action, their private right of property, against the public interest of the water users. Frank J. Terrill and Alvin Terrill and their successors or assigns under the guise of a mandamus action, seek to enforce in this action, it is further asserted, are based on a decree entered in March, 1914, which it is contended is alleged void, and which, further has been superseded by decree entered in May, 1926, in the case of Dry Creek water users against the commissioner and others.
