FLOOD FIGHTERS DOUBLE EFFORTS TO SAVE LIVES

Threat of Disaster Grows in Arkansas; Defense Workers in Up-River Country Labor to Control-Rising Waters.

(By The Associated Press) LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 20.—The Arkansas river tonight is on the verge of overflowing its banks in the city of Little Rock.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 20 (AP)—A flood disaster, in the lower Mississippi valley, again tonight is threatening the city of Memphis.

Stricken Illinois Communities Prepare to Bury Dead; Fear Many More May Succumb.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 20 (AP)—Turning from the task of searching for the bodies of victims, the stricken communities of central Illinois prepared to bury the 22 persons struck down by the wind in a storm.

Inundated Area Grows Driven by a break in the Arkansas river northeast of Little Rock, the flood charged down in a diminishing width upon the town of Levy and moved on to strike the inundated area of North Little Rock across the stream from the capital.

Along the 100-mile St. Francis river between New Madrid, Missouri and Helena, Arkansas, inhabitants of a score of towns "at arm's length" were making preparations for the advancing waters which moved southward through a crevasse in the St. John's bayou levee.

Preparations were announced in towns of the Prairie valley tonight. Local communities were providing shelter and food for refugees who brought in their livestock and moving goods to the high ground.

RELEASE CREW OF FEDERALSHIP Federal Judge Bourquin Declares Seizure Sheer Trespass by U. S. Authorities.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 20 (AP)—Captain S. N. Stone, skipper of the tug ship Federalship and 19 members of his crew were released from the twenty-day house arrest which federal district court ruled that after last month of the vessel, its million-dollar liquor cargo and crew by the United States government was illegal.

RELEASING TO ISSUES ORDER The United States attorney refused to issue an order of release until he had received word from the attorney general's office, to which he telegraphed the decision shortly after it was rendered.

BLACKFOOT, April 20 (AP)—Sixty persons attended the potato meeting called by Commissioner Welch here today and voted to adopt a plan to defend the seven-week use of sacks, favored by the use of the word "Idaho" on nothing but No. 1's, opposed having a commercial grade, approved having any brand in a sack, but not to be used after October 1 as the date for putting regulations into effect.

GRAZED MAN SLAYER OF TWO

John Failles, Recluse, Runs Amuck With High Powered Rifle; Killed Later by posse.

PEETAUMA, Cal., April 20 (AP)—A brain fevered by murderous hallucinations, directed a powerful rifle to render death to two victims and a third in the slaying of his neighbor here today when John Failles, 72 years old, ran amuck, shot and killed Mike Treadwell, and Henry Sheriff, E. A. Hassonson. A posse then shot and killed Failles.

Two versions as to the motive for the murder slaying existed here tonight, one that Failles believed the man before him and another, that the man before him was a madman.

Baricaded Doors After walking through the business section of Peetauma, slinking to death in the streets, Failles, a recluse, exchanged shots with Police Chief Mike Treadwell and a policeman and firing several ineffectual shots at pedestrians. Failles returned to his home and barricaded himself within.

Hundreds of persons, armed and unarmed, surrounded the building. An attempt was made to force the door for four days with shells which failed to kill the killer. Failles, son, Nick Failles, arrived from Santa Rosa here today, where he had been arrested.

Shortly afterward the rear door of the building opened and Failles emerged in hand. Shots rang out and he was shot with several bullets in his body.

In the cabin was found food sufficient to last for several days, a small amount of ammunition, indicating that Failles, planned a lengthy siege.

BRINGS EVIDENCE OF ROOSEVELT'S JOURNEY NEW YORK, April 20 (AP)—Missing evidence tending to show that the late President Roosevelt's return to the United States by way of the Mississippi river in Brazil was brought to the United States today by Commander Dwight H. Brown, an English explorer and aviator, who headed an expedition into the Brazilian jungles and recovered the Roosevelt trail from start to finish.

Commander Brown arrived today in Brooklyn on the steamer "Stephen". Commander Brown brought with him items and records of Roosevelt's foot steps, found at various places along the route. Roosevelt lost his picture and the important record of the rapids of the River of Doubt.

## Fresh Storm Adds To Snow Blanket In Mountain Area

DENVER, Colo., April 20 (AP)—Residents of the north Rocky mountain states today evince despondent moods with April heat records as a fresh storm added more snow to the high country.

Mountain recorders from yesterday's cold wave, which set the mercury soaring above 100 degrees above zero at Helena, but the valley still was unseasonal and unlike the July days of spring.

## JURY DIFFICULT IN SNYDER CASE

Only Three Men Selected Out of 161 Examined for Duty in Murder Trial of Couple.

NEW YORK, April 20 (AP)—Three jurors became jurymen in the Snyder trial today, joining Foreman William E. Young, selected yesterday.

The first jurymen of the day, Charles S. Meisner, a landscape painter of Springfield, was agreed on early in the day. He is married and has one child. Harry Arnold and Albert R. Ryan were approved later in the day.

The increase in the jurymen to try Henry Judd Gray and Mrs. Ruth Snyder, charged with the murder of Albert Snyder, the woman defendant's husband, was made after 74 telephone calls in review.

## Records Broken

All records for the three days of the trial in Queens county were broken, both in number of jurors accepted and in number examined. The first day saw 50 examined and none accepted. Yesterday only one was passed out of 37, while today, three of 71 were found acceptable.

Justice Townsend Snyder, presiding again carried the court session into the night, and after filling and emptying the jury box six times—filled it again just before adjournment. The total number of persons who have tried in and out of the box reached 161 as the examination of the sixth group was completed.

More than a third of the jurors were disqualified for cause today were turned aside because of conscientious scruples against inflicting the death penalty. Ten in one group of 12 held up their hands signifying lack of record with the law, disqualifying the death penalty for first-degree murder.

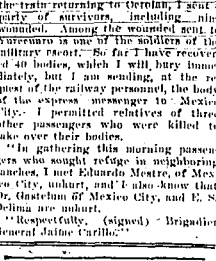

**CONDITION ACUTE.**  
KANSAS CITY, April 20 (AP)—Flood conditions in eastern and southern Kansas remained acute tonight as the river continued to rise, while destruction was reported following in the wake of disastrous flood and tornadoes in southern Oklahoma.

At Independence, Kansas, the sewage disposal plant abandoned due to flood waters from the Verdigris river and families were moving out of their homes at the south edge of the city.

**DEATH LIST MOUNTS.**  
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 20 (AP)—Six more lives have been added to the toll by Arkansas flood waters. Julius Lamb, 3, was drowned when he fell from the front porch of his home near Truman lake here.

E. H. Hancock, 24, was drowned near Morrilton.

Three negroes are known to be drowned and nine others missing, victims of a major political strike, which carried over when the motor stalled, just as a levee went out within 10 feet of it near here tonight.

Another negro was drowned near Bradley during the morning.

### SEES DEMOCRALIZATION OF PUBLIC STANDARDS

BALTIMORE, Md., April 20 (AP)—An extraordinary demoralization of public standards and private patriotism, "is indicated," in a speech which merely stands emphatically against multiplication of the constitution of the United States, and for its amendment by lawful means, only, should be criticized and denounced by some alleged leaders of thought," says William G. McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury, in a letter to appear in the Manufacturers Record, local publication, tomorrow.

"This is a great issue, and neither of the major political parties should be permitted to evade it as it does."

The speech referred to was delivered by Mr. McAdoo before the Ohio State Federation at Toledo last January, on "Prohibition, Nullification and Lawlessness." This address, Mr. McAdoo said, was a more considered one than that delivered in Los Angeles last fall. His letter was in reply to one from Richard H. Edmunds, editor of the Record, congratulating him on both speeches.

### Gibson Declines to Attend Meetings of Special Committee

GENEVA, April 20 (AP)—Hugh Gibson, American delegate to the preparatory disarmament conference, has declined to attend the meetings of a special committee which is framing a draft treaty for the supervision of the private manufacture of arms.

His absence from the committee, to which he had been appointed, caused surprise but was explained in a letter from Mr. Gibson in which he said that he thought his presence would not serve any useful purpose until it became clear that the committee would put into effect its provisions extending its operations to arms of governmental manufacture.

The American delegation apparently interprets the league of nations assembly resolution authorizing an eventual disarmament conference as distinctly including both arms of governmental and private manufacture, but Japan and Italy in particular, are opposed to taking in the question of private manufacture.

The committee, over which Count von Bernstorff, the German delegate, and former American ambassador presided, today virtually drew up two conventions, which are calculated to satisfy both schools of thought and to establish the committee as the body which will be faced with the problem of deciding which has the more reasonable case of success.

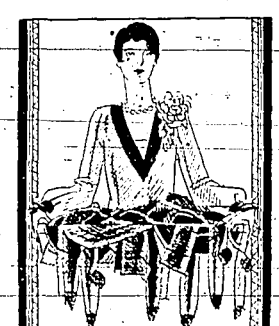

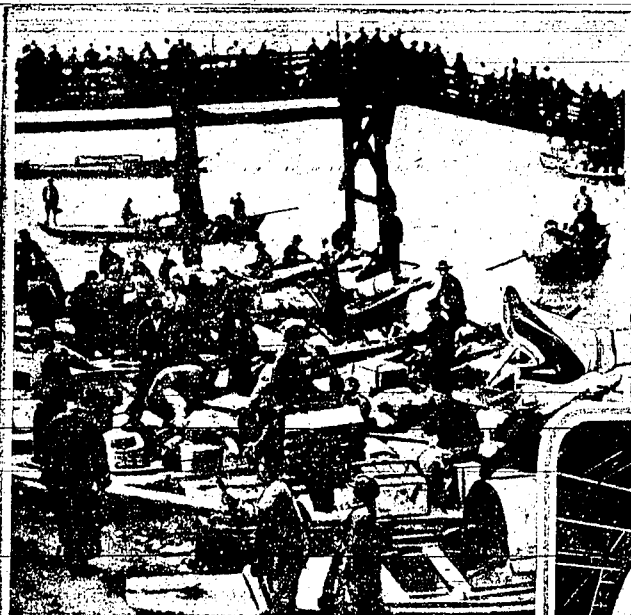

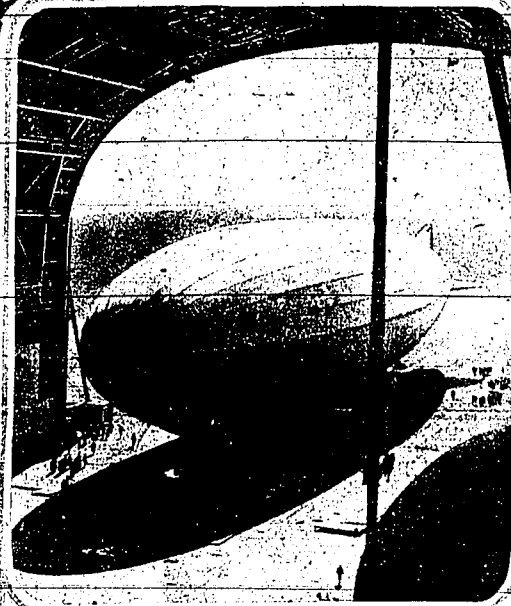

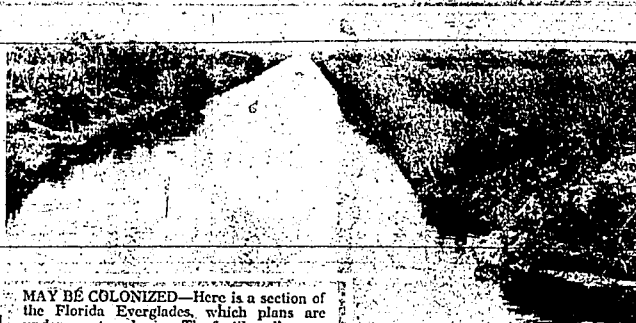

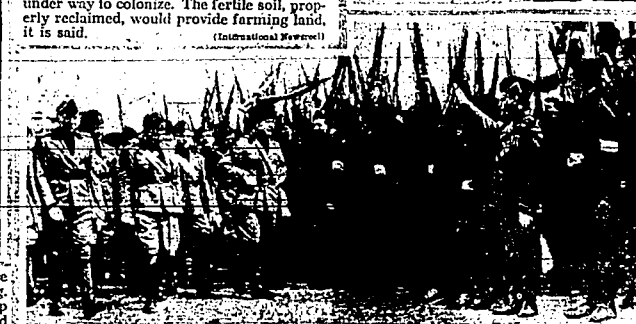

# DAYTON WILL BE FLYING CENTER

### Ohio City Soon to Realize Ambition of Becoming World's Greatest Hub of Aviation.

DAYTON, Ohio, April 20 (AP)—The city which produced the inventors of the airplane is soon to realize its dream of becoming the world's greatest aviation center.

The United States army is transferring its engineering and supply operations of the air corps to the new 500-acre Wright field, east of Dayton. When the 100,000-sq-ft hangar is over, Wright field will be a capital of flying and the government's greatest military project.

Since the days of the engineering and supply operations of the air corps have been at McCook field, also near Dayton. The government base occupies three miles. The new field offers facilities for expansion and research on a scale not possible at the old site.

A Wright field will be quarters of the military air corps. The air corps, commanded by Brigadier General William E. Gillmore. The division includes engineering, test and experimental facilities, procurement, or purchasing and production; and field service, which has to do with repair and disposal. All planes of the corps will be purchased and tested there. The industrial war plane section also is a part of the division.

Dayton's wealthy citizens conceived the idea five years ago of a large aviation center and interested the government after they had paid for most of the land by popular subscription.

#### Finest Landing Field

A 500-acre landing field under construction is designed to be the finest on earth. One building alone, containing the laboratories, has a floor space of 141,000 square feet and is one of the largest single rooms in the world.

Making the aerial project is a great task. Vast quantities of materials, airplanes, parts and equipment, machine guns and bombing apparatus and literally tons of laboratory instruments, must be taken to the new field or replaced.

Physicists and scientists have turned laborers. Much of their equipment is too delicate to be handled by any but experts, and these technicians, many with long strings of letters appended to their names by American and foreign universities, are working with hammer, saw and nails, packing and crating their tools.

Every effort is being made to complete the transfer with little interference to records.

### STANFORD PROFESSOR REVIVÉS HEROIC ART

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., April 20 (AP)—Lightning-bolting, heroic art of mythology which lapsed with the advent of bodily calculating science has been revived. The modern lightning calculator is not a giant with flashing red beard-toucing with the creation of the heavens, but a university professor, smooth-shaven, frail and slightly deaf, who has a practical purpose in calling nature's tremendous forces into play.

The almighty object of Professor E. J. Ryan's research is to make possible the transmission of electricity for greater distances, on high-voltage transmission lines. The subject of his research is a single system with power reserves for use apart as the Columbia and Colorado rivers.

### FRENCH PLAN PARTIES FOR WOMEN OF LEGION

PARIS, April 20 (AP)—French women's organizations, under the leadership of M. Le Comte Dejean, of the French foreign office, are preparing to assist wives and children of American Legionnaires in Paris next fall.

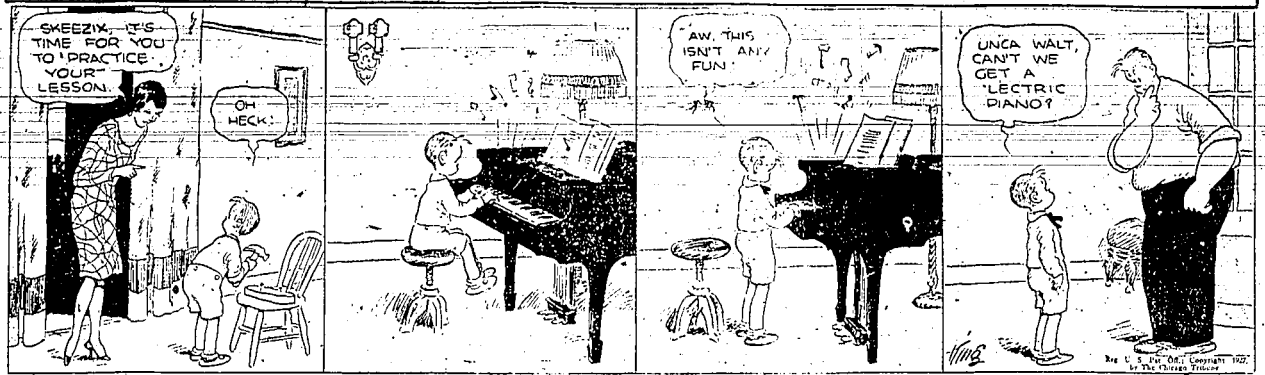

### Idaho Legionnaires May Still Reserve Places for Journey

BOISE, April 20—American Legionnaires from this state may still make reservations for the France convention journey in September with their local delegations although department quotas in the movement were recalled by national headquarters March 15, last. Albert H. Buse, department treasurer, announced that the state was not notified until he had secured a list of those eligible for the trip on the official streamers of the Legion in the following categories: Members of the American Legion in good standing for 1927 and with a paid-up 1926 membership card; members of the American Legion auxiliary for both 1926 and 1927; fathers and grandfathers of Legionnaires; husbands of women members of the Legion or of the auxiliary when accompanied by member wives; other lineal descendants of Legionnaires; brides of Legionnaires in 1927; and authorized representatives of newspapers.

With Pennsylvania in first place, New York second, and California third, in the number of reservations received to date, several states are nearing a full quota originally assigned on a Legion membership basis. There yet remain approximately 100,000 reservations in all states according to word received from national headquarters after a complete check was made. Motion picture accommodations in the movement and two-thirds cabins for men and wife are among those in great demand, bookings to date indicate.

#### Accommodations Available

Although first come, first served has been the policy in filling reservations in the France convention movement, shipboard accommodations from all states are available at special rates. Likewise rooms may be had in Paris, where 30,000 are under contract for from \$7 per week up, according to the taste of the individual Legionnaire. It is estimated that the average time required to make the Paris convention journey from the port of embarkation on this side to the French capital, one week of convention, and return to the port of embarkation will be one month.

### Simple Amusements Appeal to Taste of President Coolidge

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP)—The modern tendency toward high pressure recreation has had little effect on President and Mrs. Coolidge. Their preferences have been distinctly toward the old, reliable forms of amusement.

Large, formal functions in great number claim their attention, in the very nature of their position, but when they are left to themselves, the simple things appear to have the greatest appeal to them.

For exercise, the president likes walking or, when opportunity offers, fishing. In the evening, he enjoys reading, or putting the finishing touches on some work.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, April 20—Two exhibits of 20 drawings each, representing the best work done by students in architecture at the university, are being sent to 12 high schools for display. The exhibits are to be kept four days by each school and are to be returned to the university before commencement week in June.

Both exhibits are now at Lewis and Clark high school in Spokane. After their appearance there one exhibit will be sent to south Idaho and one will be circulated in north Idaho. The schedule follows:

North Idaho—Coeur d'Alene, Wardner-Kellogg high school, St. Maries, Sandpoint and Troy.  
South Idaho—Jerome, Pocatello, Shoshone, Ashton, Arco and Priding high schools.

At no point in the fall in the wheat market during any unusual moments, despite reports that floods in the Mississippi valley would result in considerable amount of wheat acreage.

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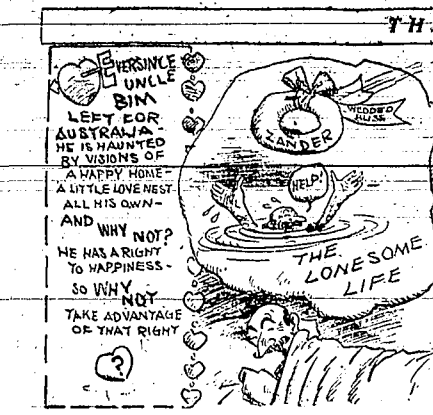

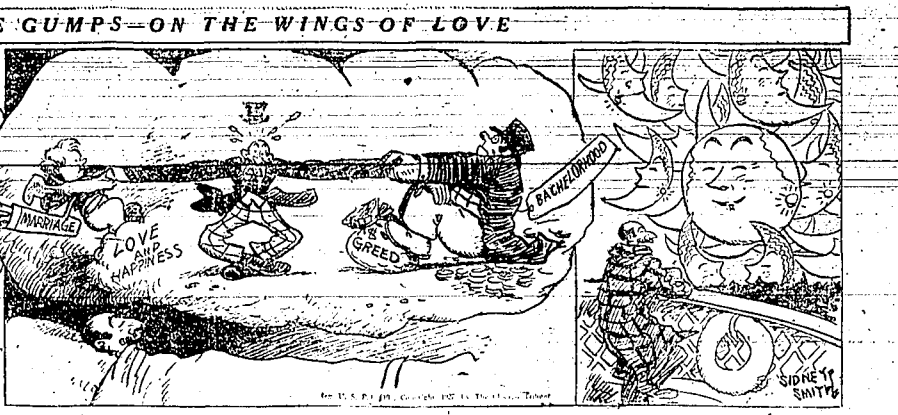
