TWO MEN LOSE LIVES IN FIRE; MANY INJURED

Explosions Kindle Flame in New Five Story Building; Negroes Meet Instant Death; 28 Others Expected to Die.

(By The Associated Press) DETROIT, April 23.—With two known dead and the death of some 28 others in two hospitals, expected, the black and smoldering ruins of a new five story building of the Briggs Manufacturing company, tonight, held the solution of whether others met death in a fire kindled by explosions which destroyed the structure early today.

2500 Employed in Plant

Estimates of the number of dead ran as high as 100 although J. W. Carter, head of the service department announced late today that a check of the employment records accounted for all 2500 employees in the building. More than 2500 are employed in all departments of the plant, an automobile body firm, occupying several buildings.

Many Narrow Escapes

One fireman was temporarily overcome, early reports that two firemen stationed at the building had fallen to their death in the blazing interior proved to be unfounded. A number however, narrowly escaped being crushed under falling walls and the roof.

Charges Not Specified

The statement, which is the government's only charge against the archbishop, does not specify the nature of the charges but in a previous statement the archbishop had stated that he had approved of President Cárdenas' action in the state of Jalisco.

Uniform Policy of Law Enforcement Sought by Official

Conference to Be Held Throughout State to Encourage Cooperation of Local Authorities with State Department.

BOISE, April 23 (AP)—Uniform administration and enforcement of motor vehicle laws, gasoline tax laws, stage and truck laws, through cooperation of local officials with the state department of law enforcement, are planned to result from a series of conferences to be held throughout the state, dated for which were announced today by Fred E. Larson, commissioner and secretary of state.

Nine Regional Conferences

"In order that it may be possible to bring about a uniform policy throughout the state in the matter of the administration and enforcement of the motor vehicle laws, gasoline tax laws, stage and truck laws, and other related subjects, I am arranging to hold, during May, nine regional conferences."

Destination Unknown

"Where are you going, Turkey?" a porter asked as he pulled a fat pig which stood close together in the mass of waiting negroes upon the embarkment.

Don't Know, Boss

"I don't know, boss," was the reply. "We are here—that's all we know. Our house near Greenville is full of water and maybe we won't ever see it again. This man like hundreds of his fellows, stood waiting for the directions of the relief workers, quite willing to do as he was told and thankful that the 'white folks' would continue to provide his daily food."

Coolidge Takes Hand in Relief for Flood Zone

Secretary Hoover Leaves for Memphis Under Direction of President; Commission Declares Emergency.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 23.—President Coolidge and the Red Cross acted today to enlarge and expedite efforts to relieve suffering caused by the Mississippi valley floods.

Train Movement Facilitated

In addition, to facilitate movement of relief trains the interstate commerce commission declared a transportation emergency in the flooded region, permitting railroads to abandon usual requirements for routing of freight.

Secretary Hoover Leaves for Memphis

Secretary Hoover was scheduled for early Monday morning. At Memphis he will go down the river by steamer to make a first hand study of the situation. He plans to remain in the region for a week. He will be accompanied by Major General Edgar Jadwin, chief of army engineers and James L. Flinn, acting chairman of the Red Cross. Mr. Coolidge and Hoover both are Red Cross officials and it was explained at the White House that they are acting in that capacity.

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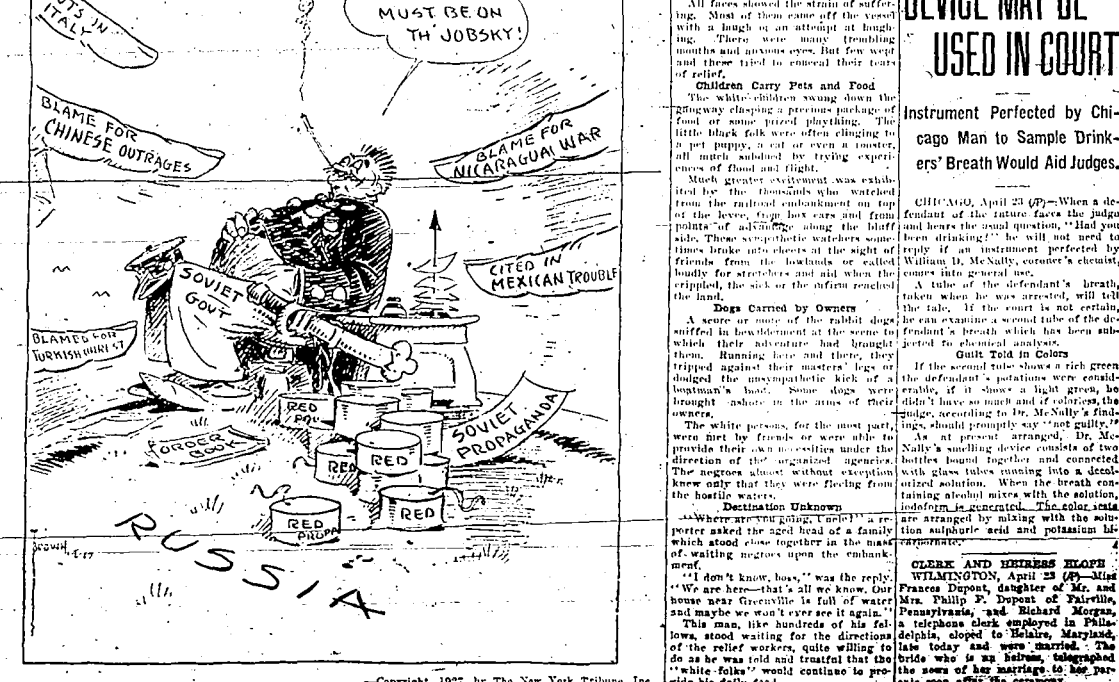

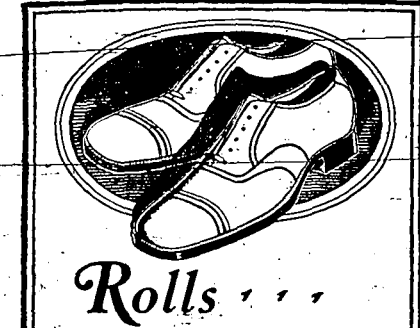

British Geographer Will Be Honored at University Pageant

Great Spedone, "Light on the Mountains" Includes Scene Showing David Thompson Trading With Idaho Indians.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, April 23.—David Thompson has been called "the greatest land geographer the British ever produced," but who died at the age of 37 years without recognition.

In the revised drammatization of the first state's early history, Thompson, who discovered the source of the Snake river, will be shown trading with Indians at his trading post at Kullyspelt on Lake Pend, a Grande.

The scene takes place on the eve of Easter Sunday, 1810. During its course Thompson reads from the Bible: "And the desert shall rejoice as the blossom of the new, and the parched ground shall become a pool, and the thirsty land springs of water."

In the pageant the Indians call Thompson the "Star Man" as he made observations with the sextant, which the Indians found not understood. They thought that he conferred with "Loda-lo," the "Light on the Mountains," or the Indians' god.

Thompson was in Montana as early as 1806, and he was the first white man to establish trade with the Indians and establishing peace in a country long famous for law.

DEPARTMENT OUTLINES CROP DEMAND OUTLOOK

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—What the agriculture department says about domestic and foreign demand for 1927 American grain crops:

"Domestic demand for farm products of the 1927 season is not likely to be materially different from the present. The domestic demand for the 1927 farm production yet to be marketed during the first half of 1927 is likely to continue less favorable than that of either the first or second half of 1926."

"Some improvement in the purchasing power of foreign countries for agricultural products of 1927 may be expected, but it is probable that larger foreign production of breadstuffs, fruits and animal products will reduce foreign demand for our exportable surplus of these products."

New Pack Kitchen For Cavalrymen

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—The cavalry now has a kitchen which will be on hand when it is most needed. Where roads or terrain are such that the kitchen cars which can follow the troops, the great distress is caused when camp is made at the end of a day's march, although sometimes necessary are an hour or so late in arriving. Locations have been more slowly than the mounted men.

Much of a cavalry outfit's work, however, carries it where wheels cannot go, and the new kitchen has been devised for use on such occasions. Mounted on a sturdy horse, it reaches camp with the men, and a meal can be prepared within the 20 or 40 minutes required for them to care for their animals.

Many problems had to be solved in devising the kitchen. Kitchen No. 1 had to be adequate to prepare a meal for 120 men. All parts had to be simple, standardized and interchangeable with corresponding parts of the regular field range, the weight had to be held within 200 pounds, including a 50-pound cork saddle and two 75-pound saddlebags and it had to make a compact and balance load.

As worked out, the pack horse has to carry the kitchen, including four boiler pans, four fire frames, four boilers, two dippers, two butcher knives, one leading spoon, one meat fork, one cleaver, one saw, one steel, four paring knives, one kitchen cut kit, one food kit bag, one cake turner, one handle and one candle lantern.

BURGLARS BREAK INTO THREE BURLEY STORES

BURLEY, April 23.—Three places of business in Burley were broken into last Saturday night. At Swanson & Musser's the thieves secured guns, ammunition, watches and pocket knives. At the Pioneer Service station at the intersection of Third and Oakley avenues, they secured between \$1 and \$7 in change and at the White House service station they managed to break only the cash register. So far there is no clue as to their identity. The authorities are working on the case and feel certain that they will be able to locate the guilty culprits.

CROP ROTATION COVERS PERIOD OF 3000 YEARS

It took farmers 3000 years to develop the modern fundamental principle of crop rotation, according to W. W. Weir of the federal bureau of soils.

This idea, which calls for the growing of an order of crops, such as grain, corn and a grass or leguminous crop, in the order named, and in recurring succession on a given piece of land, follows three other stages of crop rotation which began with the "resting" practice about 29 B. C.

# MAKE PROGRESS ON NEW PLANT AT CLEAR LAKES

### Company Pushes Work at Power Site in Snake River Canyon; Diversion Dam Nearly Complete; Gates Installed.

BUHL, April 23 (Special to The News)—The Clear Lakes Mutual Power company has been making good progress at a rate that is surprising the most optimistic. The diversion dam has been completed with the exception of filling in one main channel that takes the water into the big pipe, and the big steel headgates have been installed.

The pipeline that will carry the water a distance of 1200 feet to the power house at the bottom of the Boyd's Washburn will be completed during the next three weeks according to W. A. Kramer, of San Francisco, construction engineer of the works. About 200 feet of the pipeline has already been laid and a crew of 10 better men are now working here from California by Mr. Kramer's exclusive line at a rate that exceeds much favorable comment.

### Plans for Excavation

The 1200-foot pipeline that picks up the water at the outlet of the lake and carries it down to the power house is 2 1/2 feet in diameter, and is being constructed from heavy steel. As soon as the line is completed water will be turned into it and then released at the outlet by means of a surge and the water pressure will be used to excavate for the power house. This work is expected to begin in about three weeks.

The plant will be completed so as to furnish electricity for consumption in a year, according to Mr. Kramer. The delay is due to the fact that the heavy material for the plant has not been obtained for eight or nine months, Mr. Kramer said.

There are more than 200 stockholders in the Mutual Power company and the sale of stock is progressing satisfactorily, according to T. N. Holliday, manager and engineer of the Clear Lake syndicate, although the work on the plant is not dependent upon the immediate subscriptions to stock. The money for the development work is being supplied by the Clear Lake syndicate, which is composed of W. A. Kramer and H. W. Holt, engineering contractors of San Francisco, and W. B. Spaulding of Los Angeles, Harry Dibble of Redlands, California, and T. W. Halliday of Rupert. As rapidly as the work is completed they are turning it over to the Peoples Mutual Power company, composed of the stockholders distributed over the Twin Falls tract. It is the plan to extend power to every home on the Twin Falls tract.

## WEST END APPLE CROP UNTOUCHED

### Recent Cold Weather Not Fatal to Fruit in Buhl Section; Many Apply Dormant Spray.

BUHL, April 23 (Special to The News)—The cold weather of the past several weeks did not destroy the apple crop of this section, according to a number of local orchardists, and only a few orchardists in a bumper crop used something developers to destroy it. The dormant spray has been applied in a number of orchards to protect the spread of insect life and other scale diseases that have appeared in some sections.

### Sprays Several Orchards

S. F. Orr has sprayed a number of orchards including his own of 20 acres, and E. E. Rosman is applying the dormant spray to his orchard. A. J. Miller has one of the largest orchard tracts, being 12 acres of good sized trees, but he will not spray until the warm days after the frost. The warm days of the past week has brought out the buds on all fruit trees, so that apples will be in bloom within 10 days if the present weather prevails. Apples are in full bloom and cherries will soon be out. Present indications are that the Buhl country will have plenty of fruit, despite the extremely low temperature that has prevailed during the first half of April.

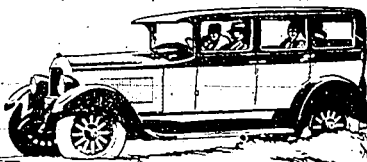

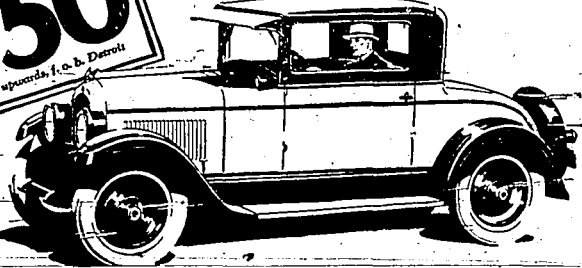

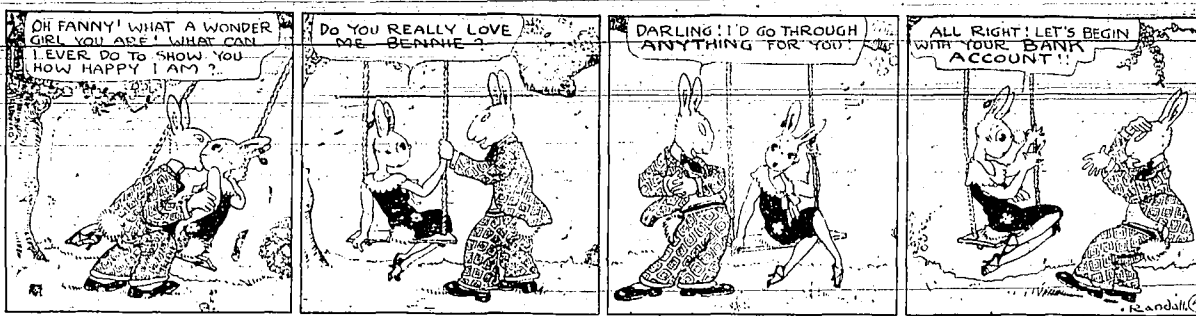

# PICTURE SHOWS OPEN ON SUNDAY FOR FIRST TIME

### Opponents Take No Action to Prevent Initial Showings Under Ordinance Approved by Popular Vote.

Under provisions of an ordinance adopted by popular vote at a city election on April 5, last, and with an understanding that certain preliminary conditions to test the validity of that ordinance, motion picture theatres in Twin Falls will open Sunday for the first time, performances in the city's history.

Gross proceeds of the entire day's performances will be given to Twin Falls football association, theatre owners and managers have announced. The show houses, agents, terms of the ordinance will be shown between 2:30 and 5 p. m. and between 7:30 and 11:30 p. m.

The ordinance permitting Sunday shows was approved at the municipal election by vote of 101 to 75, a majority of 26 for the shows.

Opponents of the Sunday shows have consulted attorneys, but it was stated last evening by E. W. Larson, one of the attorneys consulted, an attempt will be made today to invoke the machinery of the law to prevent or delay the opening of the shows.

It is the contention of opponents of the Sunday shows that proceedings preliminary to the submission of the ordinance to referendum were in sufficient under terms of state law. State law, it is contended, declares that operation of theatres on Sunday shall be unlawful but provides that a city council may pass an ordinance permitting such performances, when such action is supported by petition signed by fifty per cent of the voters at the preceding general election.

**Deny Petition Sufficiency**  
The content that direct legislation provided for by the commission form of city government law which was invoked in submission of the ordinance here, does not supersede requirements of the general law and that the petition that was signed by 10 per cent of more of the voters at the last general election, asking for submission of the ordinance at the April election does not fulfill the requirements of the law governing in the case.

Two methods of bringing the question into court were proposed. One would have been through application made by some person financially interested in a motion picture house to have applied for a writ of review. The other would involve proceeding under the criminal code and causing the arrest of motion picture operators operating on Sunday, in which case the question might be brought before the court either through habeas corpus proceedings or by invoking of the or-

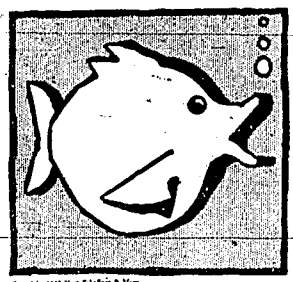

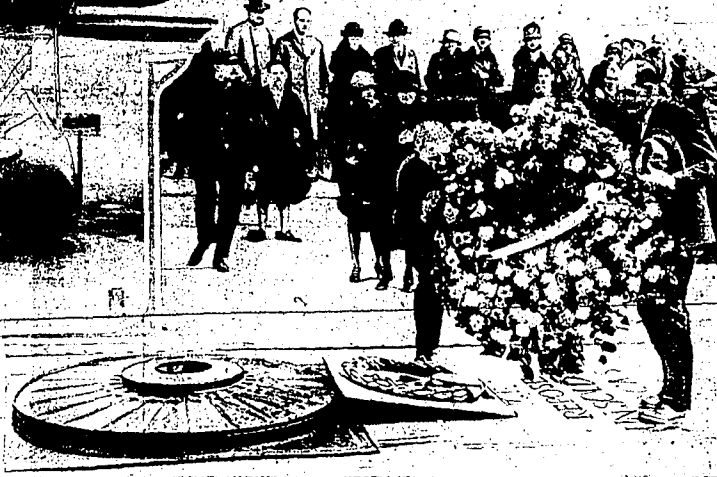

### POPULAR VIEW OF FIJI ISLANDS NOT FLATTERING; TRUTH ABOUT GROUP CORRECTS MISCONCEPTION

WASHINGTON, April 23.—A recent prophecy that the Fiji Islands will one day be the center of a British "empire" in the Pacific seems largely to the average reader slightly because of misconceptions about Fiji, says a bulletin from the Department of the Interior, headquarters of the National Geographic Society.

"The Fiji are the South Sea Isles. They are typical tropical islands, hot and unhealthy. Fijians are savages."

#### Large Healthy Islands

"These are some of the many errors abroad in regard to the Fijis," continues the bulletin. "In reality the Fijis are the largest islands situated well out in the Pacific. Only New Caledonia, the Solomon Islands and the Bismarcks, all relatively close to Australia and New Guinea, are larger. The total area of the Fijis is greater than that of the Hawaiian Islands; and Viti Levu, the main island of the Fiji group, is almost exactly the same size as Hawaii, the giant of the northern islands. Fiji is, in fact, often referred to as 'the Hawaii of the South.'"

"Although Fiji is south within the tropics, having a south latitude corresponding to the north latitude of Japan, it has an unexpectedly temperate climate. This is due, chiefly to the considerable size of the islands and their mountains which intercept the clouds and cool air currents and bring them to lower levels. Since the capital, situated on the largest island, has its tennis and cricket addicts who play in comfort, most European residents dress lightly as elsewhere in the tropics, but the few who cling to tweed suits and felt hats do so without inconvenience."

#### Mosquitoes Don't No Malaria

"On the score of healthfulness Fiji is probably the healthiest island in the world. The rearing of children by Europeans, fraught with difficulties in most other tropical lands, causes no anxiety in Fiji. The surprise is the utter absence of malaria in the islands. Mosquitoes are present, but they do not transmit this and other diseases from which Europeans suffer in other tropical lands. Fiji is truly a 'white man's land.'"

"When first well known to Europeans, in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, the Fijians were the most blood-thirsty and savage cannibals in all the South Seas. Cannibalism was not only indulged in when enemies had been killed, but people actually slaughtered relatives and companions for meat. They quickly came under missionary influence, however, and the entire native population be-

came Christianized. The Fiji of to-day is a peaceful, kindly, most interesting people."

#### Like Colony of India

"The natives are predominantly of Melanesian stock, that is of the dark, broad, kinky-haired type of islander. There has been, however, an admixture of Polynesian blood (like that of the Hawaiians and Samoans) which has given the Fijian a better physique and a handsomer appearance than those of the full blood Melanesians. The Fijians are undoubtedly more conservative although Europeans have been on the islands for a century, and although East Indians have made up a large part of the population for many years, there are practically no half-breeds."

"So large is the East Indian population that it was thought a few years ago that the islands would eventually become virtually a colony of India. There are now about 60,000 Indians, 87,000 Fijians and 400,000 Europeans in Fiji. During the past few decades sugar production has been Fiji's chief industry. The Fijians do not take kindly to plantation work, so thousands of East Indians were imported to work in the cane fields. They were brought in on the 'indenture' system, binding themselves to work for five years. After the indenture period, thousands settled in the islands to grow cane or rice on their own account, or to trade among the natives. The indenture system was abolished in 1925 and as a result the sugar industry seems doomed. The government is encouraging the growth of rubber trees, cotton, and rice. Cane plants have been secured only to sugar importance. Thousands of tons of the dried kernels, known as 'copra,' are exported annually."

#### Only Fringe Developed

"Most of the valleys and hills and mountains of Fiji are blanketed with luxuriant vegetation. As in Hawaii, however, the lee sides of the islands have fewer trees and are covered with long grass. Only the fringe of the islands and the river valleys have been developed. Roads are few, transportation depending chiefly on boats and launches. The surprising feature of the Fijis, especially to those who have thought of them as small islands, are the many large, broad rivers. The Rewa river near Suva is navigable for 20 miles. "Like most South Sea capitals, Suva is cosmopolitan. If one stands on the Victoria Parade of an afternoon, the passing show speaks of many lands. There are the young Fijians in store clothes, their shanks of bleached hair standing out from their heads. Behind them are Indian coolies and trades-

Scattered in the passing groups are people of other Pacific Islands: Samoan Islanders, Samoans, New Caledonians. Conspicuous of course are the Europeans, the most generally spotted white, by passing automobiles are the women of the European colony.

"Fiji has the distinction of greeting each new day earlier than practically

all other lands in the world. It has just west of the international date line. Sunday is born there when it is still early Saturday morning in the United States and Saturday noon in England."

### LIGHTHOUSE CREW IS ATTACKED BY BIRDS

WALNUT HAVEN, Mo., April 23.—Keepers at Saddleback Light, on a pile of rocks out in the Atlantic six miles from here, are unable to account for the attacks by storms during storms. Hundreds of birds took part in the attacks, and dozens of water ducks, commonly called sea ducks, dashed their heads against the twinkling beacon and were killed.

In the first attack a drake, weighing ten pounds broke one of the lenses and put out the light. Disregarding their own safety, the keepers worked furiously through the storm to repair the damage. Birds struck all around them. An assistant was knocked down by a big hawk as he stepped into the gallery with a flashlight. Another bird broke a plate glass window and flattered to the floor and died of its wounds.

### BOY OF FIVE TRAVELS OVER 125,000 MILES

KANSAS CITY, April 23.—(AP)—Marvin Fols' record as a traveler will make a walk around the block when John W. Hicks, three, 7 years old, got through with traveling. Young Hicks, the son of John W. Hicks, Jr., managing director of a motion picture company in Australia, New Zealand and the Far East, has traveled approximately 125,000 miles in the five years of his life.

Born in Sidney, Australia, John came to America when he was 5 months old. He returned to Sydney via London and Paris, and has made the trip from Sydney to Schuller, Mo., his parents' home, several times. Besides, he has crossed the United States several times, has crossed Australia and has been in China, Japan and Java.

The young traveler arrived in America April 7, on his ninth trip across the Pacific. He will visit relatives here and in Seattle before starting back, adding more mileage to his record.

### DECLARES WAR ON CORN BORER

Government Takes Up Arms—Fire and Plow—to Halt Destructive Invasion of Pest.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—The federal government, with five states for allies, has taken up arms—fire and the plow—to halt the destructive invasion of the European corn borer.

"Stop him!" is the slogan, and \$10,000,000 has been provided by congress to finance the campaign. By clearing up infested areas in 91 counties of New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan and Indiana before May 1, it is hoped to prevent spread of the devastating pest into the great corn belt and to such its activities in the southeast where it already has gained a foothold.

Although it is thought to have entered the United States in brown corn imported from Italy and Hungary between 1905 and 1914, before the agriculture department's inspection service was organized, this insect was not identified until 1917, when an area of about 100 square miles in the vicinity of Boston was found to be infested. After changing the corn or other plants on which it thrives in the forest state, it emerges as a moth and spreads rapidly. Last year, the infested area increased 50 per cent, embracing about 600,000 acres in states extending from New England as far west as Indiana and Michigan.

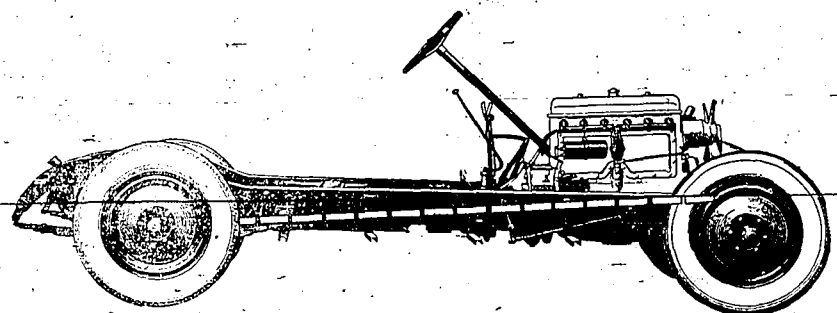
### Intensive Campaign

About 2,500,000 acres are devoted to corn in the 91 counties in which the intensive campaign against the pest is being waged. Corn in these areas are abandoned to burn or plow under completely all corn stalks, stubble, cobs and trash, in the fields or elsewhere, which have not been shredded or made into silage. Publications, lectures and demonstrators will carry instructions to the farmers, who will be paid for all extra work entailed in the eradication. If they fail to clean up their fields and corn refuse about haryanada and buildings before May 1, however, federal and state agents will take over the job and charge up the cost to the farmer.

Dr. W. H. Larrison of the bureau of entomology, is in direct administrative command of the fighting forces, with Dr. A. F. Woods, director of scientific work, exercising general supervision and Dr. W. Westcott, in charge of the field organization.

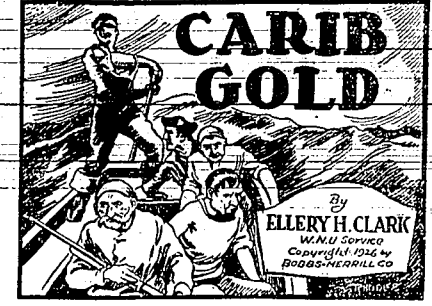

# HIGH PAY HELPS U. S. ACTRESSES

### American Women of the Stage Paid Enough to Live Honestly While on Path to Stardom.

PARIS, April 23 (AP)—American actresses can live honestly and their path to fame isn't barred by stars, says Edmund Burg, back from a visit to New York, where he was amazed by the superiority of American music halls and vaudeville.

Ancient chorus girls and stars also are young, Burg learned with surprise. As they are paid enough to live and have a chance to succeed, he discovered, they develop their talent quickly, "and make good marriages." When they retire, young girls replace them.

In France, says Burg, who is the director of the "Ambassadeurs" music hall in the Champs Elysees, things are different. "How would you have a girl, who gets \$10 a month, live without looking elsewhere for what she needs?" he asks.

In mechanical equipment, drill, scenery and comfort, the Parisian declares, America leaves "France marking time while it goes ahead with giant steps." He commented on the actors' dressing rooms, "each with a bathroom, while in France most of them do not have even running water."

**Paris Stock Exchange Nicknamed "Cometory"**

PARIS, April 23 (AP)—"Viviane Cometory," is the nickname given the French stock exchange—the Bourse—because there is so little business going on.

The foreign exchange department, in particular, is so quiet that the brokers humorously propose to turn their big room into a "Dancing."

Premier Poincare's practical stabilization of the franc and the actual fixing of the exchange rate each day by the Bank of France, the brokers say, has killed business. There is no free competition and the brokers spend most of their time gossiping or waiting for "something" to happen.

**Parisian Eggs Show The Ravages of Age**

PARIS, April 23 (AP)—Parisians know why they get so many rebalanced eggs.

One egg, in eight, here, is unfit for hatching.

The million "egg squad" examined more than 8,000,000 eggs and took more than 12 per cent out of circulation.

Dated eggs, "newly laid" eggs and "fresh" eggs, the examiners found, all had an excessive proportion of faked birth certificates.

Scrambled eggs, of course, are a refuge for the unscrupulous, but the too frequent presence of really ancient varieties of life caused so many complaints that the nation, examined, egg by egg, half the stock of Paris.

**French Boy Dowry**

Keep Girls on Farm

PARIS, April 23 (AP)—Silk stock, legs bring the country girl to town but a good dowry will keep her on the farm, is the opinion of Ambrose Rendu.

This solution, tried by Rendu, dean of the city councilors, is one among others of being adopted as a national policy. Henri Queuille, minister of agriculture, approves the plan.

# WARNS AGAINST TIPPING POLICE

### Sir Leonard Dunning Characterizes Custom of Rewarding Officers as Bad Form.

LOXNDON, April 23 (AP)—Don't tip the policeman, is the advice to the public handed out by Sir Leonard Dunning, inspector of constabulary, in his annual report on the police forces of England and Wales.

"The difficulty of finding suitable men for appointment to the police force continues, one reason being that many likely men—look-essence at a series of which the members are generally regarded as open to a tip," declares Sir Leonard.

Sir Leonard quotes Cecil Chapman, a retired Metropolitan police magistrate, as having commented on the question of tips:

"If a policeman brings my wandering dog home to me, I like to reward him, and am rather hurt if he refuses to receive it, which is inclined to do."

"Where," asks Sir Leonard, "does Mr. Chapman draw his demarcation between those whose favors he will want to save his own and those whose feelings he regrets? He would not offer half a crown to the curate of his church or the cashier of his bank for a little favor of some kind?"

# ITALIAN WOMEN FIGHT ATTEMPT TO KEEP THEM OUT OF SCHOOLS

### ROME, April 23 (AP)—Italian women are making their best stand in schools against the effort fostered by the fascist government to bar them from every walk in life wherein they compete with men.

A storm of protest from every part of the kingdom, Signora Pagano told the Associated Press, has held up the application of the new scholastic regulation barring women from teaching in secondary schools.

"We do not complain," she said, of being absolutely barred from participation in every aspect of political life, nor do we, with exception of a small intellectual minority, mind battle being waged to keep us out of professions such as law, medicine, engineering, or business life, since we agree that the fascist women of Italy instead of competing with men on their own ground should attack to jobs for which they are specially fitted. But we are prepared to fight to the last ditch against the new campaign to expel us from schools because we feel that institutions of learning are true adjuncts of the home and that the profession of teaching is woman's natural role."

The effort to eliminate women from the schools, Professor Pagano explained, is based on the contention that they are not fitted to educate the manhood of the nation to standards of virile aggressive, unemotional masculinity

# SAYS FILIPINO MEN SHOULD KEEP PANTS

### WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—Adriano B. Kimyong, 21-year-old Filipino student at the Catholic university here, does not understand why there should be any embarrassment occasioned by the wearing of his native dress—a gaiting.

Adriano wore one while in his native mountainous province of Iago and discarded it, he says, only when he became imbued with the Occidental urge. The recent disturbance of Filipino students at Trinidad from schools, when the head master attempted to make them discard orthodox pants for red and blue striped breechcloths, stirred Kimyong to speak his mind.

After students have adopted Western dress he believes they become less hardy and should not return to wearing the breechcloths as a cotton cloth, usually of red, white and blue stripes, circled three times about the waist with the ends looped over front and rear, somewhat in the manner of an elaborate apron.

# NEW ANESTHETIC GETS ATTENTION

### German Medical World Watches Experiments With Chemical Composition E-107.

BERLIN, April 23 (AP)—The German medical world is watching experiments with a new anesthetic evolved in the laboratories of the German Dye Works Corporation, for which advantages over ether or chloroform are claimed.

The chemical composition of the preparation, known as E 107, is withheld for the time being in the manner of working and effects upon the patient, both during the period of its potency and afterwards, have been described by Professor Ernst Lipper, who with other prominent German physicians and surgeons has used it in numerous clinics after a series of experiments upon animals.

Obtain Absolute Relaxation

The anesthetic, introduced into the intestine, causes the patient to lose consciousness within five minutes and recovers fully under the influence after seven or eight minutes have elapsed. Professor Lipper asserted in a lecture, broadcasted that nervousness, shaking and stiffness were absent and that absolute relaxation is attained, with a normal pulse, no alteration in blood pressure, and normal breathing.

The after-effects, in a majority of cases, are declared to be nil, there being no stomach sickness, while the system absorbs the narcotic so quickly that within an hour no traces are left. One of the corollary claims is that it is effective in inducing "twilight sleep" in childbirth.

# POLISH AND POULARD SEED BRING WARNING

Government crop experts advise against the growing of Polish and poulard wheats, false reports about which, they say, have accompanied offers of the seed for sale at from \$20 to \$50 a bushel.

Such wheat, the department warns, are not only unsuitable for making bread flour and macaroni, but their yields are considerably lower than those of standard varieties of wheat grown in the same places.

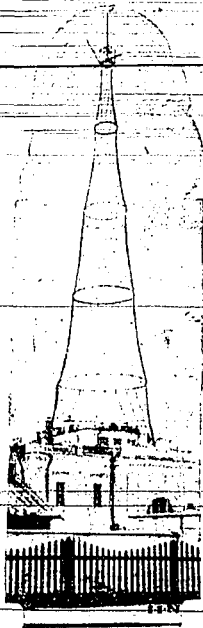
