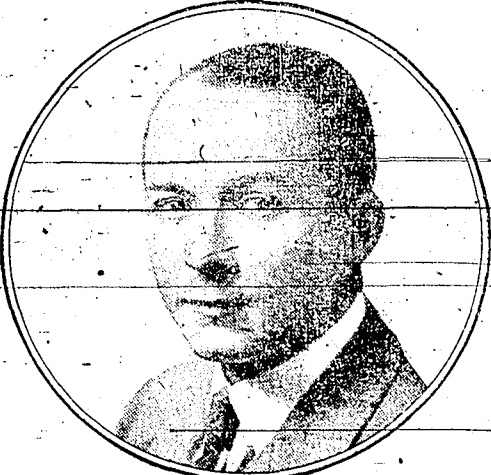

BOARD CLOSES RATES HEARING

Interstate Commerce Commission Ends Kansas City Sessions; To Resume at Fargo.

KANSAS CITY, April 25 (AP)—After adding approximately a million words to the transcript in 15 days of testimony, representatives of the interstate commerce commission closed their hearing here today on the application of western trunk line railroads for an increase in their freight rates. The hearings will be resumed at Fargo, N. D., May 11.

The first half day of testimony the shippers attack vigorously blows at the railroads' proposal for rate increases. Lytle Kennedy, Kansas City lawyer, who testified as an expert on railroad earnings, declared the railroads of the southwest are in the most prosperous condition of their existence and pointed to the listing of their common stocks on the New York stock exchange as the basis for that contention.

He introduced an exhibit showing that the common stocks of the Santa Fe, Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Missouri Pacific and Union Pacific had all reached a high selling mark for all time within the past few days. The Union Pacific and the Missouri Pacific, not included in the exhibit, are established stock market security. That contention was indicative that the earning power of the railroads was at its peak, he said, and no increase of revenue was necessary to the proper operation of the railroads.

In the proposed text of the ordinance to determine whether such a measure could be passed under direct legislative provisions of the commission form law under which Twin Falls is operating.

Taking up the argument at this point, the council members asserted that opponents of the measure seemed to be urging a test "because we didn't abandon our form of government on this particular occasion."

There is no conflict between the general law which requires a petition signed by 50 per cent of the voters at the last election as a basis for action by the council to permit Sunday shows and the direct legislative provisions of the commission form law, Mr. Sweeley asserted.

Mr. Mandate in Vote

If the result of the election is not satisfactory under the commission form, he stated, "the people have the power of the referendum. In the final analysis, the decision rests upon the vote of the people, no matter by what method it is brought to vote, a man satisfied that no court that we have will ever upset the election. Speaking from a personal viewpoint," Mr. Sweeley continued, "I should regard the number of voters who declared in favor of the ordinance as a mandate to make the measure stand."

Mr. Sweeley advised against waiving any demand of defense in the event the city were called upon to defend the validity of the ordinance. "I would not care to try a lawsuit that way," he declared.

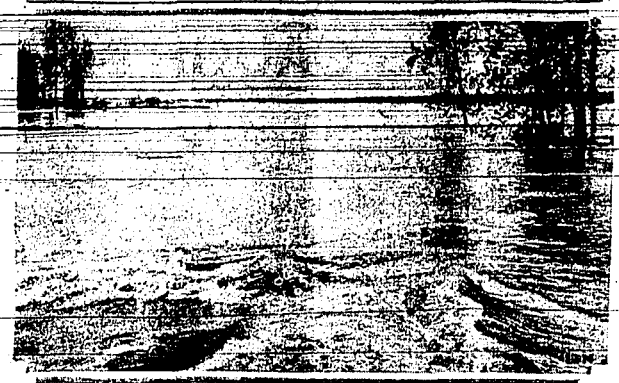

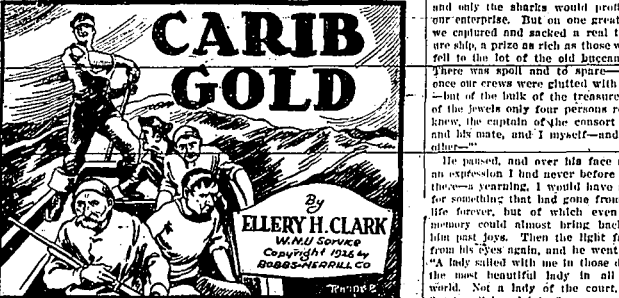
