FLOOD TAKES NEW TOWNS AND FIELDS IN LOWER LOUISIANA

Forces Wage Determined Fight to Protect Vast Agricultural Areas; River Lines Holding Except Near Vicksburg.

(By The Associated Press.) NEW ORLEANS, May 3.—The determined fight to protect the vast areas in central and southern Louisiana went steadily forward today, flood waters subsiding, and levees holding.

Everywhere along the line except at Milliken's bend, across the Mississippi from Vicksburg, the river under the enormous machine hastily built up by Governor Parker last night was functioning smoothly and steadily. It had been evacuated to high ground without report of a single loss of life.

It was estimated by officials that if the threatened levee materialized it would result in the early flooding of approximately 2000 additional square miles of territory in Louisiana.

Immediately upon receiving word of the danger, Mr. Parker, governor of the state, ordered the army to be alerted to the possibility of a flood.

After his retirement as active head of the university here, Dr. Wheeler lived in Berkeley until he went to Vienna.

GRAY TAKES WITNESS STAND; HOLDS WIDOW TO BLAME FOR PLOT

Salesman; Charged With Killing, Testifies; Charges Co-defendant With Murder of Husband for Insurance.

(By The Associated Press.) NEW YORK, May 3.—Henry Judd Gray, the little orange, N. J. coronet salesman charged with murdering Albert Snyder, magazine editor, took the stand in his own defense today in the Snyder Gray murder trial.

Gray took the witness stand late in the day after Mrs. Snyder's defense had finished. He followed Lorraine Mrs. Snyder's nine-year-old daughter, as a witness.

Mrs. Snyder surrendered the witness chair to her daughter after occupying it for more than 12 hours. Of that number, eight and one-half hours were devoted to a series of questions.

The state, through the persistent questioning of Assistant District Attorney Charles Fessenden, brought Snyder's testimony to a sudden conclusion in the last phase.

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE PRINCIPAL SPEAKER AT JOINT GATHERING

Chief Executive Addresses Members of Pan-American Conference and United States Chamber of Commerce.

(By The Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, May 3.—All nations in the Pan-American Union stand on a basis of absolute equality with the United States, President Coolidge declared tonight in an address before the Pan-American commercial conference and delegates to the United States Chamber of Commerce convention.

"It is the often declared and established policy of this government," he said, "to use its resources not to burden them but to assist them; not to control them but to co-operate with them."

"Our first duty is to secure these results at home, but an almost equal obligation requires us to exert our moral influence to assist all the peoples of the Pan-American Union to provide similar agencies for themselves."

FAIL TO RESCUE 70 ENTOMBED WINNERS; LITTLE HOPE HELD

Workers Decide to Seal Section of Mine So That Exploration May Continue; Gas and Fire Serious Handicap.

(By The Associated Press.) PATRIMONT, West Va., May 3.—Facing a second explosion in the Everettville mine, where 70 men are known to have been killed and 70 others entombed, three days ago, rescue leaders tonight decided to seal a section of the mine, which is the only one of the other parts of the mine can be explored.

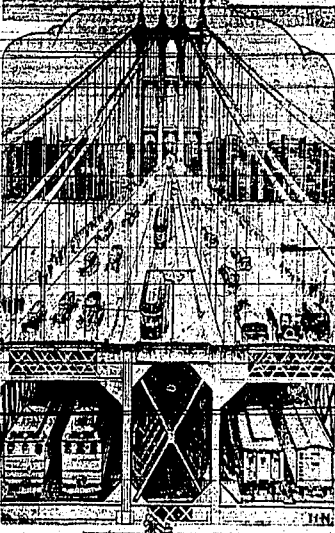

### SIX CRIMINAL CASES ASSIGNED FOR TRIAL DURING COURT TERM

Judge W. A. Babcock and Prosecuting Attorney Lay Out Work for Jurors Summoned to Report Next Week.

Trials in six criminal cases were assigned Tuesday by Judge W. A. Babcock to be held in district court here beginning next Monday, and members of a jury drawn Tuesday are to be in attendance on the court. Defendants in three of these cases entered pleas of guilty during the day. In two cases failed at the last of court jury to agree upon verdict and a motion for a new trial was granted. In the case of George Brink of Castleford who pleaded not guilty to a felony charge of kidnapping a minor to a thing he is charged with the court term, according to the assignment announced by Judge Babcock.

It will be followed by trial of Robert Amley, Charles B. Cororan and William A. Laffor who Tuesday entered plea guilty to charges of burglary in connection with theft of tires from an automobile wrecking establishment here.

### Pioneer and Artist Combine to Restore Old Stage Station

The Old Desert stage station on the right bank of the canyon northeast of Twin Falls that for 30 years prior to about 1915 was an important point on the stage line extending from Kell-on-Bluff to Hole and Walla Walla, Washington, is being restored in a small town drawn by Harry Lee Peck, Twin Falls superintendent of streets and waterworks. Mr. Raymond, about 12 years ago was employed for some time as a commercial artist.

The sketch is to be used as a blueprint to build a new stage station at the old location, which Charles S. Wagoner, a Twin Falls expert, is to include in a new volume of reminiscences of early days in south Idaho. It shows the original structure of the barn with accommodations for two six-horse teams, the fireplace chimney, the quarters for the stock tender and the stables of the central building, the building at the rear.

### WEATHER CONDITIONS FAVORABLE TO FRUIT

#### Orchardists Look Forward to Profitable Market for Crop With Frost Danger Passing.

Weather conditions thus far this season have been favorable for heavy production of fruit crops in this region according to fruit growers. 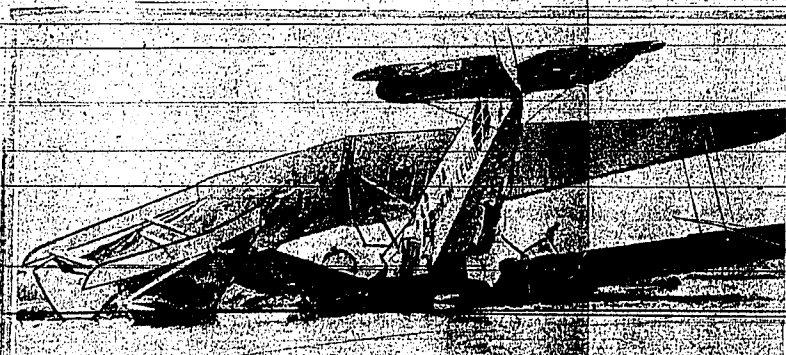

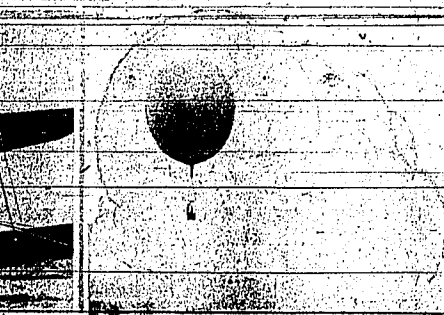

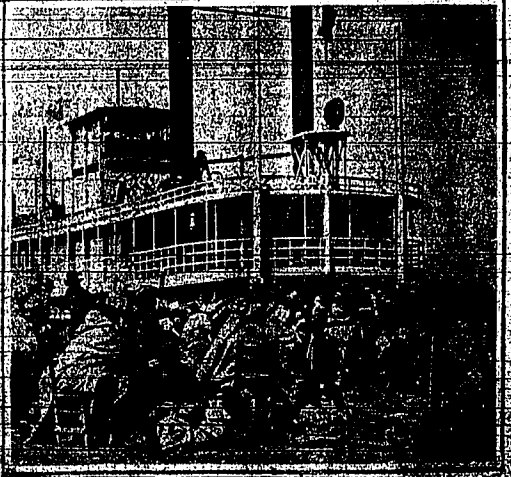

**Lost Gothic Art Collection Found**  
 BERLIN, May 3 (AP)—Gothia's remarkable collection of his own 88 black and white drawings and water colors which the Gothic Museum at Weimar had bought throughout Germany for 25 years, is now in the museum as a result of a curious coincidence.  
 The drawings, largely German and Bohemian landscapes, were known to have been presented by Goethe in 1807 to Princeess Caroline of Saxe-Weimar with a note-reading: "This is how I whiled away my leisure moments during my travels of recent years."  
 The Princess-willed the collection to her intimate friend, Christiane von Reitzenheim. Her descendants eventually thought little of the drawings as did Germany's greatest poet, who virtually apologized for dabbling in such foolishness.  
 A short time ago a distant relative of the von Reitzenheim family submitted the drawings to Professor Hans Bethl, director of the Goethe museum, who had been conducting the search, and asked if they were genuine. He said he found them in an old trunk of family relics. Dr. Wahl immediately presented his long-sought prize and "forfeited it."

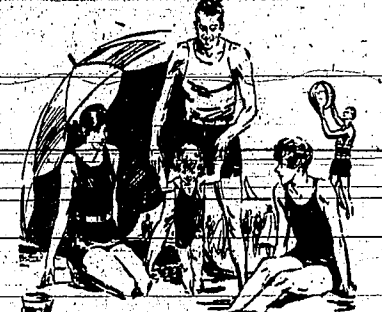

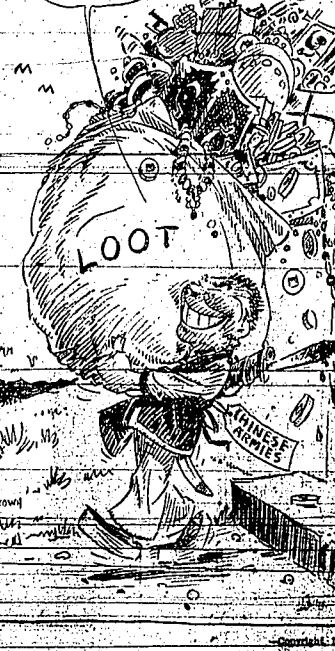

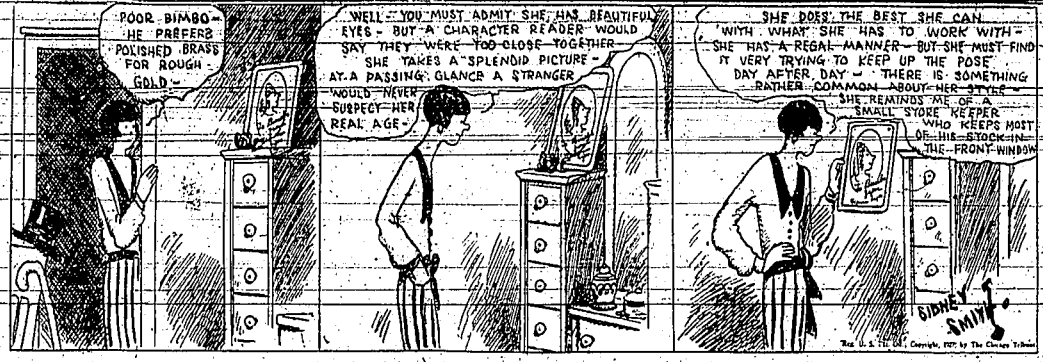
