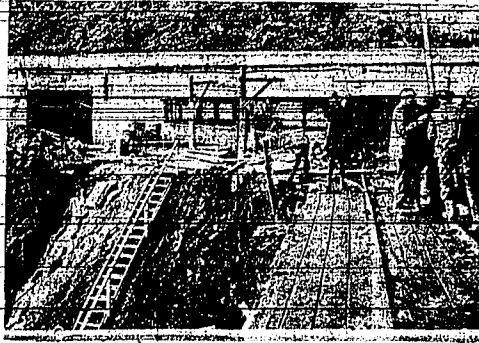

## WEATHER FAVORABLE FOR CROP PROGRESS

Weekly Summary of Conditions Reveals Past Week as Best Growing Period of Season.

Weather of the past week in south Idaho was favorable for crop progress according to weekly summary of weather and crop conditions issued Thursday by the office of the United States department of agriculture.  
The week was generally fair in north Idaho and favorable for farm and orchard activities. The temperature was well above normal at the beginning of the week, but gradually lowered to below normal during the latter part of the week. The weather was light scattered showers Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. Aerial precipitation was below normal and many in such light amounts scattered over the month that the need of irrigation is felt in the lower sections. The temperature was normal and will become general unless there is a rain soon. While fruit was badly damaged by the freeze last week the loss is not as heavy as was estimated.  
In southwest Idaho the weather of the past week was quite favorable for crop progress and for seasonable farm work. It was the best growing week we have had so far this season. All vegetation responded to the dry weather with an advanced rapidly. There came a low and bloom very quick. Early sown grain, meadows and pastures were very green. There was some cloudiness but sunshine was adequate. Temperatures were somewhat above normal until the middle of the week, when they fell to below normal for the season. There was no precipitation. In the early districts irrigation water is abundant and the crops are well along. A few dry farm districts report soil moisture somewhat short of crop needs. Sheep are being put on the range and feed is being increased. The feed is still very short, due to the backwardness of the season.

**WINNING JOCKEY IS  
BORN AND NOT MADE**

**Earl Sande Gives Views on  
Riders: Will Seek Victory in  
Third Kentucky Derby.**

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 5 (AP)—"Stuck to business," Earl Sande, the English dress expert, believes that your knees tight, your brain clear and you'll get there."

"So declares Earl Sande, the jockey who has won 14 stakes and his third Kentucky derby victory, in discussing the qualifications of men who ride thoroughbreds."

"I don't like poets," he says, "but not made," he says. "Race riding is a matter of temperament, plus, of course, proper physical equipment." It is a boy's love-hate, and will work best in the grade.

"Some get there quicker than others. Some get there easier than others. For instance, there are dozens of riders that never worry a minute about making weight. I have to watch this constantly."

"During the season I eat a couple of slices of dry toast and drink a cup of coffee when I get up. Then nothing more until evening, when I eat a hearty dinner, except red meats are excluded from work and exercising horses' diet."

"Then, when the racing season is over, I go back to three meals a day to build myself up to a condition strong enough to withstand the summer grind. Every race rider, of course, must master the rudiments of his game."

"After that it is a matter of individuality. Some of the best mechanical riders in the track will never become stars of the turf. They work, but something isn't there. To others it comes easy. That's what I mean by temperament. Work, work-work and take an interest in what you do. Riding is a profession that requires the same devotion, integrity and high standard of ethics as any other profession."

"People have an idea successful jockeys are rolling in wealth. It isn't true. We're well paid after we get our reputation established, but don't think we get anything like the salaries Babe Ruth, for example, or other leaders in sports draw down. We don't."

Sande, who hails from a mountain town in the Kentucky circuit in 1916, won his first two Derby victories, on Zet and Flying Ebony. This year he hopes to repeat on the Widener horse, Diamond. Sande's wife is a niece of Trainer Owen Child and is as much interested in racing as he.

**SERVICE SETS DEADLINE  
FOR MATING AGREEMENTS**

**Pren Moore, Poultry Specialist  
at University of Idaho, Announces  
Dates for Work.**

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, May 5.—Poultry flock mating agreements must be received on or before June 30 of this year, according to an announcement by Pren Moore, poultry specialist of the university extension service. The deadline is set so that the volume of work to be handled may be definitely ascertained, thus permitting adequate and efficient organization.

Stock of mating flocks will be started about July 1, according to Mr. Moore. The early start is desirable, he points out, because the work may then be completed by November 1 and breeding flocks can be put in proper condition in time for best breeding results. Many eggs are lost in August and flow flocks must be in condition July 20 to permit laying and reproduction by that time.

Get Accredited Flocks  
Owners who enter into the agreement with the extension service have their flocks accredited and their selected fowls are branded by Mr. Moore or another authorized agent of the university. Under the terms of the contract, the flock owner agrees that he will use for breeding purposes only those flocks that have been selected by the poultry specialist or an authorized agent, and that all of the breeding stock be tested by the application method for bacterial white diarrhea.

The accreditation test requirement to see that the flocks are free from disease is a total of 24,814 accredited, were tested last season when the matter was purely voluntary. This year the flock owner agrees also to remove and dispose of all birds in his flock that are found to be affected with the white diarrhea.

This flock mating work has grown rapidly, and it is now developing at such a rate that an association of flock owners may soon become desirable, or even necessary. Heretofore it has been carried on through voluntary agreement. In 1925 12,065 flocks were accredited. Last year the total was increased to 24,814; a gain of 12,749 in one year.

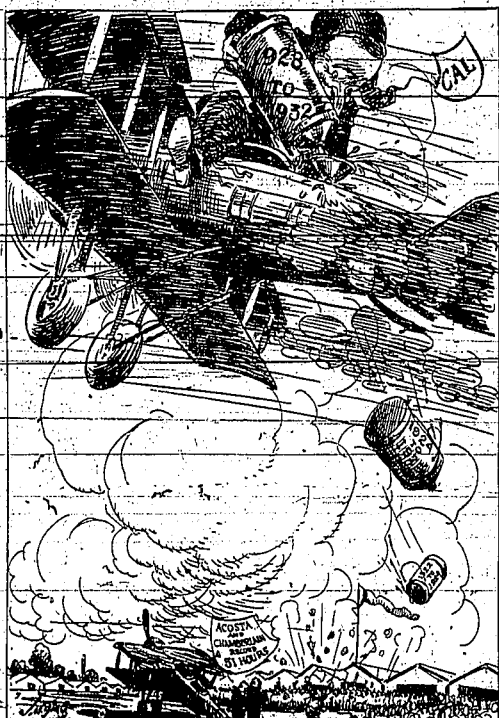

### CITY OF PARIS GETS HUGO'S EXILE HOME

Great Author's Chateau Built on Island of Guernsey Now Property of French Capital.

PARIS, May 5 (AP)—Victor Hugo's home in exile, Havreville House, built by an English pirate on the island of Guernsey, now belongs to the city of Paris.

The author's descendants and heirs have given it to the city and the city has undertaken to maintain it as a monument.

No royal chateau surpasses it in its beauty. It is a masterpiece of the finest architecture. The novelist loved old things, and the antique treasures he gathered, furniture, tapestries, life-size dolls, and other art objects he arranged with exceptional skill.

Hugo was in exile 18 years, but never was idle. He writes are among the most voluminous of any author. Yet he found time to know wherever he went and work with his hands. At Havreville House there is still his cabinet-maker's shop, where, with one staffed with his own men, he made furniture for the sake of creating something beautiful.

French Blind Expects New Simple Alphabet. PARIS, May 5 (AP)—A new system of touch reading for the blind, more simple than Braille, is given prominence by the efforts of a blind man who is generally called "The Blind." He is said to master it in a few minutes.

Louis Mayrou devised the system because he found many who could not easily learn the Braille system. His alphabet is made by various positions of three characters, a right-angle, a U and a square.

President of the Union of War Blind, the government officials who have declared themselves in favor of the new method but so far there has been no extensive collection of it in the United States. 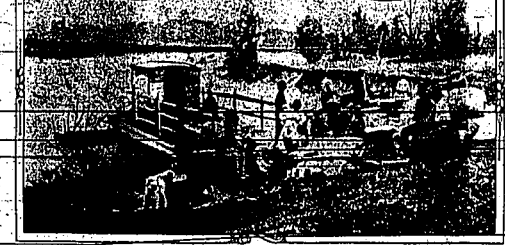
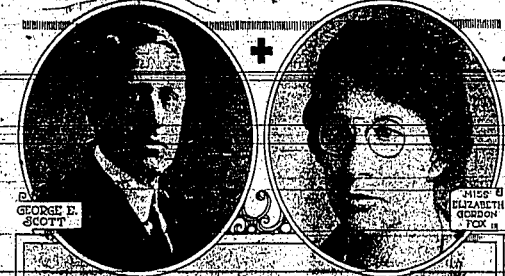

OSLAR, Germany, May 6 (AP)—Katharina von Oheimb, one of the most prominent women in German politics, was just married for the fourth time.

Her husband is Siegfried von Karst, Reichstag deputy for the German people's party. Her first husband was a Rhine machine factory owner, a chemical expert and the third an estate owner. No. 3 died. From numbers 1 and 2 she was divorced.

"Kathinka," as Frau von Oheimb is familiarly known in society and political circles, formerly was a member of the people's party and a Reichstag deputy. After differences with the German Minister Gustav Stresemann, she resigned and identified herself with the economic party. Since her engagement, however, she has given up her connections with it.

At the wedding ceremony in the city hall here, only her six children, a daughter-in-law, the two widows and the sisters and brothers of Herr von Karst were present. Contrary to German custom, which prescribes that the witnesses shall be men, Frau von Oheimb chose a member of her own sex, Frau Ackermann, a personal friend, as her witness.
