### FATE OF DEFENDANTS IN SNYDER-GRAY CASE TO BE DECIDED SOON

#### Widow and Salesman Think Over Proceedings in London Island City Jail; Both Express Remarkable Fortitude.

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, May 7.—A man and a woman whose words have been on the "front page" for many days twiddled their thumbs in London Island city jail today.

#### Not Afraid of Chair

But Judge Gray drew an equally remarkable fortitude from resignation to death, his father said. "I'm afraid of the chair," they quoted him. "It is a source of contentment to me to find myself unafraid, for I probably shall be sentenced to die. But I will think I have a chance to escape the chair."

Both had remained in their cells since they left the Queens county supreme court Friday afternoon when the making of testimony was completed. During their testimony, Mrs. Snyder accused Gray of killing her husband for his insurance, and of following on his threat to make her shoulder part of the crime. She added that she had left unlocked two doors of the Snyder house through one of which Gray entered with the paraphernalia of death in a brief case.

#### Versions Differ

Despite her protests, she testified Gray brutally killed her husband and aspired, as if by burglary. Even when police questioned her, Mrs. Snyder said, she was so fearful of the little court policeman that she hid behind a heavy "two tall, dark foreigners with long mustaches" and gave Gray's name only after many hours of grilling. Twenty days before the trial she gave differing accounts of the crime, and at the trial she gave a third discordant story.

#### Account In Discrepancy

Gray, arrested in Syracuse about 24 hours after the crime was committed, gave a different account of the killing of Albert Snyder. As soon as he learned that Mrs. Snyder had made a statement attributing the murder to him, he made a confession in which he said that Mrs. Snyder planned the crime and that he was merely the tool in the scheme by the dominance of her mind over his. He called this her "magnetism."

He stuck to his first story throughout the trial. He gave a dramatic recital of the actual killing, admitting that he struck the first blow with the hatchet, which was used to murder Snyder-unknown. Many spectators wept as he unfolded his tale of the killing.

He pictured Mrs. Snyder with a vindictive woman plotting her husband's death through hatred of him. At no time in his testimony did he reveal that he knew Mrs. Snyder wanted her husband's insurance.

### LONDON NOT BUILT IN A DAY BUT CAN BE SEEN IN HALF OF ONE

LONDON, May 7 (AP)—London was not built in a day, either. But it can be seen in half of one if the streets are slippery, and there are no street lamps or fog.

American in London are always in a hurry. Generally they are on their way from the continent to Southampton and the boat for home. They have a great deal of business to do in London, and in between the business of changing money, buying tickets and consulting trunks, there are a few spare hours in which London must be seen.

Tourists do least justice to London than to any other city in Europe, said a street guide at a leading tourist agency.

The guides are wise to seek to keep the tourists' interest by pointing out the statue of Washington in front of the national gallery; the church where William Penn was baptized; the house where Captain John Smith was married to his Indian princess, the church where Dr. Cadman preached before leaving for New York, and other points of more or less American interest.

In between, they sandwich a few remarks about St. Paul's cathedral, the London Guildhall, and the Bank of England. But the sightseers' interest is already flagging. They have arrived at the Tower of London, the guide makes one last mighty effort. He becomes eloquent as he describes the "crown" of the many wives of Henry the Eighth who were killed there.

### BRITISH WOMEN KNIT WHILE ON JURY DUTY

Middle Aged English Lady Establisher Precedent by Working During Hearing.

LONDON, May 7 (AP)—May women knit while sitting as jurors in court. One woman has already done it in Justice Atty's court, in the continuation of a precedent, and now it is the practice. The middle-aged woman who established the precedent took off her hat in a business-like manner when she entered the jury box—proceeded her knitting and went to work.

She listened attentively to the proceedings, looking up from time to time when something interested her especially. It was clear that she was following the proceedings carefully, so there was no opening in charge for her with inattention.

On another occasion a woman juror passed chocolate to other women who were serving on the jury. This was done discreetly, and no judicial notice was taken of the act.

Women witnesses who were willing to testify have frequently knitted in British courts, especially in war times, and no attempt has ever been made to stop this practice.

### European Stagard Time

Most European countries use standard time based on one of the seven "meridians" as reckoned from Greenwich. This custom is followed by all European countries, except Ireland, Holland, Russia and Greece, which base their time systems on meridians of their capitals. ### ROAD BOARD TO HEAR WOOD'S REPORT ON HIGHWAY TO NEVADA

Twin Falls District Commissioners Schedule Trip to Boise for Conference With Public Works Official.

With view to accelerating the construction of the highway from Twin Falls to the Nevada state line, Twin Falls highway district commissioners will meet with J. D. Wood, state commissioner of public works, in Boise this Saturday. The commissioners decided at a regular meeting here Saturday.

Commissioner Wood, through A. N. Ashline, division engineer, has expressed desire for conference on this undertaking with the Twin Falls commissioners, but would be unable to come here early this week as he had intended, the board was advised.

Commissioner Moves The Twin Falls board has learned nothing in regard to the project since April 17, when Commissioner Wood went to Ogden to meet with federal bureau and state officials. At that time, it was announced, the commissioner had been notified that the Nevada highway commission would put forth particular effort to improve the Nevada state highway from Ogden to Idaho state line. It was the commissioner's purpose to obtain federal aid and federal recognition for the highway from Twin Falls to the Nevada state line to connect with the Ely road. Commissioner Wood went from Ogden to Nevada and California to study the highway plans in those states.

District Funds Ready Twin Falls highway district some weeks ago approved \$25,000 to meet the district's share in cost of construction of the road to the Nevada line. The commissioners will be accompanied on the trip to Boise by J. D. Binema, district director of highways, and Stuart H. Taylor, secretary, and it was stated last evening that a delegation from Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce probably would go with the board members to meet with the state commissioner.

### TWIN FALLS BOY PLACES FIRST IN TYPING TEST

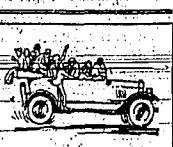

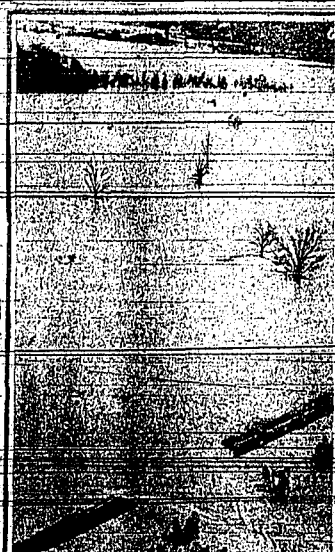

#### Aged Law is Adhered to by Old-Fashioned Cafes in Great English Metropolis.

LONDON, May 7 (AP)—In accordance with an ancient law a few of the old-fashioned restaurants in London always make a specialty of fish on Wednesday instead of beef.

Inquiring Americans have discovered that this is a survival of an old custom arising from a law passed in Queen Elizabeth's reign to obtain money for her navy.

After Mary's reign and a decline in Roman Catholicism, say the records, Good Queen's laws found that people were eating less fish and his father's law was rigidly enforced, and although gradually fallen into disuse since 1800, it has never been repealed.

Customers who pass over the fish item in their daily visits to restaurants still technically risk a penalty of 20 pounds.

LONDON, May 7 (AP)—Gone are the days when London theatres declined to admit patrons to the stalls if they were not in evening attire.

### Radio Tuning Fork Keeps Broadcaster In Right Channels

#### Exactng Device Serves to Bring Into Exact Harmony All of Hundreds of Radio Sending Stations Now Existing.

WASHINGTON, May 7 (AP)—A central "tuning fork" at the bureau of standards, more exacting than any of the devices which attune musical orchestras before concert or opera, serves to bring into exact harmony all the hundreds of radio sending stations now in existence.

Through its signals, which go out at special hours, describes the bureau, the laboratory, the broadcaster can be sure that his program is moving out in its rightful channel, and the telegraph operator and experimenter can speed correspondents with a minimum of fumbling.

Dr. J. H. Dellinger, chief of the radio laboratory, describes the machine as accurate to a degree of care, measured standard frequency. Radio is, after all, a matter of vibration, and instead of using the old method of measuring the length of its waves to classify performance, the scientists, engineers and government regulators are setting up a standard based on vibration rates to govern its phenomena.

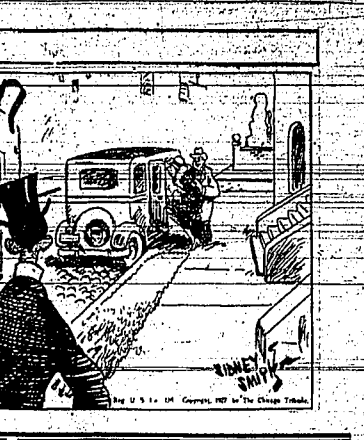
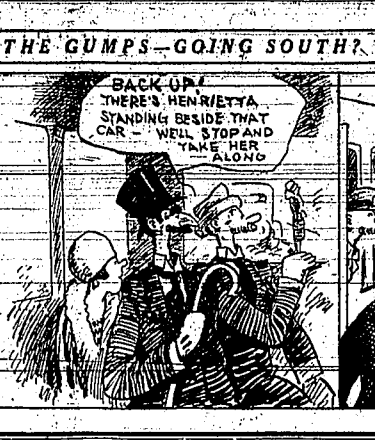

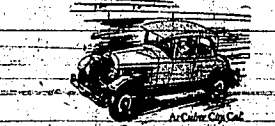
