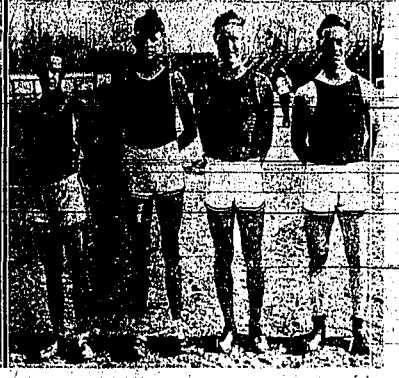

The Twin Falls Bruins won the south central Idaho district track and field meet on Lincoln field here Monday afternoon, scoring 53 points, and placing in every event except the high jump, in which Paul Jones, who has been doing a 5 feet 8 inches, failed to clear the bar at 5 feet 6 inches. Gooding was second with 20 points, and Burley third with 10 points each. Rupert scored 6, Buhl 7, Oakley 4, Jerome 3, and Wendell 1. Toone's Gooding sprinter was 230 point man, taking 11 points, and Walt of Twin Falls scored 10.

Baker Race Features The feature race of the meet was the 800 yard relay won by Gooding in 1:30.8, record time on the heavy track. Toone led the race from the line by inches after a desperate dash to overcome the lead the Bruins had accumulated in the first three changes. Jimmy Demers, world's interscholastic record holder in the javelin throw, led the crowd by throwing the javelin 193 feet 7 inches in an exhibition of his talent. Demers is on his way to the state meet at Sandpoint in the discus, shot and javelin.

Bruins Qualified 13 Men The Bruins qualified 13 men for competition in the state meet next Friday and Saturday, and should give a good account of themselves there. While Gooding, runners-up, qualified 11, about 500 spectators watched the meet which was run off in good time under exceptionally fine weather conditions. The track which had been seen on May Saturday was in poor condition although heavy, and the time was good.

Toone of Gooding lived up to his reputation as a sprinter by taking both sprints, and winning the 800 yard relay for Gooding. Leading in the 100 yard dash, he was beaten by Smith of Piler, who pushed him hard at the finish. Seven of the 13 first place went to the Bruins while five of the remaining eight went to Gooding. Buhl took one first in the high jump, and Gooding won the pole-vault, and Rupert one in the high jump.

Shot in Two-Man Heat The mile relay went to Twin Falls with little competition, and for the heavy track their time of 3:34 was good. The shot proved to be a competitive event between Smith of Piler, and Walt of Twin Falls. Both have been in competition three different times this spring, and each time, Walt has nosed Smith out for first place on the half-pole. Gooding's second place entry in the discus, failed to count through an expected, but Williams for the Bruins, took first with a throw of 113 feet 7 inches. This was as a surprise as both Simpson, and Davis of Jerome, had been doing better. Williams, however, failed to place in the javelin in which the local team was leading. ### JURY FINDS BURGESS GUILTY OF CHARGES

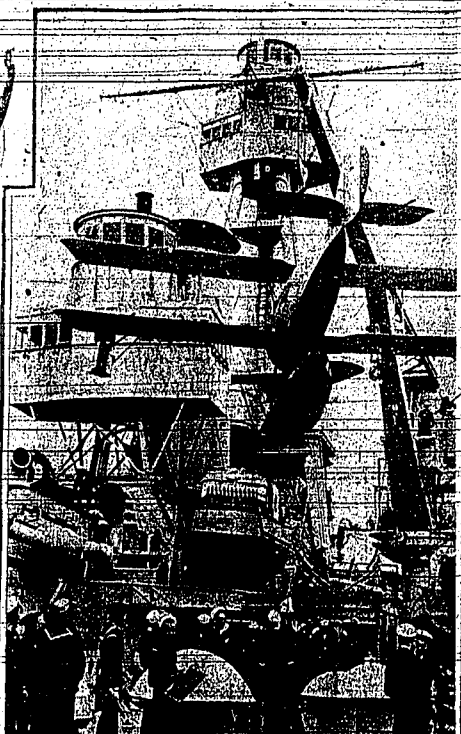

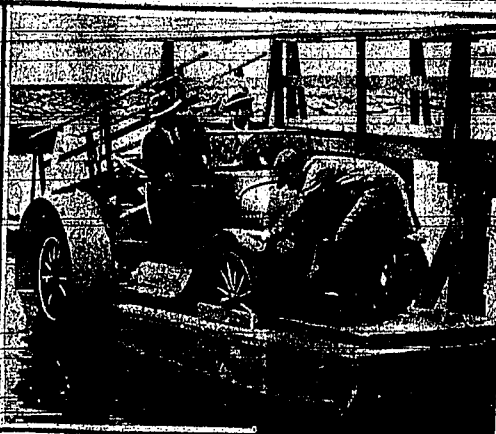

# GOLD COAST TO HAVE FIRST GOOD HARBOR

### Engineers Giving English Colony Needed Improvement; Constructing Breakwaters.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—English engineers are planning a Gold Coast colony's first good harbor. Two recent-capped breakwaters are under construction. The harbor, which is more than two miles long, swarming in the stone quarries and along the walls of stone jetties leading into the Atlantic ocean are 600 native workers, equipped by a hundred Englishmen.

At Takoradi, England has started its pounds, in part at least, says a bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic society, "not the inertest of chocolate malted milk and the English cup of cocoa."

The Gold Coast colony is the world's largest producer of cocoa, which is manufactured into cocoa and chocolate. In one recent year the colony shipped \$4,000 tons of cocoa valued at \$10,000,000 to the United States.

Gold gives way  
"While the Gold Coast longer puts its trust in gold, cocoa has displaced the metal only within the last few years. For 400 years gold was the hope that attracted for 'safe men' on the Gold Coast. Gold mines built the railroad to Sekondi, for which Takoradi the port. In the first year of the colony reached more than \$1,000,000, but the mines seem to be nearing exhaustion. A geological survey of the Gold Coast colony in 1916 reported that the gold which may themselves relegate gold to the background. Manufacturing and mining are important to the colony. First is used in steel-making and the second for aluminum.

"Of all the 'coasts' on the Gulf of Guinea, the Gold Coast has been the one to give up its legacy. There were four: 'The Grain Coast,' where Liberia is today; 'The Ivory Coast,' which has given its name to France's Ivory Coast colony; then the 'Gold Coast,' which has become the cocoa coast, and finally 'The Slave Coast,' the littoral of present Dahomey and Nigeria. The elephants that supplied the Ivory Coast with ivory had disappeared, slavery has been suppressed in Liberia since early in the nineteenth century, and it has been decades since Liberia sold grain to the world.

Stations Complete  
"Bound up in these names are much history and geography. Why should they be costly? Why has not been named for the mainland like Virginia, Maine or British Columbia? This answer is that for nearly 400 years the coast was all that European kings of this part of Africa. The Portuguese came and built trading forts. The Dutch, the French and English followed. Sometimes rival trading stations were as close as eight miles to each other, as in the case of Ouidah and the English Castle Rock. Safe in their forts traders lived and waited for the tribesmen to bring gold, slaves and ivory. They did not dare penetrate a 200-mile barrier of tangled, tropical forest that stretches from the Gulf of Guinea shore to the edge of the Sahara desert.

Scene of Sacrifices  
"The tropical forest has long been a terror for Europeans. Two main railroad lines from two coast cities, Sekondi and Accra, the capital, join Komsal, the old inland capital of the Ashanti tribe where human sacrifices were offered up less than a hundred years ago. Although the coast has 200 miles of railroad in the Colony and 4,000 miles of motor roads.

"Not only has the European had his fear of the tropical forest, but slowly he is pulling it to work. Tropical forests will keep the new port busy, not gold. Now that the natives have discovered steady profits in cocoa, it is difficult to turn their attention to other agricultural opportunities. The production of palm nuts and palm oil is increasing. kola nuts are important, and African mahogany boasts the highest figure in the world. With better transportation and port facilities at Takoradi more timber

# ROGER W. BABSON GIVES VIEWS ON SITUATION IN FLOOD FIELDS

### Classifies Disaster 'In Mississippi With San Francisco'

### Earthquake, Hurricane, Fire and Florida, California.

(Special to The News)  
BABSON PARK, Mass., May 9.—Roger W. Babson was today interviewed as to the floods in the Mississippi valley region and their effect upon business. He states that it is very difficult to get satisfactory reports, but from those coming into his office his conclusions are as follows:

Devastation Very Great  
"Without doubt, the flood, devastations have been very great. From a monetary point of view they may be classed with the Oklahoma flood, the Dayton flood in Ohio, Francisco and the Florida hurricane. Considering the number of lives lost, the figures are in excess of anything in other devastations. The number of homeless exceeds anything that has taken place before. Therefore, from certain points of view, the recent floods have been exceedingly serious.

"The Mississippi flood is different from the other devastations in that the losses are largely rural. Although the area devastated exceeds anything that has happened in this country before, very large cities have not been seriously damaged. The damage has largely been in the farming districts. The houses swept away have mostly been small farm houses and the financial losses have been in the form of crops, cattle, and other agricultural assets. The losses in cities have been confined largely to the following places: Fort Smith, Little Rock, Pine Bluff, Ark.; St. Louis, Mo.; Louisville, Ky.; Memphis, Tenn.; and New Orleans, La.

nately people cannot be aroused without something spectacular. Critics, however, agree that the chief cause of the great flood which this country is now experiencing is primarily due to denuding the country of its forests. They believe that the only solution to this problem is reforestation. If this flood created a real interest in reforestation, not only will future floods be lessened, but future generations will be provided with lumber. This is a disservice, however, which may come about from this situation. Reforestation, however, if slow work. It takes a considerable time to raise a tree. A tree in the building of a house is planted in a year; so that a reforestation project of 20 years old, and in the case of many woods the growth is even slower. Trees, however, grow more rapidly in the south where there is more moisture and heat than in the north.

The immediate remedy for floods lies in the building dams. This country would be suffering today very much more from floods than it is, if it were for the dams which the hydro-electric trust, so called, is building in all parts of the United States. Recently the public has got the idea that public utilities are making too much money from these dams and so there has been some opposition to them. Only recently congress appointed a commission to investigate the hydro-electric trust, so called. At the hearings then held, the point was made, however, were then not taken seriously. "It is difficult to visualize the tremendous area, covered by the Mississippi watershed. The river from its sources at Lake Itasca, which was discovered by Schoolcraft in 1823, to its outlet in the Gulf of Mexico, is 2,659 miles long. The drainage area of the Mississippi consists of a million and a quarter square miles, or about 40 percent of the "mainland" of the United States. This drainage area is divided as follows:

Total	1,240,050

The above table covers 10 states. Of the banks of the river are four cities of over 200,000 population. I refer to St. Paul, Minneapolis, St. Louis and New Orleans. In addition there are 17 other cities with populations over 100,000. The river has about 100,000 tributaries of which 20 are large enough to figure on statistical charts. Steamers can travel on the Mississippi and its tributaries some 4,000 miles without changing cargo. I mention these figures that readers may comprehend the tremendous significance of the problem and the vast amount of people who would be affected by any national solution of the problem.

is a psychological effect upon the country as a whole. These losses make us all come to our senses and think of life in its true perspective and see values as they really exist. # ONTARIO PREPARES FOR MANY VISITORS

### New Liquor Control System to Be Inaugurated Soon at Ontario; Plan for Tourists.

BUFFALO, N. Y., May 9.—(AP)—Canadian "homes" for thirty Americans are being prepared along the Ontario border.

The real estate activity is in anticipation of the inauguration of Ontario's liquor control system, tentatively set for May 15. Repeal of the province's temperance act has aroused interest over a stretch of miles on the Canadian side of the border in possibilities for developing places that will meet the Ontario definition of "homes."

The government will sell "hard" liquor, and either residents or tourists may drink in their homes, tourist camps, hotels and boarding houses coming under this classification. Liquor permits will be sold to citizens, and a class of permits will be sold to the law, in anyone who has resided 90 days in the community. A liquor permit, good for 30 days, will be sold for \$1.

A rush of millions of Americans is expected during the summer months, and extensive plans are being made to assist them in being "at home."

Many Hotels

Along the Niagara frontier, ranging between Lakes Erie and Ontario, there are many small hotels ready to cater to Americans, as they attempt to do, when 44,000,000 have been on sale in 1926.

The beer law permitted securing of tables, but under the new regulations rooms may be made available.

For years many wealthy Americans have frequented Canada. The influx this year, however, will not be confined to the rich.

The construction of the International Bridge between Buffalo and Port Erie, Ontario, caused a distinct advance in real estate values along the new liquor law has added another decided boost.

Since the bridge was built, the well-developed farming section west of Port Erie and along the north shore has opened to Americans possibilities of home sites, and there has been an increase in the number of homes in the American side. That situation has existed for several years, but it has increased since the liquor law became a certainty.

A real estate firm, making a specialty of developing Canadian property, says figures quoted for Lake Erie show that the number of visitors ago must now be multiplied by 10 to be interesting.

The boom is not confined to border residents. Orders for land from natives have met competition from other sections of about air, water, and land and have joined the line with money in their hands.

Entertainment for the visitors will not be lacking. The hotel and overlooking Lake Erie is to be built a large clubhouse, the nucleus of a country club, which is to be organized as members. The best and most facilities are regarded as extensive.

Building Inspector George Wood of Windsor has reported issuance of permits totaling \$1,200,000 for the first two and one-half months of the year, exceeding by several hundred thousand dollars the figures for the same period last year.

A "10-story hotel" is being built at Windsor, another hotel contemplates the construction of an addition, Walkerville, adjoining Windsor, has reported building activity, and promises to be an oasis of cafes, restaurants, near by, also has set a record for building permits.

### DELNO MINE LESSORS STRIKE SHIPPING ONE

#### Burley and Twin Falls Investors Interested in Company That Makes Lucky Find.

Within a day or two after beginning work, the Indian Mining company, composed largely of Burley and Twin Falls investors, encountered shipping lead and silver ore in mining property in the Delno district, east of Contact, and during the past month or six weeks has gotten out several tons of ore, according to Warren J. Graybill, superintendent, who arrived here Saturday evening on a brief business visit.

Assay reports show values of ore taken from the property ranging from \$65 to \$110 per ton, with one report running as high as \$210 per ton. The

ore is taken out of an incline shaft now about 60 feet deep, and is said to be similar to ore taken out of the Delno property at a depth of nearly 600 feet.

Shipping ore is being accumulated to be transported in wagons 40 miles to Mountain View.

With each ton of shipping ore, about five tons of milling ore is being taken out of the shaft. Mr. Graybill stated—shipping ore is being piled on the dump awaiting completion of a custom mill.
