GRAY AND WIDOW TO BE ELECTROCUTED AT SING SING IN JUNE

State Demands Lives of Little Salesman and Mrs. Ruth Brown Snyder for Murder of Magazine Act Editor.

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, May 13—That and silent, with never a glance for each other, Mrs. Ruth Snyder and Henry Judd Gray today went to their trial for the murder of Mr. Snyder's husband, Albert Snyder, magazine act editor.

Gray stood at Justice Gray heard the sentence read by Justice Townsend Scudder, without a tremor, his eyes never leaving Henry Judd directly at the judge. Mrs. Snyder, who has been clanking and unclanking, and one foot clapping on the heel of a slipper, bowed her head.

They stood a few feet apart, three former lovers, as they heard the state's voice demand their lives in retribution for their Snyder, whom they were to marry, and the state's voice demanded a life for each of them. They had testified to a love that could not be restrained and as the state alleged, they had hopes of obtaining \$50,000 of insurance money.

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A smaller crowd than any day of their trial at Long Island City stood at "attention" as the death sentence was pronounced. Their backs were turned to "their public," and only reporters who squeezed into spaces beside the bench, saw the hopelessness and grief written upon their faces. Their attorneys replied for them when they were asked if they had sought to say before court imposed sentence, and the words "Nothing at this time."

Lead Back to Cells Sentences pronounced in the stately, blunder, Queen's county house of correction, the court room was filled back to back at a time to the school of their own cells in Queens county, where they will remain there until Monday, when they will be whisked away to Sing Sing State prison.

Mrs. Snyder was sentenced first, and several moments elapsed before Gray's fate was pronounced. The verdicts were made by attorneys for both before sentence was pronounced. Idaho Deaths Total 282 During April; Five Persons Drown

Cancer, Heart Disease and Cerebral Hemorrhage Tie for Causes of High Mortality.

BOISE, May 13 (AP)—Cancer, heart disease and cerebral hemorrhage were the leading causes of death in Idaho, with 25 deaths from each cause reported today in the monthly report of the bureau of vital statistics. Deaths totaled 282 during the month, or 133 males and 129 females.

Five accidental drownings led the list of accidental deaths. There were two deaths from burning, one from the accident of a dynamite explosion, three railroad fatalities, one mining accident, one automobile fatality, and three deaths by fire.

Supreme Court Grants Further Delays in Judgment in Case of Millionaire Oil King.

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—Further delay was granted today in the District of Columbia supreme court both in the sentencing of Henry P. Sinclair for contempt of the senate and in the case of Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior, charged with criminal conspiracy. Sentencing of the millionaire oil operator and sportsman to a term in the District of Columbia penitentiary for contempt of the senate was postponed until Monday.

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MARINE SERVICES OF UNITED STATES JOIN IN HUNT FOR AIRMEN

Navy, Coast Guard and Shipping Board to Aid in Search for Missing French Trans-Atlantic Flyers; Hold Hope.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 13—Three marine services of the United States—the navy, coast guard and shipping board—today joined in a search for the missing French trans-Atlantic aviators and in contemplation of their return to Paris.

Secretary Wilbur announced that he would take up with the naval bureau of aeronautics the feasibility of sending the dirigible Los Angeles after the aviators.

From the shipping board came the announcement by Chairman O'Connor that all the board's vessels on route between the United States and Europe would be notified to aid in every possible way the American flyers immediately after they take off.

Head of Bureau Raises Caution Hand; American Airmen Postpone Flight to Paris.

NEW YORK, May 13 (AP)—The weather man raised a warning hand tonight and the American airmen waiting to hop off for Paris for France and fortune heeded his signal.

PROFESSOR SAVES LIFE BY REFUSING TO KNEEL FOR CHINESE CEREMONY

Dr. P. Frank Price, Ranking Educator, Tells Story of Threats Against Life.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 13 (AP)—Dr. P. Frank Price, professor of the ranking theological seminary, arrived here today about the liner Korea Maru simply because he refused to kneel for Chinese deification.

The Chinese love of ceremony was declared by Dr. Price to be the only reason he escaped death at the executioner's axe.

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RELATIONS BETWEEN RUSSIA AND ENGLAND BECOMING CRITICAL

British and Soviet Official Fee Tension Between Nations; Rupture Nearer Than Any Time Since Agreement.

LONDON, May 13 (AP)—Rupture of Anglo-soviet relations was admitted by both British and Russian officials here tonight as being nearer than at any other time since they were resumed on the basis of the trade agreement of 1921.

The present tension in relations between Great Britain and the soviet government has arisen from the raid yesterday by Scotland Yard detectives on the possession of Arcos houses in London.

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IF THEY EXPECT US TO BUY THEM

Highway Accidents Take 100,000 Lives During Five Years

Three Million Persons Sent to Hospital Since 1922 Because of Mishaps on Roads.

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—More than 100,000 persons, a third of them school children, have been killed and more than 3,000,000 were sent to hospitals by highway accidents in the last five years, according to a survey made public today by the national bureau of the American Road Builders' association.

In excess of \$2,000,000,000 worth of property was damaged, said the report, and one casualty occurs on roads every 42 seconds, with the average steadily increasing.

PROMOTERS LOOK FOR FAVORABLE DECISION

NEW YORK, May 13 (AP)—Several "headaches" prevalent in local heavy-weight circles cleared up today under the auspices of the favorable court decision and the announcement of a hit-or-miss-unknown contract governing the activities of Paulino Uzcudun. RESIDENTS OF POCATELLO TO HAVE NEW WATER RATE

POCATELLO, May 13 (AP)—New rates, cutting the old practically in half, were established by the city council tonight, upon adoption of recommendations submitted to the body by Mayor C. Ben Reed.

The new rate will be retroactive to May 1, so that the bills rendered by the water department June 1 will be based on the new figures.

Under the new schedule, a minimum charge of \$1.75 for the first 500 gallons will be made, with 10 per cent added if not paid on or before the tenth of the month.

The next 45,000 gallons will be billed at 10 cents per 1000 gallons; the next 90,000 gallons at eight cents per 1000 gallons; and for all water used in excess of 150,000 the rate will be five cents per 1000 gallons.

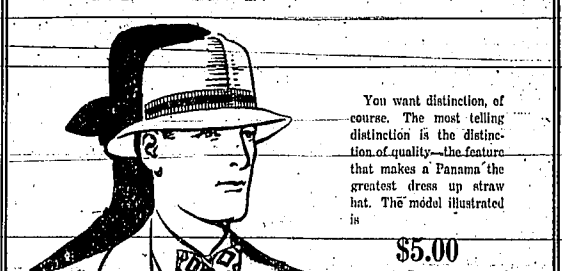

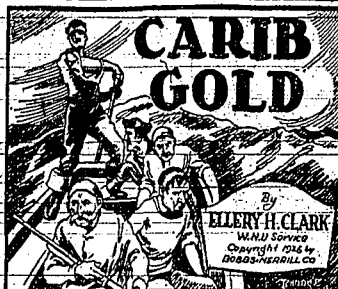

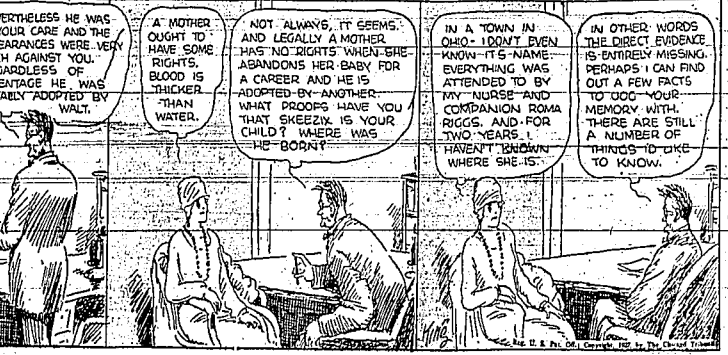
