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NEW JURY RECEIVES BURGLARY CASE AT SECOND TRIAL CLOSE

Defense Attorney Injects Element of Mystery With Testimony Contradicting 5 State's Witnesses as to Marks

The case of Robert Amly, Charles B. Coover and William A. Luff, on trial on charges of burglary, went to a jury in district court Monday. It is the second trial for the offense within a week. No word had come when members of the jury retired for the remainder of the night.

Defendants who are accused in automobile fire from the O. W. Tarr automobile wrecking establishment here last night were to be retried today. The jury retired for the night on Monday.

An element of mystery was injected into the trial when the defense attorney, J. W. Taylor, of counsel for defendant Amly, testified as a witness for the defense that he had seen one of the marks on the auto wrecking establishment and had found no marks that might have been made by a defensible instrument, but that when he made a second examination on the following day, marks were plainly visible on the door to the warehouse room.

During the day five witnesses for the prosecution, including the proprietor of the auto wrecking concern, his son, an employee, a deputy sheriff and a police officer, had testified and were sworn on the stand for the day following the alleged burglary. The marks were alleged to have been made by a screwdriver or similar instrument, but a search of the tourist park cabin occupied by the accused failed to disclose any such instrument.

The case for the defense was read after the attorney's testimony was completed. None of the witnesses was called to testify in his own behalf.

Testimony of Charles O. Black and Lionel A. Deat was introduced by the defense to indicate that the fire which was the occasion for the prosecution of Amly's case the day after the alleged burglary had, according to defendant's contention, traveled more than 200 miles.

Line of evidence introduced during the trial was as follows: U. W. Whitman, prosecuting attorney, contended that the jury was to view the auto wrecking establishment for the possible effects of use of a screwdriver or other instrument to pry an lock.

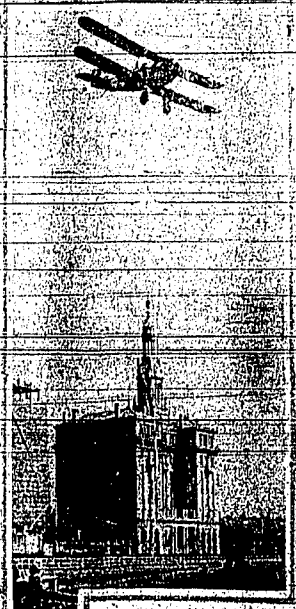

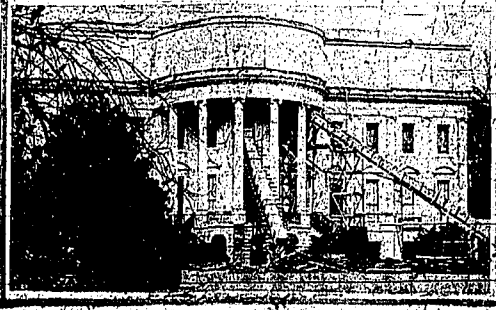

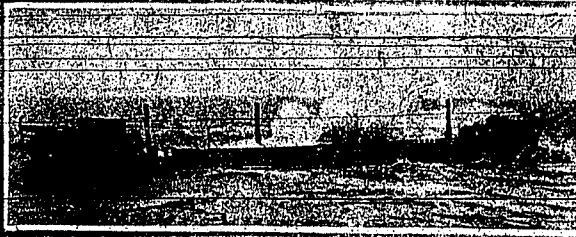

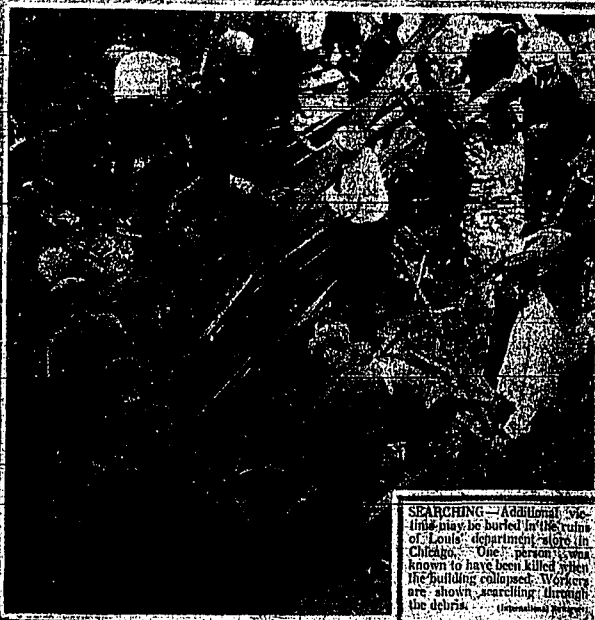

STEEPLE IN CELLAR RELIC OF ACCIDENT

One of Strangest Churches in Ber- lin Is a Church Steeple in Basement of Old House.

BERLIN, May 16 (AP)—One of the strangest sights in Germany, although unknown to most people, is a church steeple in the basement of an ancient house.

On August 28, 1734, the steeple of St. Peter's church tumbled with a loud crash, pierced the roof and two floors of an adjacent house, and landed in the basement.

Nobody ever bothered to put the tower back in place nor to remove it from its resting place. A new steeple was built and the damage done to the house repaired. The ceiling, however, has since crumpled.

For almost 200 years the steeple slept a 100-year slumber until Dr. Franz Lederer, an historian, discovered it.

Hindenburg Most Popular German

BERLIN, May 16 (AP)—President von Hindenburg enjoys greater popularity in "foreign" countries than anywhere in Germany, according to newspaper publishers who replied to a world-wide query for their national favorites.

The venerable soldier-president received 23 votes proclaiming his popularity, whereas the ex-kaiser who has just entered only one vote. Foreign Minister Stresemann followed as a close second with 17 votes, the authors (German) of the Weimar constitution with three and two votes respectively, and Max Baumbach and Paul Loebe, present of the Reichstag, with one vote each.

Espanto Advocted

At a recent conference of the federation in Cologne the practical advantages of the world language were demonstrated by the fact that representatives from 20 nations including Japan and China were able to understand each other by speeches delivered in Esperanto.

Truman Composer

Unknown to Berlin, the composer of the Berlin philharmonic was found to be a surprise that he was called upon to acquaint the Germans with one of their own composers.

Coming to Berlin to conduct a concert of the Berlin philharmonic at which his wife, Ely Reid, was the soloist, he composed a piano concerto by Franz Tsch, a composer living in Mannheim, Germany, for one of the numbers. It was then discovered that this would be a premiere rendition. While the Tsch concerto is not unknown to American audiences, it proved a surprise for the Berliners.

Odd Parades Seen

BERLIN, May 16 (AP)—Provisionals would never consider applicable are contained in the Draft for the new penal code of Germany, the Frankfurt Gazette has said.

As a startling paradox No. 54 mentioned, according to which a criminal sentenced to death or life imprisonment may also be declared permanently unfit to fill any public post. Number 57, going still further, empowers the court to appoint a death sentence by prohibiting the condemned individual from voting, either for or for from two to 10 years.

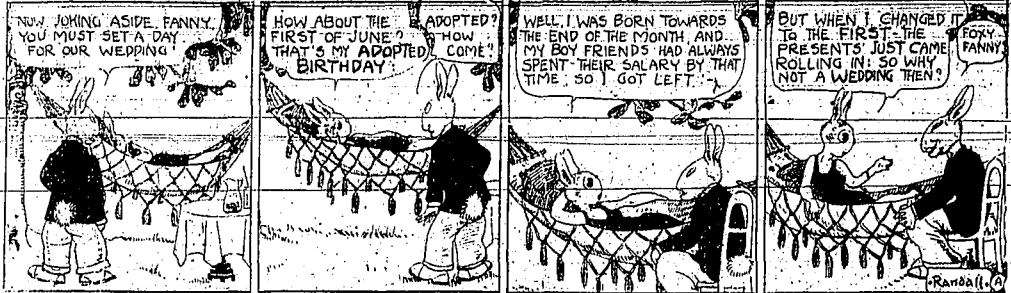

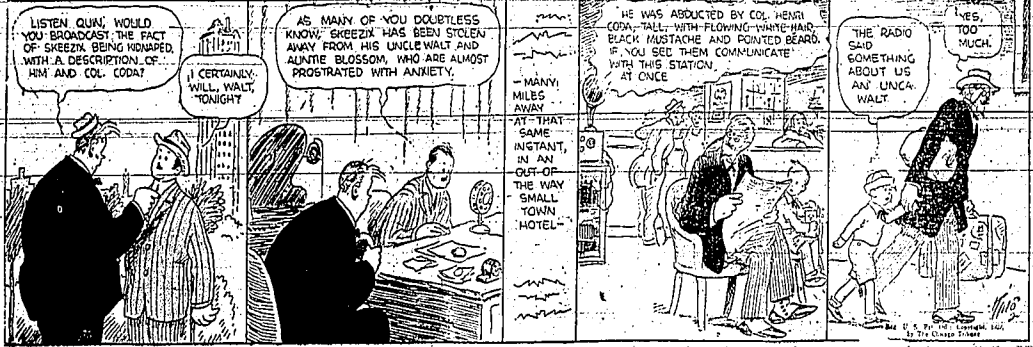

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RUPERT CHILD MEETS DEATH UNDER WHEELS

Tragic Death Darkens S. R. Johnson Home for Second Time Within Six Months.

RUPERT, May 16 (Special to The News)—Death visited the home of S. R. Johnson of Rupert twice within six months when D. R., the six-year-old son of Mr. Johnson, was accidentally killed Sunday evening by being struck with an automobile driven by Martin O'Donnell, a young man employed by Hanzel Motor company of this city.

On December 20 last, Mr. Johnson and his wife, while on their way to Twin Falls, was struck by the motor car on the Minidoka-Hills cutoff, and Mrs. Johnson was instantly killed.

Sunday Mr. Johnson had taken his children, four in number, of whom D. R. was the youngest, with him out in the country and returned about 7:15 in the evening. He told the children to pick up their toys that were scattered around the yard and put them away. D. R., seeing his little automobile, decided to take a ride around the block and in attempting to cross the street at a crossing fan into the automobile and was almost instantly killed, death resulting from two fractures of the skull and a broken neck.

Mr. Moore was passing at about the same time and immediately rushed him to the hospital, but all attempts to save the child's life proved futile. Martin O'Donnell stated that he was not going more than 15 miles per hour when the accident happened, and stated that he did not see the boy until he struck him. He had a new Chevrolet car belonging to Hanzel Motor company and said that he could not drive it very fast on account of it being new. Mr. Johnson stated that he did not wish to invest but for he realized that the accident was unavoidable.

Arrangements for the funeral have not been made as yet as Mr. Johnson's folk reside in Provo, Utah, and his wife's folk reside in Oregon. There are left to mourn the death, Mr. Johnson and one girl 16-year-old and two younger boys. The death has upset the whole community as Mr. Johnson is a well respected sheep man in the community and on account of the recent death of his wife.
