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COMMUNITIES JOIN FOR NATION-WIDE ADVERTISING DRIVE

Spokesmen for Six South Central Idaho Towns Endorse Tentative Plans and Authorize Continuation of Scheme.

A nation-wide advertising campaign for all of south central Idaho country was agreed upon by 12 realtors and business men representing six communities of this region at a dinner meeting in the Rogerson hotel dining room here last evening.

Spokesmen for the communities represented endorsed the tentative plan for the campaign which was outlined in an inspirational address by C. D. Thomas of Twin Falls, president of the Twin Falls Real Estate board, and the meeting authorized the formation of a committee to work out detailed plans for the advertising campaign and to present these plans to the general committees of the region with view to enlisting enthusiastic and general cooperation.

Thomas Named Chairman Organization of the committee was effected at a subsequent meeting with the executive Mr. Thomas as chairman.

The committee will meet again next Tuesday in Jerome, it was decided.

Other members of the committee are Clinton Spencer of Rupert, H. E. Dunderlind of Hazelton, Walter Hoels of Jerome, A. C. Thomas of Idaho Falls, W. E. Adams of Buhl, and J. E. White and C. E. Adams of Twin Falls.

Mr. Thomas announced at the dinner meeting that the advertising campaign will be conducted on a state broad basis, anticipating endorsement of the cooperative advertising program by the realtors and business men of this region. Already had obtained subscriptions totaling between \$750 and \$1000 a month for the undertaking.

On motion of C. G. Adams of Buhl, each of the advertising committees in the campaign was given representation through one member of the committee. Twin Falls being given three members.

A number of the speakers stated that a Twin Falls must be elected as spokesman at the committee of this region.

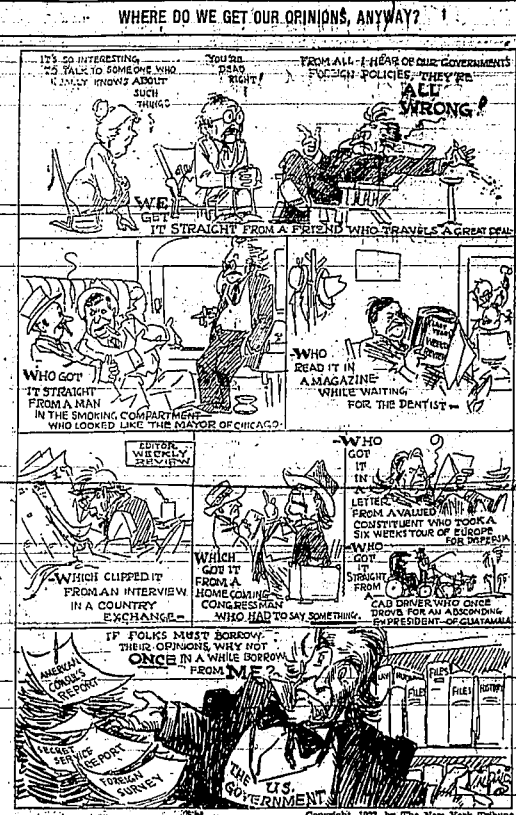

Heavy Rains in Canada and Predictions of Decrease in Acreage Play Important Part.

CHICAGO, May 17 (AP)—Disconcerting heavy rains in Canada are indications of a big decrease in wheat acreage there did a good deal to lift wheat values today. Wheat closed firm at 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 per bushel, with corn at 55 to 56 cents per bushel, and provisions varying from the decline to be advised.

According to railroad advices current here, only 50 per cent of wheat seedling has been done in Alberta, 30 to 37 per cent in Saskatchewan, and only 25 per cent in Manitoba. With fresh downpours reported today the outlook was that a full week of rain before Manitoba seeding can be resumed. Meanwhile, domestic crop conditions from the southwest were favorable, with traders anxious to have that Kansas wheat yield this season promise to fall below the output for 1926.
