Donie isn't sorry he has the speed, but he would prefer to have his burly corps in better shape than it is at the current stage of one of the "toughest" National league races in years.

Pittsburgh Staff Worked
The temporary loss of Ray Kremer, considered by Bush the greatest pitcher in the majors today, has furthered the already shaky Pirate pitching staff.

"How do you know how much Kremer is injured?" Bush went on. "Do you realize that Ray was the only pitcher on the club to go the full route from April 26 to May 19? He pitched every full route except the Clinton's yesterday, so I hope the slump is at an end. If Hill, Morrison and Meadows can't get the game-unit-Kremer returns, we will be all right."

Three Cornered Race
Like Bob O'Farrell, his St. Louis rival, Bush thinks the National league will develop into a three cornered race involving the Cubs, Pirates and Giants.

"But don't overlook the Cubs," Bush added. "They have some great pitching, good hitting and Joe McCarthy has 'em hustling all the time. I was in the American Association when I was also there so I know what he can do. The Cubs may step in there and upset us."

"The National's 'curved ball league' while the American is a 'fast ball circuit'—that's the only real point of difference. Why? I don't know, I suppose this difference in pitching styles has just developed and hung on."

Speaking of speed—and the Pirates have plenty of it—with such men as Cuyler, Grantham, Traynor and the Winter brothers—Bush declared his fastest man is now on the bench. He is Herman Layne, outfielder who came up from the Toronto Internationals.

"Layne is a break," said Bush, "even faster than Maurice Archdeacon, who came up to the White Sox some time ago with the reputation of being the speediest man in the game."

"Grantham is the fastest man down to first," said Bush, "but he hasn't much on Cuyler, who is leading the league in stolen bases. Traynor starts slow but gallops tremendous speed. Lloyd Water, the 20-year-old youngster who beat Layne and Archdeacon of the left field job, is even faster than his brother, Paul."

VANDAL FIELD AND TRACK MEN WILL MEET HUSKIES

Comparison of Records Favors Idaho in Competition With Washington University.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, May 19—The vandal field and track men will meet the University of Washington team here next Saturday in Idaho's last dual contest of the season. The only remaining meet on the schedule are the conference meet at Corvallis on May 27 and 28 and the western intercollegiate meet at Los Angeles on June 4 and 5.

A comparison of records indicates that Idaho should finish ahead of the Huskies. With the exception of the javelin and possibly the shot put and the pole vault, Idaho should win comparative records show, Pickett of Idaho, leaves the javelin about 115 or 120 feet, while in the Washington-Oregon contest Saturday, the winning throw was 127 feet 10 inches. Cleaver's time was 2 minutes, 32 seconds, "betting" all Idaho records. Washington has no man who can run the race under 10 minutes. In the 100-yard dash, Idaho has an even break with Ben Perrin sitting on the bench with a torn leg tendon. Jay Thompson can do that distance in 10.1 the same time Anderson made to win the race with Oregon Saturday. Pickett, sensational pentathlon finish, should win the high jump. Rickard's 'Weather Luck' Changes and Battle Is Called on Account of Rain

Steady, Driving Down-Pour Settles on Yankee Stadium in New York; Maloney and Sharkey Rest Another Night.

(By The Associated Press)
NEW YORK, May 19—For the second time in 20 years of fight promoting, the proverbial "weather luck" that had followed the trail of Tex Willard deserted him today.

A steady driving rain, starting in early in the day, forced the promoter to postpone until tomorrow night the all-floater heavyweight "elimination" semifinal between Jimmy Maloney and Jack Sharkey at the Yankee stadium. Outcome of the 15-round fray will determine an opponent for Jack Dempsey in the former heavyweight champion's scheduled comeback here in August.

Really 1925 Plans
Only one step before in Rickard's new career as a promoter has the weather man failed to join hands with him in the production of outdoor shows. In the spring of 1925, a downpour temporarily washed out Paul Benish's attempt on the light heavyweight title held by Mike McGeeney. McGeeney narrowly escaped the same hazard at Philadelphia last September, although rain on that occasion held until the marine and Jack Dempsey had entered the ring.

Postponement of the match, generally disagreeable to the fighters themselves, held out for Rickard the prospect of an even larger gate than he had expected. With another day added for advance-sell-outs, already at the 100,000 mark, Rickard anticipated that the total receipts would exceed his original estimate of \$300,000. Of that amount the fighters will share approximately \$150,000.

Delay Hard on Fighters
The delay is hardest of all at the physical conditions of Maloney and Sharkey, primed to peak trim for the crucial battle of their careers. Sharkey next caught in the midst of a "dry out" session, declined to pull his weight down from 162 to 158 pounds and increased his speed, while leaving him on fighting edge.

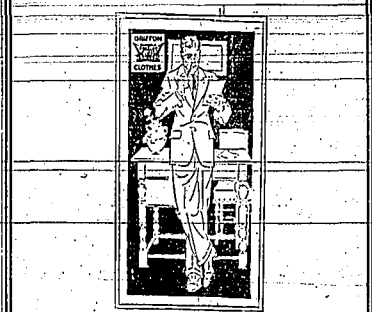

Methods of raising the crops and maintaining high standards in the flocks were discussed, with proposal to grade sheep, and take the grade of the sheep in the ear, a decided innovation in sheep breeding circles, which if followed in this section, stated Donald McLean, secretary of the association, will doubtless be used by sheep growers over the entire country.

Decision that Idaho had more Hampshire than can be used to good advantage on Idaho ranges, led the association to adopt an "artificially" campaign in periodicals taking a general farm circulation in other states, Idaho, stated Mr. McLean, has more registered Hampshire sheep than any other state in the union.

Among the prominent breeders present were: Robert Trueman of Twin Falls; Dr. S. W. McCune, of Bliss, former secretary of the National Association of Hampshire breeders; Mr. Collins of Jerome, with E. F. Rhinehart, field animal husbandman of the University of Idaho extension service; and "C. C. Bacon," secretary of the Idaho Wool Growers' association, speaking on types of range animals desired.

The meeting here yesterday is the second of a series of three meetings, the third to be held today at Rupert. The first meeting was held Wednesday at Caldwell.

C. Manson, Pocatello, Short Line manager, received by the Short Line agent at Hollister Thursday afternoon.

Bates, superintendent, stated Thursday, will hold an additional 100,000 acre feet this season. The conditions referred to by Mr. Manson, in Mr. Bates' opinion, have been caused by three or four recent warm days accelerating the runoff on the Salmon river watershed. Such conditions have "occurred in the past," although not in recent years.

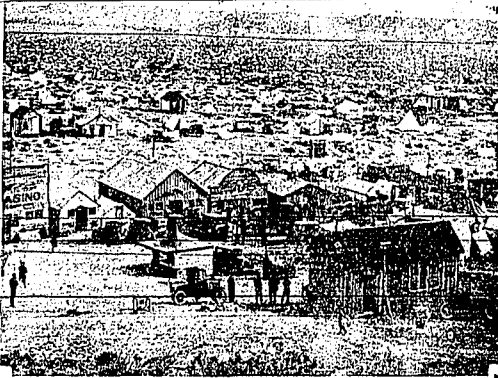

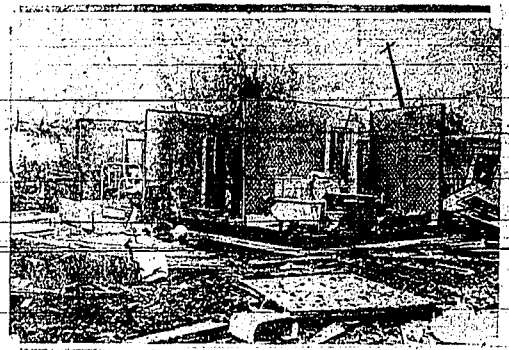

ALBANIA HAS SECOND CAESAR: ZOGU RULES WITH HAND OF IRON

President of Skiptar Republic Is Own Prime Minister; Chooses Cabinet and Nation's Parliament.

(By The Associated Press) TIRANA, Albania, May 19.—Albania, after 2000 years, has its second Caesar. He is Ahmet Bey Zogu, whose title is president of the Skiptar republic but who rules the country with the hand of a dictator.

Almed, pronounced Ahmed, is his own prime minister, he chooses his cabinet, and it is reported that he picks his own parliament. His power rivals that of Julius Caesar when he ruled Rome. His family, however, belonged to the Roman empire.

As Zoglu, Lord As one of the feudal lords descending in a direct line from the boys that were created by the Sultan of Turkey, Almed and his family possess tracts of land in the region of the Mali river which were given to his ancestors to attach them to the Ottoman cause. He adheres to the Turkish customs and the Mohammedan religion.

Almed is 33 years old, six feet tall and built like a Kentucky mountaineer. The tribe of the Mali, one of the multitudes of his regime, boasts that it has few men more brave and bold than he is a bachelor, and, by force of political circumstances, a recluse.

Will Marry As soon as the Albanian situation clears so that he can show himself to his people, it is expected that he will make his first public appearance since last November with the daughter of another Bey of the Mali.

His education, chiefly Albanian, was polished by a sojourn in Austria. Germany is his only foreign language.

A modest bungalow in Tirana is the president's home. His excessive residence at Durazzo is more pretentious.

Extensive wardrobe Ahmed has an extensive wardrobe, however. He wears different uniforms as president, commander in chief respectively of the army, judiciary and militia, and admiral of the fleet. Albania possesses two old fashions.

There is another in reserve—no Albanians say, for the day when the people call upon him to take the throne.

What the Albania president lacks most is distraction. His sisters play little music for him occasionally, but his chief pastime is listening to American airs played every afternoon from a bandstand in front of his residence by a number of Albanian-Americans brought from the United States especially for the purpose. They are led by Wason, a former member of the Boston Symphony orchestra.

WEST USES AIR MAIL MORE THAN EASTERNER

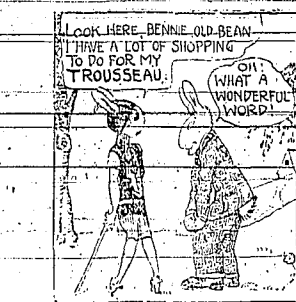
WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—Western states appear to find the new service's airplane mail service of more value than eastern states do. In proportion to population and in some cases as a matter of actual bulk, the western air mail carriers are exceeding routes by the eastern routes.

Between Salt Lake and Los Angeles the air mail has carried 5500 pounds of letters and parcels in the past month since its establishment, and the airmail branch of the commerce department figures that this amounted to 1563 pounds of mail per 1000 of population along the route. In the best month of the New York-Boston air service this volume was 2000 pounds which was less than a third of a pound per 1000 of population.

On the Chicago-Salt Lake route the ratio was 240 pounds to each 1000 of population; Seattle-Los Angeles, 307; Cheyenne-Pueblo, 740; Atlanta-Miami, 530; Detroit-Chicago and St. Louis-Chicago, less than one pound.

CHINA WAR EFFECTS FELL IN STATES

Tung Oil, Vital to American Varnish and Oilcloth Makers, Hard to Obtain

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Many Americans have wondered recently why the United States maintains a fleet of gunboats at Hankow, 600 miles up the revolution-plagued Yangtze river. Tung oil, a substance vital to the American varnish and oilcloth industries, is one answer. American gunboats have been conveying merchant ships loaded in part with tung oil.

When the palist crew clerk explains that varnish is up in price because of civil war in China, a bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic society, "do not see."

"Tung oil, or Chinese wood oil, has skyrocketed from its normal price of 12 cents a bushel to 20 cents per bushel. The cost of China's oil per year is \$100,000,000.

"Perhaps you have wondered what the woman in the magazine advertisement who pours boiling hot water on the teakettle onto the dining-room table looks like. She is tung oil.

"China war in China five or 10 years ago did not bring such a flurry in tung oil because Florida, Georgia, Mississippi and Louisiana will then be producing. Plant explorers of the department of agriculture were then facing the American paint and varnish industry, and 18 years ago introduced the first tung oil tree.

Florida today has 50,000 acres of productive tung oil trees, which would be yielding an extraordinary amount of prosperity, but there are only 3000 acres of trees in all the South. Few farms here raise older than saplings, so civil war in China has played havoc with tung oil prices.

Keeps the Junks Afloat
"Bonds, no any boat owner knows demand constant attention, calling, painting and refitting, so it is natural that a water-wise people like the Chinese should use tung oil as a preservative for boat hulls.

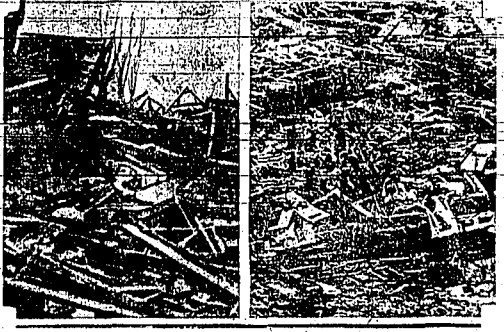
"The strange thing is that the Western world did not appreciate the value of tung oil until before 1880. Now it takes a favored place beside such other Chinese commodities as silk and gunpowder.

"To find the source of China's wood oil a traveler must journey into the stark, mountain-valley-of-Hunan-and-Szechwan Provinces. If he expects to find orchards he will be disappointed for tung oil trees, like American hickories, grow where nature plants them. The Chinese farmer depends on vegetables and grain, not nuts, to feed his family.

"Buyers move through the valley in the fall purchasing small stores of tung oil, nut, mica. Removal of the green fresh nut, the seed, five to six inches in diameter, is done in each nut. After being roasted and cleaned, the seeds are ground by jacked bullocks turning a stone mill, and the resultant pulp is mixed with straw. Cakes of tung seed pulp the size of British cheese wheels are inserted in a hollowed log. A pile driver device squeezes 40 per cent of the oil out of the cakes.

"Shoaling the Yangtze Gorges
"Tung oil itself helps to solve the difficulty of getting a liquid to market in a region where wheelbarrow vehicles are useless. The Chinese make a serviceable container out of a bamboo basket lined with a thin thickness of paper coated with tung oil varnish. This container is light but it will bear the weight of 100 to 200 pounds of goods. Coarser being the basket on poles and carry them down the river. IRISH HOPING FOR BETTER WEST PORT

Galway, One Time Important Emporium of Trade, May Be- come Great Shipping Point

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 19 (AP)—Irish hopes that the west coast of Ireland, which faces America, may become the eastern terminus of a much shortened ocean voyage between America and Europe, are revived with the announcement that a German shipping company's steamers from Halifax will soon begin calling at Galway, most important of Ireland's west coast ports.

"The period of Galway's prosperity came to an end with its plundering by the Parliamentary army about the middle of the 17th century. The population was scattered, the harbor became unusable, the mountains of the vicinity were turned into a barren, desolate, and numerous warehouses became empty. Some of the latter remain today, and reminders of the town's economic golden age. There are also evidences of more recent economic casualties; for County Galway has steadily decreased in population in recent years, and several mills which formerly produced goods for local consumption now stand unused.

"Galway is the gateway for summer tourists journeying to the picturesque peninsula of Connemara which lies to the southwest. This land of lakes, rocks and granite mountains is one of the most primitive parts of Ireland and one of the most beautiful. A sparse population lives on a poor pasture—'from little plots of soil among the rocks' and from sheep about a full day could be saved."

"Galway is now only a relatively small town differing little from other Irish communities of twelve or fifteen thousand inhabitants," says the bulletin. "Most of the ships it sees are British and French fishing trawlers—the same trawlers that have almost ruined the Galway fishermen—their little sailboats find the machine competition of the steamers too much for them. Time was, however, when Galway was an important emporium of trade. From the 13th to the 17th century the port had almost a monopoly of the Spanish trade and Spanish as well as French ships were continually in its harbor.

"So important was this commerce that a Spanish galleon grew up in the town and colored its life. Galway has often been referred to as 'Ireland's Spanish city.' Some houses still standing have patterns or open courts with gates to the street, a type of architecture distinctly non-Irish. The fishing section of Galway, the Claddagh, was once the stronghold of Spanish influence, and governed separately. It is still the most picturesque part of the town.

"Another town with Spain came when part of the great Armada was wrecked off the Galway shore in 1582. Many of the Spanish soldiers are said to have settled in Galway town. Relics of the Armada, cast upon the shore, are preserved in the museum of Queen's College in Galway.

COMPLETE CAST FOR UNIVERSITY PAGEANT

Arthur Peavey of Twin Falls to Represent Indian in Historical Spectacle.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, May 19.—Completion of the cast for the quarterly pageant of the Indians on the mountains, the Idaho historical drama pageant, was given June 4, was announced today by Professor John H. Cushman, director. The pageant is the feature attraction of commencement week, opening the program Saturday night.

The entire cast, with but few exceptions, has been selected from the student body. A number of Indians have been secured from the Nez Percé reservation and some graduates have been invited parts. With the cast complete, rehearsal will begin on top speed and each scene is gone over during a week drill.

Marie Grace of Payette, who was graduated last spring, has been selected to play the part of the Indian chief, Wagona. This is one of the Indian roles in the pageant. In the same line, Lewis and Clark expedition scene, John R. Taylor of Pocatello is character, Walking Thunder, the Indian medicine man in this scene. William Churney of Pocatello appears as the leader of Lewis, the explorer. Mr. Churney took part in the pageant when it was presented four years ago. Other important parts are played by Dwight Disney of Rupert, and Cainebeah, old Indian chief, taken by Raymond McMillan of Pocatello.

The "David Thompson" scene, which portrays the first trading post, which was the Kullypish house, on Lake Penn Orellie near the present town of Kullypish, one of the outstanding parts of the pageant. In this scene some of the major roles are those of David Thompson, the Canadian boatman, played by Bernstine Merrill of Spokane; Francis of Cocur d'Alene as du Nord; another French-Canadian, Arthur Peavey of Twin Falls; and the Rev. One of the principal parts of the pageant, that of the frontiersman, will be taken by H. Carter Davidson of Moscow, member of the English club. In this part Mr. Davidson will give the theme of each scene before it is enacted. The part of the Indian hero, which is in characterization of the "light upon the mountains," will be taken by Abe Goff of Moscow. Mr. Goff was graduated in 1923. He played this part in the first presentation of the pageant.

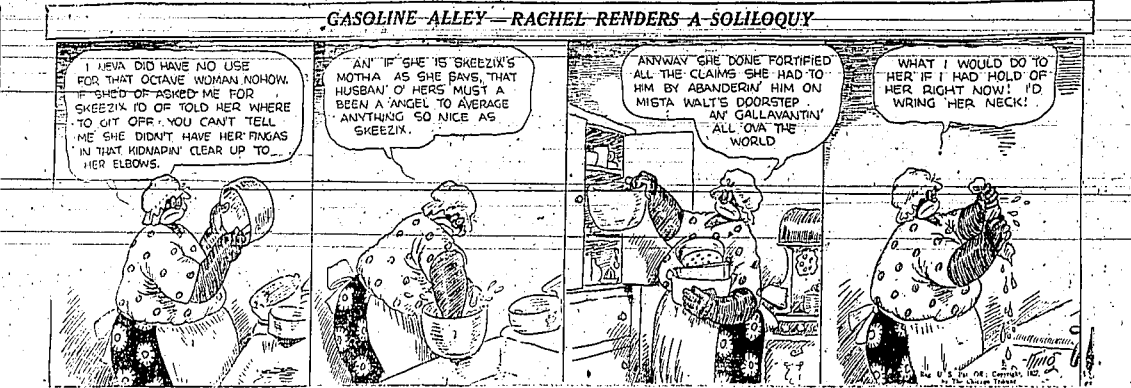

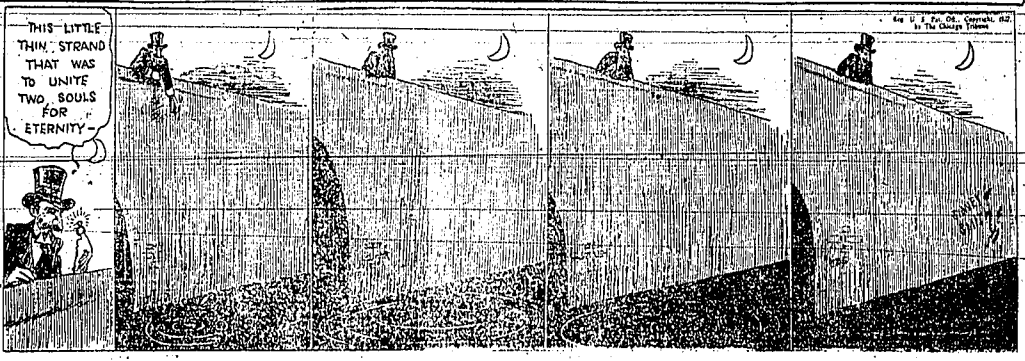

Greatest Drivers of American
Will Compete in Race Classic
on Memorial Day for Cham-
pionship and Huge Prize.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 19.—Gold
and glory, speed and thrills, crashes
and near spills and with them the ever
present expectation that those who fin-
ish with death may have to pay the pen-
alty—that is the annual 200-mile auto-
mobile race which will have its four-
teenth renewal at the Indianapolis
motor speedway on May 30.

The country's greatest drivers will
compete, as in years past, for \$100,000
prize money and for points given at
places winners in the contest for the
1927 driving championship of the
American Automobile association.

Among the masters of the wheel will
be Frank Leckhart, who rose from obs-
curity to win a year ago; Peter De-
Paolo, who holds the course record of
101.13 miles an hour for the Memorial
day grid; Leon Duray, Dave Lewis and
Harry Hartz.

The 91 1/2 cubic inch motors which
appeared a year ago will be back, and
except for possibly a few more cars
with driving power in front instead of

in the rear, there will be no innova-
tions. "Always" the assembly "cast-
ing" that some "built in the barn" cre-
ated by a dreamy youth of mechanical
genius may make his brief bid for the at-
tention of a speed-maniac.

Builders have concentrated on im-
provement of the auto motors, an ad-
ditional supercharger efficiency to en-
able more speed in coming out of the
curve, and in bettering the front drive
principle. The great speed made in
early season races has led some motor
experts to forecast a speed 20 miles an
hour faster than that of a year ago.
When rain stopped the race at 400
miles, and to predict that the DuPaolo
record is in big way fast.

The Indianapolis speedway, first in
the country, is 3 1/2 miles long and has
a half around. Only on Memorial day
is it used for racing.

As a speed laboratory, the oval is
called the "great temple" in the world.
Few improvements have been made
through the years, and where bricks
have settled the course remains rough,
demanding not only skill, but great
concentration to keep a car upright through-
out the long grind. Drivers attribute
many accidents late in the contest to
tired arms and distracted eyes.

Each year the crowd increases. Last
year it was 149,663. Motor cars from
many states line up outside the course
in advance of the contest, seeking fa-
vored positions from which to watch the
spectator. Last year the line began
forming five days before the race, and
by the night before the event the dou-
ble stream of motor, stretched for a
block.

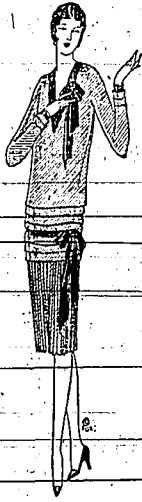
