DR. COPELAND ENTERS ON THIRD WEEK OF REVIVAL

Evangelical Outlines Successful Union Campaign; Announces Topics for Day.

FILED, May 21 (Special to The News)—Dr. Theodore Copeland of Dallas, Texas, entering on the third week of a successful union evangelistic campaign at Filer, will address a meeting of women and girls Sunday afternoon on the subject "Martha and Mary" and in the evening he will deliver a sermon lecture on "Repentance." The meetings, which are being conducted under auspices of the Methodist and Baptist churches with the "evangelistic" cooperation, are being held in the Methodist church.

He was for 27 years pastor at churches in New Orleans, Birmingham and other southern cities and has been engaged in evangelistic work for nearly eight years. He and "Milly" Sunday are the only evangelists included in "Who Who in America." Deceit of distribution of the estate was entered in probate court here about a year ago and was made subject to this litigation. Final accounting showed the estate worth \$3700. CEDAR-DRAW-DISTRICT TO DEVELOP OWN POWER

Thirty Farmers Contemplate Use of 300-Horsepower Output of Mutual Concern.

BUIH, May 21 (Special to The News)—Recent estimates supplied by the Cedar Draw Mutual Power company indicate that the power plant can be constructed to develop 300 horsepower at a cost of \$21 per horsepower, and 30 farmers of that neighborhood are contemplating taking 10 horsepower each and thus be supplied with heat, power and light.

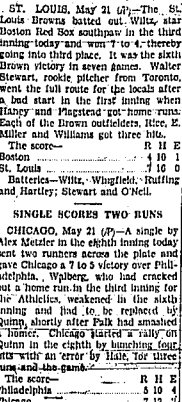
