ONE MILLION ACRES OF NEW TERRITORY IN PATH OF FLOOD

Last Dry Lands Between Levels of Mississippi River and Rolling Highlands West of Atchafalaya Vanishing Rapidly.

(By The Associated Press) NEW ORLEANS, May 24.—The last dry land between levels of the Mississippi and rolling highlands beyond the first banks of the Atchafalaya was vanishing tonight as water streamed through a hole in the dykes at McCrea, on the east bank of the Atchafalaya to form a solid sheet of water almost 60 miles wide.

Water from flood waters have vanishingly small "islands" of land. They will have cut a path 50 miles wide and 200 miles long from the Arkansas above to the Gulf.

New Land in Danger Five additional parishes with an area of 1,600,000 acres and the homes of 500,000 people will be in danger of invasion by the inland sea, when the river, low despite the protection barriers at Lake De Cade, breaks through the levee of Pointe Coupee parish.

Evacuation Stations The evacuation of five parishes added to the flood's conquest began several days ago when John M. Parker, flood relief director, warned residents at Pointe Coupee parish, in which the break occurred, that such was the volume of water in the creek leading to the levee line could not be held intact.

Current Battered Banks A new sand bag dyke had been built behind the crumbling old levee line. Throughout the night the current battered the banks with a force that would have washed away the stream bed. The water raced southward to stream through the Middle crevasse. Early today the water was indicated to flow the line might last. Fortunate assemblage on the levee. HANSEN WANTS TITLE TO SCHOOL GROUNDS

District Sues to Establish Claim to Property Obtained Nearly 20 Years Ago.

Hansen, independent school district judge, is suing in district court to establish his title to property in Hansen which it obtained nearly 20 years ago and on which a two-story six-room school building has been erected.

The deed to the property, according to the complaint, has been lost and was never recorded, so that the property now stands in the name of the Hansen Townsite company.

The Hansen Townsite company in 1910, forfeited its charter and four surviving directors are trustees. J. C. Moore of Twin Falls, the fifth director having died here some months ago. Surviving directors are trustees who with "all unknown claimants to the property" are named as defendants in this action. They are I. B. Perrin, Leonard Perrin and E. B. Williams of Twin Falls and H. L. Hollister of Chicago.

The complaint was verified by I. L. Walker, clerk of the Hansen board of education, and was filed in court here Tuesday by Charles A. North and Ray Aaga, attorneys.

DEATH CLAIMS PIONEER TWIN FALLS RESIDENT

Lysander S. Hasson Answers Final Summons—Member of I. O. O. F. and Transfer Man.

Stricken twice by apoplexy within a few days, Lysander S. Hasson, 67, pioneer resident of this city, died before medical aid could reach him at the family home, 722 Main avenue east, Tuesday morning. Mr. Hasson, a native of Iowa, came to Twin Falls 27 years ago and engaged in the house moving and transfer business, which occupation he followed until his death. He was a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge and was a well known and respected citizen.

Mr. Hasson is survived beside his widow by five children, one of whom, Louis, is living in Twin Falls. The body is being held at Grossman's funeral home, and arrangements are pending arrival of relatives.

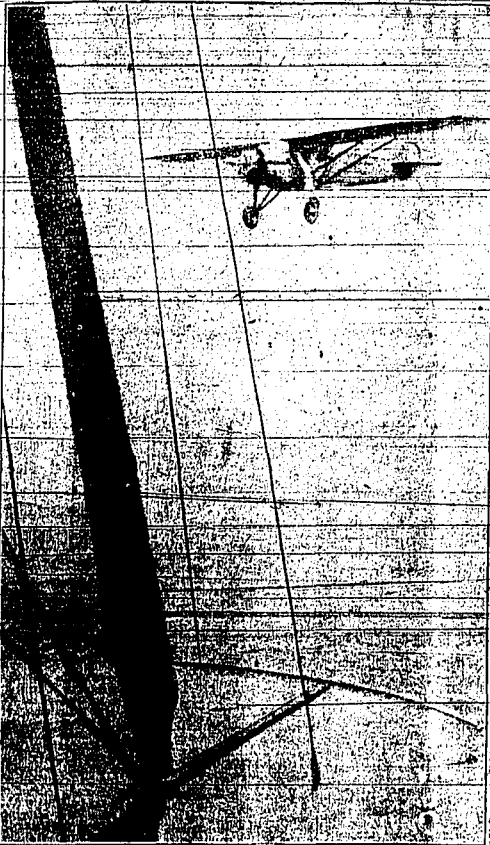
