STEPHAN TO EXPLAIN GASOLINE TAX LAWS

Attorney General Requested for Opinion on Petroleum Exemption Statute by Lukens

BOISE, May 26 (AP)—Attorney General Frank I. Stephens was asked today to interpret the gasoline tax exemption law in relation to exemptions for "non-highway" purposes. The request for an opinion came from Fred E. Lukens, secretary of state and commissioner of law enforcement, when the city of Boise filed a claim for refunds on city-owned gasolines.

Boise city claims a refund should be allowed on gasoline used by police cars, fire trucks and other city-owned vehicles in utility use in addition to use by law enforcement and fire departments. The public highway law, which provides a refund on gasoline used for public utility purposes, is interpreted to allow the claimant that every machine in city parks, playgrounds, streets and alleys of towns and cities should pay the tax.

He called on the group of judges who awarded him the Grand Prix d'Aviation, the highest honor in the war, he touched amid the great of the land, as the guest of M. Briand, the French foreign minister.

While in city hall, then came the procession and visit to the city hall of Paris and after that of the inter-city circle, where almost all the aristocracy of the French capital sat reverently over their tenebris in anticipation of his visit.

RUPERT MAN BITTEN BY SNAKE MAY DIE

Condition of Ed Johnson Serious, Say Physicians; Bitten by Rattler on Desert

RUPERT, May 26 (Special to The News)—Ed Johnson, 37, whose condition is serious, is being treated at the hospital here. Johnson, shepherd residing near here, is in serious condition in Rupert general hospital, from the bite of a rattler snake on the ankle of his right leg. Johnson, who was leading a band of sheep about 20 miles north of this city on the desert, was bitten by a snake when he found it and attempted to kill it. The rattler crawled into his leg and he was bitten on the ankle. Johnson immediately tied a handkerchief around his wrist and cut out the part of the hand bitten. He rode his horse toward town for 15 miles and was brought the remainder of the distance to this city in an automobile. His condition is regarded as serious by attending physicians.

OREGON JOURNAL BID FOR PAPER WAS HIGH

\$700,000 Offer for Portland Paper Revealed in Hearing Under Way at City on Coast

PORTLAND, May 26 (AP)—The Oregon Journal offered \$700,000 cash for the Portland Telegram in October last year because, "the Journal feared that William Randolph Hearst, New York publisher, was in the field trying to purchase the Telegram. Colonel R. W. Hagedorn, attorney for the Journal testified today. The statement was made in the hearing of the suit brought by Andrew M. Smith, trustee in bankruptcy for the Telegram Publishing company, to enjoin the Journal from publishing the same story. "Mutt and Jeff," "The Bear" and "The Football" are features.

"About October, 1925," testified Hagedorn, "the managers of the Oregon Journal were in frequent communication with representatives of Hearst were in Portland and they were negotiating for the purchase of the Telegram. The Journal's attorneys finally agreed to make an offer of \$700,000 for the Telegram, worth about \$200,000 to \$300,000, but we were willing to pay the difference—\$450,000—to keep Hearst out of the field."

It remained for 18-year-old German girl, Cillie Auser, however, to provide the touch of the French tennis rank to the top of the French tennis list, with Dida Vanzo. "The scores were 6-3, 1-6, 6-3 and established Fraulien Auser as a real contender for the title, along with her country woman, Freda Haggen, who was a favorite and Benarita du Alvarez of Spain and Ellen Bennett of England.

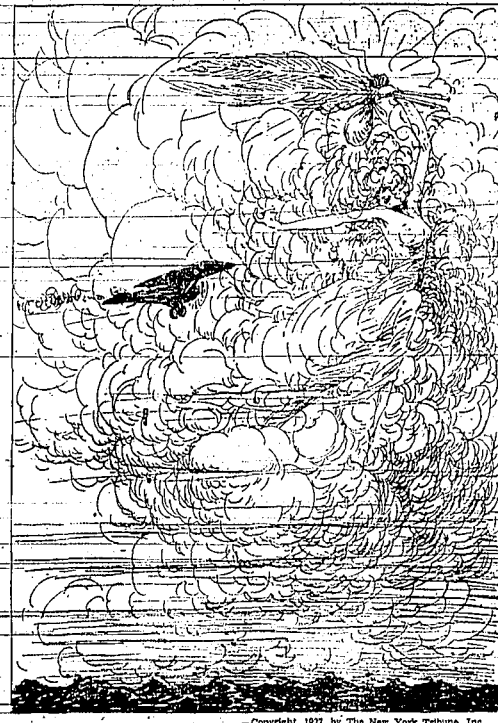

'LAME DUCKS' MISS MANY APPOINTMENTS

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—"Lame Ducks" of the last Congress have had to go limping.

President Coolidge has ignored almost completely the political tradition of Washington that party leaders in Congress who have been defeated should be cared for by the administration.

With the single exception of Ogden Mills, of New York, who was drafted by the treasury to serve as Under Secretary, none of the score or more of Senators and members of the House who retired from office last March-4 was given an appointment.

Mr. Coolidge had several opportunities. There was a vacancy on the important Interstate Commerce Commission which had to be filled. There were five members to be appointed.

Delegates had to be named to the Geneva Economic conference and similarly, other important posts were available.

There is no comment at the White House, but politicians elsewhere are getting more and more dubious as to any hopes for the "lame ducks." Secretary Kellogg is among the last of those who have been defeated for re-election to get an important post. Postmaster General Hew also went into the cabinet at the request of President Harding after he had been defeated for renomination in Indiana as a Senator.

Cool Weather Retards Development, Slightly but General Outlook Is Bright.

Warm weather during the first part of the week of May 24, with the latter part cool, resulted in retarding of orchard spraying and crop growth. However, water has been reported in heavy bloom, and orchard spraying being carried on. Peaches and apricots are reported water killed in some sections, with wheat and sugar beets in excellent condition. Beet thinning is going on, and potato planting is in full swing. Moisture is abundant, but warmer weather is essential to rapid crop development. Says the United States department of agriculture crop report.

The fairly copious rainfall which was well distributed, was reported as very beneficial, especially in the dry farming sections.
