

AVIATORS TO BRING AIRPLANE TO BUHL
Dale Adeck on Last Lap From San Francisco to Be Joined by Partner.


BUHL, May 28 (Special to The News)—Dale Adeck and Glenn Brown will fly into Buhl on Sunday afternoon in their new "Hoo-Jennings" 199 horsepower engine airplane, covering the last lap of the jump from San Francisco to Buhl. The weather is favorable for the flying. Adeck has been taking schooling in San Francisco in airplane piloting, is bringing the plane to Boise, Brown which will give the driver the equal city early Sunday morning to meet him and the two will fly into Buhl. Both Adeck and Brown in their commercial flying in this section.

Thrill for Patrons
It is the plan of Brown and Adeck to conduct passenger service transportation in the air and do all kinds of commercial flying. If their business develops to expectations they will purchase a parachute and give passengers the thrill of leaping from the plane into the air during the Twin Falls county fair at Buhl in September. Dale Adeck is a licensed pilot, having completed the work at the school at San Francisco. Lee Barker of the Chevrolet Motor Sales company is Buhl's first passenger mechanic to care for the flying machine. The airplane will carry three passengers in addition to the pilot and it has a cruising speed of 87 miles per hour, according to Glenn Brown, one of the owners. Mr. Brown is employed at the Idaho Service station No. 2 in Buhl.



CONSIDERATION HELD LACKING IN CASE OF PROPERTY TRANSFER

District Court Jury Finds Note Executed by Husband to Wife Is Valid; Opinion May Set Aside Title to Farm.

Decision returned Friday evening by the jury in district court in the case of Ellings-Oliver against Mrs. Jessie W. Oliver, his step-mother, resulted in a verdict for both plaintiff and defendant, with acknowledgment by the jury that a note for \$6000 was executed by Cloyd E. Oliver, deceased, to his wife for consideration, and that deeds executed immediately prior to the death of Oliver transferring his estate to his wife, were obtained by the defendant, as result of long and intimate relation with her husband.

Jury Finds Facts

Interrogatory No. 1: "What was the consideration for the deed given to the defendant by her husband, C. E. Oliver, which is in evidence herein as defendant's exhibit 11?"

Answer: Full amount of note.

Interrogatory No. 2: "Do you find that the deed to the defendant from her husband, Cloyd E. Oliver, which is in evidence in this case as the defendant's exhibit 11, was procured by her taking advantage of her close and intimate relation with her husband and without consideration?"

Answer: Yes.

Interrogatory No. 3: "What was the consideration for the deed executed to the defendant by her husband, Cloyd E. Oliver?"

Answer: None.

Interrogatory No. 4: "Did the defendant procure the execution and delivery to her by her husband, Cloyd E. Oliver, of the deed which is in evidence as defendant's exhibit 11, for the purpose or with the intention on her part of cheating or defrauding the plaintiff out of his share of his father's property?"

Answer: Yes. Signed by nine jurors.

Interrogatory No. 5: "Was the deed to the property in the controversy executed to the defendant at the procurement, or was it in the free and voluntary act of Cloyd E. Oliver, without her influence?"

Answer: No.

Attorneys' Statements

Attorney M. J. Beveler, of the defendant, when interviewed, stated he was very well pleased with the verdict.

in view of the fact that it found the note to be valid and good for full amount. The other questions are merely findings of fact by the jury, the plaintiff does not necessarily damage by its client.

Adorney W. G. Chapman, of Bellingwell & Chapman, counsel for the plaintiff, stated that the decision means the court will let the findings of the jury be accepted, set aside the deeds transferring the property, and the case will be remanded.

"Inasmuch as the jury found the deeds obtained as they were, the note is of no mechanical consequence," stated Mr. Chapman.

The suit, according to defendant's attorneys, was the outgrowth of Mrs. Oliver wanting money to use for property for the upbuilding and betterment of the farm, with resulting note for \$6000 being made at the suggestion of Mr. Oliver. A desire to set the property in his wife's name, rather than divide same between the two, was the reason for the transfer just prior to the death of Mr. Oliver.

COURT GIVES OPINION IN TWIN FALLS CASE

BOISE, May 28 (AP)—Evidence does not support the right of D. M. Denton to collect any sum from D. P. DeWilder in connection with the purchase of capital stock in the Times Printing and Publishing company, the district court today said in an opinion rendered today which reversed the \$2444 judgment, granted Denton in the Twin Falls county district court.

The action was brought to recover an alleged balance of \$2000 due on the purchase price of the capital stock, claimed by Denton in his suit against DeWilder. DeWilder had paid \$1000.

Defendants claimed the purchase price was \$10,000 and the opinion finds that the defendant's suit against Mr. A. Beech, Bain Cox, L. G. Bennett, George Munro, L. A. Chapin, Arthur Jarnan, E. J. Jenkin and G. D. Patlak.

The sale of stock involved in the suit is to D. M. Denton against D. P. DeWilder and others which has been reversed by the supreme court for a new trial in district court here, took place seven years ago. The Times Publishing company was an intervenor.

general economic plan of the soviet union. The statement added that the work of such organizations as the Russian British grain export company and similar undertakings will continue if no obstacles are placed in their way.

M. Khrushchik expressed regret at being compelled to discharge his large staff at such short notice.

The statement also promised that all contracts with British firms will be fulfilled to the letter in accordance with the terms of the contract, and that all money obligations of the Russian trading organizations would be fulfilled similarly as they fell due. For this latter purpose a sufficient amount will be left in London.

Volmer a divorce, until Volmer pays delinquent temporary alimony of \$120 a month created by the trial court. The supreme court order found Volmer was adjudged in contempt of the trial court for failure to comply with the court's order by keeping without the court's jurisdiction through residence in Washington or California.

way between St. Malpais and the Achafulaya rivers in the "sugar bowl" citizens of Ilerville and West Baton Rouge parishes were concentrating their forces upon the reconstruction of an old levee along Bayou Croise Terre.

Even as they worked backwaters were threatening this from the rear, moving slowly northward and eastward from the Achafulaya and the many bayous and lakes in the vicinity. Army officers believed that there was little hope that the section could be saved from inundation.

Hundreds of persons still were clinging to their homes in the slowly disappearing territory, leaving camp after the water flooded about their homes, refusing to leave by trucks only to be forced to use transportation by boats.

Many after remaining in their homes in the interim hope that they would be unharmed by the flood, led to leaves for safety. There without food or water, they awaited boats to transfer them to refuge concentration camps.

Along the west banks of the Achafulaya the flood was on the last stage of its journey into the Gulf of Mexico, into which the river passes, emerging again on the opposite side to pass into the Gulf of Mexico had swelled over

the lowlands of Iberia, Terrebonne and St. Mary parishes. Towns in the lower tier of Louisiana parishes either already had disappeared or rapidly were vanishing.

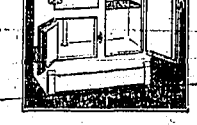

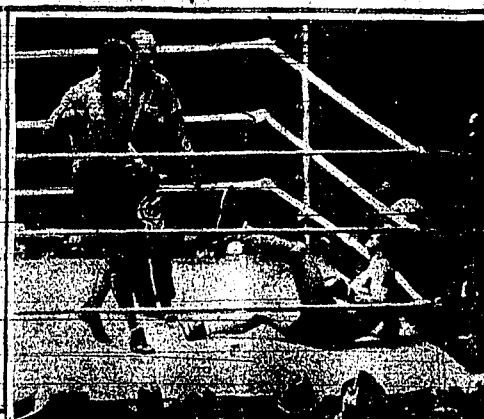

LAND OF EL DORADO WAS DIFFICULTIES

Mythical City of Gold Confronted With Monetary Problems; Taxation Changed...

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The land of El Dorado—mythical city of gold, is having financial difficulties. Great Britain, after sending a commission to investigate the riches of British Guiana, is planning to make changes in its constitution and to modernize its taxation system.

The country is the subject of the following bulletin from the Washington, D. C., headquarters of the National Geographic Society: "British Guiana, the only colony of Great Britain on the mainland of South America, has great potential riches," says the bulletin, "but has always lacked the labor to bring its hidden wealth into usable form. It is a tropical land with much rich soil and an abundant growth of tropical plants. The first step in developing such a region is to push back the jungle then a constant battle must be waged to keep it back. Where this has been done by the taming populations of certain tropical countries, such as Java and parts of the Straits Settlements, the region has become one of the world's garden spots. In British Guiana the jungle attacks that man has so far made in his war on an impenetrable vegetation have in most cases led to no-thing."

"Great rivers flow through the land, forming vast estuaries where they meet the sea. The earliest settlers, the Dutch, sailed up the wide streams and attempted to carve plantations from the forest on their banks. But this was the most difficult method of attack and, in addition, the soil in the areas selected was none too rich. Next the coast was wide and flat, with rich alluvial matter, without forest growth. Reclaiming overgrown lands was a problem better understood by Dutchmen, so they retreated before the trees and made a new start on the coastal beaches. Dikes and drainage ditches were constructed, with a system of sluice gates to let the water out at low tide. In this way much rich land was brought under cultivation. Some of it is as much as four feet below the level of the highest spring tides."

"When the British captured the country from the Dutch in 1763 they continued to develop the coastal lands and the slightly higher land immediately inland, leaving the forests practically untouched. That policy has been followed pretty closely since, so that even now the inhabitants and development of British Guiana are in large part confined to a strip of territory from 10 to 25 miles wide along the coast. "The curtailment of the slave trade in the nineteenth century, and the abolition of slavery in 1833 brought ruin to numerous plantations. Many plantations have been abandoned since that time. Efforts have been made to

solve the labor problem, but none has permitted the colony to move forward to the prosperity to which its natural resources are always entitled. The most successful plan was the introduction of indentured labor from India between 1845 and 1861. The East Indians now number more than 135,000 in a population of approximately 200,000, thus making up about 60 per cent of the inhabitants."

Rivers are Main Roads "The blacks slowly entered the East Indians in numbers. There are only about 25,000 Europeans; while Chinese, Portuguese and other bloods make up the remainder. The majority of all these elements live in the coastal belt, except the Portuguese who live in scattered villages along the upper reaches of the rivers in the forests. "British Guiana is a land of many rivers. Three very large ones flow northward to the coast roughly parallel: the Essequibo, Demerara, and Berbice. These are the main roads into the interior, especially the Essequibo and Essequibo. AMERICAN METHODS AND DOLLARS IN ITALY AID EUROPEAN PEACE

By PERCY WINNER (Associated Press Correspondent) "ROME, May 28 (UP)—The industrial and financial situation in Italy is performing a work 'sacred for European peace' by aiding 'Pakistan may Italy self-interest' in the opinion of Alfredo Rocco, minister of justice in Mussolini's cabinet. "Lately, through American assistance, Rocco declares, it will be possible eventually to accommodate 20,000,000 Italian inhabitants within Italy's present boundaries in continental Europe, thereby alleviating the gravity of one of the nation's most acute problems which the issue summed up recently in the sentence: 'Italy must expand or suffocate.' "The American dollars which are now pouring into our country in the form of long-term loans to 'industrialize' the nation, have been particularly important in the cause of peace since they relieve us from the pressure of overpopulation in the capital and other beginning seriously to accomplish utilization of our scanty natural resources. "At the same time American industry is giving us lessons in the application of scientific methods to production problems. This in a country like ours, is a question of life or death. Naturally we have to work harder than other nations to achieve normal progress, and we hope we can do so peacefully. "A similar view of aid from the United States has been expressed by Minister of National Economy DeBosis, in whose opinion Italian industrial organization must be based entirely upon American methods. "In reducing costs to undersell foreign competitors in the world market, American loans to hydraulic companies in Italy, it is pointed out, have already reduced the cost of power to the lowest level in the world and are quickly reducing the need for coal importation. "The use of American capital and labor are henceforth to be under the direct tutelage of the state, but the final form of the Charter is a question of the future. The original specifically forbade strikes, lockouts, boycotts, obstruction and sabotage, but the final form did so only by implication. Aviation is Educating General Public in Significance of the 'Great Circle Line', a Patent Fact to Mariners of All Time.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 28.—Why does he go so far out of his way?

This was the exclamation of a speculator when newspaper headlines disclosed a dispatch that Lindbergh, trans-Atlantic flier, had passed over Newfoundland.

The answer, of course, is that Lindbergh was not going out of his way; he was making a "bee-line" for Paris; that is a bulletin from the Washington D. C. headquarters of the National Geographic society.

Even a examination of a globe would show this fact, but humans are more accustomed to looking at maps, with their inevitable distortions, and it is necessary to state the fact to be projected upon a flat surface.

"To non-sailing folk it is rather a surprise to note that the shortest course from New York to London lies across New England and Canada, west of Nova Scotia, and through Ingham, and across the North Atlantic, but they do not know that the shortest route is a circle which would divide the earth in two equal parts and pass through the points in question.

Roger W. Babson Recommends Local Stocks and Mortgage Investments

Famous Statistolan Gives Advice to Investors on Financial Affairs; Recalls Failures of Huge Cooperations.

"DABSON 'PARIS,' Mass., May 28.—(Special to The News.)—Roger W. Babson has been selected as one of the speakers to what he has called "investor's conferences" in a recent interview. Mr. Babson has been replying to these inquiries by stating that in most cases he would recommend the preferred stock of the local electric light and power company, and next to this would come municipal bonds.

Loan Yarns Bonds In view of the recent failure of the Adair company in Atlanta, I wish to first make clear the difference between securities of a local building and loan association and those of a mortgage bond company. Building and loan associations in most states are mutual companies operated not for profit, but for the benefit of the respective communities. As these associations make no money in connection with construction work, architects, fees, etc., they are not tempted to take unwise risks.

Mortgage bond companies, on the contrary, are most always operated for profit and the promoters of such companies often receive their profits from the construction of buildings or from the sale of the securities. Thus the temptation is constantly present to invest money in building large buildings and taking large loans, rather than bothering with small buildings and loans, mortgage bond issues are directly or indirectly secured by notes, and statistics show that the country is today building more large buildings and taking more large loans than it is building small buildings and taking small loans.

Principles of Operation The basic reason for the success of building and loan associations is that usually their management is directly and personally high and their operating expense abnormally low. Usually these associations are run on a "cash and carry" basis, and the directors and officers serve without pay. These men serve as a civic duty, and receive their salaries from other work. Thus these associations have the benefit of expert and impartial management with a minimum of expense. Each association has three or four classes of stock based on the different methods of payment. Full paid stock is sold at par, or at a small premium, the same as stock in any other company; while the other classes are sold on monthly payments of from 50c to \$5 or more a month, varying with different associations in different cities. Anybody can buy without being a borrower; but no one can borrow without being a stockholder. This makes borrowers and stockholders mutually interested in one another, which is a form of constant security.

shares are exempt from federal income taxes 10% of annual earnings of \$200 to each individual, and one's money may be withdrawn at any time.

"Although Building and Loan Associations are not banks, yet in many ways they resemble the mutual savings bank and cooperative banks which have been so very successful in New England and other sections of the country. These associations are not competitors of banks, but rather co-operate with them, helping to create within the communities the habit of saving. In many parts of the building and loan associations are under the supervision of the state bank examiners. This examination by the State authorities is a distinct safeguard to investors. There are also State associations of these building and loan associations as well as a national association. This national association is very jealous of the reputation of all the associations and carefully watches their operation and personnel. Investors little realize the magnitude to which this industry has grown. Today there are about 13,000 of these associations with a total capital of over a billion dollars. I believe the shares of these associations in your local community, bought either outright or on the installment basis, are exceptionally good investments in most cases, especially if you know the directors to be men of high integrity in the older communities these shares pay from 1-1/2 to 7 per cent, while in some other sections they pay up to 8 per cent. Every investor should do well to have some of the full paid shares in his strong box. Every-

one who buys anything from an automobile to a radio, on the installment plan should also buy some Building and Loan stock on the same plan.
