**CHARLES LINDBERGH**  
**ARRANGES FOR EARLY RETURN TO AMERICA**

Youthful Flier's Word of Entertainment in London Comes to Close Soon; May Come Home on Ship 'George Washington.'

(By The Associated Press)  
**LONDON, May 30.** Captain Charles Lindbergh's desire to return home at the earliest possible moment has brought into consideration his sailing on the "George Washington" June 2, though final arrangements are still held in abeyance. It is said that the "Philadelphia" is not to be operated in his plans may reach a definite conclusion tomorrow.

The youthful American hero comes to entertainment in London which will end Wednesday, with a banquet by combined American organizations, and it is reported that he may begin packing his baggage immediately, so that it can be taken along with him on the "George Washington" which is said to be decided to return on that boat.

Rounding out one of the busiest days of his career since he flew into "world fame," Lindbergh will start a banquet here tonight, with a friendly hint of his plate was a pile of five luscious ham sandwiches, with a jug of water, and a gentle reminder of his transatlantic menu in the good ship, "Spirit of St. Louis."

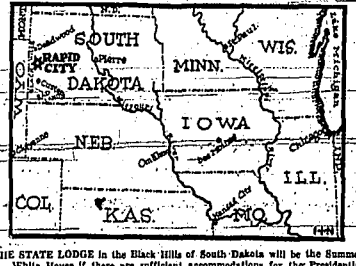

## OUTLAWRY OF WARS OBJECT OF TREATY

### Columbia University Professor Proposes Compact to Eliminate Possibility of Contention.

**NEW YORK, May 30 (AP)—**Foreign Minister Briand's message to the American people last month, that France would willingly subscribe publicly with the United States to the outlawry of war as between them, is the basis of a treaty to bring this hope into realization proposed by Professor James T. Shotwell, of Columbia university, in an address today.

The draft is of a model treaty or "American Locarno" outlawing war as between the United States and the nations of the world and providing for arbitration and conciliation of disputes.

**Second Treaty Offer**  
It is the second treaty that has been offered to respond in practical terms to Briand's message. Ward of the Associated Press on April 6. The other was made public Sunday by the American foundation and proposed an agreement that would bind the signatories to accept some sort of conciliation or arbitration in every dispute.

**Draft Is Presented**  
The draft of the Shotwell treaty was presented before a distinguished gathering assembled to honor the war dead at the Lincoln memorial to those who have died for their country. President Nicholas W. Winter, of Columbia university, in an address, declared that the treaty if supported by public opinion and incorporated into formal treaties, will mark a long and satisfactory step forward in getting rid of the threat and appalling destruction of international war.

**Ward's Message**  
The treaty was drawn originally in an effort to state just what was the French suggestion which was developed into a draft framed by Shotwell. The treaty is applicable to any other signatory of the Locarno and to other non-American powers, including Japan.

**United States Senator From California Delivers Memorial Address Aboard "Tennessee."**

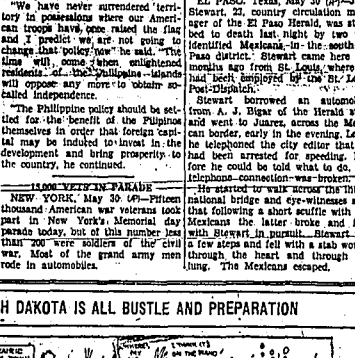
**SAN FRANCISCO, May 30 (AP)—**Standing before the big guns of the deck of the U. S. S. Tennessee, United States Senator Shortridge, in Memorial day service at sea in honor of sailors and soldiers dead, predicted that the desire for independence by some residents of the Philippine Islands will wear away with the years.

Pointing out that "the sun never shines in the shadow of our flag," he said that the United States had rightfully acquired sovereignty over the Philippines and he should tell the Filipinos not without recognition that we intend to exercise that sovereignty for the benefit of the island residents.

**Speaker Warns Prediction**  
"We have never surrendered territory to a power where our American troops have once raised the flag and I predict we are not going to do so again," he said. "The times will come when enlightened residents of the Philippine Islands will oppose any more to obtain so-called independence."

The Philippine policy should be settled for the benefit of the Filipinos themselves in order that foreign capital may be induced to invest in the development and bring prosperity to the country, he continued.

**SPEEDWAY, Indianapolis, Ind., May 30 (AP)—**George Souders of Lafayette, Indiana, driving his first major race, won the Indianapolis motor speedway today.

TELL IDAHO'S STORY  
IN MUSIC AND DRAMA

University Students Enlist Indians in Presentation of "Light on the Mountains."

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, May 30—History of Idaho and the Northwest in music and drama will be presented by the Associated Students of the University of Idaho at 8:30 p.m. Saturday night, June 4, at a grand outdoor rehearsal of the entire cast will be staged about the middle of the week for final preparation before the pageant is presented to the public. Reserved seats are now on sale on the campus, where all tickets will be sold.

Talbot Jennings' version of pioneer history of the state in the production is considered by many to be unique in its presentation. Revision of the original script by Mr. Jennings for this spring's presentation gives a more unified and dramatic treatment of the subject.

In 1923, students of the university made up the cast, with persons taking Indian parts wearing original costumes from the Nez Perce Indian reservation at Lapwai.

The overture "The Light on the Mountains," written by David Nyvall, Jr., professor of piano, who wrote all of the music for the pageant, will open the production with the university pep band will play the overture and other selections. Following the overture will come the "Prelude to the Romance Lies in Her Name," by H. Carleton Davidson, member of the public school faculty. In the program Mr. Davidson will play the theme of the pageant.

Scene 1 portrays the Nez Perce Indians on the prairie, where they have uncontrolled control of the wide prairie. During this scene the women, the bird women, is shown by hostile Indians and carried away. She appears again in scene 2 when she leads the Lewis and Clark expedition to the "Light on the Mountains" in 1805.

In scene 3 the audience is carried further north. The scene is set in the Oregon Territory, where David Thompson, noted Columbia basin country explorer and geographer, established the trading post, called Kullyspell house, in 1809. Here is pictured the loneliness and mystic spell cast by this lake country. The Oregon Trail, 1825, with the thousands of emigrants making their way to the west, is portrayed in the fourth scene. A camp is shown where the travelers camped for the night and singing. Then comes an attack by Indians.

Discovery of gold in the Boise basin in 1825 comes in for its part in the fifth scene. A mining mining company is mentioned in the pageant. One of the most popular features four years ago was the cowboy dance. This has been retained in this year's pageant, coming at the sixth scene.

The epic of the Nez Perce in 1877 brings the pageant to a climax. This is divided into two parts. The first part portrays the defiance of the Indians to the white man. The second part produced the last stand of the Indians in the Nez Perce war when General Howard forced the surrender of Chief Joseph.

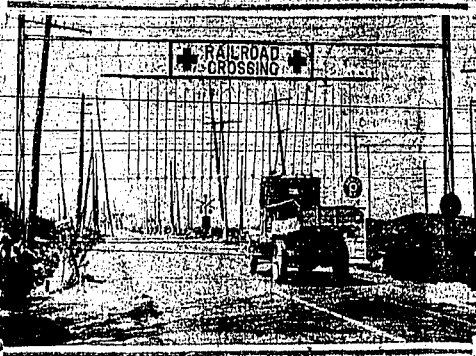
