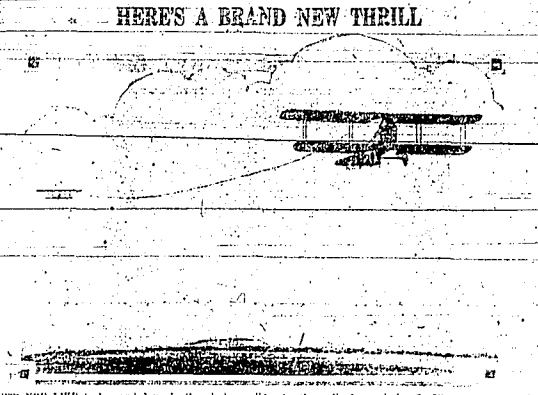

STEAM SHOVELS TEAR THROUGH MOUNTAIN PASSES OF COLORADO

Transportation-Other Than by Train Impossible on 16 Roads Across Continental Divide During Past Six Months

DENVER, Colo., June 1 (AP)—For more than six months King Vidor has held an impassable barrier over the Rocky Mountains. His steam shovel, snow and sleet, have laid the rugged peaks and mountain passes with fury and man has stood defeated.

Transportation, other than by rail road, has been impossible, for 16 roads that cross the Continental Divide at an average elevation of 10,000 feet above sea level have been under snow blockade five to 50 feet in depth. With the advent of spring, man again has an upper hand, and within the next month the mountain passes of Colorado will be opened to traffic, and these roads will be transformed into smooth, dry highways.

Independence pass, with an elevation of 12,000 feet above the level of the sea, is the highest transportation route across the Continental Divide. Cameron pass, in the northern part of the state, through Poudre canyon is a direct route between Omaha and Salt Lake City. Tennessee pass perhaps is the best known for cross-state travel and herdhood, being on a transcontinental highway, receives heavy summer travel.

Perhaps the most popular trip in the state, and the one best known to eastern visitors, is the Pull River road and pass. It presents one of the most difficult problems of road maintenance in the country. Work of clearing it began May 1, at a point 12 miles out of Dosa Park, where a stretch of more than ten miles has been blocked since the first of December with snow drifts, in some instances, 50 feet deep.

When it is cleared Fall River highway becomes the connecting link between the Rocky Mountain National Park and Grand Lake, one of the finest resorts in the state. Persons traveling over this route through the famous "snow tunnel," where for more than two miles banks of projecting snow are perpetual. The road clearing this year was undertaken by means of a giant steam shovel. Prospectively about 50,000 tons have been stretched over the passes in the late fall.

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# GOVERNMENT MAKES FIGHT FOR WATERS RETURNING TO RIVER

### Argue for Inclusion of Secretary of Interior as Party at Interest in Twin Falls Canal Suit.

Secretary of the Interior Hubert Work, according to government attorneys, is a necessary party defendant in an action instituted by Twin Falls Canal company against George H. Carter, Idaho commission-er of reclamation, and G. Charles Gilman, deputy commissioner of reclamation and district watermaster. Argument on a motion to bring the secretary into the suit was presented in district court here Wednesday before Judge W. A. Imbeck, who took decision under advisement.

The action, according to Judge J. R. Bostwick, attorney for the canal company, was brought for the purpose of obtaining a court order requiring the reclamation commissioner and watermaster to determine the status of the Twin Falls company as a party to its natural flow water right between 200 and 600 second feet return flow water entering Snake river between American Falls and Milner dam. The canal company contends the other it seeks is justified by terms of the Foster decree of 1913 by which Snake river water rights were adjudicated.

Attorneys for the government argue that the reclamation service of which the secretary of the interior is the head has had the use of this water for more than 15 years under terms of the Foster decree and of a temporary injunction that antedated the decree. They argued that court order affecting this suit will disturb the status of other claimants, and that it is necessary to bring all of the claimants before the court for a final determination of the status of the water rights involved. Unless other claimants are permitted to enter this action, the government attorneys pointed out they will be at liberty to bring similar actions in other courts and a multiplicity of suits with consequent confusion may result.

Under interpretation heretofore placed on the Foster decree, the government attorneys asserted, natural flow of the river between American Falls and Milner has been construed to be the flow as it would have been if the Minidoka project had not been built. They referred to affidavits of O. Clyde Baldwin and of E. B. Darlington of Bunley, Minidoka project manager, to the effect that without return flow of water from the Minidoka project, the natural flow of the river at Milner would be less than at American Falls. Judge Imbeck only once offered comment on the arguments. The question, he said, seems to be one of administration of the decree, rather than of interpretation of any uncertainty or ambiguity in its terms.

Argument for bringing the secretary of the interior into the case were presented by H. R. Ray of Boise, United States district attorney; B. S. Ginter, mayor of Boise, United States reclamation service attorney, and S. T. Love of Turley.
