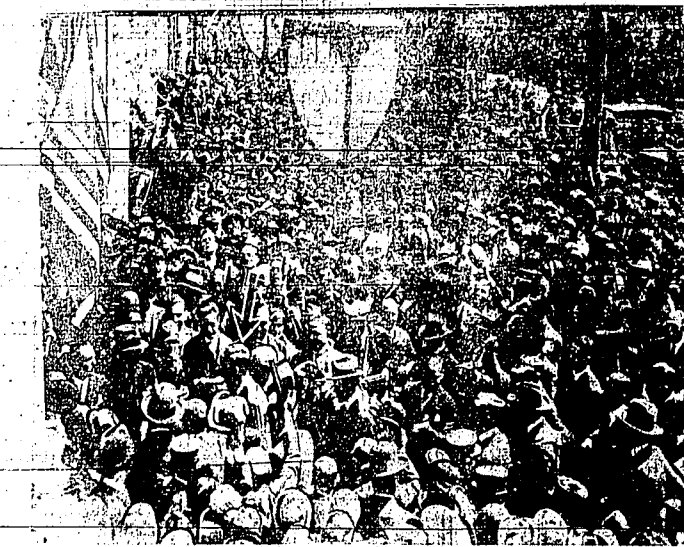

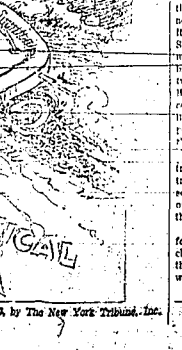

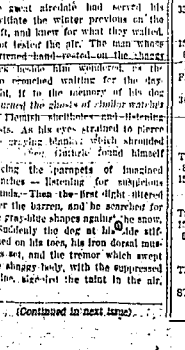

COOLIDGE CAMP SITE IS NEAR DESERTED MINES

Almost Score of Abandoned Old Claims Lie in Black Hills Within 20 Miles of Lodge.

CUSTER, S. Dak., June 3 (AP)—A score of abandoned gold mines lie in the Black hills of South Dakota within a 20-mile radius of the game lodge where Coolidge will vacation this summer.

The rolling numbers of forsaken shafts, the little piles of earth and prospectors' caves now overgrown with brush and weeds mark the grave of many a prospector's hope and lead to expectation of a bonanza.

The remarkable success of the recent mine, stimulated by the results, paradoxically, for the multitude of abandoned mines. The Homestake made his money from the mine, and for 20 years it has produced \$2,000,000 more in gold each year.

Its success made promotion of other mines easy, and most of these ventures failed long since, while the Homestake continues to produce \$1,500,000 in gold from each ton of low-grade ore it treats, and to yield \$1 of that in dividends to stockholders.

A little way north of the summer white house is the old trundle mine into which \$500,000 was expended without profit.

The Spokane mine, the Elmo mine, the Revolution mine and the Homestake mine are traditional in Idaho history, but few survive as money-makers.

It is also the only mine in the hills which uses the cyanide process of treating ore in addition to the traditional process, this obtaining more than 10 per cent of gold content when the cyanide treatment will not extract

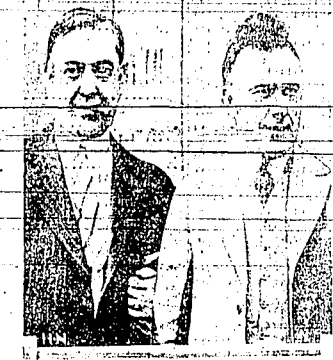

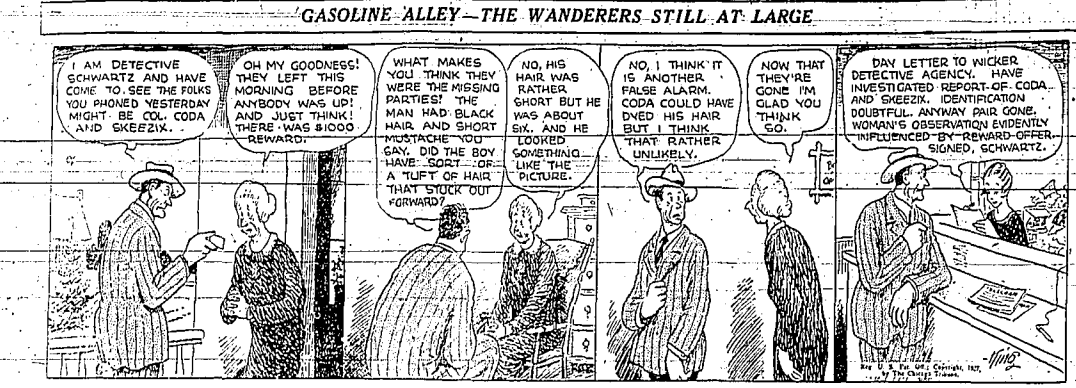

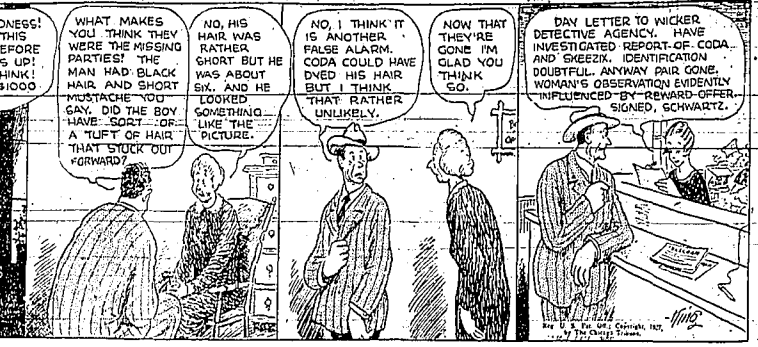
