THIRD TRIAL BRINGS RELEASE FOR THREE BURGLARY SUSPECTS

Portland Men Accused in Connection With Alleged Theft Acquitted After Long Fight in District Court.

Robert Annly, Charles Gorman and William A. Lefeur, accused of burglary and larceny to the third time during the present court term in district court here, were released from custody Sunday morning when a jury rendered verdicts which acquitted the accused men on all counts. The jury received the cases at 6:30 p. m. Saturday. Jurors in the two preceding trials failed to agree on verdicts. The men were accused in connection with alleged theft of two automobile tires from the G. W. Tarr automobile wrecking house here last April 22. One of the tires alleged to have been stolen was found on Annly's car in which the three men came here April 19 from Portland by automobile. What officers believe is the other stolen tire was found in a roadside ditch northeast of town shortly before the third trial opened.

Both of these tires were turned over to Mr. Tarr by R. E. Lefeur, Twin Falls police chief, whom officers had been derided Monday by Sheriff M. E. Finch.

Feel Grievous

Lefeur, speaking to the three accused men, said last evening that they felt that they were being treated as if they were guilty. He said that he had grounds for feeling that way because he was a witness for the prosecution who had had committed perjury. In view of the fact, however, that action in either direction would involve expense to taxpayers, Lefeur said he had agreed not to press their claim for return of the tire or seek to institute prosecution of the witness named. Lefeur said that the tire would have been returned to Portland as they had received possession of Annly's car. The car, Lefeur said, is being held up here at the instance of police until a payment of \$100 is made while the men were in jail here it made.

Elements in Case

The history of the case that the accused men hinged on identification of the tire that was taken off of Annly's car a tourist car here on the morning following the burglary, and also on connection of marks on the door at the Tarr establishment with a screwdriver that officers picked up at the tourist park cabin occupied by the accused men.
