ANOTHER WISCONSIN MAN PRAISES IDAHO DAIRY POSSIBILITIES

Dr. James Healy, Federal Inspector in Charge of Tuberculosis Eradication Work, Sees Great Opportunity Here.

Opportunities for successful dairying in the Twin Falls country again claimed the outspoken admission of a Wisconsin man when Dr. James Healy of Madison, Wisconsin, in charge of tuberculosis eradication work in this state, visited this region in company with Dr. W. A. Sullivan of Boise, inspector in charge of United States Bureau of Dairy Industry activities in Idaho.

Idaho's possibilities for development of the dairy industry were again inspected a number of the dairy farms of this district; compare favorably and in many respects with those of Wisconsin. Dairymen of the Twin Falls country who in recent months have furnished many gallons of milk to California buyers, especially consider advantage of bringing in young, purebred stock to maintain and build up the herds of this district. Dr. Healy advised.

Idaho—In Lead
Dr. Healy visited Idaho on a tour of investigation of tuberculosis eradication work in the northwestern states and left last evening for Salt Lake.

With 14 counties on the accredited list of being free from tuberculosis in cattle, Idaho ranks first among the northwestern states, and excels the record of Wisconsin which has 12 accredited counties. Idaho's dairy industry is one of the best in the northwest, and within the next few months, entry will be rated to 22, constituting one-half of all the herds of this state. The state agricultural department and bureau of animal industry is cooperating with the federal veterinarian in this work.

METAL MARKERS FOR TRAFFIC LANES USED

New Divosa Will Replace Paint Lines Effortless Saving; Present Clearer Line to Motorist.

Under the direction of H. S. Rayburn, water and streets engineer, a crew of men were engaged Thursday placing metal markers on the intersection of Main avenue and Shoshone street to replace the painted traffic lines. The new marking is drawn into the pavement, and the curb 30 feet on each side of the street. "While the initial cost of the new marking is slightly more expensive than the painted lines, it will last for a long time. It is planned to place about 100 of the markers on main streets, later using them to mark definite limits of parking spaces."

CALIFORNIA FIRM SUE BY MRS. KEITH PETERS

Mrs. Keith S. Peters, widow of K. S. Peters, is suing the California Building and Loan Association of Los Angeles for \$100,000 in connection with the death of her husband. Mrs. Peters charges, died in the course of his duties in the Mohave desert last June from the effects of heat. According to a clipping from a Long Beach paper received here by H. C. Gentry, Mrs. Peters charges the company was not successful in that it failed to provide insurance for her husband under the provisions of the California state compensation insurance act.

SUES BANK FOR ACCOUNTING

Suit against the Twin Falls National bank was instituted in district court here Thursday by William Cleveland, who asks for an accounting in connection with an alleged "arbitrary" action which the bank undertook to finance his farming and dairy operations. He claims the bank failed to do so. The suit was filed by Turner H. Jackson, man attorney.

SYNDICATE TO REIMBURSE PEOPLE'S POWER COMPANY

Collapse of Clear Lakes De-
velopment Plan to Cost Stock-
holders Nothing.

Collapse of the Clear Lakes syndicate project for power development at Clear Lakes on Snake river north of Dubui will entitle no loss to the People's Mutual Power company. It was announced last evening by T. S. Nicholson, F. J. secretary and treasurer of the company. All money paid to the syndicate by the People's company, which proposed to take over Clear Lakes power plant on completion, will be returned. Mr. Nicholson said.

In explanation of apparent discrepancy between estimates furnished last week by Harry Dibble, engineer, and a member of the syndicate, and the total cost of construction of Clear Lakes diversion works as shown by affidavit on proof of completion of these works last June 1, Mr. Nicholson pointed out that the syndicate estimate included \$43,000 that had been expended in the work prior to the time the syndicate began work. Mr. Dibble's estimate of approximately \$200,000 actually was made higher and wider, with a greater amount of concrete construction than had been contemplated by Mr. Dibble's estimate. It was pointed out these changes. It was stated, were made in view of unanticipated contingencies in construction of the power plant. Directors of the People's company met here last evening with Mr. Dibble and Thomas W. Halliday of Rupert, members of the syndicate, to work out a settlement of affairs between the two concerns.

LONDON, June 9 (AP)—The old George Tavern is about the only hotel left in London where a guest is shown to his bedroom by the light of a candle.

The ancient tavern contains many relics of Charles Dickens, and pictures and photographs of London as it appeared in his day.

The inn is reached by turning up a narrow lane out of Borough High street, near London bridge.

All bedrooms are furnished with huge old fashioned fourposter bedsteads. It is the only remaining hotelery in England's capital with an open wooden balcony running along outside the bedroom windows.

Behind the dining-bar are laden with old period quart pots and the old coaching days when thrills were big and capricious unlined. Hung upon the walls are cumbersome pictures which were carried by the old night watchmen.

Radio Telephone Improved LONDON, June 9 (AP)—Considerable improvement in the trans-Atlantic wireless telephone service is promised by the construction of a new radio station now being built in Edinburgh, Scotland.

Measurements and tests carried out in 1925 indicated that the north of the British Isles was the ideal situation for transmission and reception of telephonic conversation with the United States, and the Cupar station is nearing completion. This station will supersede the present station at Wrentham, Wiltshire, which is about 80 miles from London.

British radio experts consider that, although the present wireless telephone service in America is not secure in the full sense of the word, it is proving of such value that its introduction was fully justified. Complete security, however, is considered desirable, and with the opening of the Cupar station, experiments to this end are to be carried out by the British post office engineering staff.

King Resumes Park Rides

LONDON, June 9 (AP)—King George has resumed his early morning summer-horseback rides in Rotten Row much to the satisfaction of numerous tourists but there has been no tendency on the part of society leaders to turn out for centers before breakfast as was the custom thirty odd years ago.

The king rides between 7 and 8 o'clock, this being the only opportunity he has for regular outdoor exercise when the court is at Buckingham palace.

In older days when royalty rode regularly in Hyde Park, a great many of the most prominent men and women of the land were sure to turn out, even before breakfast. If it were known that King Edward would appear on his favorite steed, but early rising is not as popular as formerly and the morning after in these days of night clubs and cabarets the king has Rotten Row almost to himself for his early morning canter.

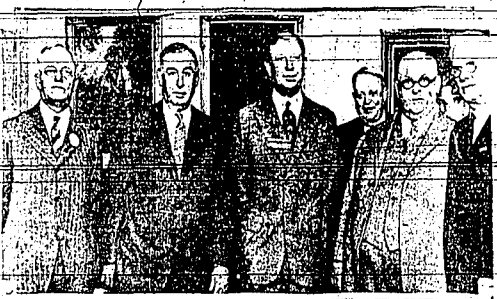
London Bobbies Wear Helmets

native of Scotland, E. M. Byrnes. He knew flowers. After 29 years at propagating plants he was chosen assistant in charge of cultivation.

There was a son for whom he had the usual ambitions—not excluding the presidency. But J. Ware Byrnes liked flowers too. He labored and studied with his father.

Then, in 1900, a daring project evolved. With anaryllis bulbs imported from England the Scotch gardener started his scheme to change the red petals to white. Skillfully he cross-pollinated the lighter shades; and, in 1926, with fingers smearing the spectrum of color from deep red to salmon and pink, he saw the approach of green. Again he tried and in 1922 there burst forth the first white anaryllis human eye ever had seen.

Only one thing was lacking—fragrance. With need and tollborn hands the pioneer made a last valiant effort.

When death came on January 22, 1922, his work was unfinished. To his son for 16 years his associate, came a twofold heritage, the position of assistant and the task of completing their project.

Interpersed with other experiments, with national flower shows and their attendant preparations—the younger man followed the elder's desire. He cross-pollinated the white anaryllis with the "lansene" calathids "bucklet hills". The result is problematical. No blooms have appeared. But Byrnes has a plant neither anaryllis nor lily.

It may be the dream flower!

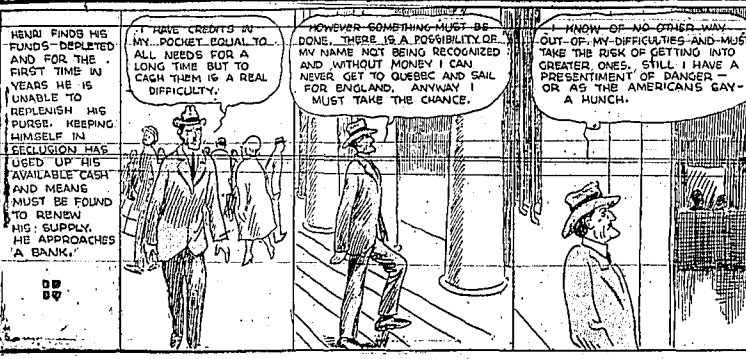

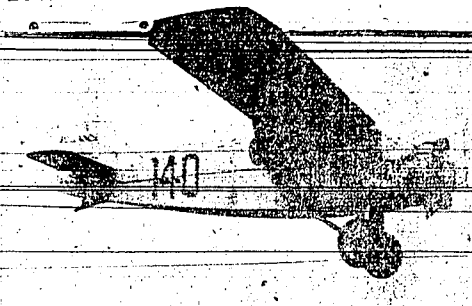
