Clear Skies During Night Make Shadow of Earth Visible on Orb Shortly Before Midnight. The lunar eclipse, discernible from all points in Southern Idaho and the Intermountain country under clear skies, was first visible to the naked eye in Twin Falls last night at 11:40 p. m. standard mountain time.

SALT LAKE CITY, June 14 (AP)—Clear skies after today's rain made the eclipse of the moon tonight perfect in Utah from all parts of this city. The shadow—darkening—appeared in the moon's disk at 11:43 p. m. and by 12:30 the face of the orb was fully obscured.

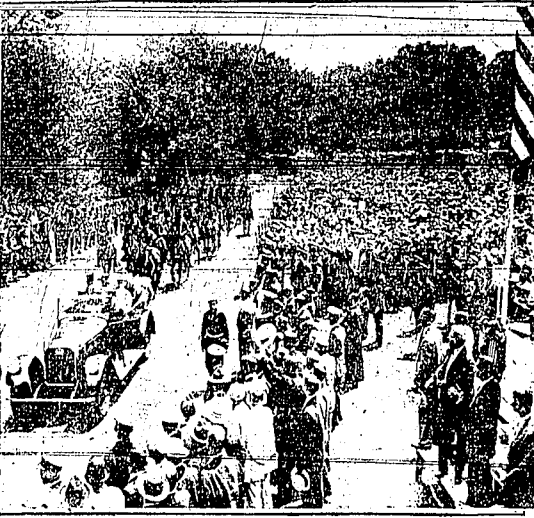

DEMPSEY AND SHARKEY TO TANGLE NEXT MONTH

Two Leading Contenders in Heavyweight Field Will Fight for Chance at Tunney.

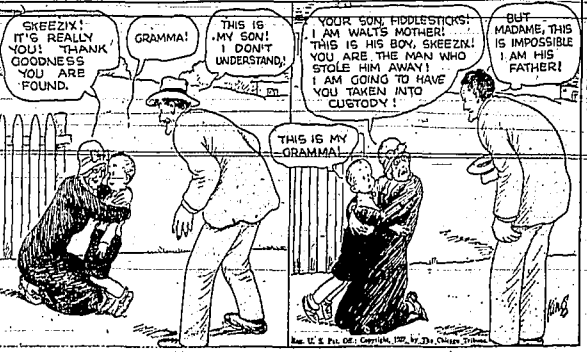
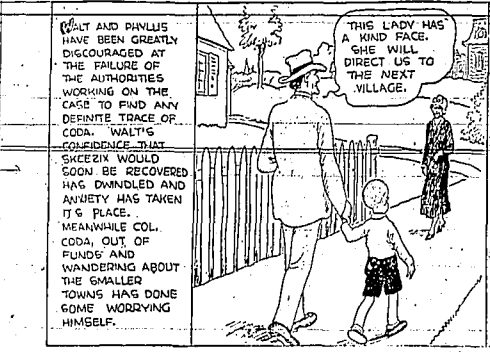
