# MYSTERY SURROUNDS IDENTITY OF BODY FOUND IN STREAM

**Investigation Indicates Possibility of Heart Stroke or Focal Play Causing Death of Unknown Man.**

Mystery surrounds the identity of a body of a man about 40 years of age found early Wednesday afternoon lodged on a log of rock in about 18 inches of swift water in the middle of Crook creek about a mile and a half south-east of the old rock crusher by Frank Beatty, farmer living near the creek. The body is that of a well built man about six feet tall and weighing 165 pounds. He has dark hair, blue eyes and brown hair tinged to sandstone. The body was dressed in a rather worn pair of dark woolen trousers and a pair of good quality white with blue line flannel checks, and a well worn pair of shoes with rubber heels.

Several Twin Falls people have viewed the body in an attempt to know their man but to date no one has claimed it. Several men have confessed themselves puzzled as to his name, though some declare they have seen the man here before.

Mr. Beatty, who drives his cow along the creek every morning, stated last evening that he had seen along the bank shortly after he picked up the body yesterday morning, and had crossed the point near where the body was found. He is positive the body was not there at that time, and believes the body was lodged between 10 and 1 o'clock, at which time he discovered it. A call was made immediately to the sheriff's office, and Deputy Sheriff W. S. Dotson hurried to the scene. The body was lodged against a ledge, the right arm having caught in a protruding rock and the head, lower limbs and arms were submerged, with part of the trunk exposed.

**Doubt Drowning**

The body was taken to the Greenman mortuary where Dr. J. E. Langenwater, acting as county coroner, in the absence of Dr. George C. Haley, was summoned. Investigation by Dr. Langenwater revealed the fact that the lungs of the deceased were not filled with water, leading to expression of some doubt but, evening as to death by drowning. A minute examination of the body revealed but few slight abrasions possibly caused by the body coming into contact with rocks and debris in the bed of the stream. Other physicians who examined the body state that one bruise on the head would possibly have been sufficient to stun, and perhaps kill the man.

**Coroner P. J. Crossman** was out of the city Wednesday, and no arrangements were made for an inquest to determine how the man met his death, and in event it is deemed necessary to hold a post-mortem examination.

**Touch of Drama**

**Chief of Police Ralph Lehigh** was working in conjunction with the sheriff's office, Jas. munda, strenuous efforts to bring identification of the man to a successful conclusion. A touch of drama was added to the case with the appearance of a Mr. Wilson, who stated after viewing the body, "I hadn't talked with my brother Carl Nelson but an hour previous, I would swear it was he, but I know Carl is living and at his home. Possibility of the man being a Durley man is being investigated by local authorities, and every possible means to secure identification is being used.

Possibility that the man did not drown, but came to his death some other way, lends a new angle to the case, in that the man may have been the victim of a heart stroke, and the man whose death lends a possibility of foul play. The man's watch was missing, apparently hurriedly pulled off a
