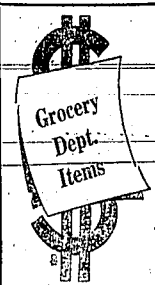

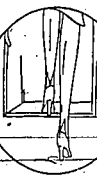

# LETTER SHEDS LIGHT ON IDENTITY OF MAN TAKEN FROM STREAM

### Investigators Find Coat Believed to Have Been Worn by Dead Man, Containing Writing in Foreign Tongue.

Discovery Thursday of a letter written in Norwegian and addressed to John Paulson at Portland is believed to shed light on the identity of the man who was Wednesday found dead in a boat and a half of swift water of Hook creek a mile south of Twin Falls.

The letter was found in a pocket in a coat which was found by officers on the bank of the stream about a mile above the point where the body was found. The coat, officers stated, is of the same material as the trousers worn by the dead man.

#### Supports Suicide Theory

A penciled note written in Swedish on the bank of the letter tended to lead investigating officers to the conclusion that the dead man had taken to his life. Translation of this writing made by C. E. Lind of Twin Falls was to the effect that the writer had traveled earlier in the year in search of work and that he had money in a bank and that his trip was in Portland. It contained the words "forgive me" and closed ironically with a phrase that was translated literally, "And so all this."

The letter in Norwegian was written last April 20 by Ole Erik "Ole" David Green, and addressed to John Paulson at Portland. It was typewritten and written, according to the translator, and related in the main an account of a working man's wanderings.

Other evidence in connection with the case came to light Thursday in the statements of James A. Young, the Lakes boulevard, that he had met the unidentified man Tuesday evening in Hook creek canyon near where the body was found the next day.

The man, Mr. Young said, was walking rapidly with his head bowed, and his face was covered with perspiration. He replied with a foreign name to Mr. Young's greeting.

More than 1000 persons during the day, according to attendants, viewed the body of the unidentified man at the crematorium. Many expressed belief that they had seen some one closely resembling the dead man but were able to identify him. A number of suggestions as to possible identity of the dead man were investigated during the day, but each one proved groundless.

Look for Poison

With view to determining the cause of death, Coroner F. J. Grossman authorized a post mortem examination which was made early in the afternoon by Dr. John P. Coussin and Dr. J. E. Langenwaller. Section of the skull was lifted to determine the extent and possible effects of bruising on the head, and the cavities of the chest and abdomen were opened. The examining doctors would make no statement as to the result of their examination. The stomach and its contents were delivered to Homer Bakon for chemical analyses to determine whether there was poison present.

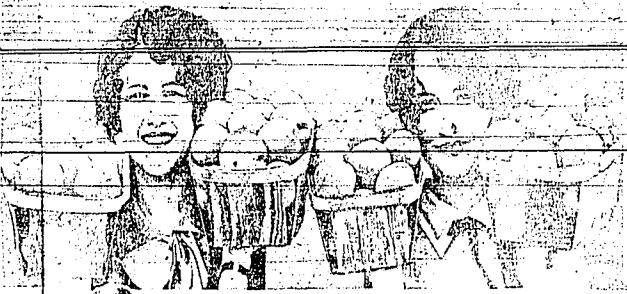

If President Coolidge can match those performances, the fishing men will concede to him the reputation as an angler which precedes him to the scene of his summer outing.

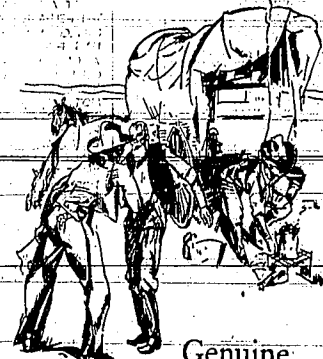
