

TWO FLIERS MISSING FOLLOWING CRASH OF BIG TORPEDO PLANE

California Naval Air Station Officers Lost After Air Craft Is Forced Down; One Man Swims Nine Miles to Shore.

(By The Associated Press.) SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 22.—Eleven-year-old William B. Hactor, operations officer of the North Island naval air station and Charles K. Robbins, aviation chief mechanic, were believed to have lost their lives in crashing the Lieutenant Thomas Plater saved his life by swimming nine hours following the crash of a big torpedo plane off miles of Laguna Beach. Tuesday night details of the crash became known here. Today on Plater's arrival in San Diego. A squadron of seaplanes and the destroyers MacDonough and Corey today searched the area where the torpedo plane disappeared.

Assumes Blame for Crash. Lieutenant Plater, who assumes all the blame for the fatal crash, said: "I left the cockpit of my plane at 1:15 p. m. Tuesday for San Diego in the Boeing torpedo plane. At about 8:30 p. m. while four miles off the beach the plane suddenly struck the surface of the sea. The plane sank in less than five minutes. Two port engines came off and floated away. Hactor, Robbins and I myself took off our parachutes and saw away the fuselage and the life preservers which were stored in a compartment at the rear.

"All three of us managed to cling to one of the pontoons, but this sank within five minutes as the bottom metal has been badly damaged by the landing. The other pontoon floated away. All swim for shore. "Robbins started out for the shore first, closely followed by Hactor. I could not swim as fast and took to my life preserver. I could hear Hactor and Robbins encouraging each other. They started to get within 100 yards of the shore at about 10:30 o'clock. I failed to hear their voices. I was so tired I heard them after that.

"At 12:30 o'clock I struck the beach near Laguna, but was too weak to get up and walk. I lay there fully clothed before the morning. My strength to walk to the deputy sheriff's office where the officer there found me and gave me some dry clothes. At 7:30 I telephoned the naval air station and reported what had happened.

Commander Hactor was 35 years old. He was born in Nebraska and was appointed to the naval academy from Lincoln in 1911. He was in the aviation service in 1920 and had a total of more than 1000 flying hours to his credit. He was unmarried and had no relatives.

Conqueror of North Pole Will Follow Course Taken by Lindbergh Across Ocean.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—Commander Richard E. Byrd will begin the great "circle route" approximating the compass course which Lindbergh took—He probably will place his dependence in the compass to Europe on the earth-inductor compass. Creates New Instruments "Barely a generation ago," says bulletin from the Washington, D. C. headquarters of the National Geographic society, "compass meant just one thing essentially. A needle that caught the north. Now, chiefly because of the development of aviation, three or four other compasses have been added to the list. First among them the new compass is the gyroscopic compass.

which, because of its accuracy, has found its main use on shipboard. Then, in direct answer to the demands of the rapidly growing air force, came the earth-inductor compass. The sun compass and the radio compass. Early fliers were entirely dependent on the magnetic compass for indications of it. The same instrument that guided Vasco da Gama around Africa, and Columbus across the Atlantic. When and where this rather simple instrument first came into use have been bitterly debated. By some historians its invention has been attributed to the Chinese, the Arabs and the East Indians, while other authorities have contended that these eastern peoples really learned about the device from early European visitors to the Orient. Apparently a very crude sort of compass, a magnetized needle floating on a splinter, was used in the east at a very early date. Europe appears to have developed a greatly improved instrument which was reintroduced to the west.

Magnetic Compass Erratic

"The simple magnetic compass was found to be ill adapted to use by air-fliers. It oscillated during the flight and became erratic when a turn was made from north or south. This was due to centrifugal force. Thus the magnetic compass failed the flier at one of the times when he most needed a true indication of his direction, and he failed him because of a force that can never be absent during practical flight. Another difficulty was the presence of much steel in airplane construction, and its additional effect on the needle. To meet these difficulties as early as possible special types of magnetic compass have been devised for flying, and practically all airplanes have been fitted with them. But they cannot be depended upon alone, especially immediately after turns, and they must be checked against instruments depending on some other principle than the north-seeking tendency of a magnetic needle.

Generator Replaces Needle

"The earth-inductor compass" was devised especially to meet aviation needs. It does not have the confusing lag of the magnetic compass; it gives immediate notice of deviation from a straight course; centrifugal force has little effect on it. Both the magnetic compass and this earth-inductor compass make use of the fact that the earth itself is a great magnet. The magnetic forces of this huge magnet force constantly approximately

Shows Direction by Shadow

"The sun compass was created by Albert H. Bumstead, chief cartographer of the National Geographic society, to solve the problem of direction in the North Pole, where the magnetic pole may lie in any direction but north of the observer. The sun compass is a clock with one hand and a 24-hour dial. It is set for local sun time. When, in the northern hemisphere, the face of this clock is tipped from the vertical at an angle equal to the approximate latitude of the place and is turned so that the hands point directly toward the sun, its 12 o'clock mark will point south. By keeping the hand steadily toward the sun, the 12 o'clock mark will remain due south. A little pin on the hand casts a shadow, which falls directly along the hand's center line when the hand points to the sun. Navigation along any established line can be kept in keeping the shadow always along the hour hand.

"The radio compass, unlike its competitor is a wireless compass. Several types have been developed. In one form it consists on plane board of expirations attached through a receiving set to a coil antenna which can be rotated. When it is turned edgewise toward a radio sending station or "radio beacon" it gives signals of maximum sound. By thus locating a known station, the flier can find the position of his plane. Another form the radio compass has a coil antenna fixed rigidly with its edges in the direction of flight. Signals are sent out from its destination and caught on the flier's expirations. When the plane veers from the course, weakness of signals warn of the wrong direction."

DISPLAY MORE FLAGS ON FOURTH OF JULY

City Extends Own System for Exhibiting Nation's Emblem on Streets.

More flags have been ordered to extend Twin Falls new flag display system to include four blocks on Shoshone street and three blocks on Main avenue. The flags will first be displayed when Twin Falls celebrates the Fourth of July. They were first put out on last Flag day and again last Thursday when the Woodmen of the World of this district, assembled and evoked a great deal of favorable comment on those occasions.

The new system of flag display was devised by Harry Bayburn, municipal streets superintendent, and all of the equipment, except the flags themselves, was made in Twin Falls. It provides for use of the ornamental street light posts on either side of the street. Four flags being hung out at a graceful angle from each lamp post. With the new flags, a total of 438 flags will be put in use in the display.

The new system displaces an overhead display system which was abandoned some months ago when the flags became soiled and littered.

A practical advantage of the new system lies in saving of time in putting up and taking down the display. This work now is done by two men in an hour and a half, whereas the former system required the work of six or seven men for a half day.

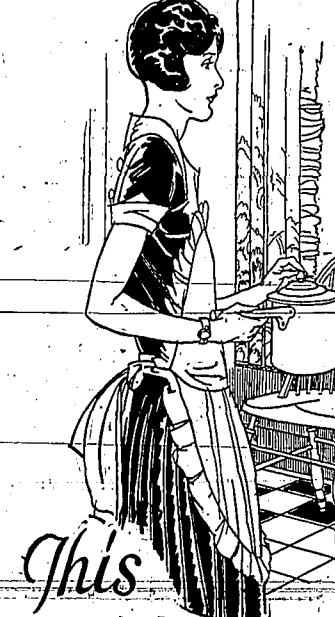

VETERAN AIRMAN TO MAKE ASCENSION AT CELEBRATION HERE

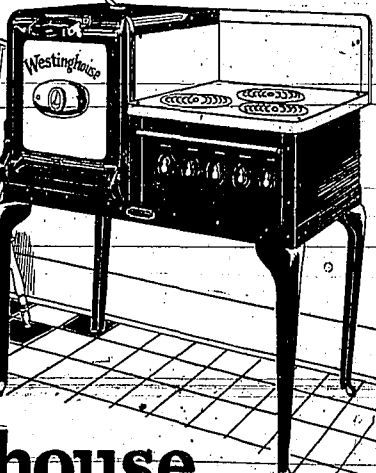

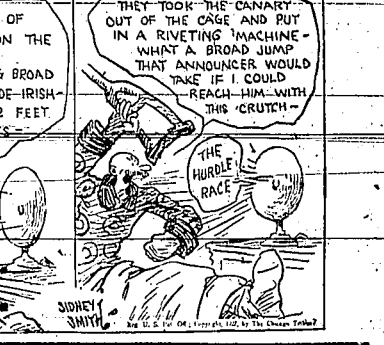

Routing of the Sawtooth highway in Idaho from Shoshone by way of Jerome, Falls City and Teton to the Nevada line, has just been approved by the secretary of agriculture, so that federal funds will be made available for use with state and Twin Falls highway district funds for completion of this section of the road.

Entering Nevada the road will extend through Contract No. 10, where it will connect with transcontinental highways to Yosemite national park and San Francisco.

Nevada Officials Active

Nevada officials are desirous of bringing about the completion of the highway from the state line to Wells, and they desire also, to extend the road through White Pine county to Ely to effect junction with the transcontinental highway to Los Angeles and southern California.

Road commissioners of Elko and White Pine counties in joint session with Idaho and Twin Falls highway district officials at Elio last winter approved a program for construction of this road, and subsequently the Nevada legislature took action endorsing the proposal and requesting allocation of federal funds for this program.

Carries Information
Mr. Wilson, while in Washington recently to attend an annual meeting of the United States Chamber of Commerce, conferred with the government officials relative to this project and obtained information which he will lay before the conference at Reno next Friday.

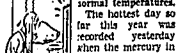
