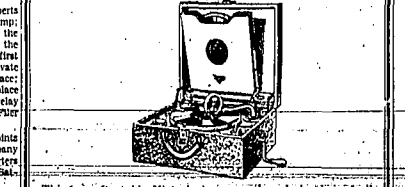

The Twin Falls library next Friday will be without a home, since that will be the last day of the present quarters will expire.

Lease for library quarters in the Elix building, which was made by the present action instituted by O. A. Brustle, Twin Falls carpenter, was accepted by Twin Falls city council last April 25.

Brustle argues that the lease is illegal because four out of the five members of the council and board at the time of the lease held office on the 25th.

Stipulations agreed upon by the attorneys Friday set forth that W. S. Hill, Stuart H. Taylor and E. E. Dickson, members of the library board, were members of the lodge prior to last June 10 when they took oaths from the lodge; that Mrs. Martha R. Hester is the wife of a member of the lodge, but that Mrs. Hazel B. Sweeney, fifth member of the board, is not the wife of an Elk.

Miss Paula G. Fox, who was named as one of the defendants in the stipulations set forth, obtained the lease from the lodge and delivered it to the council and board, as a matter of accommodation and had no other interest in the transaction.

The case for Brustle is being conducted by E. V. Larson. The city and library board are represented by M. J. Sweeney, acting city attorney, and the lodge and Miss Fox by A. J. Myers.

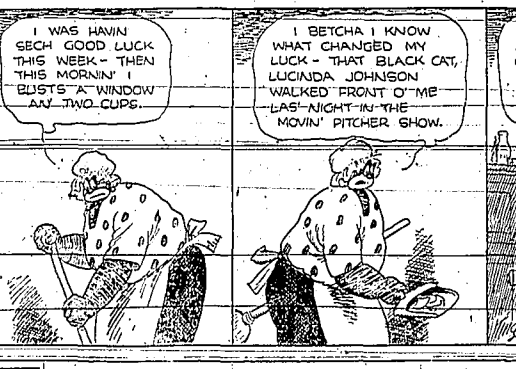

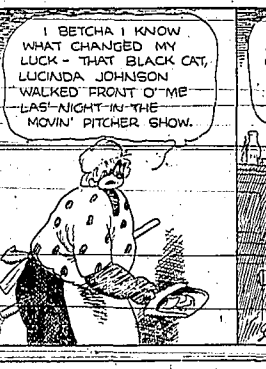

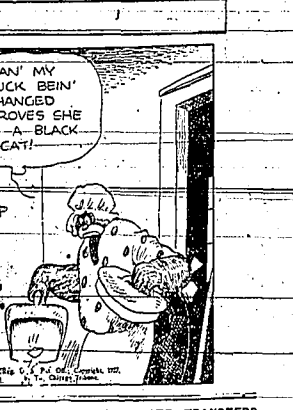

Roger W. Babson Makes Report on Three Weeks' Survey of Optimistic on Opportunities for Manufacturers.

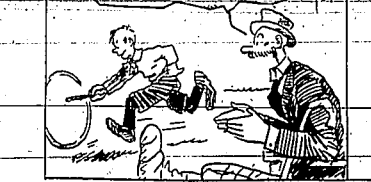
BABSON PARK, Massachusetts, June 24 (Special to The News.)—During the past three weeks Roger W. Babson has been making a survey of manufacturing conditions in the south and west. He has returned very optimistic on opportunities in certain southern states and believes that the west will continue to do more manufacturing. His complete statement is as follows:

Manufacturing in the south and west has been complaining about the poor conditions in the textile mills and shoe factories in New England. Moreover, their statements have been backed up by statistics. All public-spirited people are aware that New England mills have been suffering severely the past two or three years. This has resulted in a decline in the price of many mill stocks and a general breaking up of morale. Considering what New England has done for the entire country...

During this trip I did not find general business any better than was expected. The volume of business is good everywhere, but not everywhere is it equally so. In the cotton and wool textile industry, which are the main factors in the world, very busy, while in the many mill districts, which are not complaining. When reaching the textile centers of the south, I found the cotton and wool textile industry very busy. Many mills are working not only all day, but also all night. Contrary to New England as it did, there is no shut-down in the south. In only two or three days a week the southern and finding the mills working all hours of the day. This was very impressive. Moreover, the southern manufacturers are apparently very optimistic.

In talking with some of the large mill owners in the south, I referred to the fact that the cotton and wool textile industry in the north had been suffering for some time. The head of the Cotton Manufacturers' association, has been given the credit of being the one who has secured additional markets and found additional markets for cotton goods. This clearly illustrates the two different points of view existing in the south. Southern mills are running nights primarily because there is an excess of supply. In the north, there is so cold nights that the employees get night work. I see little hope of a recovery in the cotton and wool textile industry in the north. Nights so long as they can sell the goods, I cannot speak too highly of the situation in the south. The labor who are working in these mills. They are a fine lot of men and women who are doing their best to maintain health, ambition and a desire to work. There is a spirit of friendliness and unity in these southern mills which is unknown in the north. Of course, the same situation exists in Lowell, Lawrence and other Massachusetts cities. The south may not enjoy this condition 30 years hence, but today labor conditions are ideal. It is a pleasure to think that southern mills are successful because they are near the cotton and wool fields. The factories are successful because they are near the cotton and wool fields. 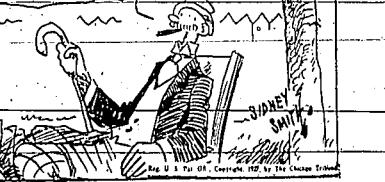
