Bank Robbers Carry Loot

BERLIN, July 2.—A teddy bear stuffed with 400,000 Polish zlotys, or about \$50,000, was taken away yesterday by a trio of bank robbers to employ a 1,000,000 zloty from Poland into Germany.

When a man stepped up to the cashier's cage of the Deutsche Bank at Frankfurt-on-Main recently with the request to change \$20,000 zloty into German marks, the large amount made the cashier suspicious. The bank communicated with the police and was told that the bank notes were O. K., but attention was called to a bank robbery recently committed at Krosowka Huta.

Investigation led to the arrest of a postal clerk, Karl Kersch, who had a key to the strong room of a bank at Krosowka Huta. He confessed to having hidden the money in a post-office trunk, who gave it to his wife for safe keeping. The same night both men slipped across the frontier. A few days later Mrs. Kersch started on a motor launch and she gave her little girl to carry and so also got across the border without a hitch. She reported this trick a number of times until this entire 1,500,000 zloty were safely in Germany.

BERLIN, July 2.—Employees of the German electrical companies came on a strike about 2000 a year, according to figures submitted at the annual meeting of shareholders.

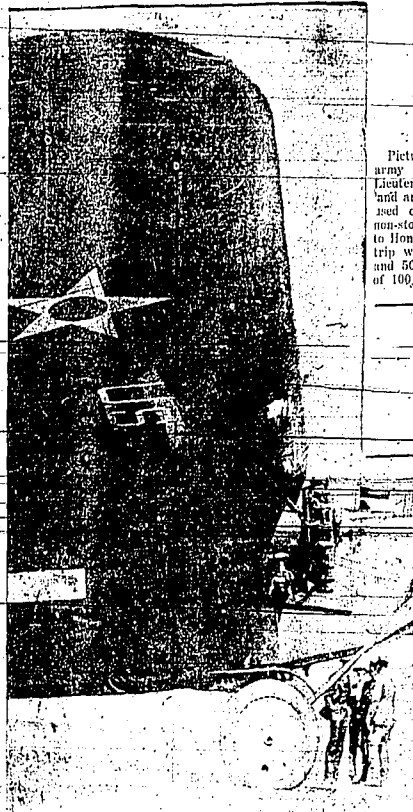

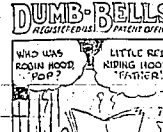

The birth rate in this country last year decreased, and the death rate increased, the former changing one per cent, and the latter half as much, in the wrong direction.

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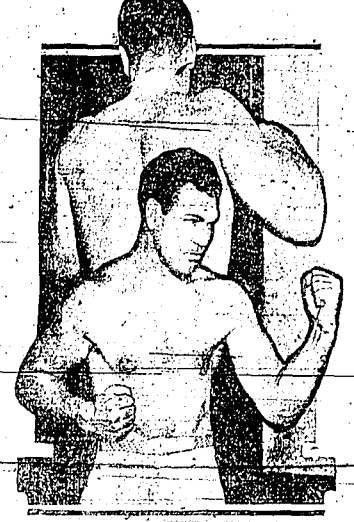

ST. PATRICK'S ORDER CONFERRED BY KING PRINCE OF WALES

Society Ranks Third in British Knights and Was Founded in 1783; Members Must be Irish Peers; Few in Roll.

LONDON, July 2 (AP)—The order of St. Patrick, conferred by King George on the Prince of Wales, ranks third in the British orders of knighthood. It is preceded only by the order of the Garter and the Order of the Bath, which confers the rank of knight.

The order of St. Patrick is a society of knights, founded in 1783, as a measure calculated to convey to the Irish nobles the same rank and precedence as the most respectable situation of that kingdom. This is the first bestowal of the order since the reign of King James II.

The order was conferred on the Prince of Wales, and the king, in a ceremony at St. Patrick's, London, July 2.

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In the Heart of the Land of Outdoors

Where Mountain and River Combine to Charm the Vacationist and Good Roads Abound; Hailey, Headquarters of Tourists and Campers' Paradise.

AROUND Hailey, Idaho, which is 63 miles from Twin Falls, is located a network of the finest summer highways to be found anywhere in the Rocky Mountain region.

Tourists passing through southern Idaho on the Old Oregon Trail still seem to hold aloof from the summer playground out of sheer dread of the "mountain highways." As a matter of fact these roadways are generally smoother and more easily traveled than highways of the lower plains where heavy travel often cuts and leaves the surface rough.

Any car or even reasonably good condition, can make the entire trip from Snake River valley to Hailey, or Galena Summit into the beautiful Salmon River Valley without once having to shift into low gear.

TIMMELMAN HILL TO HAILEY

Leaving the low Snake River plain northward from Shoshone the first scenic view to greet the traveler is the panorama spreading out ahead at the top of the Timmelman Hill 2 1/2 miles north of Shoshone. This picture gives a full view of the widest part of Wood River valley, with mountains which were completely covered with forest timber a generation ago but now are dotted here and there only with mining prospect tunnels.

A hint glimpse of the higher rugged Sawtooth Mountains in the background is suggestive of what is in store a few miles farther along.

GALENA SUMMIT DRIVE

Leaving Hailey, the country becomes more mountainous and, finally the road is almost levelled in with beautiful forest and rugged peaks at the beginning of the spectacular but gradual climb up the Galena Summit over a perfect, smooth and even grade National Forest highway.

On this ascent glimpses through the trees as the route twists and turns and zigzags back and forth in order to keep the high grade levelled the tourist that he has behind already many beautiful brooks and forest nooks that are ideal camping and fishing places and summer cabin sites.

And then, near the top of our course, the mighty jagged peaks including Mt. Hurdman, 12,000 feet, the highest mountain in Idaho, begin to loom up on all sides in all their mighty splendor.

AT THE TOP OF GALENA

From the summit the view is even more inspiring for there are to be seen, range upon range in all directions, the formidable Sawtooth Mountains. It seems almost incredible that scenes of such rugged grandeur can be viewed from such perfect highway routes.

The Sawtooth Parkway highway drive northward to Stanley leads gradually down the Salmon River watershed showing the various mountain ranges at all times to the right and left. The small creeks and streams join together gradually into larger water flows and finally form the majestic Salmon River. Forest Ranger stations and scattered cattle ranches are the only signs of civilization for many miles.

Throughout the length of the route from Hailey to Stanley (77 miles) there are numerous side trip roads that lead further into the depths of the varied forest, mountain and lake retreats.

TRAVELERS FOR CAMPING PLACES

A series of lakes offer easy access by auto roads and are already favorite camping and overnight stops well known to everyone. These lakes are Allures Lake, Pett Lake, Red Fish Lake and Stanley Lake—each different in its setting and display of attraction. Back of these are many trails and foot paths that lead to numerous smaller unspoiled lakes and wooded mountains.

Many mines which in the near past have produced millions of dollars worth of precious metals and now lie idle with their primitive towns adjacent, form a melancholy but strangely fascinating spectacle which the traveler should not fail to see if he wishes to get the real atmosphere of western mining days.

Although the old and deserted mines hold fascinating interest to the visitor it is not to be understood that all of the mines are operations of the past.

There are many large active operations now going forward, including the Marconi Mine, Livingston Mine, Bullion and Red Hill, which is a Henry Ford property. Dozens of other properties, prospects, relocations and re-workings of old properties to find lost veins are in progress all over the region.

FROM STANLEY TO CLAYTON AND CHIAHLIS

Just below Stanley the Salmon River Valley narrows into a picturesque canyon gorge. And presents a kind of scenery present itself with changes at each curve in the road. Cataracts, forests, mountains and varied gorgeous rock formations alternate rapidly in the changing spectacle towards Chialis.

Sawtooth Park Highway extends on to Salmon City and projects on north to Missouri as a connection with highways of the state of Montana.

From Stanley a good forest highway extends to Cape Horn and thence to Boise over Lowman route which is extremely steep with precipitous grades. The other road via Bear Valley to Cascade and thence to Boise or McCall is a good road with easier grades throughout.

A DIFFERENT RETURN ROUTE TO HAILEY

From Clayton there is a shorter return route via Chilly, up Lost River to Trail Creek Summit and down a good highway which connects with the Sawtooth Highway again at Kelchum 12 miles above Hailey. This road, however, is not yet open for the season. Or the route may be continued on from Chilly to Arco and back upon the "Caters of the Moon" through Carey.

While Hailey is the largest town in the Wood River country, Kelchum is rapidly becoming recognized as a summer outfitting point for tourist and sheep man. It is the terminal of the trail and during the sheep shipping season as well as throughout the summer and fall months presents a scene of bustling activity in marked contrast to conditions during the winter when business, necessarily, is almost at a standstill. Kelchum boasts a unique summer hotel of picturesque log construction opened up just a year or two ago.

The three highway routes above mentioned, namely, Sawtooth Park Highway, Trail Creek Highway, and Mulefoot-Arco-Carey, respectively besides being good roads, each offer adequate stopping accommodations and eating places for those who do not wish to camp.

Hailey Hotel Springs, Guyer Hot Springs and Robinson Bar each have good swimming pools of natural hot water and good hotel accommodations.

YOU CAN GET LOST

With any good forest or highway map in hand a stranger is entirely safe in all this big mountainous country. Full credit is due the Government Forest Department for this valuable service. Every creek, stream, lake and place of note is marked. Also, forest service telephones connect all the various Ranger Stations and open booths are available to the general public.

In all, the Wood River and Salmon River and Sawtooth Park mountain country is safe and easily accessible and furnishes within a large but compact area a summer playground beautiful, fascinating and not easily forgotten.

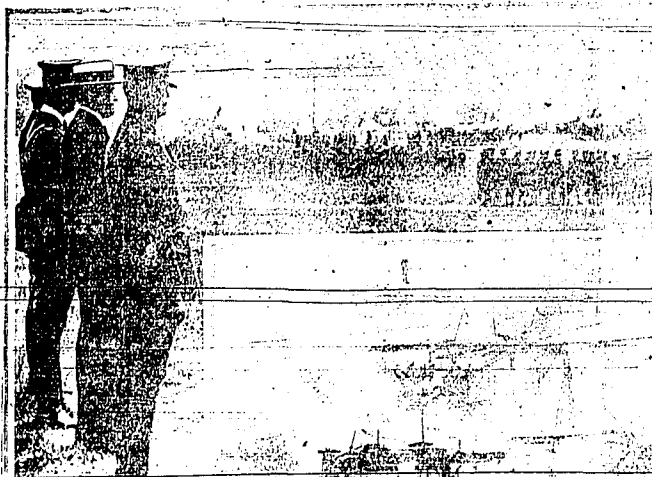

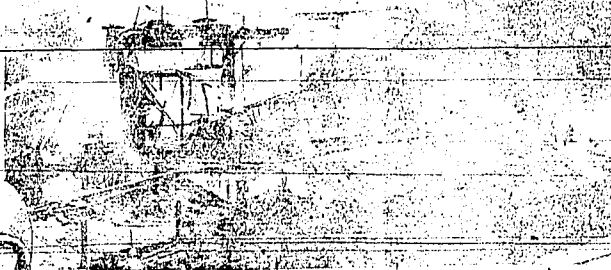

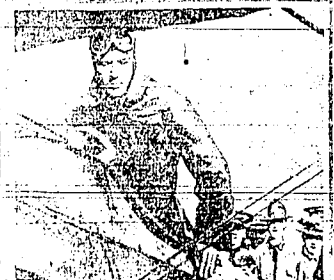

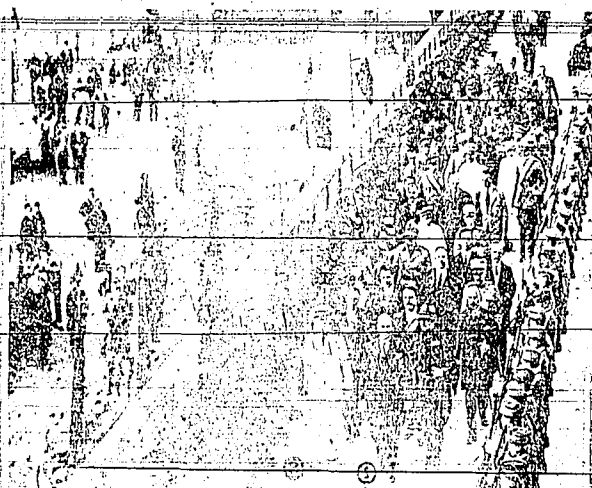

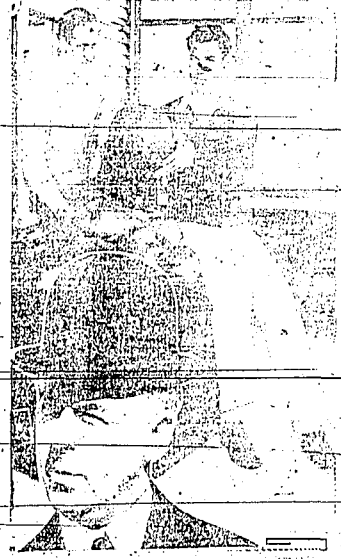
