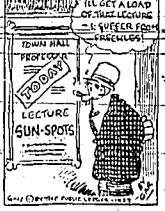

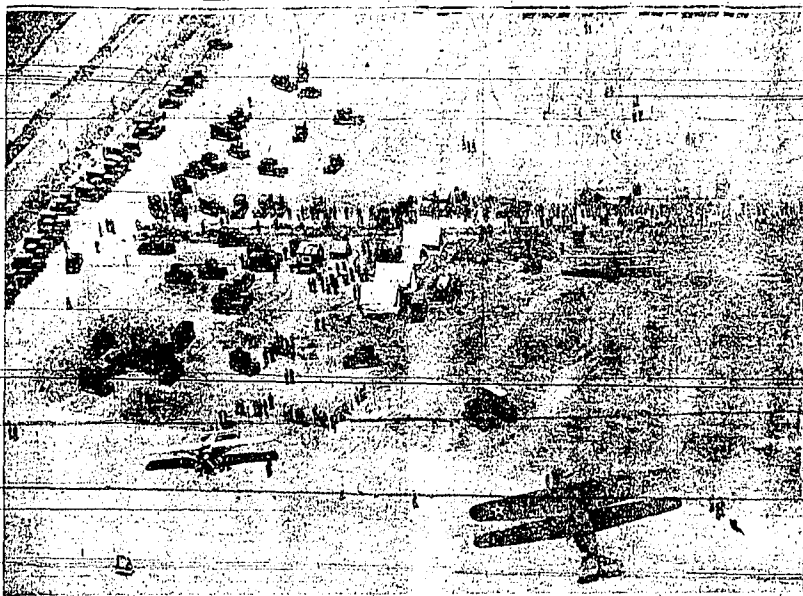
LINDBERGH'S VISIT TO FRENCH CAPITAL COST FRANCE MUCH

Lights to Show Way to Paris Were Kept Burning Long After Aviator Landed; Reception Was Expensive.

PARIS, July 4 (AP)—Lindbergh's visit cost France a lot of money. The lights alone, to show the way to Paris, cost a nice sum. The biggest searchlight in the world, on Mont Valerien, west of Paris, sent its rays 200 miles all that Saturday evening. All the searchlights of northern France were kept burning long after Lindbergh landed. The furniture bills if it could be calculated, also would be high. At the city hall and at the chamber and senate receptions, the crowds clamored wildly into the unimpaired chairs and divans, fringed sofas and desks and left torn fabrics and broken and mangled woodwork.

PARIS, July 4 (AP)—Four hours service in the American army recently saved an Albanian lecturer, Vasil Papadopoulos, from waiting years for a visa to return to America. July 4 (AP)—The eightieth anniversary of the day he rescued Jess Willard in a boiling sun at Toledo to win the heavyweight championship of the world, Jack Dempsey today settled down to the usual of winning back the title. Shows Off Fire Pitches of the fire that carried Dempsey through some of the greatest battles in modern ring history, flared occasionally as Jack went to work with the sixteen ounce gloves. He fought fast rounds with Johnny Saxon, Joe Starn and Bill Butler; all well-kept and Marty Burke; light heavyweight, after a rugged punching session with Petro Corr, an Australian heavyweight. The most impressive session of the day came against Dave Shade, rugged California master of the weaving right-left style that day, July 1919. The big fellow matched Shady's speed with fast footwork and bobbed and punched to Dave's head and body with both accuracy and assurance. Jack finished the day with a three-minute wrestling session against Carl Carter. He spent five hours on the road this morning.

He was the president and dominant figure of the convention, and served as president of the new nation for four years.

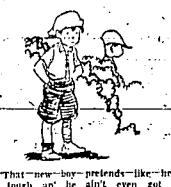
