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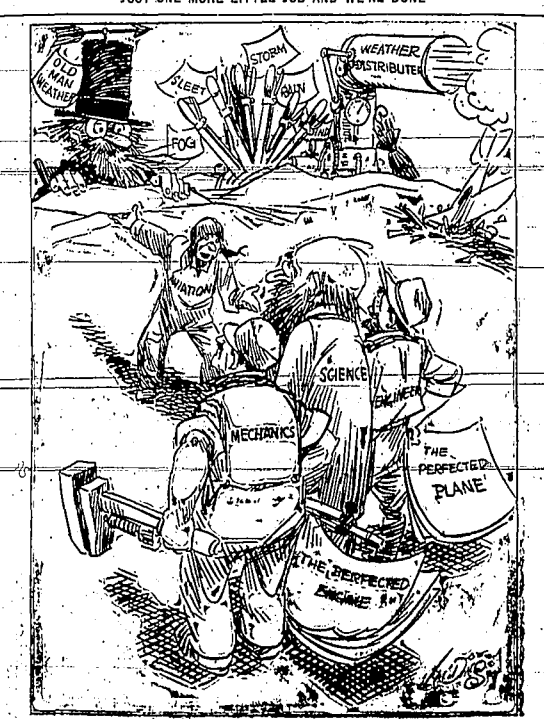
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BUHL COUNCIL ASKS NEW PETITIONS FOR STREET GRADING

Discussion Discloses Fact That Budget Makes No Provision for Improving Intersections at Expense of Municipality.

BUHL, July 6 (Special to The News)—The city council discussed last night at a meeting the petition which was presented by property holders on Eleventh and Twelfth streets asking that these thoroughfares be surfaced with gravel. Council decided to ask those interested to provide a petition which would be signed by property owners who would pay for the cost of surface street and alley improvement.

It was brought out in the discussion that the city has no fund available for improving streets, and suggested that property owners volunteer to pay this cost. If the streets are graded an improvement district will be created and costs would be assessed against the property. It has been the custom for city to pay the cost of improving street and alley intersections, but this has not been provided for in the last two-year budget.

The matter of parking cars in the main streets while the drivers wait in front of buildings was also discussed. It was decided that owners will be limited in the amount of time they may leave their automobiles in the streets.

JURY RETURNS VERDICT IN DISPUTE OVER SHEEP

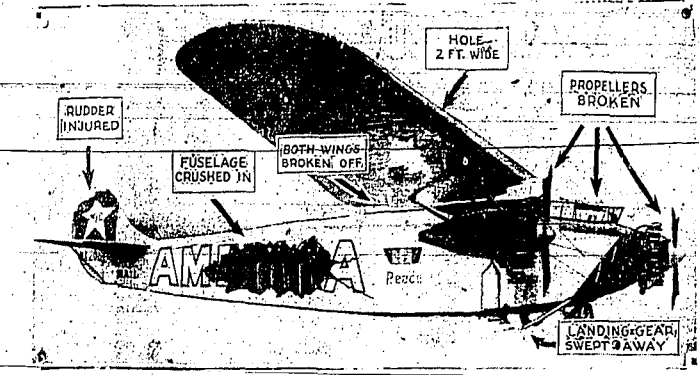

PERISHABLE COMMODITY PRODUCTION INCREASES

Superintendent of Pacific Fruit Express Company Estimates Crop at 33,426 Cars in 1927.

BOISE, July 6 (AP)—Idaho's 1927 crop production of perishable commodities is estimated at 33,426 cars, an increase of 635 cars or 2 per cent over the 1926 production of perishable crops, C. H. Gunnell, Ogden, superintendent of the Pacific Fruit Express company, reported today to the Idaho public utilities commission. Movement of the 1927 crops will spread over the period July 1, 1927, to June 30, 1928. In the period June 1, 1926, to July 1, 1927, there were 25,091 cars moved from southern Idaho points on the Oregon Short Line.

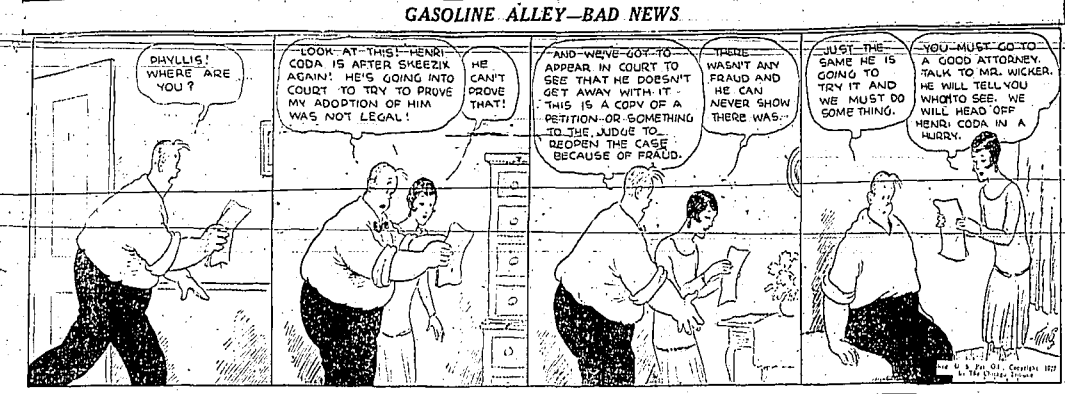
