The bodies of the two were found ground to pieces on the track.

JANITOR TO FACE TRIAL FOR MURDERING WOMEN

New York Pollock Round Up Man Accused of Dredging Plots; State Has Good Case

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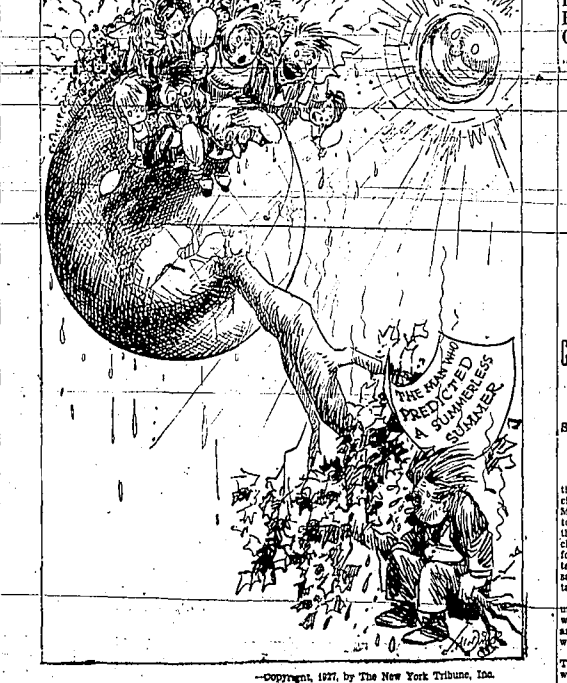



GET THIRD DELIVERY**

Directors Authorize New Allot-
ment to Distribute Accumu-
lation-Credited to New Rule.

Waterusers of the Salmon River
project will receive in three deliveries
of irrigation water this season, a total
of 14 1/4 inches for each acre of
Salmon River Canal company stock.
Sufficient water to make two later
deliveries for domestic uses will re-

change in the amount of water to be
delivered.

Crops on the Salmon River project
are showing an excellent growth con-
dition, with promise of big yields.

THREE YOUNG MEN ON MOTOR TOUR HELD ON CHARGES OF FORGERY

Jerome Sheriff Arrests Suspects for Whom Officers Here Launched Search; Leave Trail of Bad Checks.

Three young men, traveling in an automobile, were arrested at Jerome, Idaho, and were being held here today on charges of forgery of checks.

They have the names of Clinton H. Smith, 26, of Weller, Idaho; Walter Frederson, 26, of Ontario, California; and Duff Tracey, 21, of Jackson, Nevada.

The young men were arrested on the order of Judge Chief H. E. Loshon, stated last evening, involving a number of forged checks, most of them being drawn for about \$200, the charges, officers said they had learned, was traced to Jerome, Idaho, at the bank drug store. It was drawn for \$22.50 and made payable to J. C. Thompson. It was signed with the name of George Harrison, a person who had been arrested here by the officers.

Travels Operation Here

Under similar circumstances, the officers said, a check was passed by the accused man Saturday at a rooming house in Twin Falls and another check, bearing forged signature of Carl Nelson, was presented Saturday at a store here where it was turned over to the officers. A warrant for Smith's arrest was issued here last Wednesday on application of the United States marshal of the Twin Falls credit association, who had an information furnished by the police. It was stated last evening at police headquarters.

The accused men were traveling in Frederson's roadster. Frederson, who is a native of Idaho and a resident of this country since 1924, set out on the percent trip with Smith from San Rafael, California, a few days ago, they told the officers. They were joined at Lovelock by Tracey.

They went from here last Saturday to Weller and were intercepted and arrested at Jerome by Deputy Sheriff William Sears and officers here on their route to Eden to visit Smith's sister. URGES SUPPORT FOR IDAHO INSTITUTIONS

Miss Permeal French, University Dean of Women, Addresses Buhl Rotarians.

BUHL, July 14 (Special to The News)—A plea for more interest on the part of the parents in the state of Idaho and its institutions with a view of building up more sentiment for these institutions among the boys and girls of today, was the theme of a talk given today at the Buhl Rotary club luncheon by Miss Permeal French, dean of women at the University of Idaho for the past 20 years. Miss French stated that she was born in Idaho and her love for this state and its institutions was unbounded.

Miss French pleaded for the restoration of more home life to the Idaho homes of today, and for the employment of young men and women in the schools where they are above the criticism of the public.

"There is not enough sentiment for these institutions," she said, "because there is lack of sentiment at home. One of the reasons for lack of sentiment at home is the lack of observance. Girls and boys are not satisfied to go a mile from home when they go riding, but they must go 10 miles or more and are not satisfied to stay out until 11 or 12 o'clock at night as they used to do but they must stay out until 2 in the morning."

Miss French said that parents of today are not in practically every way as the parents, Miss French said. "The boy is given a nickel or a dime to spend a day, and after the day is over twice as much. It then doubles until he requires a dollar a day for spending money and he is permitted to drive the car and father buys the gasoline," she said.

"It is a great mistake to send a boy out to the university with a very small amount of money. If he or she does not work outside of the university course there is not much time for recreation in auto riding and what time they have should be spent in the library."

Miss French pointed with pride to the fact that the University of Idaho has come up to class A, the best standing possible, but she added it was through the efforts of the people in charge of it and not the interest on the part of Idaho citizens.

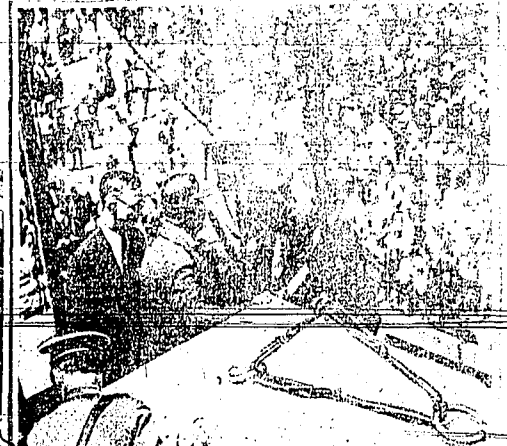

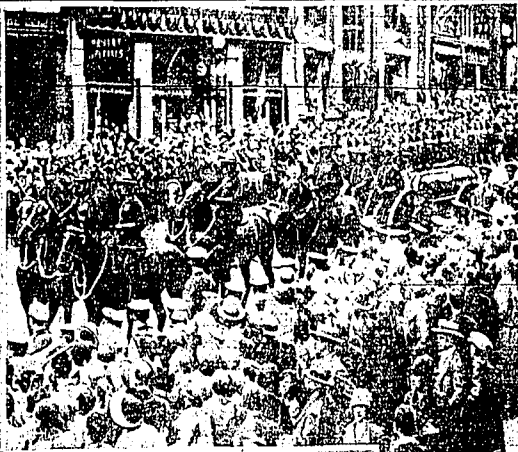
