



**BARRY DIBBLE FILES POWER SITE REPORT**

Engineer Gives Estimate on Costs of Plant at Banbury Springs; Buhl to Check Up.

July 19.—The report of Barry Dibble to Gardner Adams, trustee for the city of Buhl, on the cost of building a power plant at the Banbury Springs site with a view to supplying Buhl, Eden and the west end farmers with power, at \$10 per horse power a company with 4100 per horse power for development of the Clear Lake site. This report has been partly verified by a thorough inspection of the site which will be checked completely during the next week.

A fund of \$100,000 was authorized by a meeting of the city of Buhl on the 14th of the month, and the trustees are to learn how much more is needed for the development of the site.

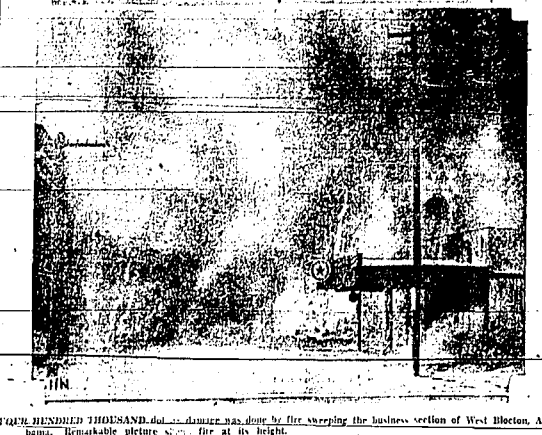
It is estimated that the total cost of development will range from \$150,000 to \$200,000. This will develop from 1200 to 1500 horse power. The peak load for Buhl and the McCullough addition at the present time is about 400 horse power, while the average consumption is about 400 horse power.

Under further figures, the total cost of the plant is estimated at \$225,000 per year, including interest on the investment. According to the published statement of the trustees of electricity in Buhl and McCullough addition, the Idaho Power company approximately \$400,000 for electrical energy during the year. It is estimated that the development and operation of the Banbury site will cost the city of Buhl about \$150,000 to \$200,000 in a sinking fund to retire other bonds.

The trustees of the city of Buhl have submitted to the public utilities commission a report on the Banbury site. The estimate is about one-fifth of that amount.

The books for the Buhl Independent school district are being closed this week by secretary of the board of education, J. Gardner Adams. He reports that the general fund is low, but there is about \$15,000 in the sinking fund. The debt is \$100,000 in bonds maturing upon the school building.

OR YES OR NO? Again Sacco and Vanzetti appear on the surface of the news offerings of the day.

It has been some years since these men were convicted of murder and sentenced to death. At the time their conviction attracted little attention but as days of various sorts served to keep them in the gallies, public attention began to fasten upon their plight.

It appears now that the men employed to check into the circumstances surrounding the trial have decided that everything went through in legal form and that the convicted men had, in effect, a fair and honest hearing.

But it is difficult to believe that any impartial review of the evidence submitted would result in a conviction in the minds of the investigators that Sacco and Vanzetti, beyond a reasonable doubt, were guilty of the actual crime with which they were charged.

Obtaining they may have been but their names are in every case an atmosphere of feeling hatred against the things for which Sacco and Vanzetti stood. They were radicals and agitators, preaching a doctrine which amounted to treason in times of war.

Many impartial observers do not think so. If these men are to be executed the authorities of Massachusetts should be very sure of their ground. If there is one-tenth of one per cent of a chance that they are innocent, they should be kept in the benefit of this element of doubt.

Probably this has been done, but there will always be those who will be liable to doubt it.

CHELITY TO ANIMALS

It is a fact that many animals are suffering from chelity, a condition which is caused by a lack of certain vitamins in their diet.

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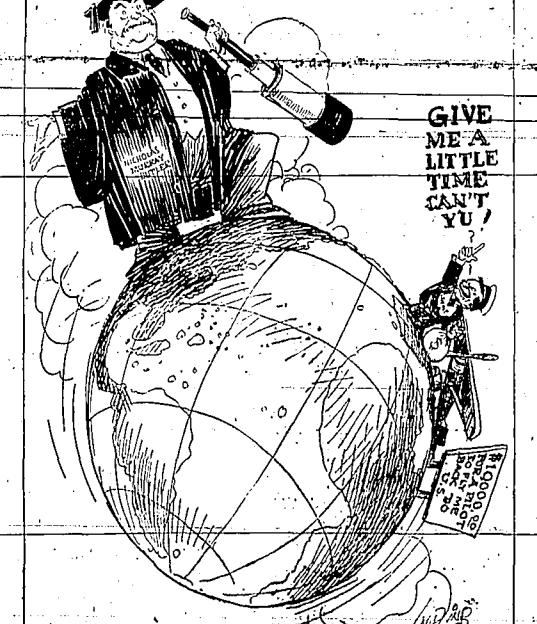

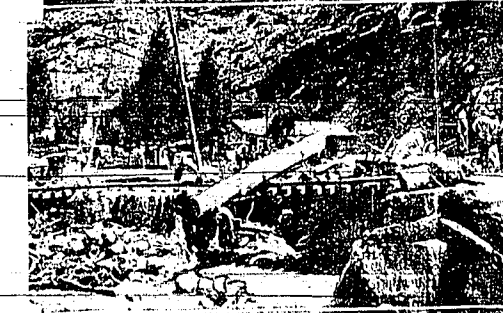

MANAGER COFFIN IS HERE FOR MEETING

Head of Idaho Rate Association Will Discuss Freight Charges Pertaining to Vicinity.

General discussion of these various items which amount in all to a total of nearly 500 specific rates on out-bound products alone will be given full consideration.

Mr. Coffin will explain why it costs \$450 to ship a car of prime prunes, peaches or grapes to New York from Idaho while the same car could be moved from California, 700 miles greater railroad haul, for \$415.25.

Why a car of fruit which a Utah grower may ship to 20,000 lb. car of potatoes to San Francisco for \$147 while the grower in the Twin Falls district will be required to contribute \$185 to the railroad for a 20,000 lb. car to San Francisco, is considerably shorter distance.

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CANAL COMPANY CUT IN WATER IS MADE

Reduction of 200 Second Feet Is Ordered; May Draw on Storage.

The Twin Falls Canal company Tuesday ordered a cut of 200 second feet in the flow to be applied to the tract, reducing the full run from 3500 to 2400 second feet. At the same time an order was given to draw storage from Jackson lake, if necessary in order to keep the flow up to 2400 feet.

This is the first time this year that there has been deemed necessary to draw from Jackson lake storage. It may be necessary to draw from the lake during the summer months, if necessary the company is in readiness. Last year it was necessary on June 17.

The stockholders of the Jackson Lake reservoir, by their meeting last week, decided that evidence was not sufficient to justify them in expending from \$20,000 to \$30,000 on improvements to be made in the reservoir.
