GOVERNMENT GIVES FLYING CROSSES TO HEROES OF AVIATION

Lieutenants Maillon and Hegnerberger Receive Honors for Oakland-to-Hawaii Flight; Thousands Gather at Capital.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, July 21.—Breezing down upon the capital from the air, Lieutenants Maillon and Hegnerberger received today their government flying crosses and medals of appreciation for their flight from the Pacific from California to Hawaii.

Lieutenant Maillon, who had been severely hurt when he stepped from a ship similar to the Fokker monoplane which carried them to take his aerial trip, was taken to the hospital, acting secretary of war, had handed to each of the young officers an envelope containing a letter from the president, one "worthy of the greatest praise," and one "bestowing much credit" on the United States army and navy.

Then on behalf of President Coolidge, Secretary Kellogg greeted the army aviators as did secretary of war, General John A. Pershing, assistant secretary of the navy, Rear Admiral Moffett, chief of the navy bureau of aeronautics, Anthony Fokker, inventor of the plane in which the trans-Pacific flight was made, and Charles L. Tamm, president of the Wright Aeronautical corporation, which built the whirlwind engines of the plane.

Was Wonderful First.

"On behalf of the president, I compliment and congratulate you on the great non-stop flight to Hawaii," Secretary Kellogg said, after placing each flyer by the hand. "It was a wonderful achievement and formed a new chapter in the history of aviation."

Mr. Kellogg then added his own words of congratulation to Secretary Tamm and Warner. They came the turn of the man who commanded the great American army of aviators, "I greet the youngsters warmly."

Greeted by Pershing.

"I am very glad to have the honor to extend my own congratulations to you," he said. "I may presume to do so, and speak, for the army, I wish to say that you have accomplished a most splendid achievement. It will mean very much for the advancement of aviation. I hope you may both be able to see the results of your fine example of efficient aviation."

Before finishing their plane to the ground after their successful flight from Dayton, Ohio, the young flyers circled the field, flying low over the thousands gathered in the official reception pavilion, reserved seats and left spaces far to the right and left.

The total reserve fund increased \$211,740 to a total of \$4,937,087.

FLOOD RELIEF MEASURES WARRANTS EARLY MEETING OF CONGRESS; PRESIDENT IS SILENT

WASHINGTON, July 21.—(By)—Senator Smoot, who is chairman of the senate finance committee which is preparing to take up a tax reduction bill next session, reiterated that the prospective tax cuts should be held to \$100,000,000, he suggested, however, to the president that the reduction be made to apply on this year's income.

On this year's income, he pointed out that it would be necessary to have the tax reduced by \$100,000,000 in the first installment of taxes for this year fall due.

The corporation tax should receive first consideration, the Utah senator declared and he proposed that it be cut from 13 per cent to 12 per cent which would reduce the total of \$100,000,000 to the prospective \$300,000,000 reduction.

CUSTOM COURT REVERSES DEPARTMENTAL RULING

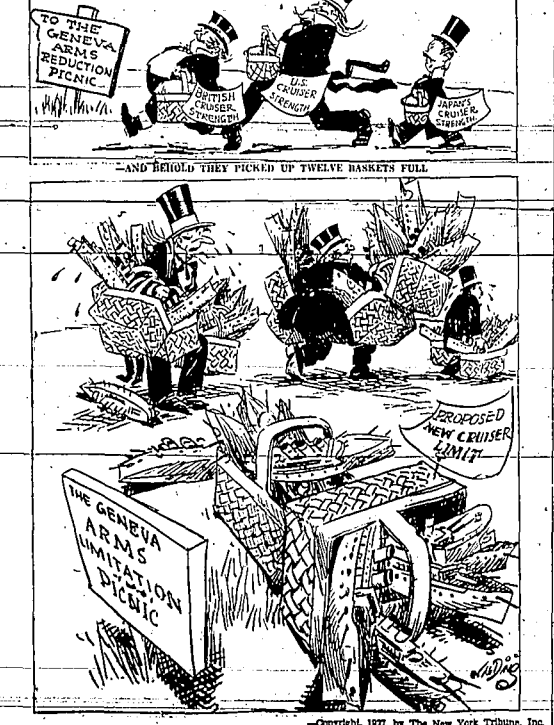
Americans Remaining in Canada Less Than 4 or 5 Days May Bring in Goods Duty Free.

NEW YORK, July 21.—(By)—A treasury department ruling designed to protect American merchants from Canadian competition has been reversed today by the United States customs court which decided that Americans remaining in Canada for less than four or five days may return with \$100 worth of merchandise duty free.

The decision applies to stilling returning from Canada, with exemption as applies to those returning from abroad.

The case decided was brought by H. Ely Goldsmith, consulting an immigration lawyer, who protested against paying duty on a table cloth purchased in Canada.

The decision will remove irritation along the Canadian border as to Americans who are buying Irish linen, English and Scotch wools and English china and porcelain in Canada for souvenir and household use cheaper than in the United States.

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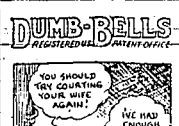

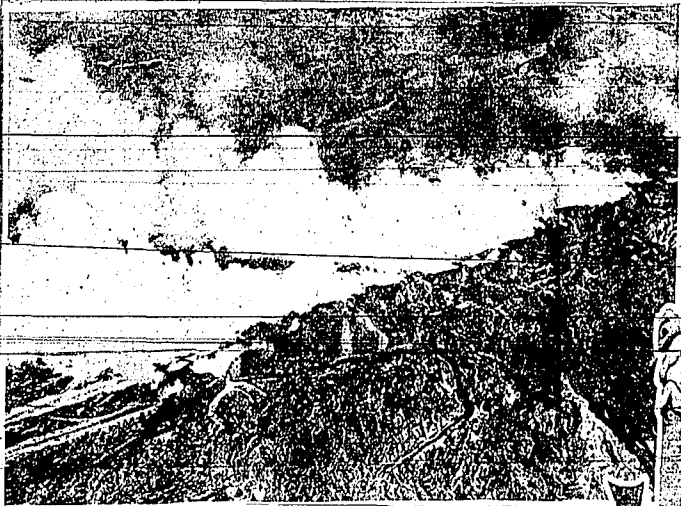

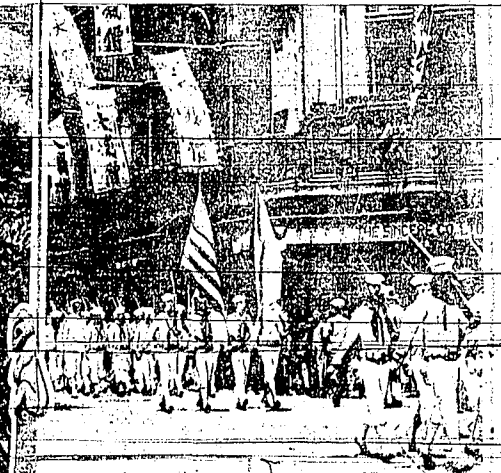

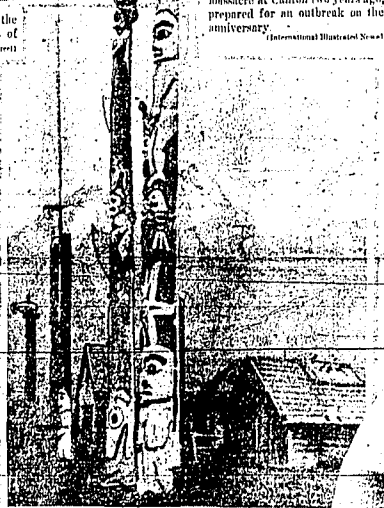

HUNGARIAN EUROPE

Statenen at Versailles Reduce Country to Great Extent; Land Left Partly Submerged.

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—Hungary's summer is if you had had had it.

Statenen at Versailles in 1919 turned the state of Hungary to a state less than five large. They reduced a country as large as Illinois, Indiana and Ohio together to a country the size of Indiana.

Even the 25,000 square mile of Hungary was partly submerged real estate—practically all of it.

The Thes, not the Danube, is the principal river of Hungary. Flowing through the flat Hungarian plain it was twisted itself into a snaking Mississippi. It wanders for 200 miles through a fertile valley 500 miles long. Several rivers became stagnant lakes, shaped like new moons.

While the Thes, flowing south to the Danube, creates conditions of malaria—malaria, its drainage has a different course. Soon after the first bend in the Danube, the narrow pass through the Carpathian mountains known as the Iron Gate.

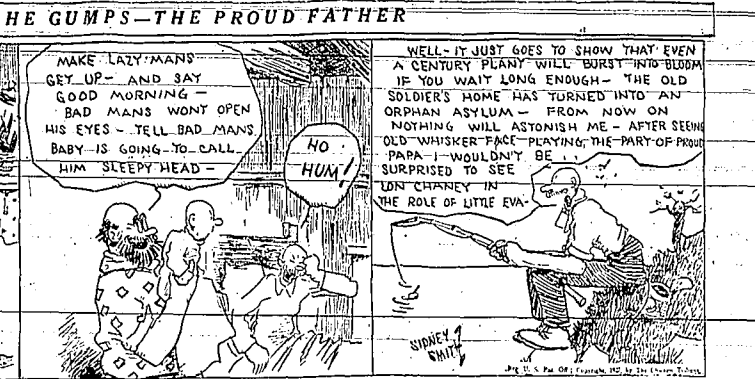
