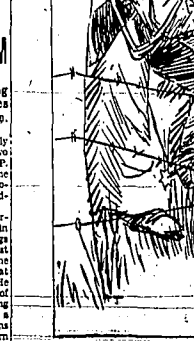

DEMPSEY IS READY TO QUIT RING AFTER FIGHT WITH TUNNEY

Win Back the Crown, Will Get Out of the Game Forever Rather Than Wait Long for Contenders' Says Ex-Champ.

(By The Associated Press) ATLANTA, Ga., July 23—Win or lose the Tunney bout, Jack Dempsey will hang up his gloves hereafter unless the heavyweight field is thick enough with prospects to keep him busy fighting, the former king of the heavyweights declared as he passed through Atlanta on his transcontinental swing.

"If I win back the crown, I'll get out of the game forever rather than wait two or three years before meeting a worthy contender," he found time to say amid the enthusiastic welcome he received here.

Favors September Date "No later than September 24, some time between September 15 and then," expressed Dempsey's desire in the matter of setting a date for the next step in his comeback effort, the bout with Gene Tunney, which everybody, including Jack, seems certain will take place in Chicago. His arrangements with Tex Rickard are complete, he said.

Probably for the thousands time during his southward trip, where people at every station at which his train stopped greeted him and cheered him. He patiently answered questions about the mooted blows to Sharkey's midriff.

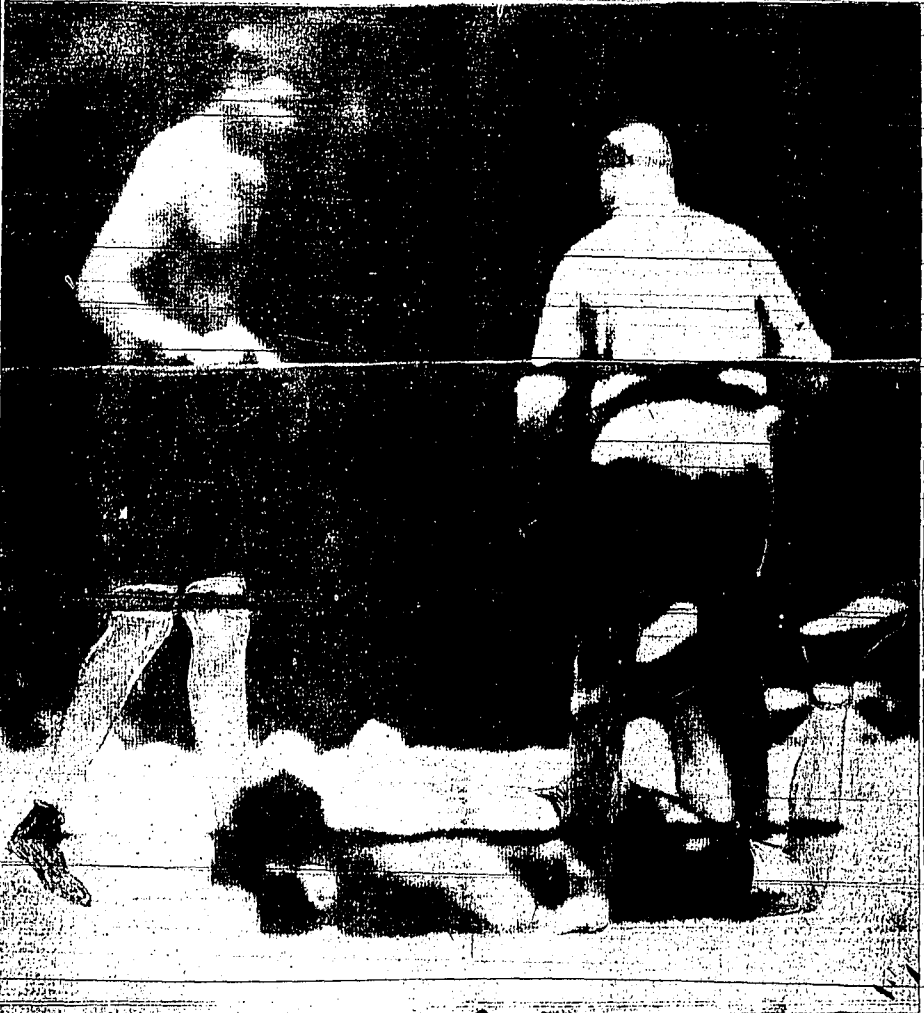
OFFICIALS ANNOUNCE CHANGE IN SCHEDULE

RICKARD NAMES JACK DEMPSEY AS MAN TO FIGHT GENE TUNNEY

Champion's Contract With Promoter-Calls for Selection of Opponent, Setting of Date and Site for Title Bout.

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, July 23—After formally naming Jack Dempsey as the man who will fight Gene Tunney for the heavyweight championship this fall, Tex Rickard today declared—his matches that may head another contender to a title shot in 1928.

Although Tunney's contract with the promoter called for selection of an opponent at will at the discretion of the champion's first title defense by July 25, Rickard agreed to a delay until August in the carrying out of the latter two conditions. Rickard declared the fight will take place between September 15 and 20, but where he did not know. No direct proposition has yet been made to take the match in Chicago, he said. "I have strong reports that the 10-round fight already had been allotted to the mid-west metropolis in the hope of achieving the first \$2,000,000 'gate' in title history."

After the conference with Tunney, Rickard sought to arrange a match between "Jack Dempsey and Paulino Uzcudun," Spanish woodchopper, who recently cut down Harry Wills, the giant negro. The light heavyweight champion agreed to Rickard's terms, but Uzcudun would not sign without considering the matter for several days with his board of managers.

Dempsey agreed to forfeit his 195-pound title in order to take on Paulino, and if victorious, meet Jack Sharkey in a double header. The double header will follow Dempsey's crushing attack Thursday night, in ready for any match that will place him back in the title hunt, Rickard said.

THE RESTORED OIL RESERVES

The navy's oil reserves, it is announced, will be completely restored to the Navy Department by August one, six years after their unfortunate transfer to the War Department.

The Navy Department announces that, in administering the oil reserves, its policy, in line with legislation applying to the reserves as interpreted by the courts, will be a policy of conservation.

This is as it should be. It should never have been otherwise.

And speaking of conservation, it would be well if the navy were somewhat spread out to include all the nation's oil fields, those privately owned as well as those held by the government.

Conservation here should mean not only holding certain reserves, but also the curbing of waste, the complete exhaustion of a well before abandoning it, and the adoption of more efficient methods of drilling, pumping and refining.

# IMPLIED WARRANTY SHOULD BE PROVEN IN LAW AND FACT

### Supreme Court in Suit Over Lump Sum Developments Holds More Than Inference From Suspicion Is Needed.

Holding that implied warranty must be established by the law and evidence, and cannot be established by inference from a circumstantial fact, the supreme court in an opinion rendered in the case of C. A. McMaster against L. A. Warner, by McArthur J. Chapman, attorney for McArthur, upheld the verdict for \$3000 and attorneys' fees, given plaintiff in accordance with the instruction of Judge W. H. Babcock.

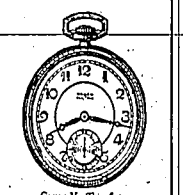
In January, 1925, Warner bought several head of stock at a sale held by McArthur. Among these was a heifer, "Golden Lady," which the defendant—evolution—alleged McArthur recommended to Warner and for which \$250 was paid. Late during the following summer a lump appeared on the jaw of the heifer, but disappeared, and reappeared again in October or November when it was killed. Dr. Eerkline examined the animal and found a long scar between the jaws, which had healed. He could not say how long the cure declares. Other veterinarians said it looked like an old scar, and did not fit the case where it was made, but thought it looked as if it had been caused by lumpy jaw. On May 15, the heifer was shipped to Ogden and sold for beef.

Lump jaw develops in the Warner herd, causing considerable loss. Warner refused to pay the note given for the stock and filed counter claim for \$3000. The court says that the theory of Warner apparently was that the heifer carried germs of lump jaw on the day of the sale and was not fit for the purpose for which she was purchased and that this constituted a violation of an implied warranty of fitness. It says that there is nothing in the record to show that McArthur knew or had reason to know that the heifer was likely to become infected with lump jaw, and that the experts did not testify as to when, in their opinion, infection took place, whether before or after the purchase of the heifer by Warner.

# COMING LAMB SALE AT FILER LARGEST IN UNITED STATES

### Method of Breeding to Secure Early Supply for Market Is Described by President T. C. Bacon of Wool Association

In the Idaho Sheepman's method of segregating, white-faced ewes are bred black-faced bucks for quick and early maturing choice market lambs. According to T. C. Bacon, president of the Idaho Woolgrowers' association in a statement today.

"The new lambs—jams this season, will be made up of ewes bred on the range and of the ewe lamb, and therefore marketed, making it necessary for the Idaho range man to buy lambs of 40,000 yearling ewes to replace his flock and keep his number up. Mr. Bacon stated:

"There will be a select bunch of flocks of the white-faced breed offered at the state fair sale to be held at Filer August 10—Three flocks of the Rambouillet—Lincoln—Puriana—Galloway—Skielving—North Western—Galloway—and—Corriedale breeds, will be suitable for raising the best possible white-face ewe lambs to supply this large market here in Idaho. This demand is largely supplied from Oregon, Montana, Wyoming and other western breeding states at present," Mr. Bacon said, and more of them should be raised at home.

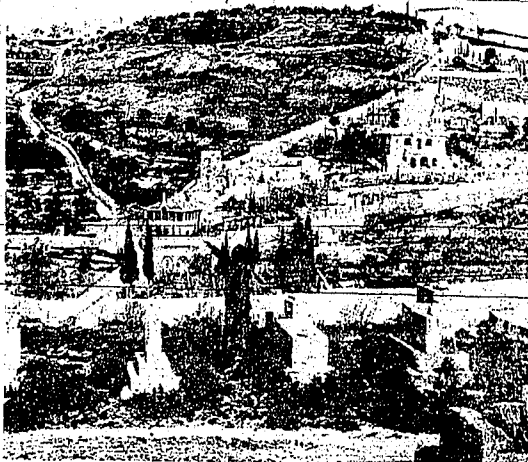

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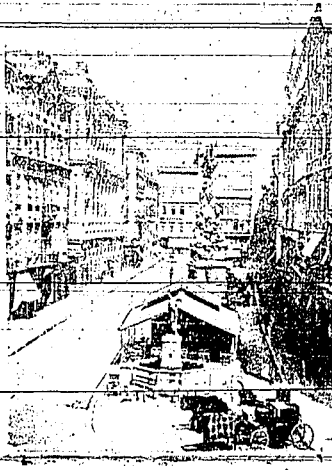

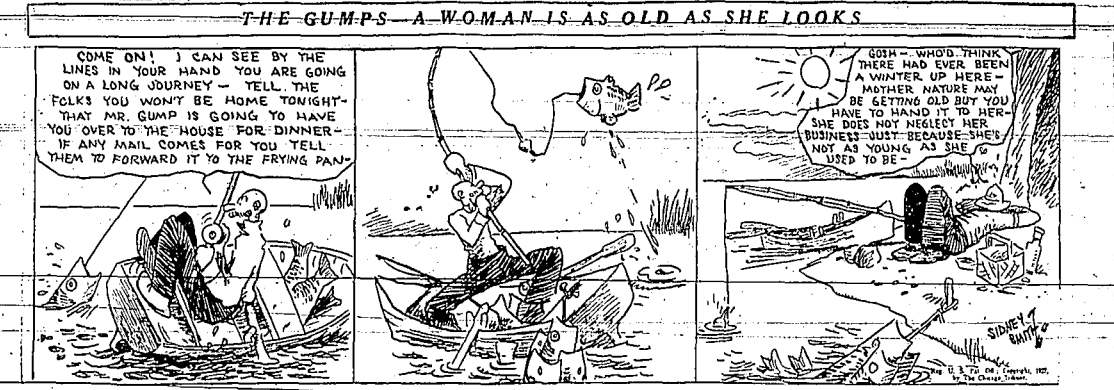
