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FLIERS LEAP TO DEATH FROM BURNING AIRPLANE

Trapped in Blazing Monoplane 700 Feet Above Ground Two Men Die in Escape Attempt. CHICAGO, July 30 (AP)—Trapped in a burning monoplane 700 feet above the ground a flying instructor and a student aviator were killed tonight when they jumped from the ship to escape the fire. The blazing plane crashed, a twisted mass of wreckage, in Oaklawn, a suburb, beside the bodies of its victims before the horrified gaze of a score of the village residents. The bodies were identified as George Albert, 26, instructor, and James Ross, 30, a student, both of Chicago. Residents of Oaklawn said they saw a puff of smoke and heard a loud explosion when the plane was at an altitude of about 600 feet. The pilot apparently made a desperate effort to effect a quick landing and headed the plane's nose down as the ship burst into flames. When about 500 feet from the ground one of the men, his clothes ablaze, leaped to his death and moments later the second occupant, a human torch, jumped from the cockpit. Neither carried a parachute. The crash was the second here this week.

350 MEN FIGHTING FIRE ON RESERVE IN OREGON

Every available man employed on the Bear creek project was thrown onto the fire line and men were hurried from Sandy to assist in keeping the flames from reaching the dense timber of the watershed.

FOREST FIRES IN COAST STATES STILL MENACING

Timber Blazes in California and Oregon Under Control of Fighters, but Still Dangerous. SAN FRANCISCO, July 30 (AP)—Forest fires which were started by lightning and have spread during the last two days through the forest preserves from northern California to Crater Lake, Oregon, were reported under control tonight but still in a menacing state unless extinguished by heavy rains. One fire, a 20-acre conflagration at Needle Rock, Oregon, was causing the most trouble. Forest reserve officials in Medford, Oregon, announced. The government has been asked for supplies to fly over the burning areas and report the status of the various fires so that a serious situation may be averted.

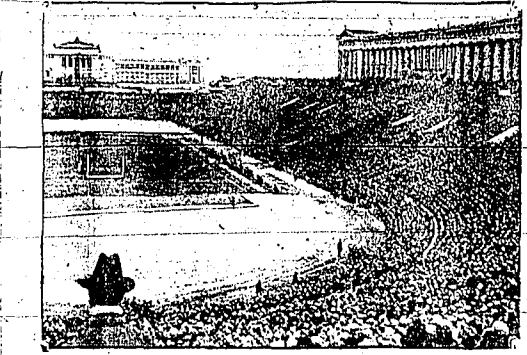

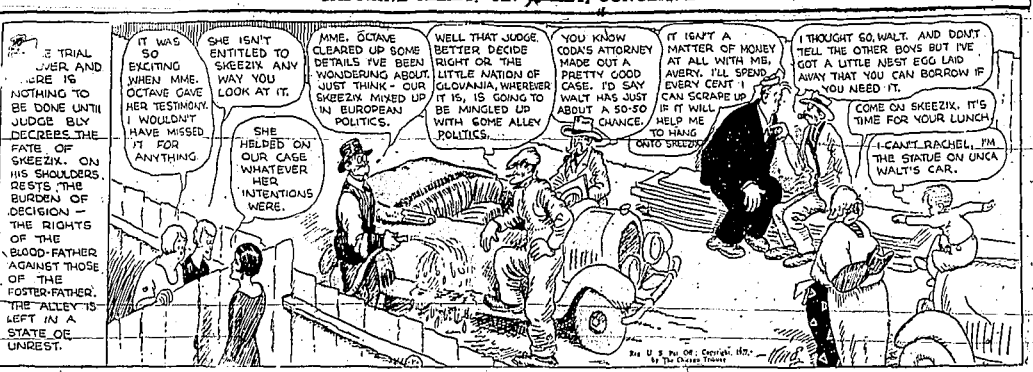

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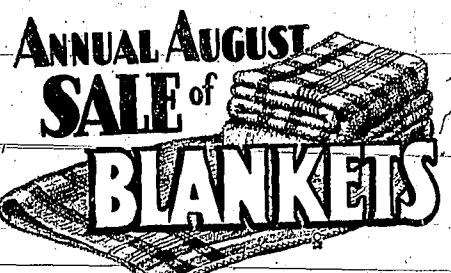

### CEDAR CREEK SUIT OVER RESERVOIR IS SETTLED BY PARTIES

Adjustment for Lands Con-  
ceded for Reservoir Water  
Is Reached After Two Trials  
Here; Two Appeals Are Taken.

Complete settlement was reached Saturday in the case of the Idaho Lands Development company against the Brackets et al. suit, which has been pending in court for the past two years and which has been tried twice in the district court and heard twice on the supreme court. The case involved the value of part of the land conveyed to the Cedar Creek reservoir by the former water right to the reservoir tract.


Cause of suit was adjustment proceedings when the defendant company and the defendant suits regarding the value of the land could not be reached. The judgment approximated \$40,000 for defendant. The exact terms of settlement are not known. However, it is known that title to the Annapolis Springs stock ranch and 200 acres, which had been acquired by the company with about 600 acres in other lands, passed to the defendants who will, it is reported, in addition receive about \$2,000 additional for the property covered by the reservoir to which they had title. The reservoir is one of the best in southern Idaho. The reservoir covered other lands but adjustment for these had been previously made. The principal stockholders in the Idaho Lands Development company are E. T. Meredith of Boise, Idaho, former secretary of agriculture, and his brother, P. C. Meredith of Boise. Attorneys in the case are Edwin Snow of Boise for the Meredith interests and Judge E. A. Walters, E. M. Wolfe and J. T. Hamilton of Twin Falls for the Brackets.

### Seed Collector Is In Operation Here

### Tariff on Onions May Be Increased

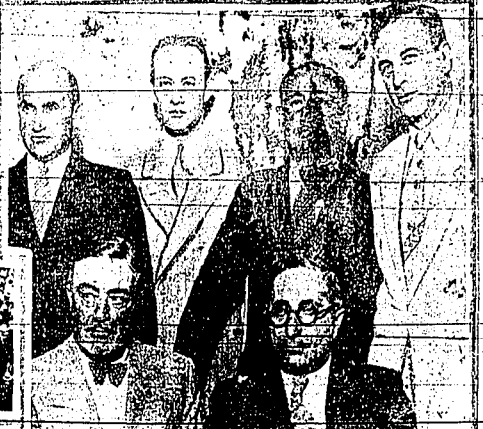

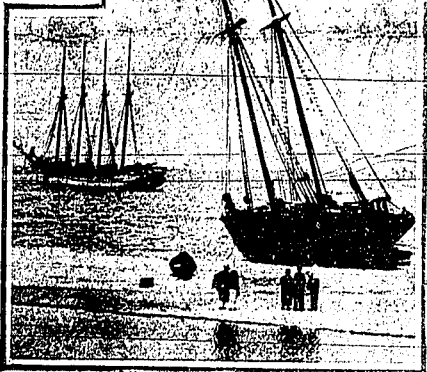

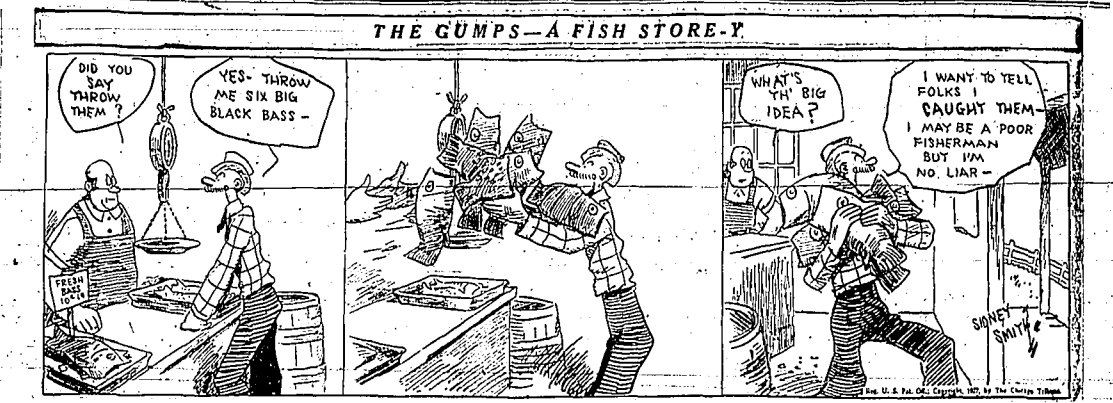
