

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE WILL NOT CONSENT TO RECENT DECISION

Amplification of Statement: "Do Not Choose to Run for Office in 1928," Is Lacking; Reporters Question Executive.

(By The Associated Press) RAPID CITY, S. D., Aug. 5.—It was emphasized today at the summer White House that President Coolidge is planning to leave office March 4, 1929, but no amplification of his statement on Tuesday that "I do not choose to run for president in 1928" was forthcoming. 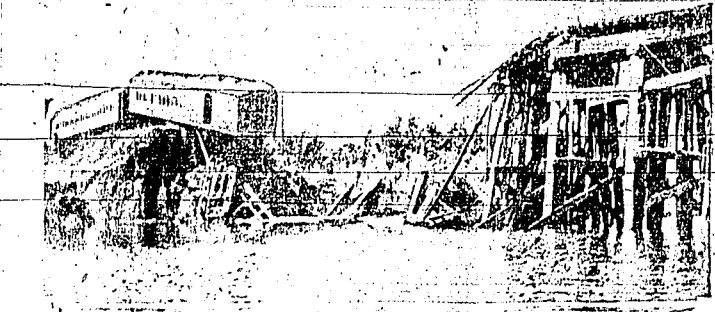

UNION PACIFIC CUTS WHEAT FREIGHT RATE TO COAST MARKETS

Twin Falls Shippers to Ship by Way of Wells—Five-Cents Cheaper Than Through Ogden, Under New Schedule.

A cut of five cents per hundred in the freight rate on wheat from Twin Falls to San Francisco over the Well-to-Ogden route was announced by the Union Pacific on August 4.

While an official announcement of this cut from 20 cents per hundred to 45 cents per hundred was not made until later than September 16, according to advices received here by F. E. Beach, Oregon Short Line agent.

"This cut in the freight rate should greatly stimulate shipments to California ports," said Mr. Beach. "San Francisco—about two tons to 10 tons of wheat daily and other heavy commodities from California are also heavy consumers."

Ogden Agents Claim—"Heretofore most of the wheat shipped to Denver and has gone through Ogden, where it is inspected. It is a primary wheat shipment point, the same as Kansas City and several other western points."

"An average of from 150 to 100 cars of wheat is shipped to California annually and will continue such a heavy consumer. It is likely that the better wheat to establish branch lines here or at least send their buyers into this territory, the reduction in freight being a sufficient attraction to bring a large amount of the shipments westward."
