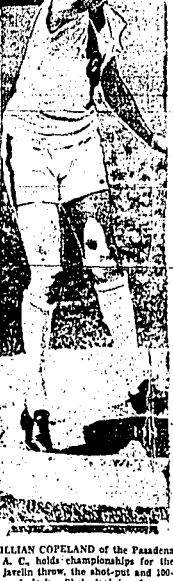

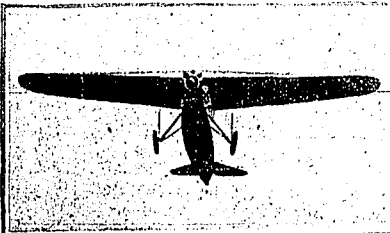

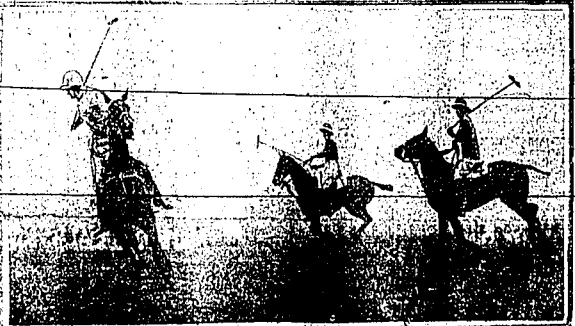

ARMY TRAINS COOKS IN ARTS OF KITCHEN

United States War Department Shares Philosophy Set Forth by Great French General.

JUNCTION CITY, Kas., Aug. 12 (AP)—Napoleon's conviction that an army travels on its stomach is shared by the war department of the United States. It maintains a cooking school at Fort Riley to train leaders, cooks and sergeants in the art of feeding soldiers, and through its activities the government has learned how to insure soldiers an ample diet on 23 cents apiece a day.

A class of bakers and cooks first met at Fort Riley in 1905, was housed in a real school in 1908, and now more than 100 men graduate yearly from the school to become instructors in similar schools in each corps area. Officers, too, are trained to culinary arts and meat management. The object of feeding soldiers on 23 cents a day, officers say, is quantity, variety, palatability and health, and a knowledge of how best to prepare them.

Here are some tips for housewives from the military kitchen: Hash is never served. Most bottles of cosmetics are made from the gold medals that cannot be utilized otherwise. Left-over bread is never thrown away. It is dried, toasted, and used in soups.

Soups are a regular item on the army menu. Bones are not cooked with meat, but are removed and boiled to make soup stock. Enough soup for 100 men can be made from 38 to 45 cents' worth of the next meal. Cheaper cuts of meat than those prepared in the home are prepared occasionally. Bananas and citrus take the place of prime rib and loin on the army menu. Left-over potatoes represent the next meal as "hash-brown." The army system is applicable to civilian life. Bakers who have started bakeries or bakeries of their own.

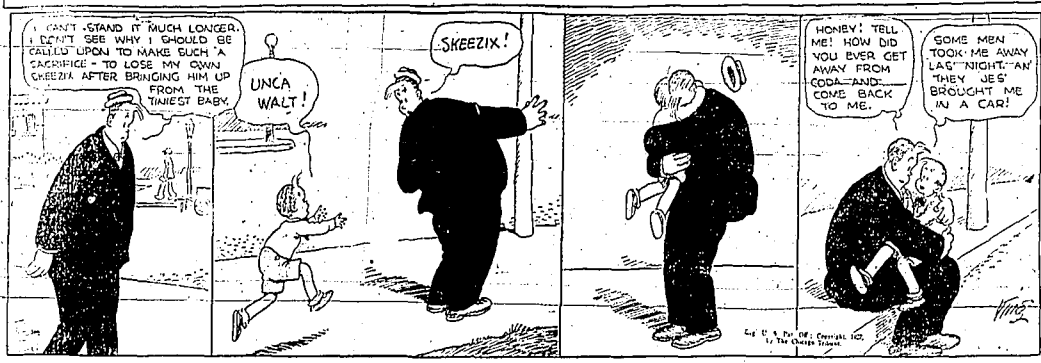

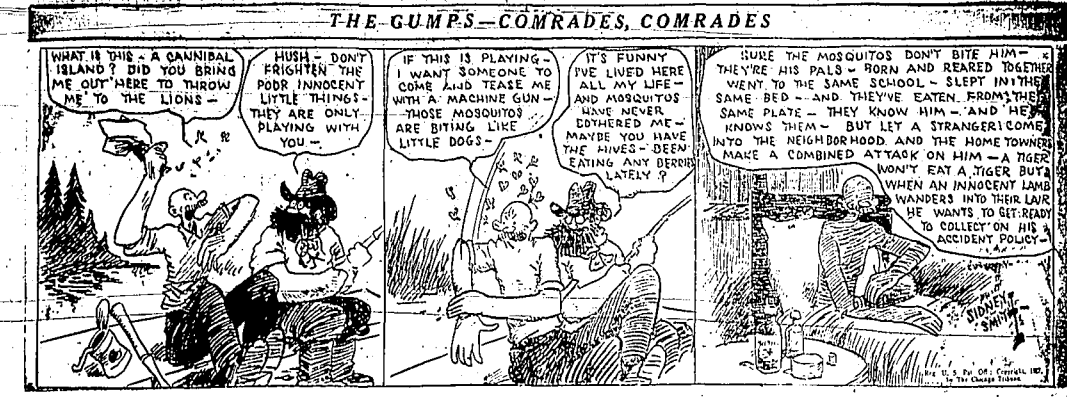
