Other features of the program will be handling of the bull, and other rates and fair work, in the evening.

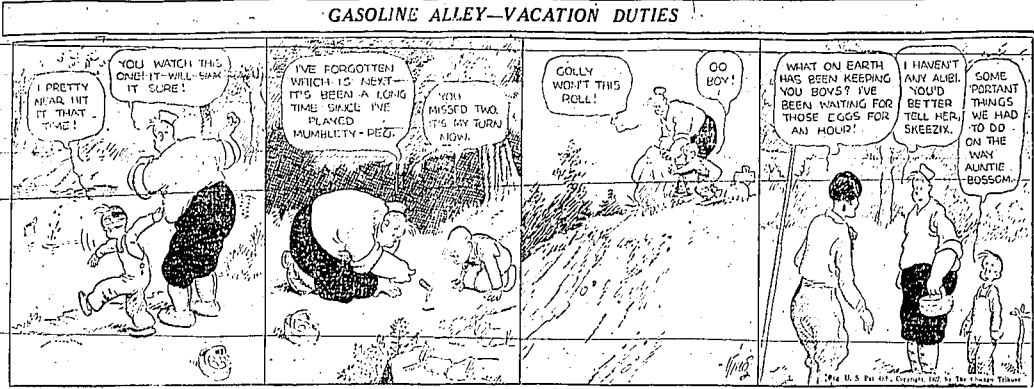

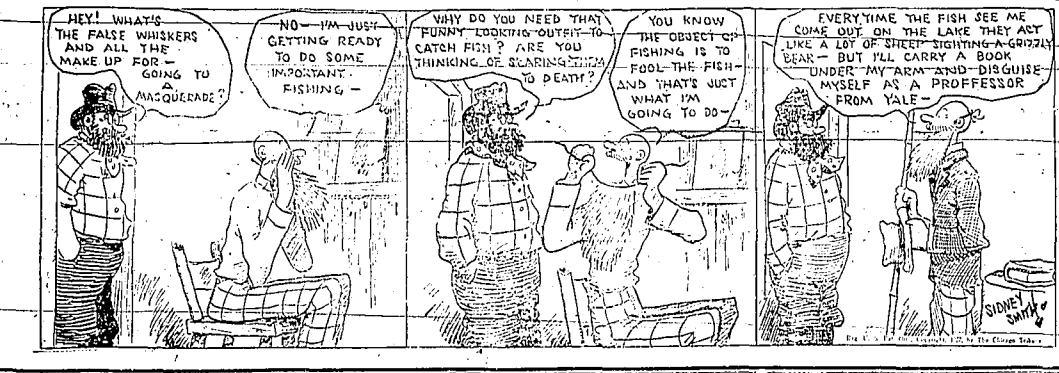
