COOLIDGES ARRIVE IN YELLOWSTONE PARK TO VIEW FAMOUS SCENES

First Day of Chief Executive's Visit in Great National Playgrounds Is Crowded; Week's Itinerary to Be Heavy One.

(By The Associated Press.) YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Aug. 27.—With a week of touring and rest before them, President and Mrs. Coolidge came into Yellowstone national park today to view its scenic spots on a program which has been arranged for as yet undisturbed but ambitious tourists.

It called for a steady trot through the cloud-broken mountains and through valleys bubbling with waters and hot springs from a volcanic activity—a program which has not been the first night stop in the spacious mountain residence of H. W. Child, president of the Yellowstone hotel corporation, when they stopped overnight at an automobile camp near Camp Roosevelt to visit the Tower falls region.

Returning this evening, they rested in the Child home across from Mammoth, but for the crowded, week-long itinerary before them. From here in this wonderful area where everything is beautiful and safely populated, large crowds are following the president's movements. His arrival at Mammoth will not deal like coming to a gay week-end party, where the guests stand in front of the hotel and wait for the president to appear in a motorcade.

Coolidges Count on Pleasant Week. And for the president and Mrs. Coolidge this is to be a week of good times—actually the first of this kind Mr. Coolidge has had since he entered the White House. Apparently, anticipating his pleasures, the president was immediately delighted to be in the park. He usually has a custom to talk as when stopping on trips, but today as the train passed through the mountain cities, he carried verbally with some of the folk who came down to his train.

Reaching the Yellowstone about the middle of the afternoon, the president will be in the midst of some lively times. Hundreds of guests are awaiting the Coolidges, and the jazz instruments of college boys lie to wile away the evening. In the day time, there is ample opportunity for horseback riding, tobogganing and hiking, and many places to go for sightseeing.

DIVORCE COURT ENDS LONG MARITAL BATTLE

Charles Spencer Chaplin Trades \$625,000 and Custody of Two Sons for Interlocutory Decree.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—Charles Spencer Chaplin pleaded today to divorce court here today and traded \$625,000 and permanent custody of his two sons to his old wife, Lita Grey Chaplin, for an interlocutory decree of divorce.

Into an honor's session of Judge Walter Coker's court, at which Mrs. Chaplin argued and Chaplin pleaded, read the final verdict to the eight months marital strife.

A property settlement, reached out of court was announced by Edwin E. Murray, chief of counsel for the suing wife, and Mrs. Chaplin made her own routine entry of custody from the witness stand.

A few corroborative witnesses were sworn, testified briefly and the decree was granted.

In addition to the \$625,000 which Chaplin agreed to pay his wife, the comedian established a trust fund of \$200,000 for his two boys. The principal of this fund will go to the children when they are 21. Mrs. Chaplin agrees that she will receive the \$225,000 Chaplin agreed to pay \$100,000 as expenses of his wife during their separation, \$25,000 for the reversion costs and fees; \$21,000 for stock and \$100,000 a month for the support, maintenance and education of the children for a period of five years pending setting up of the trust fund.

Mrs. Chaplin will receive \$375,000 of the total award at once in cash, her legal representative said, the remainder to be paid her in a period of two years, as follows:

On September 1, 1928, \$100,000; September 1, 1929, \$100,000 and a salary for 1930, the balance of \$50,000. Within 15 seconds after Judge Coker had completed reading the decree ruling divorcing certain testimony of Murray had announced receiving the settlement. 1927 TAX LEVY WILL BE OVER SIX MILLS

Increase of Approximately 15 Cents per \$100 of Assessed Valuation Announced at Boise

BOISE, Aug. 27.—Idaho's 1927 tax levy is fixed at Idaho's six mills, or one and one-half cents per dollar of assessed value for the year 1927, resulting in an increase of approximately 15 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation. This announcement was made today by E. G. Calkins, state auditor, on the work of the state board of equalization in fixing the tax levy for appropriation among the counties on the basis of the 1926 valuation.

Practically the entire revenue for the state is derived from taxes levied on the property, the rate for 1927. The rate of the levy on the 1926 valuation of \$177,662,231 is fixed at six mills, or one and one-half cents per \$100 of assessed value. General interest and sinking fund tax, three-tenths of a cent, and the three state highway bonds, one and one-tenth of a cent, approximately one-tenth of a mill, to total 6.3 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation.

Arkansas River Floods Raging; Many Homeless

Edwina Opens Arms to Refugees For Fourth Time in Year; 1000 Persons Face Plow Waters

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 27.—Edwina, Calicut county, for the fourth time this year, has opened her arms to flood victims and more than 200 persons are seeking refuge in the town as the Arkansas river continues its encroachment upon their lands.

Refugees now are being cared for at Edwina, Dana, and McGowan, and Colton plant and much more than 1000.

Encroached banks in the Proffers and McGowan areas, and the subsequent inundation of land in Deola and several counties rendered establishment of the Proffers, McGowan and Dana camps, while flood waters in the White, yawning levees from Dr. Art and inundation of lands near Edwina and Georgetown.

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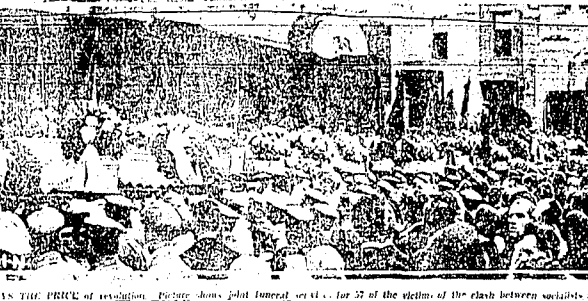

QUINCY PROFESSORS BRING IN CHARGES Whether "Firing" of Two Instructors From College Is Blow to Freedom of Question.

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Aug. 22 (AP)—Whether the "firing" of two professors at Marshall college, state-supported institution here, was a blow to academic freedom, as is claimed by their supporters, or merely a necessary step in the interest of the college, is the question to be decided by the state board of education.

A hearing will be granted August 25 to Professor S. S. Wolfe and Professor W. H. Blythe, directors of the college faculty by President M. S. Shaker, with the board's approval.

Meantime students and alumni, stirred by the firing of the two teachers, have circulated petitions and raised protests over what they consider a "fundamental" attack was to be launched against members of the faculty of West Virginia University at Morgantown, the largest state educational institution.

The board did not respond Professor Wolfe and Blythe for the coming school year. It was wanted that Professor Wolfe was dismissed by a "disciplinary committee" in the college.

MOTION PICTURE AIDS IN STUDY OF CANCER Films and Camera Assisting Scientists in Combating and Learning of Deadly Tumor.

LONDON, Aug. 22 (AP)—Motion pictures are the latest weapon used by scientists in the study of cancer. The annual report of the British Cancer Research Committee, which is the story of the expanding cancer cell.

"In studying the growth of human cancer," says the committee, "the most important factor is the behavior of the cancer cells. Photo can be taken at intervals of ten seconds, thirty seconds, one minute, and so on.

The photographs are taken over a period of time as long as two days. In order to get the most accurate results, the film must be developed up as much as 200 times.

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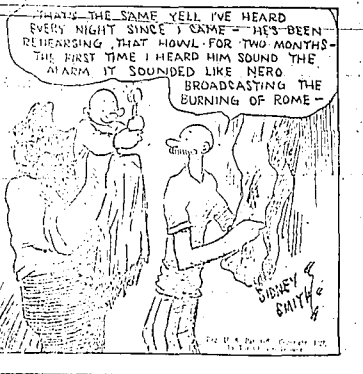
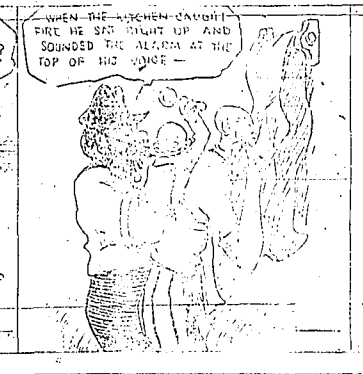
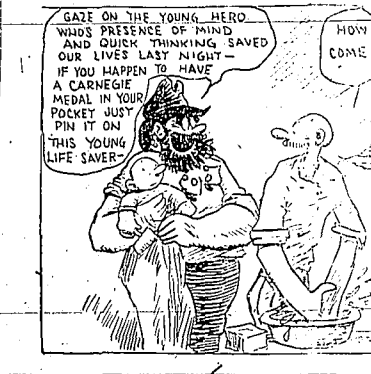
