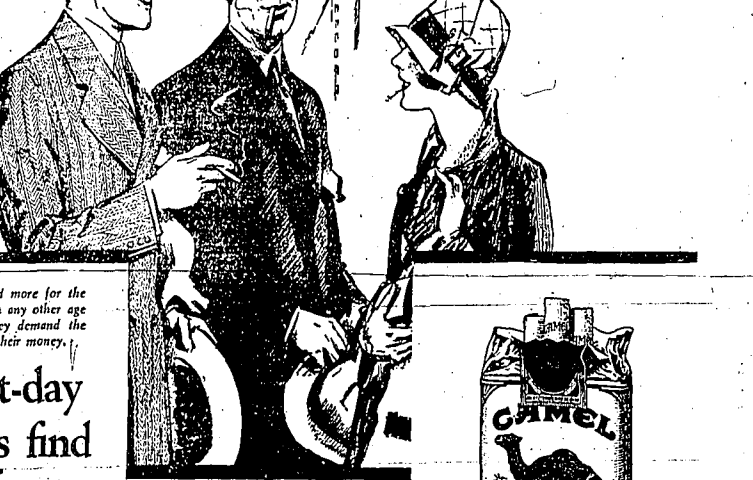

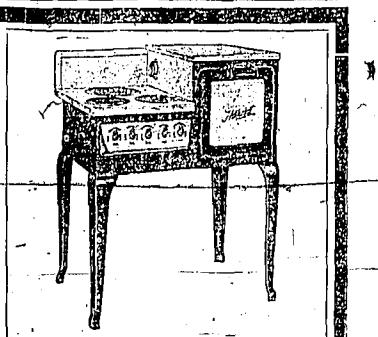

CLOSE LAST GAP IN TITANIC SPAN OVER SNAKE RIVER CANYON

Bridge Builders Lock Last of 30,000 Tons of Steel Into Place in Highest Highway Bridge in World.

Massive steel girders were put out Thursday and locked into place on the final gap in the great Twin Falls-Keokee bridge spanning Snake

river in Idaho. The work was completed on the south side of the bridge. Closing of the gap was attended by no extraordinary amount of hurried preparations during the day witnessed the work. It was a rather slow and painstaking operation. At the end of the day, one after another of the connecting links between the two great sections of the span were lifted and bolted into place.

Midway between the great canyon walls that are 1400 feet apart at this point, and nearly 50 feet above the water in the river below, workmen, using the big cables and carrying the steel and concrete into its place in the big span, moved it into position in these final stages of the bridge on the big span.

Ahead of Schedule
L. G. Murray, superintendent of construction, was jubilant as the work went forward. Murray is to direct the final gap hour-and-a-half in advance of the time he had set in his reports for this phase of the construction.

One of the most interested spectators who never deserted the scene throughout the day was S. L. Hodson of Twin Falls, attorney for the bridge builders and during a long period of days before construction was begun, their only representative on the ground.

All of all of the steel now in place, there remains, Mr. Murray stated, about three weeks' work for riveting its binding the steel cores and braces of the great structure complete. The Union Bridge company and the Puget Sound Bridge and Dredging company, cooperating in the building of the big span, have set September 15 as the date for its opening. Mr. Murray stated last evening.

Construction of the big bridge, under Mr. Murray's supervision, has been pushed forward well ahead of schedule since the opening of 30,000 tons of steel entering into the structure was begun last May 1. He would say last evening, however, only that the bridge will be completed in time for opening by next October 1, the time fixed by terms of the franchise that was granted by commissioners of Jerome and Twin Falls counties to R. M. Murray, designer of the bridge.

Charles G. Huber, president of the Union Bridge company, is to be here, early next week, Mr. Murray was advised last evening.

He Sees 'Contact' Big Mining Camp

Contact is destined to become one of the great copper camps of the west but like the development of all copper camps, it is going to take some time to bring it into being, states Edwin P. Gray, president of the Great Mining and Development company, who is at the Recreation.
