BALDRIDGE DECLARES FOR STANDARDIZATION OF PRODUCTS OF FARM

Chief Executive Handles Many Issues Vital to Commonwealth in Address at All-North Idaho Picnic Outing

(By The Associated Press) COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, Aug. 27.—With all Idaho enjoying an abundant degree of prosperity at present and with the future for the state's major industries brighter than ever before, Governor C. H. Baldrige, speaking here today at the all-North Idaho picnic, urged continued standardization and registration of Idaho agricultural products.

In referring to the phenomenal development of Idaho and the west coast during the past 25 years, the governor declared: "It seems scarcely credible that during the next few years Idaho will experience an even more rapid period of growth and development."

Growth of Pacific coast cities and the expansion of export business to the Orient make imperative the supply of foodstuffs in ever increasing quantities by the international states. The governor predicted that the west will be brought under cultivation, when every minute product will be explored, and second-growth timber on the Pacific coast in north Idaho will be for more than the present value of the land upon which the timber is growing.

Idaho Financially Sound As barometers of Idaho's sound financial condition, Governor Baldrige noted a five and one-half million dollar increase in savings deposits since 1922, promptness of tax payments more than one-half million dollars of state taxes paid in the first six months of the year, and early remittances by counties of state taxes.

One of the most important problems of state administration named by the governor in his early address of some 100 minutes to save "taxpayers interest on current obligations of approximately \$100 for every working day."

"It should be a part of the concern of every good citizen to see that means to curtail them, and that that liberal spending of public funds be materially lessened," Governor Baldrige said.

"When I established my home in Idaho in 1904 the population of the state was 100,000," he said. "Today the population is approximately 300,000."

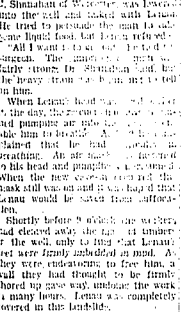

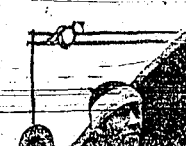

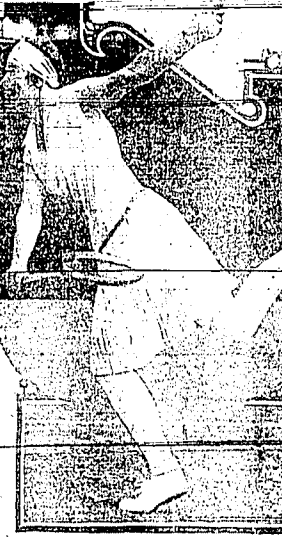
